Hedley aldermen set new hours for City Hall

The Hedley Board of Aldermen met in regular session June 7 at 7:05 p.m.

The board considered and accepted a letter of resignation from Jim Lollar, who stated he had to resign his position "due to unforeseen circumstances."

Aldermen discussed replacing Lollar, but no action was taken.

The budget for fiscal year 2004-2005 was discussed and adopted.

Office hours for City Hall were discussed for the purpose of reducing labor and utility costs. The board approved hours of 8 a.m. to noon, Monday through Friday.

SBA economic injury loan deadline is July 6

Businesses in some Texas counties can now apply for low interest Economic Injury Disaster Loans from the US Small Business Administration (SBA).

The SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loans are available for businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers sustaining crop losses due to excessive rain, hail, high winds, and lightning that occurred on June 22, 2003. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible.

Businesses in the following counties are eligible to apply: Briscoe, Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Donley, Hall, and Motley.

Loans are also available for businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers sustaining crop losses due to drought, high winds, static electricity, and heat that occurred June 1, 2003, and continuing.

Businesses in the following counties are eligible to apply: Armstrong, Briscoe, Donley, Floyd, Hall, Motley, and Swisher.

TAKS results please Hedley ISD officials

Results from the TAKS test administered to the students at Hedley schools this spring are in, and the administration is very pleased with the outcome.

Students in grades three through eleven were given the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) exam this year, and Hedley ISD superintendent Bryan Hill said the results look good.

"We're real proud of our test scores," Hill said. "There are some areas we need to improve on; but for

the most part, we're real tickled."

State law requires that third-graders must pass the reading portion of the exam to be promoted to fourth grade, and 100 percent of the third-graders at Hedley ISD passed.

The third grade students also were tested in math and scored 90 percent, which meets the state average of 90 percent.

Hedley fourth graders scored above the state and regional averages in reading, math, and writing with 100 percent of the students passing all three tests.

The fifth grade students in Hedley scored above the state average of 79 percent in reading with 87 percent passing, but fell below the state averages in math and science. 80 percent passed in math compared to the state average of 82 percent, and in science 47 percent passed compared to the average of 69 percent.

Sixth grade students in Hedley were tested in math and reading. They outscored the state average of 77 percent in math with 85 percent passing, and in reading 100 percent passed.

The seventh graders were tested in three areas and fell below the state averages in reading and writing. 78 percent passed in reading compared to the state average of 83, in writing 80 percent passed compared to the average of 91 percent, and the students met the state average of 70 percent in writing.

HISD's eighth graders scored above the state averages in reading and social studies, but fell short of the state average in math with 57 percent passing compared to the average of 66 percent.

Hedley's ninth graders exceeded the state averages in both reading and math while the tenth graders surpassed the state averages in writing, math, social studies, and science.

Hedley's juniors scored above state averages on three of the four areas of the exam they were tested in with passing rates of 100 percent on the writing exam, 100 percent on social studies, 100 percent in science, and 83 percent in math. The state average scores were writing 87 percent, social studies 97, science 85, and math 85.

Spier receives VFW certificate for heroic efforts

Deputy Spier was honored for attempting to save the lives of two citizens of this community, one while off duty.

"We are very proud of Mike for what he does for our community," said Commander Powers.

The VFW recognizes individuals who help others by saving lives. The National award is awarded when a local VFW Post makes application and submits documentation about the life saved. The application is then submitted to the Department of

Texas for review and then forwarded to the National VFW Commander for approval.

Spier was selected by the National Commander to receive this award.

TDH offers hot weather tips for staying healthy

The sun is shining and skies are clear. Summer in Texas invites outdoor activities. But the intense heat that marks the season also can signal the need to take health precautions.

Preliminary numbers from the Texas Department of Health (TDH) show that there were 40 heat-related deaths of Texas residents last year. A total of 38 deaths were recorded in 2002 and 26 deaths in 2001. In 2000 in Texas 64 people died of exposure to excessive natural heat.

The elderly, the very young, and those who are sick or without access to air conditioning are most severely affected by heat. Children left in closed vehicles, even for a short period of time, are at great risk.

Perspiration normally cools people. But high temperatures and high humidity can overwork the body. Dehydration and heat illness

can result if a person does not replace fluids lost during perspiration.

Symptoms of heat illness include heavy sweating, muscle cramps, weakness, dizziness, nausea, weak but rapid pulse and headaches. People with these symptoms should find shade, drink water slowly, and make sure there is good ventilation.

If fluids are not replaced soon enough, heat stroke can result, potentially leading brain damage or death. Get immediate medical attention for anyone with extremely high body temperature, red and dry skin, rapid pulse, confusion, and loss of consciousness.

Staying in an air-conditioned area, either at home or in a public place such as a mall, library, or recreation center, is the most effective way to fight heat. If air conditioning is not

available, pull the shades over the windows and use cross-ventilation and fans to cool rooms.

A cool shower or bath also is an effective way to cool off. Limit use of stoves and ovens to keep home temperatures lower.

Children can quickly become dehydrated in hot weather. They need to drink fluids frequently, especially water, and wear light-colored, loose-fitting clothes. Avoid drinks that are heavily sweetened or contain caffeine. Check on children often, especially if they are playing outside in high temperatures.

TDH offers these heat precautions:

- Never leave anyone in a closed, parked vehicle during hot weather, even for a short time.
 - Drink plenty of fluids but avoid drinks with alcohol, caffeine, or a lot of sugar. Start drinking fluids before going out into the heat.
 - Plan strenuous outdoor activity for early morning or late evening when the temperature is lower. Use a repellent containing DEET to avoid insect bites.
 - Take frequent breaks when working outside.
 - Wear sun block, hats, and light-colored, loose-fitting clothes.
 - Stay indoors in air conditioning as much as possible.
 - Eat more frequently but be sure meals are well balanced and light.
 - Don't dress infants in heavy clothing or wrap them in blankets.
- At first signs of heat illness -- dizziness, nausea, headaches, muscle cramps -- move to a cooler place, rest a few minutes, then slowly drink a cool beverage. Seek medical attention immediately if conditions do not improve.
- Prevention is the best defense against heat-related illness and death. Staying cool, drinking plenty of fluids, wearing cool clothing and pacing outdoor activities are keys to staying healthy in hot weather.

The most notable loss was the Highway 70 bridge over the Salt Fork of the Red River, which went out around ten o'clock when a ten-foot rise on the already full river hit the structure. Parts of the concrete and steel bridge are now visible in sizeable chunks for a mile or more downstream.
- The Ministerial Alliance "took notice" of the rodeo association's plan to hold the last day of the annual celebration on Sunday, July 4th, called it "absolutely... not necessary," and questioned why Clarendon should "desecrate" the Sabbath.

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The following column are remarks delivered by US Rep. Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) on the floor of the United States House of Representatives last week.

Reagan had confidence in America

Like many Americans, I feel a real and personal sense of loss with the death of President Ronald Reagan. He was a great man and a great President, ranking in the top tier of all of our Chief Executives. He will be remembered as a pivotal historical figure, but at the same time, many Americans feel as though they have lost a member of their family. Such was the unique character and legacy of Ronald Reagan, the President and the man.

My wife, Sally, and I each had the honor of serving as mid-level political appointees during the second term of the Reagan Administration. We were down in the bowels of the bureaucracy but proud to be working for and certainly inspired by President Reagan. With his optimism and his confidence in America, he inspired at least a generation of conservatives to be involved in public life and to advance the ideals for which he stood.

I believe that the accomplishments which cause Ronald Reagan to stand among our greatest Presidents can be traced to a set of fundamental beliefs to which he adhered throughout his political career.

One of them was strong, steadfast confidence in the American people. President Reagan knew that government must be limited so that the unlimited potential of individual Americans could be unleashed. He knew that when families were able to keep more of the money they earned, not just the family but the whole country would benefit. The result of his tax relief and restraint of government was the longest period of economic growth in the nation's history.

President Reagan also believed, with the signers of the Declaration of Independence, that freedom is a gift of God, intended for all peoples. In his speech to the British Parliament in 1982, which he viewed as among his most important, he said,

"We must be staunch in our conviction that freedom is not the sole prerogative of a lucky few, but the inalienable and universal right of all human beings."

He could not be satisfied with a status quo stand-off in the Cold War. He sought to roll back tyranny, and he succeeded beyond anyone's wildest dreams. His "peace through strength" policies, along with his willingness to engage the leaders of the Soviet Union directly, led to the end of the Cold War and gave millions of people across the globe a chance at the freedom which God intended.

As important as his accomplishments domestically and internationally were, perhaps his most important success was to help the American people believe in themselves again. After the tumult of assassinations, Vietnam, Watergate, and malaise, Ronald Reagan came to remind us of the core values of the Founding Fathers and of the special place that the United States has in the history of the world - "the shining city on a hill."

President Reagan was called "The Great Communicator," but he said that what was truly great were the ideas he communicated. Those ideas were fundamental in the creation of the United States. As he noted in his farewell address, he communicated "great things . . . [that] came from the heart of a nation - from our experience, our wisdom, and our belief in the principles that have guided us for two centuries." Ronald Reagan brought out the best in us because he knew the best of us.

He was often underestimated. But, his clear words required clear thoughts, and those clear thoughts came from a clear vision and clear values, the articulation of which was refined over a lifetime of work. The amount of work and thought Ronald Reagan put into developing and expressing his views is only now becoming known, with the publication of some of the thousands of articles and letters written with his own hand.

He clearly believed that one must not be afraid to speak the truth, sometimes to the discomfort of his advisors. Throughout his career of public service, Ronald Reagan did not remove himself from the struggle between right and wrong, good and evil. He engaged in that struggle, and he changed the course of history.

Before the British Parliament, President Reagan repeated the question asked by Winston Churchill in one of his wartime speeches: "What kind of people do they think we are?" President Reagan answered, "Free people, worthy of freedom and determined not only to remain so but to help others gain their freedom as well."

Being a "free people, worthy of freedom" and "help[ing] others gain their freedom as well" remains America's challenge. My hope is that we pursue those aims with the determination and spirit that Ronald Reagan displayed throughout his career.

A President whose basic political philosophy about the role of government continues to occupy center stage in our domestic debates more than a decade after he left office; A President who changed the course of world history and helped free millions of people from totalitarian bondage; A man who restored a nation's confidence in itself and continues to inspire defenders of freedom everywhere. Quite a record. Quite a life.

Our nation was blessed to have been given Ronald Reagan.

Then they decided to go bike riding. It was Andra's idea. I blame her.

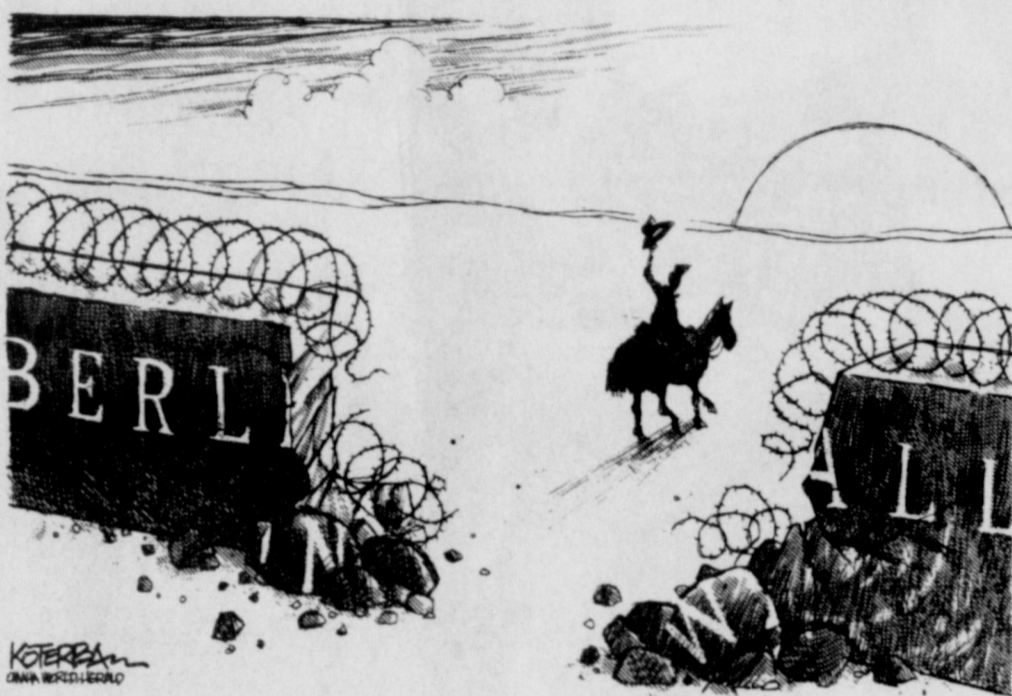

America mourns a legendary president

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District to start water quality testing season

The Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District will be beginning its annual water quality program on June 21.

Some 275 samples will be tested for nitrates, sulfates, iron, fluoride, ammonia, chloride, alkalinity, hardness, specific conductivity, total dissolved solids, and pH. The program should conclude in the month of September.

Since this is the 2004 season, wells in the program with even

state well numbers, or any well that exceeded a state secondary drinking water standard in years past, will be sampled.

Depending on whether or not the water from a particular well ever exceeded a state standard, the District will test the well on an every year or every other year basis. Knowing the water came from the same well and water source enables the District to compare past results to the newly gathered data.

District personnel will be traveling in maroon or red pickups with a visible logo on each door. We may be entering your field, pasture, or land. So just in case you see an unusual pickup, it is our staff monitoring the quality of your drinking water.

If you would like to have your well water tested, please call us at 883-2501, and we will set up an appointment at your convenience.

Also, the PGCD is currently in the process of a district-wide irriga-

tion well inventory.

During the next few months, District personnel will be checking all irrigation wells to see if the well is still in production, has been abandoned, or has been plugged and covered. This procedure will allow the District to update its well database and assist in future modeling and planning.

Last, but not least, let's all please remember to conserve water. Future generations are counting on it.
