# Voters re-elect incumbents

## Hospital, city, school board members all win re-election

Local incumbents were returned to office in all races last Saturday when Donley County voters went to the polls.

Despite being the most talked about race, only 25 percent of registered voters cast ballots for candidates running for the Donley County Hospital Board, which was the only county-wide election.

Three current members of the hospital board were re-elected. In Place 5, Carolyn Moffett defeated challenger Linda Kay Bell, 336-307. Place 6 director Onita Thomas won more votes than any other hospital board candidate in her 436-208 re-election victory over

Don Stone, and Jim Douglas posted the narrowest win when he beat June Davis, 329-307, for the Place 7 position.

In the race to fill the Place 4 seat formerly held by the late Jerry May, Pat McAnear defeated Kelly Tunnell by a margin of 416 to 222.

A total of 652 votes were cast in the hospital board election.

Clarendon voters also decided to keep their current city leaders on the job as three incumbent aldermen were returned to the board. Alderman Mark White received the most votes, 242, followed by Aldermen Tommy Hill

and Janice Knorpp with 195 each.

Also on the city ballot were Ray Hamilton (147), Ron Lamberth (129), and William "Bill" Holden (78). A total of 343 citizens voted in the municipal election, a turnout of 27.5 percent.

Hedley residents also like their city leaders. Mayor Janie Hill, running unopposed, received 60 votes; and Aldermen Terry Stevens and Leon Ward were re-elected with 39 and 54 votes respectively. Challenger Pamela Casteel received only 27 votes.

Sixty-six Hedley voters cast ballots in that city's election, a turnout of 30 percent.

Voters in the Clarendon Independent

School District returned three members of the Board of Trustees to their offices. James Shelton received the most votes with 376, followed by Renee Betts with 361 and Marvin Thompson with 315. Challenger Judy Thomas received 164 votes out of the 428 ballots cast.

Hedley Independent School District voters re-elected two current members and added a new face to their Board of Trustees. Incumbent Marlee Sharp led the count with 80 votes, and incumbent Jason Sargent had 78. Abby O'Neal was elected with 68 votes, and Rex Morris will not be joining the board after receiving only 56 of the 102 votes cast.

# Grant provides \$50k to college

Clarendon College will be better prepared to serve future students thanks to a \$50,000 grant awarded by the Don & Sybil Harrington Foundation last week.

The funds will be used for technology purposes in the new CC Library & Learning Resource Center, which is now under construction. CC President Myles Shelton said the grant is a great gift for Clarendon's students.

"Technology is one of the critical components of the new library," Shelton said. "We are going to have an open computer lab with 45 computers, which will be tied into a wireless network. Students and faculty with their own laptop computers will be able to bring them in and access the network. This grant allows us to make that a reality."

Shelton said the college is still waiting for the final paperwork on the grant but confirmed that there are no matching funds required. The grant money will go directly to the purchasing of computers.

"The ability to use printed and

online resources is the future," he said. "This makes the technology we've dreamed about come true."

The Harrington Foundation and the Amarillo Area Foundation awarded a total of \$506,979 in thirteen grants around the Panhandle in recent days, including a \$43,679 grant to the Donley County Hospital District for a new ambulance. Foundation CEO Jim Allison said the grant awards are about more than money.

"The foundations are pleased to announce these recent grantmaking decisions, representing an investment in people, property, and ideas, which in turn will help our region flourish, not only in economic and monetary matters, but in matters concerning spirit and hope," Allison said.

Shelton credited CC employees Will Thompson and Greg Henry for their work on the grant application.

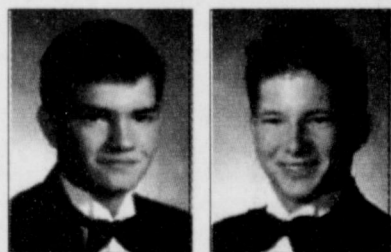
Construction on the new library is reported to be about two weeks ahead of schedule. The \$1.3 million facility is being funded by gifts to the college and the CC Foundation.

## Groundwater district plans limit to strengthen rules

WHITE DEER - The Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District plans to add a 1.25 percent annual decline limit for the Ogallala Aquifer to strengthen District rules, intended to preserve 50 percent of the groundwater in 50 years time, according to rule proposals published last week.

The 1.25 percent acceptable decline rate is based on the aquifer's 1998 saturated thickness and will be recalculated every five years. The District's Board of Directors will receive public comment on the newly proposed Rule 16 and other revisions through May 21 and plans to adopt them at a meeting on May 26.

In March, the Board adopted 15

new operating rules and returned one to the rules committee. The latest revisions reflect public comment and deliberations since that time.

"These revisions will give us the tools needed to enforce our 50/50 Management Standard," said C.E. Williams, general manager of the Panhandle GCD. "The 1.25 percent limit serves as a trigger mechanism for the standard."

The 50/50 Standard says at least 50 percent of the aquifer must be left in 50 years, starting in 1998.

In other proposals, the District plans to more clearly define a Depletion Study Area - an area where the aquifer decline exceeds the limit.

# Hewlett Packard awards \$35k to junior high school

A team of five teachers from Clarendon Junior High will be receiving help next fall in applying technology in their classrooms, thanks to the Hewlett Packard Technology for Teaching grant they have been awarded that includes an award package valued at more than \$35,000.

The award package will include five HP Tablet PCs, five HP multimedia projectors, an HP Officejet all-in-one, an HP digital camera, HP K-12 help desk support for one year, a \$500 stipend per teacher, and a professional development program

that includes customized learning opportunities, expert mentoring, and participation in an online learning community to support teachers' use of technology.

To complement HP's award, Microsoft will donate Microsoft Office 2003 and OneNote 2003 software for use by the teachers.

The team led by Tammi Lewis, the science teacher at CJH, also includes Andrea Hall, who teaches math and Algebra I; Jay Gage, who teaches reading; Adelita Elam, who teaches technology applications; and Becky Swearingen, who teaches special education.

The team of teachers along with the seventh grade students at CJH will integrate their new technology next fall in a project designed to research and understand Mad Cow Disease and West Nile Virus.

The students will create PowerPoint, brochures, and graphs to demonstrate the effects of these diseases on the community, the history of each disease, predictions of future effects of diseases, and ways to maintain stable environments as well as many other topics that will interest students.

"I'm looking forward to getting our new equipment and implement-

ing the new curriculum we will be receiving with this technology," Lewis said.

The school should be receiving the new equipment within the next three to six weeks, and the five teachers will begin working on the curriculum for the project soon thereafter.

"We hope to have the curriculum completed by the end of the summer so we can begin the project at the beginning of the fall semester."

CJH is among 193 elementary, middle and high schools, colleges, and universities that will receive more than \$10 million over 2004-2005 from the grant which is designed to

accelerate learning through the innovative use of technology.

The HP Technology for Teaching grant supports HP's broader education goals of transforming teaching and learning through the integration of technology in the classroom and beyond. The grant enables teachers to apply technology to enhance learning and improve student achievement in math, science, and engineering.

Through its investments in education, HP is helping to prepare students for leadership in the digital economy and to ignite interest in careers in engineering and the sciences.

**Republicans' free spending boosts Dems**

Republicans used to be considered the party of limited government while Democrats were the defenders of the overgrown welfare state. But a recent poll suggests that the public doesn't see it that way anymore. A national "Battleground" poll of likely voters taken at the end of March found that John Kerry is favored over George Bush 48 to 39 percent to do a better job at "holding down federal spending." When asked the same question about Congress, voters favored Democrats over Republicans 47 to 42 percent.

If the parties have traded places in the public's mind, the Republicans have only themselves to blame. Aside from fighting a costly war, President Bush is spending time on the campaign trail touting his expensive prescription drug benefit, advocating large-scale federal intrusion into state school systems, and promoting wasteful subsidy schemes such as hydrogen-powered car research.

The cumulative effect has been to send a powerful signal that Bush is out of touch with fiscal conservatives and with federal budget realities. To make matters worse, Bush has just asked for another \$25 billion for Iraq, and Republicans in Congress are motoring ahead with a pork-laden \$275 billion highway bill. This is no way for the GOP to get the party base energized for the coming election. Republicans should be worried because it's clear that the Democratic base is energized with a big anti-Bush block of voters likely heading to the polls this November.

A group of House conservatives is launching one last attack on the bloated budget before the election in hopes of showing that Republicans can "hold down federal spending." A group led by Jeb Hensarling (R-Tex.) and Paul Ryan (R-Wisc.), is championing a list of reforms they want included in the 2005 budget resolution to be voted on in coming weeks. The reforms, under the rubric of the "Family Budget Protection Act," include a form of presidential line-item veto, caps on entitlement spending, and a mechanism to enforce agreed-upon spending limits.

The House leadership should get behind the proposals to rally the troops for the election, much like the Contract with America did a decade ago. Unfortunately, the House conservative proposals have received close to zero support from the White House so far. The White House isn't necessarily against these reforms. It has simply not exerted any energy to move them forward in Congress.

That is short-sighted because John Kerry will hammer the administration on "fiscal irresponsibility," and the GOP needs a pro-active plan to counter him. Kerry has been moving to the political center in recent weeks and making himself sound like a sensible moderate on fiscal issues. He now promises middle-class tax cuts and says he will cut the deficit in half in five years, just like Bush.

Bush and the Republicans need to set their budget agenda apart from Kerry's. The Ryan and Hensarling proposals are a start. But an even more powerful idea is to impose an overall cap on federal spending. It could be modeled after Colorado's successful Taxpayer's Bill of Rights, which limits state spending growth to the growth in population plus inflation. A federal version could be called the Taxpayer Protection Act, which would protect taxpayers as rising entitlement costs and high deficits spur calls for tax increases in coming years.

Capping overall federal spending would force Congress to set priorities and eliminate wasteful and unnecessary programs. The cap should cover all federal spending, including defense and entitlements. It is not true that Social Security, Medicare, and Medicaid are "mandatory" programs that cannot be cut. If members of Congress were constrained by an overall budget cap, they could make a choice each budget cycle to cut these programs or to cut other lower-priority programs.

The Bush administration and Republicans in Congress have a successful tax-cutting record to run on this year. But that may not be enough to convince their grassroots supporters that their party stands for reform rather than business as usual in Washington. Adopting a Taxpayer Protection Act would assure voters that the Bush tax cuts will not be reversed and that Republican policies are not just "Kerry-lite." If Republican voters see no compelling reason to turn out and vote, there could well be job turnover at both ends of Pennsylvania Avenue this November.

**Medicare prescription benefit starting**

This month the government begins to implement the new prescription drug benefit in Medicare. Unfortunately, Medicare continues to be used as a political football with charges flying back and forth. I think that it is very important for people to have the straight facts so they can make decisions that make sense for them.

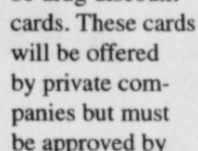
That is the reason I have written a brochure that will be going out to every person over the age of 65 in the 13th Congressional District. The brochure contains the essential information about the new prescription drug coverage and tells you where you can go for more information.

The most important fact about the new benefit is that it is completely voluntary. You do not have to participate in any part of the program if you do not wish to do so. If you already have a drug discount card or prescription drug coverage, you may prefer to keep that coverage.

Even if you choose to participate in the new Medicare benefit, you will have a choice of plans. You will not be forced into a "one size fits all" government program. You can select from several options the plan that best meets your needs and your situation.

The first stage of the new benefit will

be drug discount cards. These cards will be offered by private companies but must be approved by Medicare authorities. For a cost of no more than \$30 a year, these cards are expected to save most people 10 to 25% on the cost of their medicines. They will be available to any Medicare beneficiary except those already receiving drug coverage through Medicaid.

Enrollment for the discount drug cards is underway this month. But, be careful. Already, there are people out there trying to convince senior citizens to buy phony discount cards or attempting to trick them into giving out private information. You should keep in mind that Medicare-approved discount card providers are not allowed to make door-to-door visits or solicit customers through "cold calls." Don't fall prey to con artists.

The best way to obtain a drug discount card is to contact an approved card provider yourself. To see a list of available cards and to compare prices, you can look

on the Internet at www.medicare.gov. You can also get the same information by calling 1-800-MEDICARE.

When you find a card you are interested in, you can contact the company offering the card and ask for a Medicare-approved drug discount enrollment form. Some companies will let you apply by mailing or faxing your form while others will simply take your information over the phone or on the web.

Special assistance is available for seniors whose income was less than \$12,569 in 2003 (\$16,862 for couples). They may be eligible for up to \$600 per year in 2004 and in 2005 to help cover drug costs, as long as they do not have other drug coverage.

The drug discount cards may be used until 2006, when a new Medicare D will offer permanent prescription drug insurance coverage. This coverage will also be voluntary, and beneficiaries will have their choice of several plans.

The new Medicare prescription drug benefit has the potential to help beneficiaries see significant savings and greater availability of the medicines they need. As always, let me know if my staff or I can be of further assistance.

**TxDOT encourages youth to buckle up**

Many people - especially teenagers and young adults - still do not take one of the simplest and most effective steps to stay safe: Buckling up. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), 59 percent of the passenger vehicle occupants killed in crashes in 2002 - 32,598 men, women and children - were not wearing seat belts.

Teenagers and young adults are particularly at risk. Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for teens and young adults in the United States from age 16 through 34, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Yet, 64 percent of 16 to 29 year old (and 68 percent of 18 to 34 year old) passenger vehicle occupants killed or seriously injured in crashes in 2002 were not wearing a safety belt, according to NHTSA.

Sometimes the fear of getting a traffic ticket is the only reason that someone will wear a safety belt. That is why state and local law enforcement officers across the

country are joining the national Click It or Ticket/Operation ABC (America Buckles Up Children) May 2004 Mobilization that runs from May 24 through June 6, 2004. Officers across the country will aggressively ticket unbelted drivers and passengers.

The combination of active law enforcement, high-profile publicity, and the advocacy ad promotion by public and private groups continues to be an extremely effective means for increasing safety belt use and saving lives across the country.

Bottom line, law enforcement officers would rather write someone a ticket than find that same person dead or critically injured because he or she was not restrained in a crash.

Wear your safety belt every trip, every time, and encourage teenagers and young adults to do the same.

Clarendon taxpayers could save at least \$8,000 on airport renovations, according to information presented to the Board of Aldermen last Tuesday.

Alderman Janice Knorpp, who heads the committee overseeing grant-funded renovations at Smiley Johnson Municipal Airport, reported E.D. Baker had received the bid for the project and said the job should be about \$80,000 under budget.

The \$886,000 grant through the Texas Department of Transportation will fund runway and other improvements at the airport. The state will provide 90 percent of the funds, and the remaining ten percent will come from municipal funds.

City officials say it will be months before all the paperwork is done on the grant, but City Administrator Sean Pate said Clarendon could ultimately save between \$8,000 and \$10,000 thanks to the project bid coming in under budget. The savings

could also provide a cushion if workers run into anything unexpected during construction.

The project should start the middle of this summer.

In other city business last week, aldermen considered a new sign for the airport and decided to have it read "Smiley Johnson Municipal Airport / Bass Field."

Joe Shadle addressed the board concerning limbs being brought to the Recycling Center for chipping. The board discussed charging utility companies and construction companies to discard limbs. City Hall will check with other cities in the area.

In his Administrator's Report, Pate said he had received a notice from AEP/Mutual Energy that they will start doing electrical disconnects. If a customer does not make payment arrangements, the electric company will disconnect service 15 days after the date of the mailed notice.

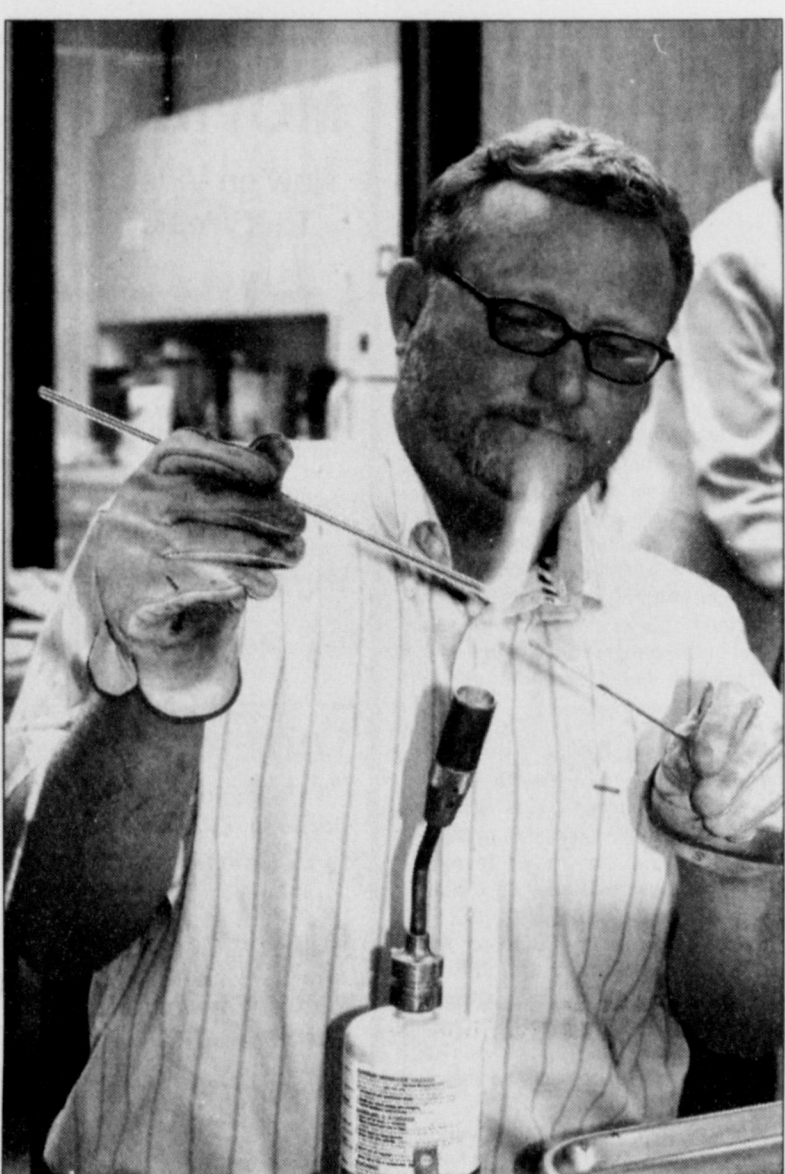

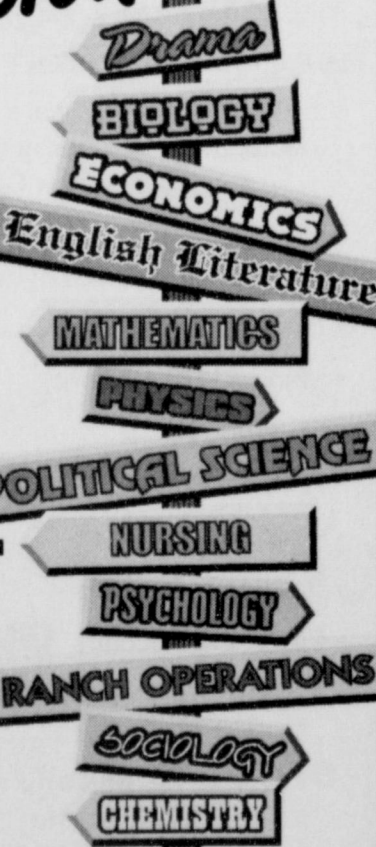

**FSA taking applications for emergency farm loans**

Applications for Emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought that occurred from September 15, 2003, through December 31, 2003, are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located at 321 Sully Street in Clarendon, Larry Goetze said today. Donley County is one of eight in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Ann Veneman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought. Larry Goetze said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 100 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue the agricultural business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent. "As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Larry Goetze said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to consider proceeds from those programs in determining their loss. "Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until December 28, 2004, but farmers should apply as soon as possible," Mr. Goetze said. FSA is a credit agency of the US Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. The FSA office in Clarendon is open from 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

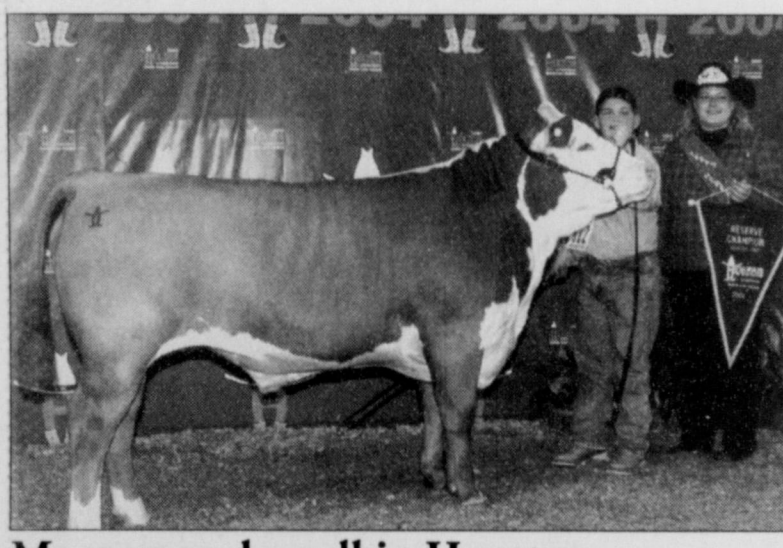

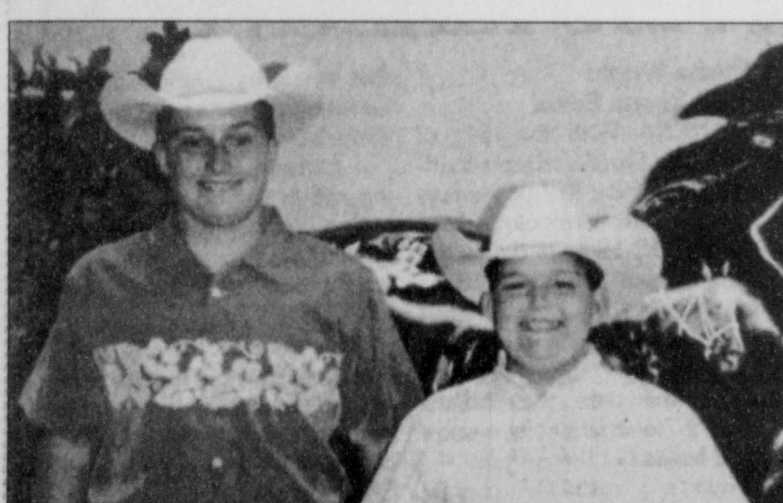

## CHS takes state meet by storm

Sprinters Angel Williams and Equilla Weatherton left nothing on the track as they cruised to four gold medals and one silver medal at the State 1A Track meet held in Austin last week.

Williams blew away her competition in the 100-meter hurdles, 400-meter dash, and the 200-meter dash and splattered the old records in first two events to rewrite the record books, some of which have stood for 27 years.

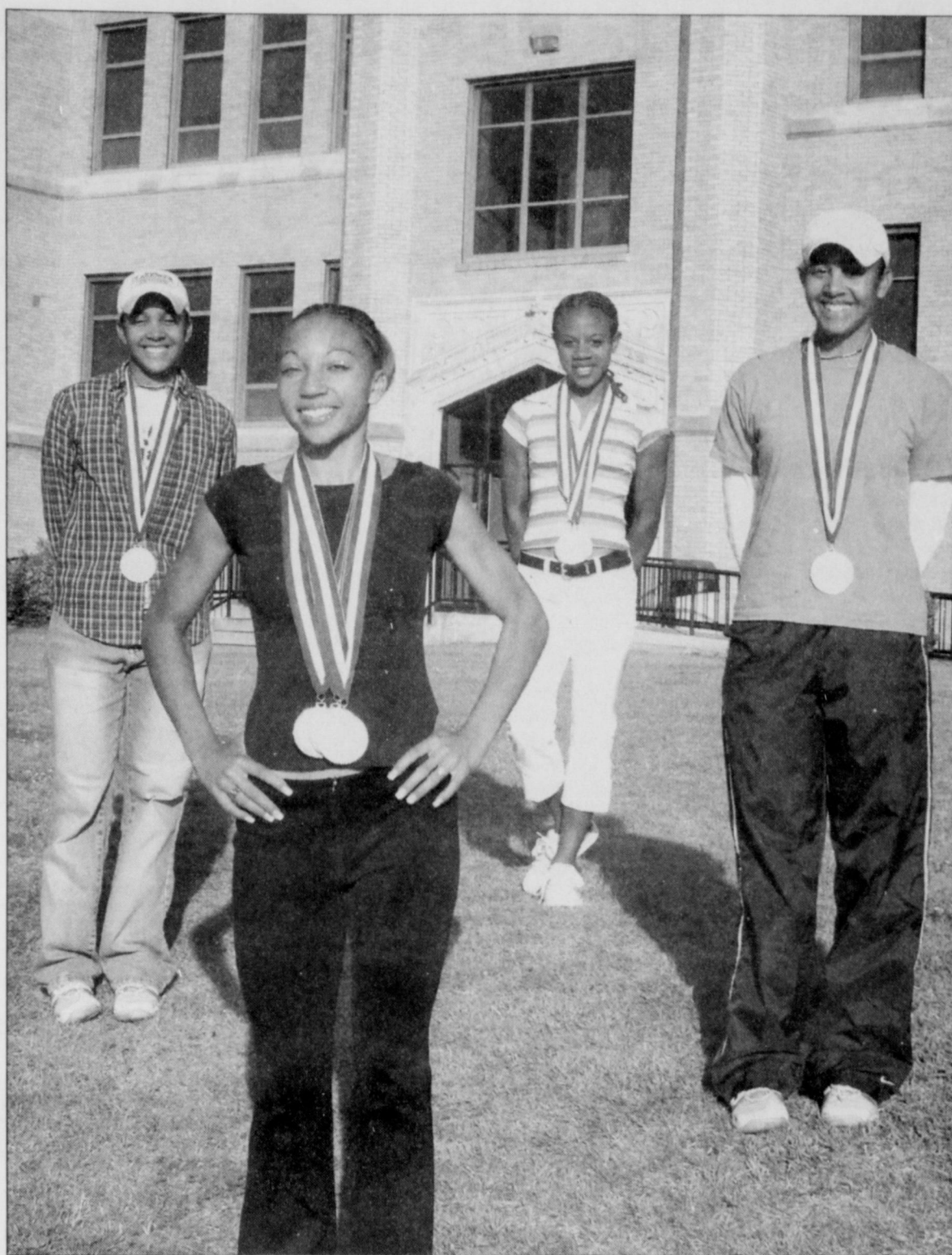
Williams' 14.27 in the 100-meter hurdles broke the old record of 14.70 that was set in 1989, and her personal best time of 54.97 in the 400-meter dash bested the old time of 56.20 that was initially set in 1977 and tied in 1992.

Williams' closest opponent in the 400-meters came in at 57.95 and running second to Williams in the 100-meter hurdles was a 15.66. As if two gold medals were not enough for Williams, she went on to claim the 200-meter gold as well and ran it in a time of 24.69.

Weatherton didn't set any new records, but she glided to the gold in the 100-meter dash with a time of 12.22.

Last year in the state meet, Weatherton ran the race in 12.56, which gave her the bronze. This year Weatherton also qualified for the 200-meter dash and brought home the silver, running second only to Williams with a time of 25.67.

Williams and Weatherton were the lone Lady Broncos that participated in the state meet and together racked up 48 points, which gave the 'team' second place in the meet behind Granger who scored only two more team points with a total of 50. That's quite a feat for only two runners.

Sophomore Chase Thornberry participated in the state meet as well and gained some valuable experience despite playing only one match. He was defeated by Toby Farmer (Poolville) 6-2, 6-2.

"Going to state was a tremendous accomplishment for Chase," Callaway said. "Not only is he the first non-Abdullah to make it in ages, he is only a sophomore. He played the opening match on center court and ran up against an experienced senior who ended up losing in the finals to the four-time state champion from Rotan. I think it was a really good learning experience for Chase; and if he keeps working at it he will be back a couple of more times. Chase ended the season with a match record of 26-8."

Callaway was very pleased with the way the trio represented their school and community.

"I was proud of the effort and attitude of all three participants and Clarendon should be, too. They all did us proud!"

Callaway also went on to thank Abby Abdullah for all of his help in preparing the players. "I want to thank Abby; he helped us a lot, and I appreciate it very much."

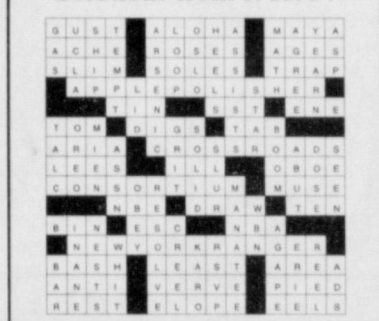

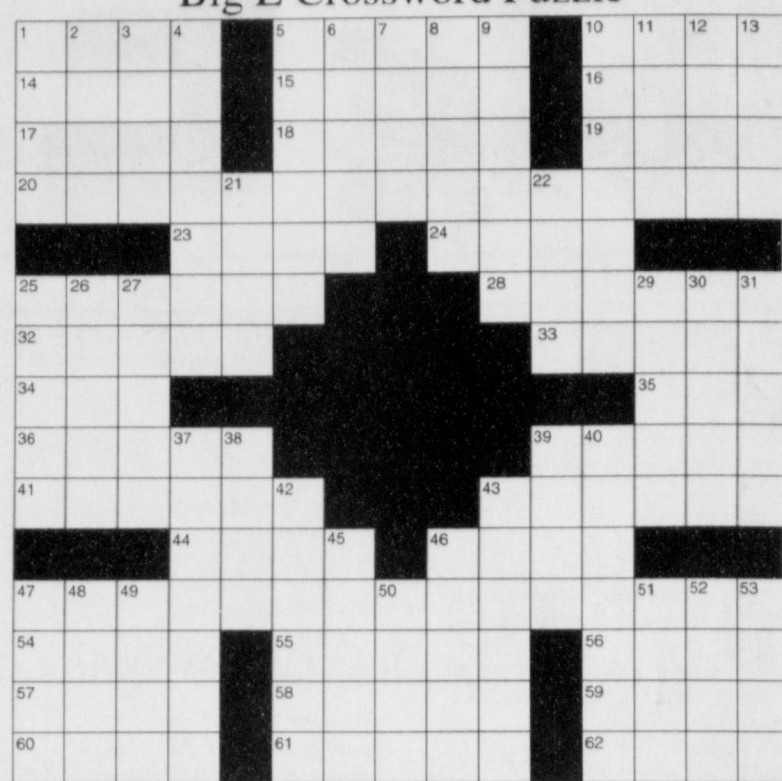
