CLARENDON CIVIC CLUBS COOPERATE IN PARK IMPROVEMENT

Northwest Texas Methodist Conference Begins Sessions In Memphis Wednesday

Mayor J. Claude Wells Makes Welcome Address. Rev. T. S. Barcus, Presiding Elder, Welcomed on Behalf of District. Rev. Cal C. Wright of Vernon Is Made Secretary for 11th Term

Memphis, Nov. 17—With the assignment of ministers to their pastoral posts for the next 12 months at the twenty-ninth annual session of the Northwest Texas Methodist Conference here opening Wednesday and closing Sunday, three presiding elders are scheduled to return to pastorates.

Four hundred and ten congregations will be affected by the appointments.

The three presiding elders who have served their quadrennium, and according to the church law, must return to pastorates, are Rev. J. O. Haymes, of the Amarillo district; Rev. T. S. Barcus, of the Clarendon district, and Rev. Sam H. Young, of the Sweetwater district.

The opening of the conference signals the succession of Bishop Ivan Lee Holt to the post in which Bishop Hiram A. Boaz has served for the last eight years.

Attendance at the five-day conference is expected to include some 250 ministers and hundreds of laymen.

Bishop Holt, it is expected, will appoint a successor to Dr. Tom W. Brabham, president of McMurry College, Abilene, who resigned about a month ago with the expressed desire to return to the ministry.

This conference also will elect delegates to a unification conference to meet next year in Kansas City, at which time the three large branches of Methodism are expected to be made one great denomination.

The Northwest Texas Conference—one of the five in Texas—was organized at Stamford in 1909, being detached from what is now the Central Texas Conference. It has around 75,000 members, having shown an increase of 8,722 during the conference year of 1936-37, of which 2,777 were on profession of faith.

During the period, 29 candidates were licensed to preach, making a total of 133 lay preachers; 584 infants and 1,889 adults were baptized.

The conference has 326 church edifices, valued at \$3,825,148, with indebtedness of \$379,894; 187 parsonages, valued at \$596,350, with indebtedness of \$33,476.

Woman members of 329 missionary societies number 7,226 and they raised during the year \$39,794 for local and \$19,719 for foreign missions.

The denomination has 329 Sunday schools under its exclusive control with 4,667 officers and teachers and a total enrollment of 49,412.

Members paid their nine presiding elders during the year \$38,315 and pastors \$24,856, and paid to the orphanage at Waco \$14,862. Total raised for all purposes during the year was \$881,164, compared with \$728,207 the preceding year.

Three veteran ministers will be come supernumerary, it is definitely known. They are Rev. Ben Hardy, Tahoka, with 41 continuous years in service; Rev. C. E. Fike, Stratford, 26 years, and Rev. T. J. Rea, Woodson, 27 years. They will retire from active service.

Memphis will entertain ministers and delegates on the Harvard plan. Rev. Orion W. Carter is host pastor. Rev. Cal C. Wright, presiding elder of the Vernon district, will act as secretary of the sessions.

A number of Methodists from here are attending each of the sessions.

MANY OUT OF TOWN EX-STUDENTS OF OLD CLARENDON COLLEGE HERE FOR FIRST REUNION FRIDAY AND SATURDAY

Clyde I. Price, Sponsor of the Movement, Is Elected President Of Permanent Organization. Mrs. Katherine Bugbee Is Elected Secretary

Hundreds of ex-students from all parts of the United States gathered here last Friday and Saturday for a two-day reunion in commemoration of the founding of Clarendon College in 1898.

Highlighting the program was the vote, at the chapel exercises Friday morning, that made the reunion a permanent affair, and the election of officers.

Clyde I. Price, father of the first reunion, was elected president; George Ordway, Amarillo, first vice president; Hubert Hillman, Plainview, second vice president; Luther Gribble, Wellington, third vice president; Mrs. Katherine Patrick Bugbee, Clarendon, secretary; and Clay Thompson, Amarillo; Wayland Weathered, Pampa; Avis Austin Broughton, Childress; Johnny Calloway, Henrietta; C. W. Ratcliff, Lubbock; P. W. Walker, Eastland; Arthur Parker, Paducah; Coopwood Perry, Elmer, Okla.; and Heck Harris, Portales, N. M., directors.

S. H. Condon, instructor at West Texas State College, Canyon, and former principal of Clarendon College, was principal speaker at the chapel exercises. Condon told the group that "Through many of the buildings were gone or changed, Clarendon College's monument is the splendid success of her students."

H. T. Burton, Clarendon schools superintendent, made the welcome address with Jess Stanford, Hereford, replying for the visitors.

Stanford in a forceful address told the assembly that he was not surprised at the way Clarendon had greeted the ex-students, for "the latch strings have always been outside the door of every house for the students of Clarendon College."

Stanford, a member of the first graduating class of the college, recounted by-gone school days, horses and buggies and bucking broncos.

C. H. Dean, Plainview led the singing with the Rev. Orin Carter, Memphis, giving the invocation. J. R. Porter, Clarendon, was the master of ceremonies and Mrs. C. H. Dean, accompanist.

The reunion officially opened Friday morning with registrations at the administration building. The Clarendon football game Friday afternoon preceded the buffet supper and open house at the girls old dormitory Friday night.

Former Clarendon Pastor Dies Friday

The Rev. L. L. Swan, 81, former Clarendon pastor, died Friday morning at his home in Wellington, Kansas, where he has lived since his retirement in 1934. Services were held in Wellington Monday afternoon.

Born in Ceylon, South India, July 7, 1857, Mr. Swan was educated at Rugby School, England and held an M. A. degree from Oxford.

A zealous missionary, Rev. Swan was ordained Deacon of the church in 1896 and Priest in 1898. In his youth he was a friend and associate of the present Archbishop of Canterbury.

In 1882 he was married to Miss Ella Mary Ray, of which two children were born. Following the death of his first wife, the Rev. Mr. Swan was married to Miss Gertrude Caldwell who survives him.

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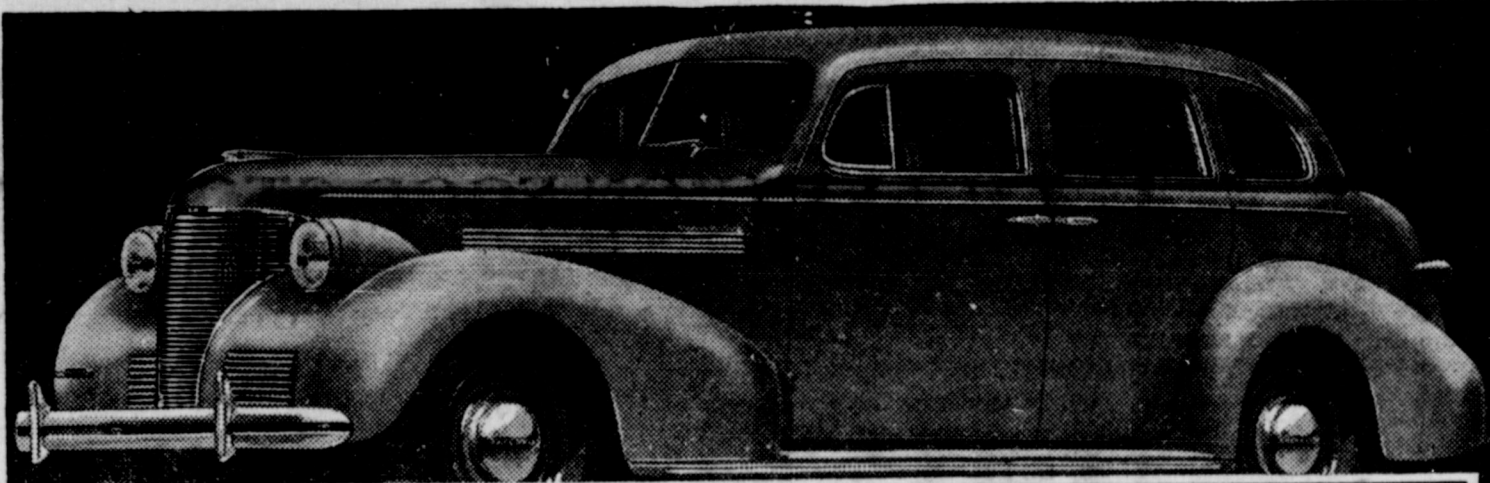

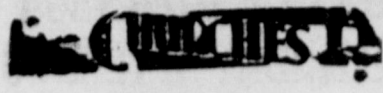

TEXAS CLUB WOMEN PLAN VARIED ACTIVITIES DURING COMING YEAR

Representing the federated clubs here was Mrs. B. L. Jenkins. The 41st annual sessions were held in the Senate Chamber at Austin, closing Friday.

One of the distinguishing characteristics between men and women is the spirit in which they attend conventions. Men look upon a convention as a place to relax, have fun, and pay little attention to business. On the other hand, women take their conventions seriously, and fun is rigidly subordinated to the business needing attention.

A broad program is contemplated for the coming year as attested by the action taken at this convention.

Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins of Eastland, newly-named president, planned to complete within the near future a state executive organization at the headquarters building in Austin, directed by an executive secretary. Such a plan was voted under the refinancing program for the clubhouse, saved from possible foreclosure by Mrs. Clara Driscoll Sevier, national democratic committeewoman, who will take over the debt.

The debt amounting to \$82,875 will be repaid by each club paying

five dollars a year. The note bears three percent.

Mrs. Driscoll Sevier of Corpus Christi saved the Alamo to the state some years ago by supplying the money for its purchase.

In addition to this positive action, the Texas federation went on record for a wide variety of state projects, including a legislative program with these objectives:

Strengthening of the laws against marihuana.

Creation of state funds to match funds provided by teachers toward their own retirement.

More equitable freight rates for the south.

More liberal legislative appropriations for child welfare.

Endorsement of the program of the National Commission on social diseases and enforcement of the state laws requiring premarital examinations.

Creation of a memorial to the late Mr. Percy V. Pennybacker of Austin.

The convention also gave its endorsement to the movement for Texas' participation in the New York and San Francisco Expositions next year.

 Today as never before the student must know at least the fundamentals of one or two sciences if he is to be proficient in his own field of endeavor. The well trained man uses several sciences as the necessary working tools in his own profession.
 Chemistry has to do with Matter and with the changes which it undergoes. The chemical research of recent years has been more and more toward the investigation of the mechanism of the processes of life in both animal and plant, and the investigation of how and why diseases occur.
 The world and its peoples are greatly influenced by chemical transformations, just as they have been greatly affected by physical changes. In the affairs of everyday life, in business, manufacturing, transportation, agriculture and finance, in war and peace we are greatly concerned with the states and conditions of matter.
 Chemistry is not only useful and interesting, but it affords the student an excellent opportunity to train his mind in powers of memory, observation, and reasoning.
 The Chemistry Department of Clarendon Jr. College offers two courses, That of General Chemistry and of Organic Chemistry. The first course is intended to provide instruction in the fundamental principles of the science of chemistry, to develop the power of clear scientific thought, and to form habits of accurate observation. Organic Chemistry is a study of the fundamental types of organic compounds. This course is intended for pre-medical students.
 The laboratory is located in the basement for proper ventilation. Students spend four hours weekly in the laboratory and have three lecture periods.
