WHITE DEER - The Board of Directors of the Panhandle **Groundwater Conservation District** last Wednesday remanded to the rules committee a proposed decline limit of 1.26 percent a year for the Ogallala Aquifer.

Board members said they wanted to carefully consider all the comments made at the public hearing and ensure that water users clearly understand the rule's rami-

The limit proposal is part of a newly proposed Rule 16 intended to implement the District's goal of preserving 50 percent of the groundwater in 50 years time.

The District's hallmark 50/50 Standards says that at least 50 percent of the aquifer must be left in 50 years, starting in 1998. The standard underpins the management plans of both the District and the Panhandle Water Planning

In other business, the District approved 113 Initial Production Permits and four single well production permits. The District also approved one Agricultural Conservation Equipment Loan.








The Clarendon Board of Aldermen met in regular session May 25 in the Board Room of City Hall.

Results of the May 15 election were canvassed, and Mayor Tex Selvidge administered the oath of office to Aldermen Janice Knorpp, Tommy Hill, and Mark White.

Theresa Shelton addressed the board on behalf of the Clarendon Outdoor Entertainment Association and requested funds from the Motel Bed Tax to promote this year's Saints' Roost Celebration. The board authorized \$1,800 for this purpose.

Kay Howard of the grant-writing firm HOWCO met with the board to discuss the ongoing disaster grant project. The project, which funded paving and storm water improvements in southeast Clarendon, was to be paid entirely by grants from the NRCS and ORCA. Unexpected costs to the city are an estimated \$30,000 to \$35,000. The board directed Howard to have a conference call with city engineer Che Shadle, City Administrator Sean Pate, and NRCS officials to see if that final number can be adjusted down.

Shadle addressed the board regarding this year's proposed paving on Fourth Street from Koogle to Jefferson and on Seventh Street from the west city limits to Sims. He presented plans for 31-foot streets with curb and gutter similar to the paving done last year under the ORCA grant. Shadle said he hopes to go to bids in

The aldermen discussed charging contractors and utility companies to dump limbs at the recycling center. The workload from all the limbs is taking 35 man-hours per month. No action was taken.

The Saints' Roost Museum will hold its annual Barbecue and Open House on Friday, June 11, at 7 p.m. on the museum grounds.


