## Oil Is Defense Against Scale

Late winter is an excellent time to begin protecting deciduous fruit, nut and landscape trees from scale insects, aphids and other overwintering insects and eggs.

"January and February are prime months to apply a dormant oil spray," said Dr. John A. Lipe, Extension Service horticulturist at Fredericksburg.

As winter draws to an end, insects grow weaker and are more vulnerable to the suffocating oil film. However, producers must be sure not to apply dormant oil after trees have begun to leaf out or bloom.

The main target of the oil spraying is scale. Scale are sucking insects that attach themselves to tree limbs and branches with smooth, tender bark. They drain sap from the plant, and a serious infestation of scale insects can weaken and kill branches or entire trees.

"Scale insects enclose them-

## Purchasing Manual Announced

"When you use local tax dollars to buy everything from paper clips to patrol cars, you want the most mileage for your money," State Comptroller John Sharp said today.

"Now, for the first time, everything city and county governments need to know about purchasing-from state regulations and procedures to the bidding process and cooperative buying-is in the Comptroller's new purchasing manual for local governments," Sharp said.

Sharp unveiled *Model Purchasing Manual for Texas Cities and Counties* Tuesday, February 19, at the 33rd Annual County Judges and Commissioners Conference at Texas A & M University in College Station.

"The new manual is easy to use, even for those who don't know the first thing about purchasing. You don't have to be a lawyer or an accountant to use this book," Sharp said.

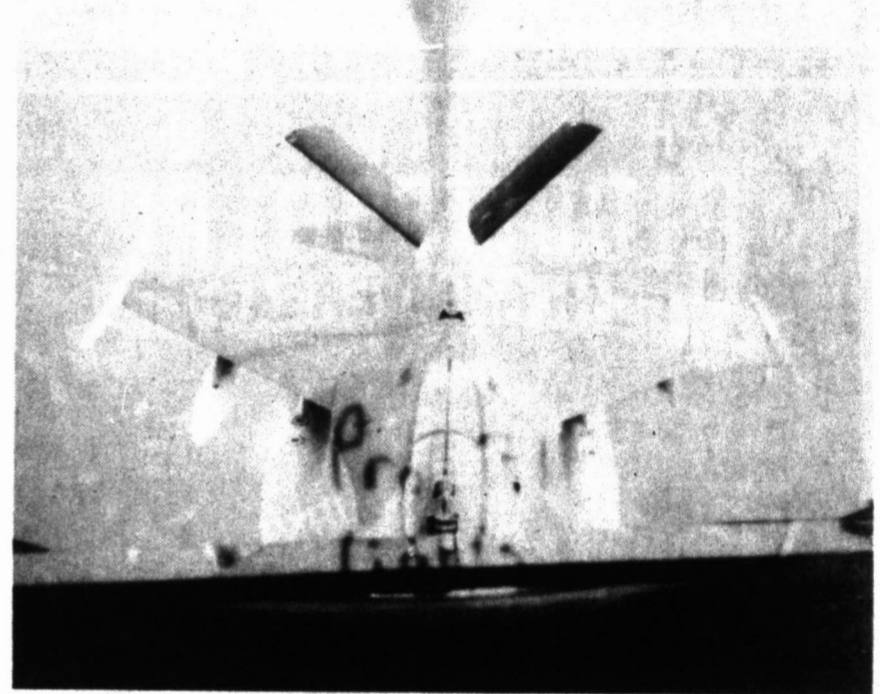
The manual was developed because the Comptroller's office was receiving so many questions from local government officials about purchasing procedures.

"It's a very confusing and sometimes very complicated subject, and local officials need to have the correct answers available for them in one place," Sharp said.

The purchasing manual also is backed up by telephone assistance through a toll-free call to the Comptroller's Local Government Division. Additionally, agency staff is available to conduct seminars about the purchasing manual.

"We'll come right to the courthouses and city halls, go over the manual, and help local officials set up an efficient and effective purchasing process," Sharp said.

## Local Justices Attend School

A total of 104 newly elected justices of the peace from across the state attended a 40-hour basic school January 27 - February 1 in Austin conducted by the Texas Justice Court Training headquartered at Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos. The school is held in compliance with Supreme Court Rule and Statute (Art. 27.005) Texas Government Code which requires newly elected or appointed justices of the peace to attend a 40-hour course within one year of taking office.

Topics covered included court management, setting-up court, liabilities, judicial ethics, financial management, court security, criminal jurisdiction and venue, parks and wildlife laws, traffic laws, alcoholic beverage laws, civil jurisdiction and venue, forcible entry and detainer statutes, basic civil procedure, peace bonds, emergency commitments, duties of a magistrate, truancy, administrative hearings, rules of evidence, search warrants, vital statistics, and inquests.

**Bedwetting: Causes and Cures**

According to a recent study, 14 percent of children between the ages of 5 and 13 wet the bed. Nighttime bedwetting can result from many different causes. Heredity seems to be a big factor. It has been reported that in 44 percent of families with a child that wets the bed, one of the child's parents also was a bedwetter. The incidence is higher if both parents were bedwetters.

Organic causes of bedwetting include structural defects in the urinary tract at birth, a small bladder, urinary tract infections, diabetes, epilepsy, and neurological problems. Researchers recently found that the absence of the hormone vasopressin may be a factor in childhood bedwetting. Organic causes may require surgery or other procedures.

Nonorganic causes may be approached with behavioral techniques. The child may be instructed to take charge of such things as making a trip to the bathroom before bedtime, washing soiled bedclothes, and charting the progress of the number of dry nights experienced. Moisture alarm systems are sometimes useful. Prescription medicines used to treat bedwetting include vasopressin, certain antidepressants, and occasionally, amphetamines.

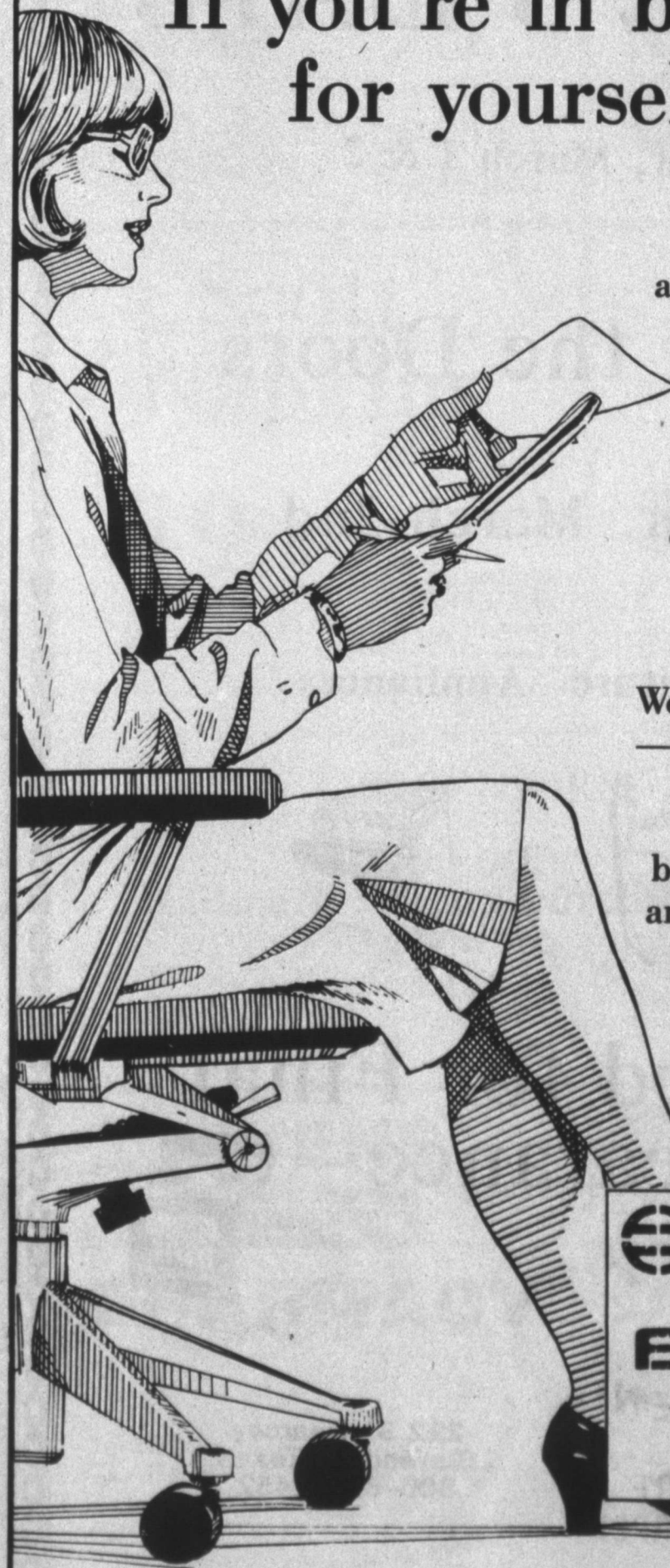

**Interest Rate Drop**

The recent decline in interest rates may be good news for some veterans. Declining rates usually mean that high interest loans can be refinanced at lower rates. Often this will save veterans hundreds of dollars a month, or thousands over the life of the loan. According to Al Poteet, Waco VA Regional Office Director, Texas has about 17,000 outstanding VA home loans with interest rates above 12 percent. Poteet estimates the balances of these mortgages at more than \$941,421,862.00.

To cite an example: If your original loan was \$70,000 and you had an interest rate of 13 percent for 30 years, your monthly payment of principal and interest is \$774.34. If the same loan amount was closed today at VA's current rate of 9.5 percent, the payment would be only \$588.60, thus representing savings of \$185.74 a month, or \$66,866.00 over 30 years.

In the above example, the benefits of refinancing occur most often when mortgage interest is reduced by 2 or more percent. The new loan may exceed the current VA interest rate (9.5), but must be lower than the existing mortgage rate the veteran is paying.

Also, veterans should be aware there may be substantial closing costs involved. However, many mortgage lenders offer these loans with no out-of-pocket cost to the veteran. Veterans who currently have a high interest rate VA mortgage loan should consult their lender or local yellow pages for a mortgage lender who is active in this aspect of the VA home loan program.

**Apple Day Scheduled**

Today's college-bound children, from the age of five or four-even three sometimes, embark on an educational journey that may take 20 years or more to complete.

On Apple Day, Tuesday, February 26, a trio of elementary school students will complete that same journey, in a figurative manner, in less than 20 minutes before Governor Ann Richards, Lieutenant governor Bob Bullock and House Speaker Gib Lewis. It's all part of Apple Day.

Beginning at 9 a.m., some 300 Austin-area students-representing students throughout the state from pre-kindergarten through post-graduate college levels-will line the Capitol south walk, cheering the trio on. As the elementary students step beyond the little red schoolhouse and proceed up the walk, 181 students each will place an apple in the red wagon pulled by the

children. (Later, after the ceremonies end, the wagon will be pulled onto the floors of the House and Senate Chambers, where each member will be given an apple to remind them of Apple Day's message.)

The educational path that the students "bring to life" traces the very direction and road that every young Texan must take if his/her future-and Texas' future-is to be filled with promise. Through this demonstration with college, high school, junior high and elementary school students, Texas educators plan to illustrate clearly the importance of an unobstructed path for all youth to follow-and "reap the Golden Apple".

The Apple Day event will culminate as a select group of students presents the Governor, Lt. Governor and Speaker with a Golden Apple. Following remarks by former Texas Coordinating Board Chairman, Larry Temple, each leader will briefly respond to the crowd, which will include university/college presidents and chancellors, school superintendents and business and other education leaders from around the state.

Apple Day is co-sponsored by the Texas Association of School Administrators and Association of Texas Colleges and Universities.

selves with a protective covering that makes it difficult to affect them with pesticides," said Lipe. "Oil spray can kill the pests by covering them with a suffocating film."

Most fruit trees including peaches, plums, apricots, nectarines, apples and pears are subject to scale infestation. Pecans also benefit from an oil spray, although phylloxera insects are more of a problem than scale on pecan trees.

Numerous species of ornamental trees and shrubs are also subject to scale infestation and can benefit from a dormant oil spray. This spray, however, may injure evergreens, Lipe said.

Suggested rates of application form dormant oil is 1.5 to 2 gallons per 100 gallons of water, or 2 to 4 ounces per one gallon of water. The effectiveness of pest control will be improved if an insecticide is added to the oil.

Labeled insecticides include Lorsban 4E (0.5 - 1 pint/100 gallons), Diazinon 50WP (1 pound/100 gallons) or Supracide 2E (1-2 pints/100 gallons).

"The oil spray works best if applied when the temperature is above 55 degrees," Lipe said. "Do not use oils when temperatures are below 32 degrees or above 90."

The key to effectiveness with oil spraying is good coverage. Air sprayers or commonly used by commercial orchardists, but they are often marginal in spray volume and coverage. Higher volume hand-guns provide better oil coverage and should be used to spray trees known to have serious scale infestations.

"Some trees may require a second oil spraying, but wait three weeks before spraying again," Lipe said.

**ORDINANCE NO. 285**  
**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS:**

**Section 1:** That all of those portions of Goodnight Street, Martindale Street, and McClelland Street, and all alleys lying within and between the following described lots and blocks in the Original Town of Clarendon, Donley County, Texas, be and the same are hereby closed, abandoned, and permanently vacated as streets, alleys, or public thoroughfares of any kind or character whatever, to-wit: Lot 1, Block 67; Lots 1 and 6, Block 68; Lots 1 through 7, Blocks 69 and 74; all situated in the Original Town of Clarendon, Donley County, Texas, according to the recorded map or plat thereof of file in the County Clerk's office of Donley County, Texas.

**WHEREAS** the City Commission of the City of Clarendon is of the opinion that said expense of collecting said delinquent taxes should be borne by the delinquent properties and their owners who are responsible for causing such expenses.

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED** by the City Commission of the City of Clarendon:

**Section 1:** Whenever any accounts for delinquent taxes owed the City of Clarendon are given to its tax attorney for collection, on or after July 1 of the year they become delinquent, the City of Clarendon shall be entitled to, and shall collect, and additional penalty of fifteen (15%) percent of the delinquent taxes and penalty (including any interest owed) due on each delinquent property at the time of collection, either before or after suit and or foreclosure sale, as provided by Section 33.07 of the Texas Property Tax Code.

**Section 2:** In addition to the collection expenses provided for in Section 1 above, the City of Clarendon shall be entitled to collect the actual expenses incurred by the Donley County Appraisal District in providing all data and information as to the name, identity, and location of necessary parties and the legal description of property necessary to the filing of any suit for delinquent taxes.

**Watch For Worm Problems**

There have been reports of heavy infestations of army cutworms in surrounding counties, causing damage to wheat fields. I have not received any reports or seen any infestations in fields in the Clarendon or Hedley area. Up on the northern side of the county in the Groom area army cutworms are present and I have had a report of one Clarendon home owner with an infestation of worms.

Army cutworm eggs are oviposited in the soil in the fall. Eggs hatch and worms feed sporadically through the winter as temperatures allow. Most of the damage occurs during late winter and early spring as weather begins to warm. Small grains are the major host, but they readily feed on alfalfa.

During bright, sunny days they will be found just under the soil surface. Night time and cloudy days they will be found feeding on leaves and tillers. When there is no green left, they will move to undamaged areas of the field. Army cutworms prefer dry conditions.

Wheat and alfalfa producers need to be checking fields at this time. Control measures are warranted when fields average three to four cutworms per foot of row and damage is evident.



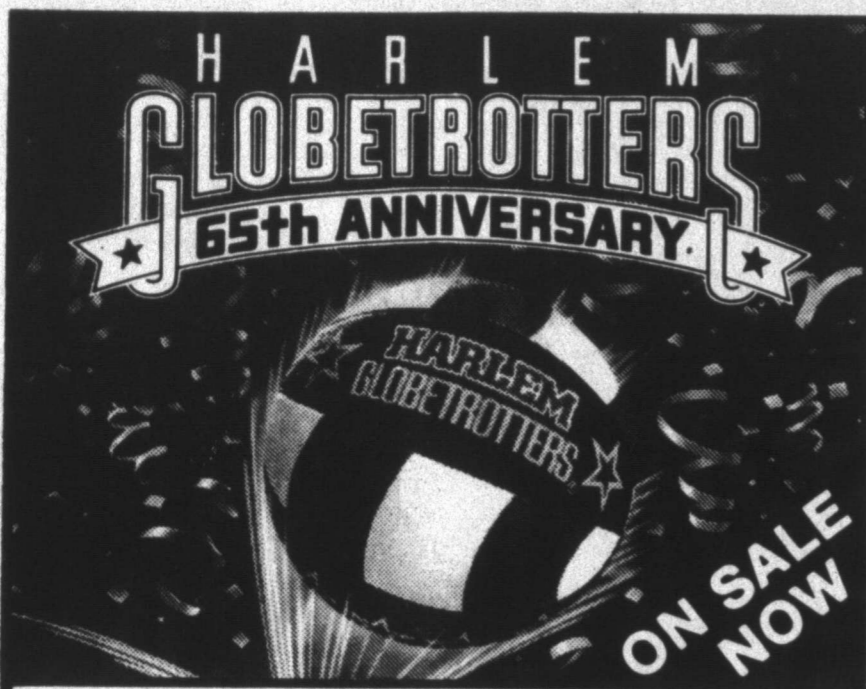

### Waterbeds in Haiti

This is a sleazy day, I thought with venom, as I plopped my carcass down on the bed; everything has gone wrong--the sun is hiding, the wind is blowing, the ceiling-fan is making a horrible squeaking noise, there's only one Oreo left in the package, I'm out of Diet Coke, the heater on this waterbed is turned up too high, and I have the flu. Wonderful! I must surely be the most disconsolate creature on Earth. Snort. Sneeze. Sniff. And then I heard it...that still, small voice, riding the waves from my nervously bouncing foot to the back of my pillowed head:

*I am hungry, and I am thirsty...I am a stranger...*

My heart began to race with recollection. I laid very still and closed my eyes and allowed myself to listen:

*I am naked and sick, I am a captive....*

My mind began to wander back to a time when I, as a boy, stood with my Pastor and others in a little village south of Monterrey, Mexico. I can still see the Missionary speaking in Spanish with a man who lived there. The man was middle-aged, snaggle-toothed, and dusty. He smiled broadly as they spoke and his dark eyes shot forth a fire that unnerved me. And then I heard the Missionary say a word that I recognized: Jesus (sounds like "Hey-zeus" in Spanish). The man giggled and clapped his hands and almost shouted these words: "Jesus Cristo, Rey Senor!" I didn't quite understand him but it was obvious that the Missionary had been here before, many times. The man laughed even more as he began shaking hands and welcoming each one of us, one at a time. If a person can have two complete but different emotions going off inside him at once, I did. I was elated to be there and to be a part, but I was also deeply saddened at the sight of the raw poverty about me. Children, by the hundreds, playing in the dust around open sewers, and living in mud shacks. But they were all laughing, and somehow I knew that my Lord lived here--in the streets, in the huts, in their faces, and in their laughter. I knew it! And I have never felt so at-home.

Other pictures invaded my mind there on that day that the flu did reign. Pictures and slides shown at my church by Missionaries headed toward the field. Pictures of people from South Africa, New Guinea, New Zealand, Israel, Brazil, Belgium, Fiji, Sri Lanka, and Tanzania. Real people! People like me, and people like the dusty man in the Mexican village. These pictures from my memory tear at my heart with a garden rake, and each time they do they plant something strong, something hot, deep within my soul.

*Sheep or Goat* the voice whispered, *Sheep or Goat?*

Then I realized in the mist of my pathetic, self-willed kingdom-of-my comfort that there is still a village of children calling out to me. I am hungry! I am thirsty! I am lonely! I am hurting! These people need more than just refrigerators, curling irons, microwaves, carpet, and remote-control television sets made in Japan. They need real fingers to touch them, and real arms to hold them, and a real concern to tuck them in at night. They need to know that when this sniffling, sneezing, cookie-eating, sleazy-day of a life is done that there is something better ahead. Someone better! Jesus!

Oh Jesus Cristo, Rey Senor...I beg you Lord, keep my waterbed, but please...send me! (Matthew 25:31-46)

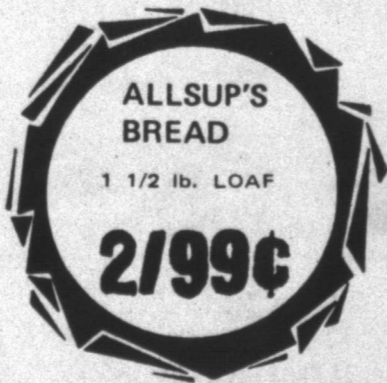

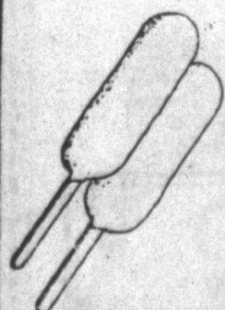

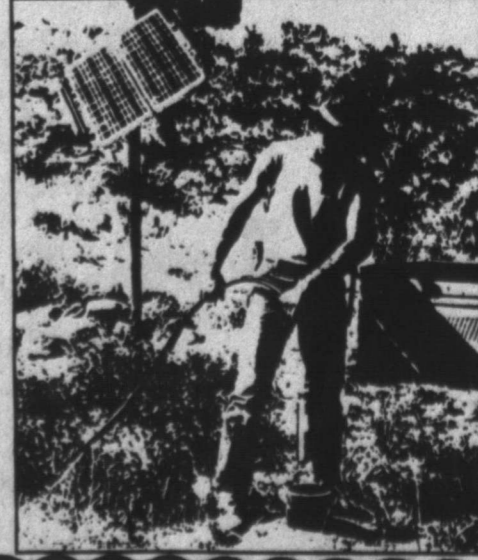
