Egg Throwing Leads to Jail

Donley County Sheriff Jimmy Thompson reminded area residents Monday that throwing eggs or pumpkins or other objects can have very serious consequences.

"People who throw eggs or other objects will be arrested," the Sheriff said. And charges of malicious mischief carry a penalty of up to a \$2,000 fine and a year in jail. In addition, the culprit may have to pay restitution for any damage or injury done. They may also have to clean up Clarendon as a public service project.

"People need to realize that throwing eggs or other objects can result in serious injury or major property damage," the Sheriff said, "Because of that danger, the behavior will not be tolerated."

Judged on the basis of past years, there is a very high probability of violators getting caught.

Both regular and reserve deputies will be on duty this weekend.

Stay In Compliance

Washington, D.C.-All fields planted to a crop that have a Highly Erodible Land (HEL) determination must follow a conservation compliance plan that has been developed by the SCS. Conservation cropping system and crop residue use practices must be in place and applied each year. Spot checks are being conducted each year to determine compliance. If you are found to be out of compliance during a spot check you will not have the opportunity to correct the situation. Also, you will not be eligible for any government program benefits. If you have any questions, please contact your local SCS.

Joan Wood Avant Exhibit Set

Les Beaux Art Club will host a One-Woman Art Show and Exhibit featuring renowned South Texas artist, Joan Wood Avant, Saturday, October 30 from 10:00 until 3:00 at the First United Methodist Fellowship Hall.

Avant captures the South Texas light, not unlike that of the deserts of North Africa or the Southwest United States, harvests it from the fields and brush country where she lives, and sets it free in her landscape and floral still life oil paintings. Avant remembers as a child a fascination with the interaction of light and shadows on the limestone hills of the Central Texas ranch where she grew up in the arms of her father's love of nature. In the brush country of South Texas, where she has lived since 1953, Avant continues to be an observer of nature; taking "hunting trips," finding a place in the scrub brush near a creek or on a mesquite flat at a river, sitting patiently with her camera readied for the antlered head of a prize buck or the playful antics of a doe with her fawn. Back in her studio, the colors and feelings Avant has absorbed are transformed into her art.

Joan Wood Avant is represented by galleries in San Antonio, Austin, Round Rock, and Dallas and her work has been exhibited in Taos, San Antonio, Austin, Dallas, Houston, Salado and Round Rock. She is a member of the Coppini Academy of Fine Arts and the Art League in San Antonio; Austin Palette Club; Scottsdale Artists Association; Cowboy Artists of America Museum Association; Artists and Craftsmen Association of Dallas; Houston Civic Art Association. As an art instructor, Avant acknowledges her debt to such masters as Innes, Fechin and others, by sharing her expertise and love for painting through demonstrations and lessons, passing her own understanding of art on to others.

Water Conservation Loan Approved

The Texas Water Development Board today approved a \$750,000 loan from the Agricultural Water Conservation Bond Program to the Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District No. 3.

The District will use the funds to make low-interest loans to area farmers and ranchers who will use the funds to purchase more efficient water conservation equipment. In the past, the District loaned \$650,726 in funds from the Agricultural Water Conservation Bond Program to farmers and ranchers in their District.

Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District No. 3 is located in Carson County, however the jurisdictional area includes parts of Armstrong, Donley, Gray, Hutchinson, Potter, and Roberts counties covering a 3,672 square miles in northwest Texas.

Funeral Directors, Inc. of Clarendon.

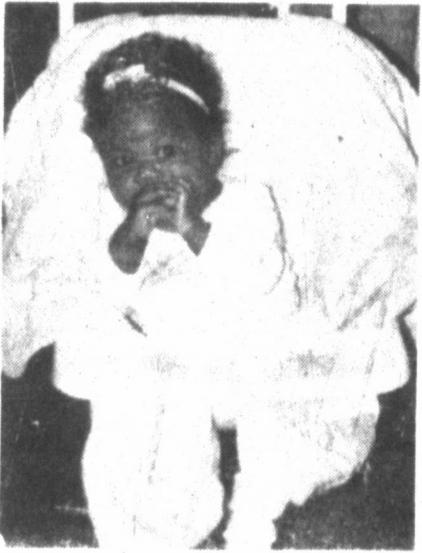

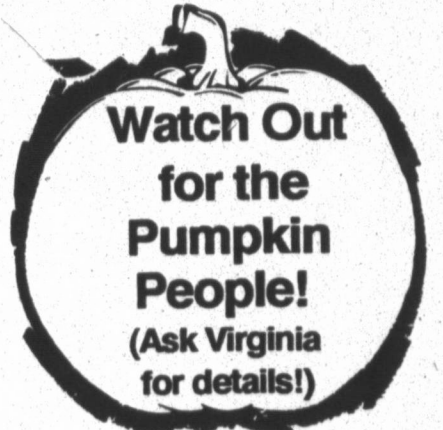

Clarendon School Board Minutes

The Board of Trustees of Clarendon Consolidated Independent School District met in special session on October 12, 1993, at 7:30 p.m. in the Administration Building. Members present: President Johnny Floyd, Vice-President Phil Fletcher, Secretary Lynne Williams, Derlene Graham, Elmonette Bivens, and Dan Hall. Members absent: Wayne Hardin. School Officials present: Phil Barefield, Superintendent; Kent Hargis, High School Principal; Mike Word, Junior High-Elementary Principal, and Pat Cheek, Counselor. Others present: Leslie White, Jane Edwards, Judy Zehr, Charlie and Jamie Deyhle, Tricia Skelton, Diane Chamberlain.

Dan Hall opened with a prayer.

Motion by Dan Hall, seconded by Phil Fletcher, to approve the minutes of special meetings of September 9th and September 13th, and regular meeting of September 9, 1993. Motion carried unanimously 5-0-0.

The financial statement for the month of September was approved by board action.

Bills incurred by the Clarendon Public School and the Business Office were presented. Motion by Derlene Graham, seconded by Dan Hall, that bills be allowed and ordered paid. Motion carried unanimously 5-0-0.

Thank You notes were shared from Mike Word and the Smith family.

Thrisha Skelton, who is in private practice in Amarillo, working with language disabilities and dyslexia, presented information on the alphabetic phonics program of treatment. An estimated 20-25% of school children are affected. Phil Barefield recommended that the school contract with Jamie Deyhle to work with our students. She has worked toward the certification requirements at a graduate level. Motion by Phil Fletcher, seconded by Elmonette Bivens, to adopt a dyslexia program for the school district, and contract with Jamie Deyhle to implement the program as a language therapist. Motion carried unanimously 5-0-0.

Open Forum: Board requested by two individuals not in attendance to refrain from restoring the old gym until all school debts are retired. The lights on the tennis court have been repaired.

Motion by Elmonette Bivens, seconded by Lynne Williams, to adopt an observation policy for teacher appraisals that schedules the teacher observation of the teacher by the day and hour of the day. Motion carried unanimously

5-0-0. Site-Based Decision Making and Campus Improvement Planning was discussed. Phil Barefield reported discussion with staff regarding commitment and staff development as required in order to fully benefit from this team approach.

Motion by Derlene Graham, seconded by Elmonette Bivens, to apply for a waiver from the Texas Education Agency for four days of staff development if judged by Phil Barefield that there is staff support. Motion carried unanimously 5-0-0.
