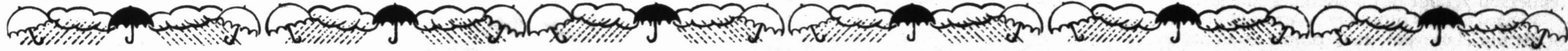

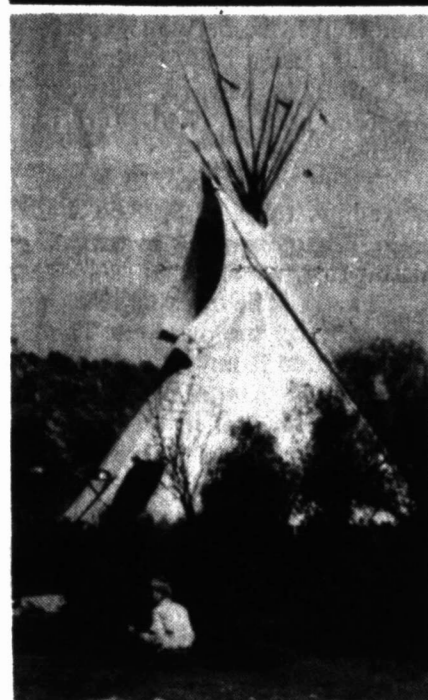
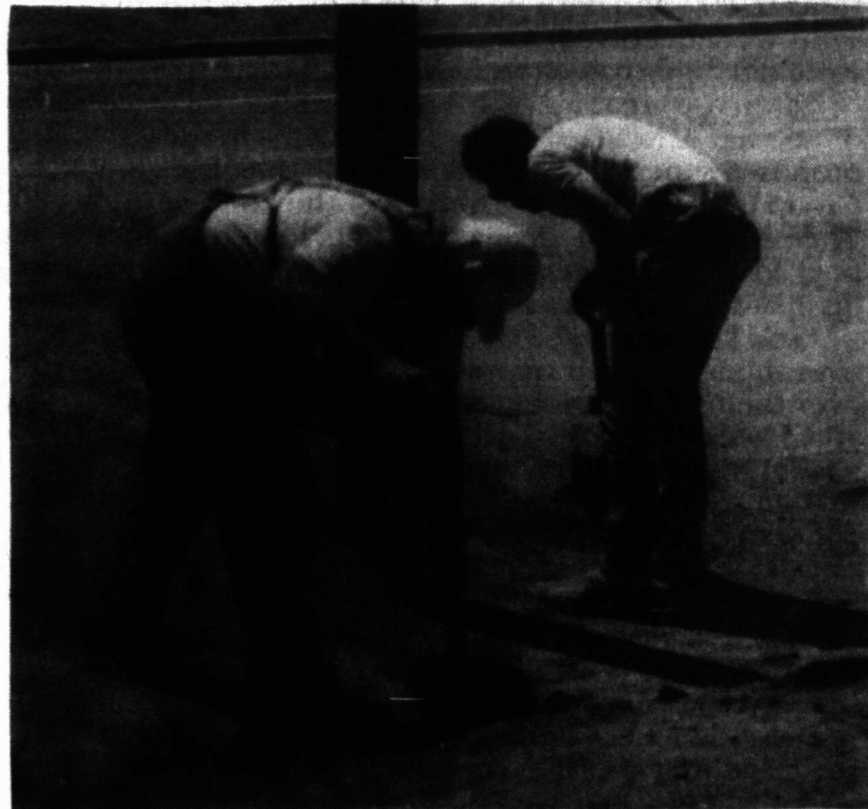

The Failure of Church Politics

Half a generation ago, Vatican II, the great reform council, met in Rome. One result of that meeting was a big boost for the ecumenical movement, which was already gaining momentum. Many of the big denominations began exploring ways to merge with similar groups.

Unfortunately over the intervening years, much of that momentum ebbed away. Most of the denominational mergers fizzled out or were put on hold. Some of those that were successful failed to stem the numerical decline of the merging entities.

Several factors probably contributed to the failure of the initial movement. Certainly Satan had everything to lose and nothing to gain if many of the divisions were dissolved. And the tempter has no greater wrecking tool than church politics.

Often the great mergers failed because the leaders of "Group A" wanted all the high offices in the proposed super-denomination, while the officials in "Group B" were equally covetous of the same positions. The resolution of doctrinal conflicts soon became bogged down with ego involvement. A glorious ideal dissipated into polite wrangling.

"You know that the rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them and their high officials exercise authority over them," Jesus said in Matthew 20. "Not so among you. Instead, whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first must be your slave--just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."

Until church leaders are willing to "take on the form of a slave" and follow Jesus' example of self-sacrifice, there is little hope for Christian unity through the union of denominational governments.

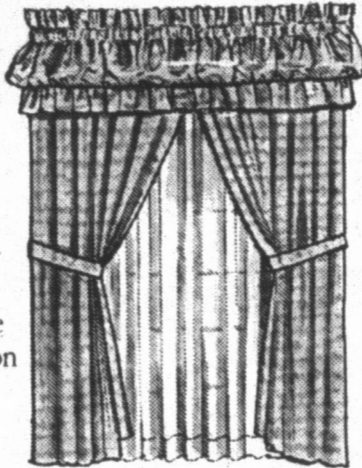
But individual Christians do not have to wait for their denominations to act. Perhaps the surest route to Christian unity may well be through grass-roots action.

No one can prevent individual Christians from treating each other as brothers. No authorities can stop individual believers from cooperating to accomplish the goals that Jesus had set before his followers. Ultimately real unity can only occur between individual believers who acknowledge the Lordship of Jesus.

Obesity: Four Different Approaches

According to recent estimates, between 40 and 50 percent of adults living in North America are overweight due to excess body fat (obesity). Obesity can produce a variety of physical and emotional problems. For example, the obese tend to have more high blood pressure, heart disease, gout, diabetes, and gallbladder disease than do persons whose weight is in the normal range.

Effective weight control requires a life-long commitment in order to prevent regaining weight that has been lost. Experts generally recognize four different approaches to weight loss.

Restriction of calories: Calorie restricted diets reduce daily calorie and fat consumption.

Exercise: Brisk "walking" 3 to 4 miles a day can produce as much as one-half pound of weight loss per week.

Behavior modification: Behaviors are relearned or modified so that fewer calories are consumed and/or there is more daily activity or exercise.

Drug therapy: The main value of certain drugs in weight control is the reduction in appetite. The best approach is to combine drug therapy with exercise, calorie restriction, and behavior modification.

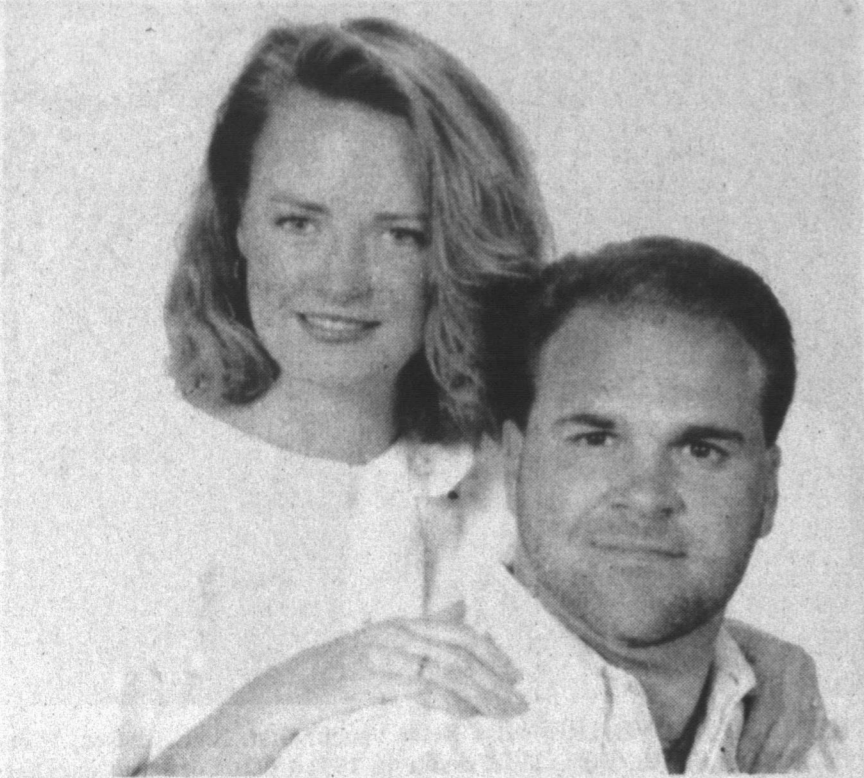

Screening for Skin Cancer

The Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer will screen for skin cancers on Saturday, May 4 from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. The service is free. Among the doctors participating in the program is Dr. Turner M. Caldwell, who was raised in Clarendon.

Clarendon and the West Texas area has a very high rate of skin cancer. Many area residents have developed or will develop melanomas. Left untreated, such growths may even be fatal. Early detection makes a vast difference in survival rates.

Prevention is also very important. Cancer doctors advise the following:

- Avoid excessive sun.
- Use a sunscreen.
- Wear hats and protective clothing.
- Inspect you skin regularly.
- See you dermatologist.

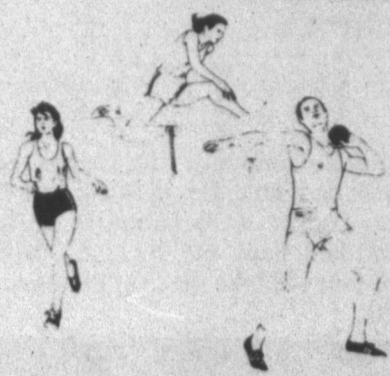

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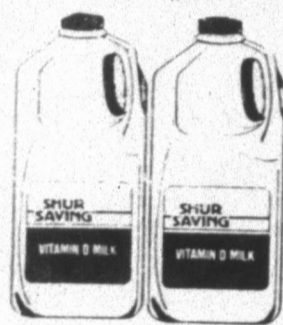
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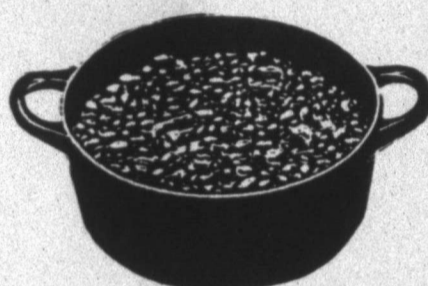


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Veterinary Programs Set

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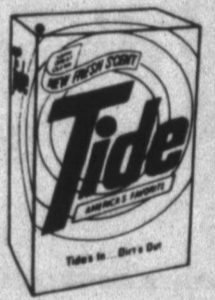

Computer Training Center Opens

Agricultural producers, consumers families and community leaders in West Texas are gaining a modern new training facility here, designed to make the personal computer a more useful tool in planning and managing their operations.

The Texas A & M University System Computer Training and Education Center will be formally activated during an open house from 10:30 a.m. until noon on April 19. The center is in the specially renovated Moody Building at the Halfway center of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, ten miles west of Plainview on U. S. Highway 70.

The center has been designed and equipped with individual computer work stations and the latest software and audio-visual teaching equipment. It will provide hands-on training in a wide variety of computer applications for producers, county officials, homemakers and community leaders.

The open house will begin with remarks by State Rep. James E. "Pete" Laney. A Hale County producer, he is chairman of the board of trustees of the High Plains Research Foundation, a privately-funded, non-profit research and educational entity supporting agriculture in the area. Dr. Jackie Smith, Texas Agricultural Extension Service agricultural economist and management specialist, will explain the role of the center.

The facility results from a cooperative effort of three A & M System units--the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and West Texas State University--and the High Plains Research Foundation. Faculty of Texas Tech University's College of Agricultural Sciences also will use and support the center.

Laney and Dr. Zerle L. Carpenter of College Station, state director of the Extension Service which will operate the computer center, agree the facility will open new opportunities for area farmers, ranchers, families, business and community leaders.

"Farmers and ranchers in the High Plains are among the most progressive and innovative in Texas," Laney said. "The personal

computer has become a common and invaluable tool for these producers, yet we are just beginning to tap the resources it provides.

"This facility will make it possible for West Texas producers to receive the most current computer training and learn the latest agricultural applications without inconvenience or untimely absence from their operations," Laney added.


It's the annual meeting where Cooperative management will inform members of plans that directors have for the coming year and bring you up to date on the problems and progress the Cooperative is experiencing.



In his "Scattered Shots" column in *The Hedley Informer* of July 24, 1959, Editor Ed Boliver reported, "...Hedley is enjoying a quite unusual July this year, in the way of rain, enough having already fallen to match a usual three-month period or more. However, it is not too unusual as yet, since it is raining only water, as usual.

"It might be much more exciting," Ed continued, "if it were to rain fish, frogs, or some of the other items which have been reported, such as worms, snails, mussels, snakes, and turtles. The most common claim is that it has rained fish. Ordinarily, these are confined to only short showers, but it is claimed that on the Gallipoli Peninsula of Turkey, it once rained fish without

interruption for three days. Also, they usually cover only a small area, but one claim states that 32 square miles were covered with fish. More of these reports have come from India than any other country, although they have also come from England, Germany, the United States, France, Ecuador, Burma, and some Pacific islands.

"A rain of fish was reported in Australia in 1924, and in 1931, a fish shower in Bordeaux, France, was claimed to be so heavy that motor cars were compelled to halt. Worth mentioning, also, are two living frogs said to have been found inside a hailstone which fell at Dubuque in 1882; likewise an eruption of the volcano Carguairazo in 1898, which sprayed boiled catfish over the landscape. This last story may or may not sound likely, but at least it is an intriguing thought, gathering ready-cooked catfish without fuss or bother."

Ed went on to say that you should take all those tales with a grain of salt. But it's getting so dry around the area, that we might welcome a shower of fish, frogs, worms, or even snakes, if that's what it takes to get some rain.

The Hailstone

The air is thick, heavy. Cumulus clouds appear where moments ago there were none. These individual cotton puffs quickly merge into mountain masses. A thunderhead is born.

Water droplets are hurled skyward by the updraft in the now-towering cloud. Those droplets are frozen in the mid and upper levels of the storm, and begin to fall earthward as ice.

But the updraft halts the ice particle's descent, and sends it again on the express elevator toward the top of this meteorological skyscraper. In the supercooled middle and upper regions of the cloud, it picks up more moisture. The new moisture freezes, adding to the weight of the water-droplet-become-hailstone, and the stone--still tiny--again begins to fall.

Over and over the process is repeated, until the updraft is no longer able to overcome the weight of yet another layer of ice, and the hailstone crashes to the earth.

Have you ever known a hailstone--that person who rides the updraft of popularity and success, takes a sharp dive, then catches the next current upward? Do you know him--roller-coastering through life, reaching an ever-new height of accomplishment here, climbing to a new treasure there? Do you see him taking on, like Nature's hailstone, an encrustation of whatever surrounds him--riches, fame, power, pleasure--things not bad in themselves, but which change the form of the updraft-rider just as each new coat of ice changes the form of the hailstone--things which ice over the heart, making it difficult for the better way to penetrate. Have you ever watched as the encrustations, the ice-layers, finally take their toll, and that person takes a disastrous plunge?

Do you know a hailstone? Sometimes this describes the best of us--tossed by the current, weighted down by the world.

Nature's hailstone has no choice. He is where God put him, perfectly obeying God's laws of physics. But we do have a choice. We don't have to "be...carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive" (Ephesians 4:14).

You have a choice! The califying effect of sin does not have to drag us down from the heights. "...Let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us..." (Hebrews 12:1).

Whose updraft are you riding? There may be some exciting moments on Satan's roller coaster, but the ride always ends with a hard fall. Think, too, about what happens when a hailstone hits the earth. It nearly always damages something else as it falls. We don't sin in isolation; our deeds--our misdeeds--always affect someone else.

Whose updraft are you riding? God's way may involve some terribly jolting ups and downs, but the landing is always smooth, and the landing place is always higher ground. "[God] hath raised us up together, and made us sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus" (Ephesians 2:6).
