Tax petition ruled invalid by county

The Donley County Commissioners' Court ruled a petition to roll back the county tax rate to be invalid during a called session on Monday.

The court ruled that a petition would only be valid if the county had exceeded the maximum rollback rate when it set the tax rate this fall. That did not happen, and therefore the petition was invalid.

Commissioners did not check the validity of the reported 614 names on the petition. Only 257 signatures would have been necessary had the petition been in order.

4-H, FFA to begin swine validation

The swine validation committee will begin validating hogs November 20. They will be coming to exhibitors' homes for validation.

All 4-H swine exhibitors should notify the Extension office, and FFA exhibitors should notify their AST so they can be sure and get everyone's hog validated.

Local sales tax rebates decline

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander delivered \$368.9 million in monthly sales tax payments to local governments last week.

Rylander sent sales tax rebates of \$252.3 million to Texas cities and \$20.2 million to Texas counties. Seventy-four special purpose taxing districts received \$9.8 million, and Texas' six metropolitan transit authorities and two city transit departments received \$86.5 million in sales tax revenue.

Local rebates were mostly down with Clarendon dropping 13.87 percent to \$23,665.88 and Hedley dropping 33.75 percent to \$608.92. Howard-wick was up from \$1,095.15 for the same period one year ago to \$1,446.45 this year.

November sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in September by monthly filers and in July, August and September by quarterly filers, and reported to the Comptroller in October. The state's share of sales tax reported during this period was \$1.1 billion.

CC breaks ground on new residence hall

Clarendon College officials broke ground last Thursday on a new dormitory complex which will increase the number of beds for on-campus students by 37 percent.

The new facility, located on the southwestern side of the campus along Clarendon Avenue will house 80 students and will be set up as suites. Rooms will be open to the outside, and every two rooms will share a bathroom. The facility will house both men and women.

CC President Myles Shelton said if the new residence hall gets filled with 80 new students, it would increase overall enrollment on the home campus by 20 to 25 percent.

CC currently has a problem housing existing students with more signing up to live on campus than there are beds available, and the shortage was expected to worsen without the new facility. A new Lady Bulldog softball program is expected to attract between 25 and 30 new students, an Equine Science program will draw about 40 students, and the addition of Intercollegiate Rodeo should bring in 50 to 60 students.

The \$2 million facility is being financed with revenue bonds, which are paid for by student fees. No tax dollars will be being expended on the project.

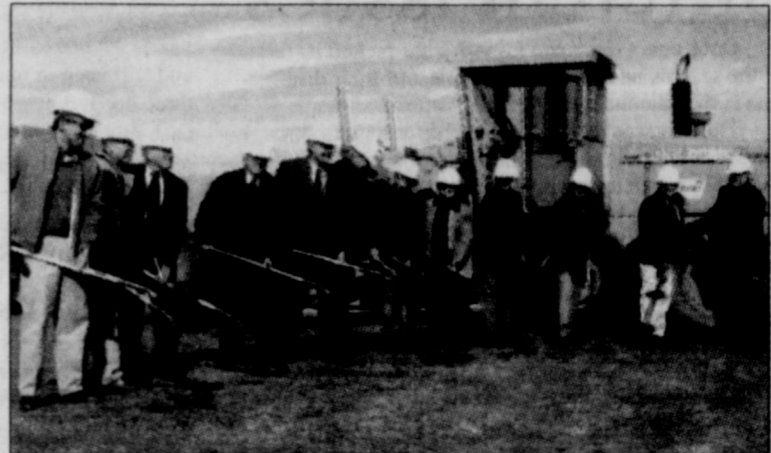
Officials expect the residence

hall to be completed by the fall 2003 semester.

Also on Thursday, CC Regents met in a called session and gave approval for the construction of a new equine center to be built on the western side of campus along US 287. All regents voted in favor of the center except Jim Blackerby, who abstained.

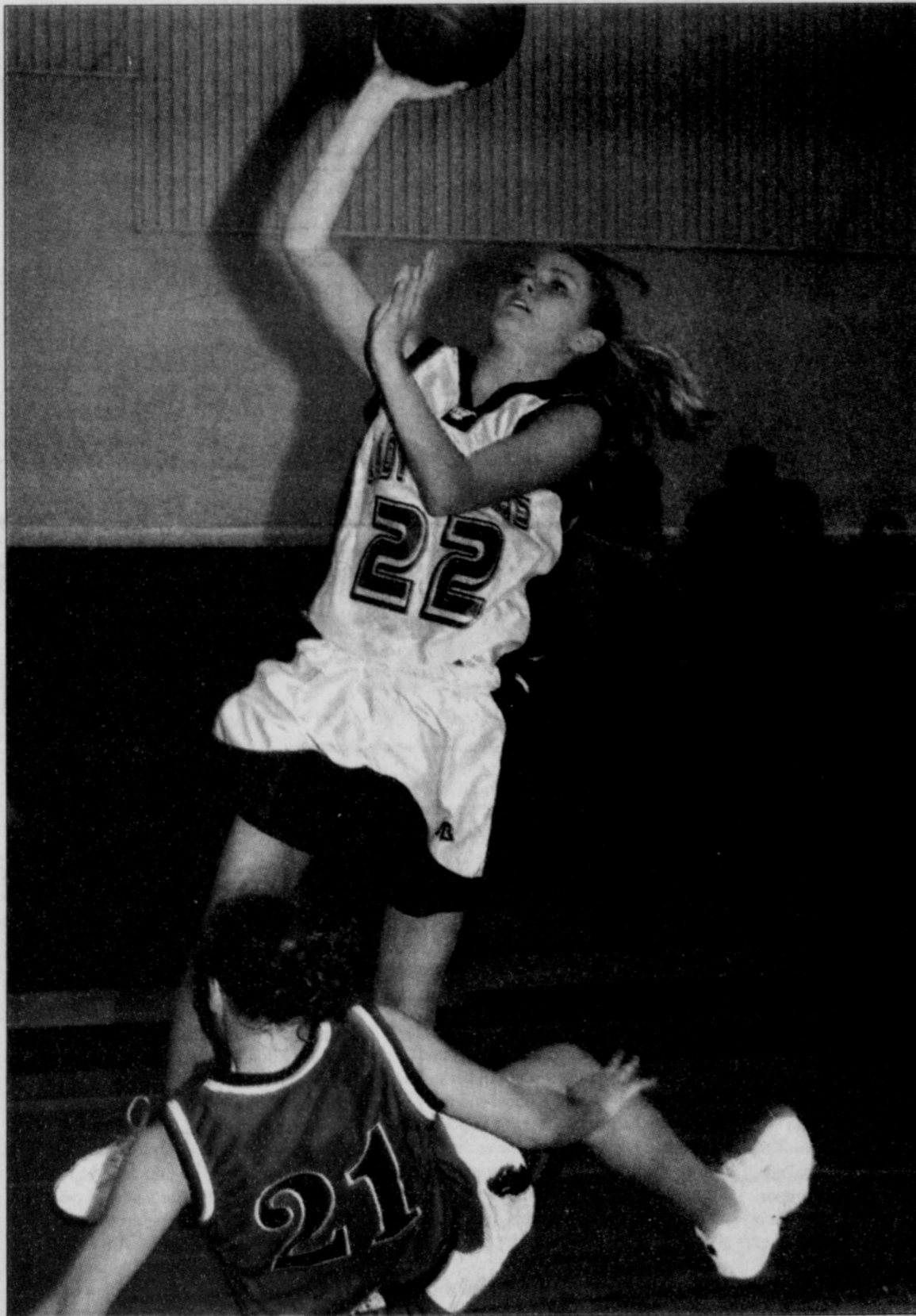
The center will be a metal building, 230' wide and 320' long, and will cost an estimated \$728,873.

The cost does not include stands, stalls, or arena equipment. It will take an additional \$250,000 to bring the center up to a fully operational status.

County receives \$50,000 grant for courthouse

Donley County met with a reversal of fortune of the best kind last week with the news it had successfully met the requirements of a \$50,000 challenge grant.

The challenge grant came from an anonymous Texas-based foundation which earlier this year donated \$100,000 to the restoration of the 1890 courthouse.

Donations from local individuals, businesses, and organizations, as well as a supplemental grant of \$185,000 from the state, have more than satisfied the requirements of the challenge grant. Donley County received the \$50,000 check last week.

"We're really happy and fortunate to have these funds because it is going to allow us to add some additional stonework to the project," said County Judge Jack Hall. "We're just very pleased."

The new funds together with \$350,000 in additional tax notes issued by the county this fall have placed the county in the position of having an estimated \$326,000 in excess funds for the project.

Hall said the county hopes to use part of that money for debt reduction but also wants to take care of some work that is not currently called for in the project such as sidewalk repair and replacement.

Commissioners met Monday to consider what if anything should be added to the project now that extra funds are available.

"It's just human nature that if you don't do things now on this project, they will probably never get done," said grant administrator John Kiehl of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

The Commissioners' Court discussed using the \$50,000 challenge grant to replace or repair the worst

of the deteriorating stonework on the building. The original scope of work called for repairing all the bad stones, but that part of the project was eliminated last year when the sole bid for the job came in nearly \$1 million over budget.

Commissioners also discussed repairing the large stained glass window on the east side of the building and restoring artwork on original vault doors. Both items were eliminated from the project last year. A flood lighting system for the exterior of the building and a speaker system for the district courtroom were mentioned as other priorities which need to be added to the project.

Judge Jack Hall said commissioners also need to consider refinishing antique furniture for the building and preparing a display cabinet for relics found during the restoration.

"I believe that all the furniture which has come out of that building needs to be sanded, stained, varnished, and put back into the courthouse," Hall said.

Some original courthouse furnishings are currently in the Courthouse Annex or other offices, and other pieces are in storage.

Commissioners agreed that professional services would be needed for the top priority items of the stained glass window repair, the vault door preservation, the exterior up-lighting, the speaker system, and the stone rehabilitation work. Other items such as furniture repair and restoration and window treatments might be done cheaper using local firms and talent.

The court will meet in a called session in conjunction with the contractor's next construction update conference to discuss added priorities for the project. A date for that meeting had not been set at press time.

Aldermen order house to be demolished, property to be cleaned

The Clarendon Board of Aldermen voted to take action against property owners at 107 E. Front Street and to tear down an old house at that address.

City officials had declared in July that the house owned by Benny and Janet Harris constituted a fire hazard and was a "dangerous structure" under local municipal ordinances. Weeds and debris on the property were also determined to be a public nuisance at the same time, and the aldermen gave the owners 30 days to clean up their lots and to either fix or remove the house.

Last week, the board found that the property owners had not made any progress in correcting the problems and voted unanimously to clean up the lots and tear down the house.

Aldermen considered taking action on a trailer house at the same address, in which Mr. and Mrs. Harris live, but it will not be demolished. City Attorney James Shelton advised the

board that the city would have to go through the district court to touch the trailer since it is considered to be a homestead.

No timetable was set for the clean up and demolition work. According to previous comments in city meetings, municipal workers have cleaned the property twice in the past, and a church group has cleaned it once.

The board also discussed nuisances at other properties in town last week and began the legal steps to take action against those owners as well.

In other city business, engineer Che Shadle discussed the paving work to be done under the NRCS and ORCA grants in the southeastern part of town. The fieldwork has been completed, and paving and curb and gutter work on 14 blocks should begin next spring when warm weather returns. Possible easements needed on Thurman Avenue were discussed.

City Superintendent Jim Roberts reported

that Clarendon has been approved for a \$29,900 grant for a loader and yard ramp at the recycling center.

City Secretary Linda Smith brought up the annual employee dinner, and a date was set for this. Smith also asked Shelton for clarification on animal permits for residents whose property is only partially inside the city limits. Shelton said anyone with livestock in the city limits must comply with the ordinance.

The employee uniform contract with Unifirst was discussed, and the board directed the city attorney to draft a letter terminating the contract on December 31, 2002.

The aldermen also voted to write a letter to AEP-WTU regarding a proposed Pole Attachment Agreement informing the electric company that the city already has an agreement and feels a new one is unnecessary. AEP had requested the city sign an agreement to place holiday decorations on streetlights downtown

and charge the city for any electricity used.

The contract with the Donley Appraisal District was discussed, and aldermen expressed frustration with the way the appraisal board is comprised. The entity that collects the most taxes has the most votes and can control who is appointed to the board. The city does not have enough votes on its own to appoint someone to the board. The aldermen also discussed the district's budget.

The contract with the district was approved with Aldermen Bob Watson and Mark White voting in favor, Aldermen Tommy Hill and Michael Tibbets against, and Alderman Janice Knorpp not voting. Mayor Tex Selvidge broke the tie with a vote in favor.

Tibbets said he understood the catch-22 the city was in with needing the district to collect its taxes but said he voted against the contract because he wanted the public to know there is an issue with the district's budget.

Thornberry's security plan gets Senate OK

WASHINGTON, DC - Twenty months after he first introduced legislation to establish a Department of Homeland Security, Congressman Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) voted for - and the US Senate approved Tuesday - a plan that would do just that.

"I am pleased that we have finally been able to reach agreement on this legislation," Thornberry stated. "While I had hoped we would have approved the bill sooner, the important thing is that we are doing it now. Acting quickly is critical to the security of the American people."

"This is not a perfect plan. I have no doubt Congress will need to revisit portions of this plan at some point down the road. You just don't pull together over twenty different agencies and expect it to go off without a hitch. But we've got to start someplace, and this plan will put the foundation in place to make our Nation more secure."

At present, Thornberry noted, more than 40 federal agencies have some responsibility for homeland security. Under the plan approved this week, a number of these key agencies will be merged into a new Homeland Security Department. These agencies include the Border Patrol, Customs Service, Coast Guard, and the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

This bill, which was approved by the House of Representatives by a vote of 299-121 and by the Senate 90-9, mirrors and builds upon HR 1159, legislation Thornberry introduced in March 2001 to reorganize homeland defenses. Since introducing this bill, Thornberry has worked with the Bush administration and Congressional leadership to craft a reorganization plan.

Howardwick aldermen discuss new fire department by-laws

The Howardwick Board of Aldermen met in regular session November 12, 2002, in Howardwick City Hall.

Fire Chief Joe Zeyen reported on the activities of the fire department. One call was paged out in October for a structure fire. Fumes from a water heater had been blown back into a house by high winds; there was no fire. Zeyen said the FEMA grant funds of \$4,500 had been received. The funds will purchase new radio equipment for the department.

The new by-laws for the fire department were presented, and Zeyen explained the duties of the president, the vice president, the engineers, line personnel, and rescue truck personnel. In the absence of the Fire Chief and Assistant Chief, responsibility reverts to the Clarendon Fire Department.

Alderman Sam Grider requested

"City Of" be added to the title "Howardwick Volunteer Fire Department By-laws."

The board approved the contract with the Donley Appraisal District.

Peggy Cockerham reported on the Beautification Club's plans for the lighting on December 1, 2002, at Howardwick City Park. Refreshments will be served afterward at City Hall at 7:30 p.m. The club also plans a stew and cornbread fundraiser in January and an art show in either January or February.

The board voted to contact the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission to get them to assign physical addresses in the city.

Weeds and high grass on several lots were discussed. Mayor Billy Woods said nothing could be done until it goes through the city attorney and that no response had been forthcoming from him.

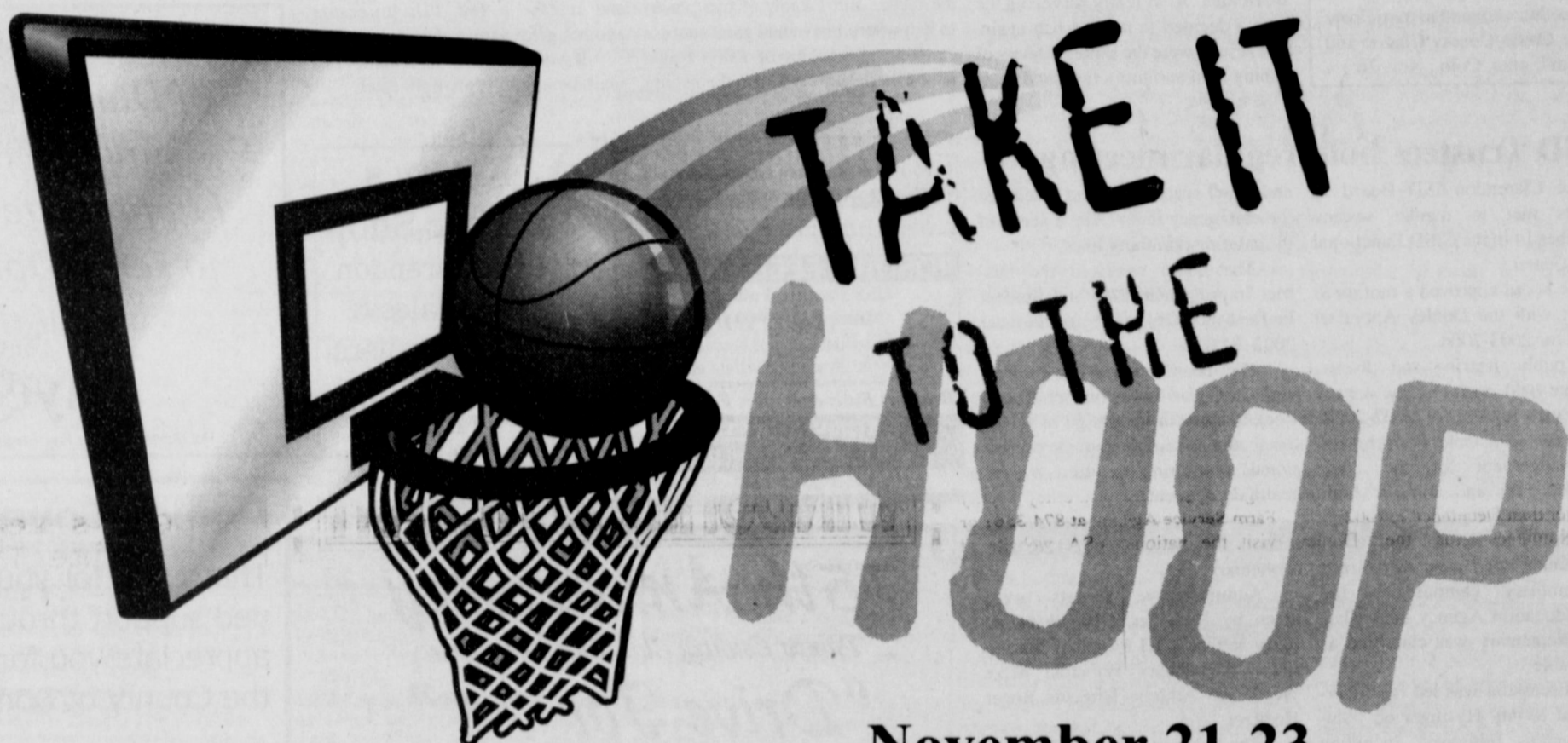
