### Moral Pyæmia.

Pyæmia, in medical parlance, signifies blood-poisoning, and is usually occasioned by sloughings consequent upon a wound of some kind. The blood becomes impure, loaded with effete material retained in the system. It is not the extent or size of the wound that determins the dangerous result. The mere fact of a breach of surface, no matter how trivial, may be sufficient to excite the morbid process, the materials for which may have been previously stored up in the system. Three-fourths of all the deaths that follow amputation are in consequence of Pyæmia.

This suggests the fact of a moral Pyæmia, or blood poisoning, which has features so strikingly resembling this disease that they cannot be mistaken. ### The Lucky Horse-Shoe.

The superstitious notions concernng good-luck horse-shoes that have been handed down to us by tradition undobutedly originated when horseshowing was in its infancy. History informs us that the vulcanian art was practised by preists and other sacred men in ancient times. The sacred Danger of Handling Do- smith not only fashioned the weapons, but shod the horses of heroes. The Druid priests are said to have been skillful workers in iron, and practiced the vulcanian art in great seerecy. The Anglo-Saxon monks are said to have been skilful workers in iron. The smith's art was so highly prized in the days of King Edgar that he enacted that the priests should learn and practise it. St. Dustin, who acquired great fame for being a cunning worker in iron, lived in the tenth century, and gave himself up to a solitary existance, practicing his art in secret. The mystery connected with this saint caused the simple people of his day to venerate him. St. Elory was Bishop of Noy, France, in the seventh century, and by some means or other became the patron saint of horse-shoers in nearly every country in Europe.

Writing by Rule. Few people outside the profession know that writing is often done to order. A picture is sent to a writer of stories, with the request that he will produce a tale to fit it. On this suggestion a readable story is geneally produced without much trouble. For such tales some publishers pay more, some less; all, however (the exceptions being so few as only to prove the rule ), pay for quantity and not for quality. Of course, the manuscript must be up to a certain standard, or it is rejected; but so seldom do hack writers excel themselves that the rule which pays so much a column or so much a thousand words is a very fair one. Leaves of corse weeds, however, proved an abundant quota of danger, but frequently their strong scent and bitter or nauseous taste give timely warning against being consumed. Of all our British orders of plants, perhaps the umbelliferous order coutributes the rankest and most widespread elements of danger. The tall hemlock is every where known to be poisonous, and it is one of the most abundant occupants of the hedge. A peculiar "mousy" cder can generally be reconized on squeezing the leaves, which are deep green in color and trebly compound, the small lobes being lanceolate and deeply cut. It is said that the mousy smell can be detected in water containing not more than a fifty-thousendth part of the juice. Hemlock is both an irritant to any sore place and a general, narcotic poison, producing headache, imperfect vision, loss of power to swallow, extreme drowsiness, with complete paralysis of voluntary mussels and mussels of respiration. 





The Texas cattle received at New York in the last few months, though by no means choice, have been in decidedly better condition than those of any preceeding year, and they are consequently gaining in favor with THE the butchers of the Atlantic Seaboard. The improvement in these cattle in the last two or three years gives ground for the belief that Texas will ultimately furnish from its ranges beeves which will grade second only to the good corn-fed cattle of the feeding states. That state comes forward this year with an astonishing erop of corn. This furnishes the true key to the future greatness of the Southwest as a cattle country, for the use of corn with the luxuriant pasturage of that region can ultimately furnish from its ranges beeves which will rival in quality the best of Illinois exports. All this is withreach of Texas stockmen, but whether they will develop these possibilities or not remains to be seen .-Pittsburg Stockman.

'Twould puzzle any reporter to quote prices of cattle on the range just now; there is no legitimate value to stock cattle or female stocks. The first sell readily at from \$16 to \$20, counting everything with no sellers; and as to she stock they are held above any possible trading point. But few contracts for next springs drive have been made owing to holders being unwilling to price. Those who have closed trades have paid \$10 to \$12 for yearlings and \$15 for two year olds. The market is in a very unsatisfactory condition and we fear will result in putting off "trading for spring delivery" too late to allow buyers to get up their outfits of horses and men. In beef cattle there is but little doing, our local butchers paying \$15 and up for yearling beeves, and \$18 to \$20 for two year olds, and are having to rustle to get a supply. The Cattle Plague.

An alarming plague among cattle has appeared recently in Pennsylvania, Virginia, North Carolina, and Alabama. At the Agricultural Department, the disease is supposed to be splenic fever, as it is popularly known, Dr. Salmon, one of the department inspectors, pronounces the form of this disease, and it is probable that the others are like it. If the disease is realy splenic fever then no time should be lost in the application of the Pasteur system of inoculation as a cure. Valuable papers on this subject, with illustrations, will be found in the Scientific American Supplement. For example, in Supplement 300 is given Professor Pasteur's remarkable adress before the International Medical College, London, in which the nature and results of his discoveries are described. In 323 is a very able paper by J. W. L. Thudichum, M. D., of Loudon, embracing an account of the most reliving contagium, and their application to the prevention of disease in animals. In 337 is an acount, with illustratious, of the practical application of the Pasteur system in the inoculation of animals.




