## Voters can ballot early thru Oct. 29

Early voting is currently underway for this year's general election, and Donley County voters have several local races to decide.

In the only county-wide contested race, County/District Clerk Fay Vargas is facing a challenge from Janette Cox Wagner. Vargas is running on the Democratic ticket and Wagner is on the Republican ticket.

Voters in Precincts 3&4 will choose a new Justice of the Peace to replace the retiring Ann Kennedy. Democrat Colleen Owens will face Republican Denise Bertrand for that office.

Precinct 4 voters will also select a new commissioner to take the seat occupied by the retiring Bob Trout. Dan Sawyer is running for that office as a Republican, and Brad Dalton is running as a Democrat.

Other local officials are running without opposition, including County Judge Jack Hall, County Treasurer Wanda Smith, Precinct 1&2 Justice of the Peace Connie Havens, and Precinct 2 Commissioner Donnie Hall.

Precinct 3&4 voters also have an unopposed write-in candidate for the constable's job in that part of the county. Doug Wright is seeking that currently vacant position.

Early voting is being held from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays in the Donley County Clerk's office in the Courthouse Annex and will continue through next Friday, October 29. Election Day is November 2.

## Bronco Band earns Division One rating

For the first time in four years, the Clarendon High School Marching Band received a Division One rating at the UIL Region Marching Competition last Saturday in Amarillo.

"Mr. Strobel and I are so proud of the hard work and determination that our band students have exhibited this year," CHS Band Director Megan Boone said. "We set goals at the beginning of this school year, and on Saturday, we went out and achieved them."

The band performed their show entitled "Rock Phrases" in the Dick Bivins Stadium for a panel of three judges. Two of the judges gave the performance a Division One rating, and the other gave it a Division Two rating.

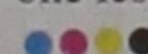
The band will not advance to state since this is not an advancing year.

## Aldermen tap Little as next administrator

Lambert Little was the unanimous choice as the next city administrator when the Clarendon Board of Aldermen met last Tuesday, Oct. 12.

Mayor Larry Hicks said he thinks Little will do a good job for the city and be able to save money due to his experience.

Aldermen praised Little's experience, knowledge of municipal laws, and good sense of humor during their discussion, and the board approved a salary of \$50,000 plus benefits.

In a telephone interview this week, Little told the ENTERPRISE he is looking forward to coming to Clarendon.

"I'm excited, and I'm loading up the motor home right now so that I have a place to camp out for a while," Little said.

Before starting a career of city management, Little served four terms on the city council in his hometown of Hamilton and then was mayor of that city for two terms. He then managed the cities of Mexia

and Edna before going back to college to finish a bachelor's degree in Business Administration.

After getting his degree, Little became the City of Hico's first city administrator and held that position for five years.

"Hico is about two-thirds the size of Clarendon, but we did a lot in five years," Little said. "We had about \$3 million in public works improvements, and the state completed a \$6 million highway project. Citizens saw dirt flying all the time."

Little also helped organize Hico's annual Texas Steak Cookoff, which brings as many as 5,000 people to the city.

He left Hico nine months ago and returned to his hometown where he and his twin brother have a landing strip and work on various airplane projects, but he says he's ready to get back into city government.

"I'm looking forward to meeting with people in Clarendon," Little said, noting that he intends to find out what is most important to the council

and to the community before setting any goals for his time in Clarendon.

Little's employment with the city begins November 1. At press time, city officials planned to have Little at City Hall on Wednesday, October 20, from 1 to 3 p.m. to meet with citizens and employees.

In other city business last week, the aldermen approved a resolution authorizing a grant application for the city's recycling center, and the board elected Alderman Ann Huey to serve as the city's mayor pro tem.

## A Century OF Living

What is the secret to living a century? Just ask Curtis Lee (C.L.) Benson. He knows the answer.

"Tend to your own business and stay focused," he said. "There's not too many of us out there."

Benson celebrated his 100th birthday on October 7. His family and friends gave him a party on October 9, where he became one of the few who get the chance to blow out the candles in celebration of a century of life.

"I'm 64, and C.L. shows me there's hope coming up to this end," Benson's caretaker and friend Diane Chisum said. "His mind is sharp, and he can do his laundry and his ironing on his own, as well as tell us what to do to keep us straight. He does quite well for his age."

Benson's long life began October 7, 1910, when he was born in Brice to Justus Lee Benson and Bertha Izella Hudson Benson.

He is the oldest of two siblings. His sister, Susie Kent, will be 99 in March.

"Yeah... I'm the oldest," Benson said. "I'm the oldest, period."

When Benson was 8, he moved to Clarendon and has lived here ever since.

"His parents moved them into a brick house on Sixth Street, and that's where he grew up," Chisum said. "He has lived on Sixth Street ever since then, just in different houses."

He attended school in Clarendon from first grade through college.

"I started first grade in the second floor of what now is the high school," Benson said. "Mrs. Vaughn was my teacher, and now there's a dorm named after her. When I was in sixth grade they moved all the primary and secondary levels out of that building and into the old saddlery by the park. Then for high school and college I returned to the current high school building. I went to Clarendon College for one year and studied engineering."

Instead of playing the Wii or watching movies for fun, Benson and his childhood friends did other activities for entertainment.

"We would go skate on the Courthouse Square or go swimming at the YMCA," he said. "The YMCA swimming pool was under the City Hall. It was open in the afternoon all week long except Sunday, because that's when they drained it."

They also discovered ways to get into trouble.

"We always hunted swimming holes," Benson said. "We would find a pond on someone's place and slip in. Of course they would always catch us and run us out."

But it was not all fun and games. While growing up, Benson had many chores that are unnecessary today.

"Since I was the oldest, one of my jobs was to fire up the furnace every morning," Benson said. "I would wake up early every morning and go out, chop the firewood and build the fire."

He still remembers the day America won World War I.

"They blew the whistle to let everyone know it was the end of the war," Benson said. "Everyone left school and went to [Kearney Street], and then the fun began. We all went to

the courthouse square and celebrated way into the night. Most of the kids didn't even get home until midnight."

Benson also recalls when the Adair Hospital was running.

"Mrs. Adair built the hospital for the JA Ranch cowboys," he said. "She wanted them to have a place to go if they ever got hurt."

When he was older, he became a farmer with his brother Lloyd and grew many crops on the land in Brice they inherited from their father. They called themselves "The Benson Brothers."

He retired in 1975. He still owns the land, but now he leases it out.

"All I ever knew was the farm," Benson said. "We grew cotton, maize, a little wheat and even soybeans once. We tried peanuts, but the

## Video focuses on the cost of big government

Today, October 15, the dynamite documentary, "I Want Your Money," opens at theaters nationwide. The release of this film so close to the midterm elections on November 2 is no coincidence. "IWYM" is a cry of the heart from its makers; in fact, it wears its heart on its sleeve from start to finish. The makers of this movie urge Americans to rein in Big Government before our country is ruined.

This documentary is not about objectivity or balance. It is openly and unapologetically on the side of conservative, limited government. All the "talking heads" are conservatives. Just as a Michael Moore documentary is regarded as leftwing propaganda by conservatives, so too will "IWYM" be regarded as rightwing propaganda by the left.

If your political beliefs place you in the left-most third of our population, you will probably want to stay away and avoid having your blood pressure raised.

If you are in the third of our population farthest to the political right, you might find this movie to be preaching to the choir; however, if you want to hear some classic conservative arguments, you might appreciate "IWYM" for compiling "The Greatest Hits of Conservatism."

This movie is aimed at the third of Americans who are in the middle—the independents, undecided voters, and young people still sorting things out. In fact, preview screenings of this documentary have resonated strongly with independents, with many showings accompanied by spontaneous cheers, applause, and other forms of enthusiastic audience participation. Spontaneous Tea Party, anyone?

The main theme of "IWYM" is the choice between two contrary philosophies, two versions of the American Dream. One is the limited-government creed that those who earn wealth should be able to decide what to do with it; the other is the Big-Government religion that prefers political elites to make those decisions. In this documentary, the former is championed by Ronald Reagan, the latter by Barack Obama. Indeed, Ronald Reagan is the star of this show. In both actual film clips and animated scenes, Reagan's philosophy is given in his own words. In fact, "IWYM" is the best introduction to our 40th president that I can think of. For older generations of Reagan fans, this documentary offers a nostalgic trip down memory lane; for Americans under 25 who may not know much about him, this would be an excellent place to start to remedy that deficiency.

This is a very polished, professional documentary. From the clever opening (a fast-spinning money counter followed by the distinctive "ka-ching!") through the close an hour-and-a-half later, "IWYM" stays tightly on theme. Happily, it avoids becoming monotonous by deftly shifting from archival footage to "talking heads," featuring some of the most eloquent expounders of the limited-government philosophy (Star Parker for president!) to folksy or irreverent, clever, and mischievously humorous scenes starring animated versions of Reagan, Obama, the two Clintons, the two Bushes, Nixon, Carter, Pelosi, Palin, and Schwarzenegger. These political celebrities are turned into one-dimensional caricatures who are (except for Reagan) lampooned with gusto. By the way, the vocal impressions of Reagan, Obama, Nixon, and Bill Clinton, are superb.

"IWYM" has a few minor flaws that I'll leave for other reviewers to note, but there is one major error. Reagan's Attorney General, Ed Meese, asserted on camera that Reagan brought federal spending under control. He did not. From fiscal year 1982 (Reagan's first full-budget year) through 1989 (his last) federal spending rose from \$745 billion to \$1,143 billion—an increase in the size of government of over 50 percent in only eight years.

The producers of this documentary should consider adding a supplement to the DVD release, explaining how President Reagan, saddled with a Democratic House under the control of Speaker Tip O'Neill, had to accede to large increases in social spending to secure congressional support for the expensive arms buildup that led to the crack-up of the Soviet bloc.

Reagan insiders like Meese shouldn't try to embellish the Gipper's record. After all, the man won the Cold War without firing a shot, and his tax cuts gave us a quarter-century of almost uninterrupted growth. Those two achievements alone make Reagan the greatest president of the 20th century. We really don't expect one man to have solved all our country's problems, do we?

It falls to us who are living today to take the next step to secure our country's future—namely, reining in federal spending. It won't be easy taking on the federal leviathan and the entrenched special interests, but, as Reagan himself reminded us, we can do this, because we are Americans.

Thanks to everyone who worked on "I Want Your Money" for helping to point us in the right direction. God bless America.

## What happens when DC knows best

WASHINGTON, D.C. — It has been a little over six months since the health care reform bill passed Congress and was signed into law. Already we are seeing some effects of the new health law on the health insurance market. Premiums are rising, coverage for part-time employees might become a thing of the past, and some insurance companies are no longer offering child-only plans. Unfortunately, these consequences may just be the tip of the iceberg of the Washington-knows-best attitude.

Many of the provisions of the 2,000-plus page law have not yet taken affect, and some will not until 2014. Regulations to implement parts of the bill are being written as we speak. With a sluggish economy, businesses are rightly concerned about the overall bill and its effect on their companies. They are waiting for the other shoe to drop when additional regulations become public. Already, Americans everywhere are facing higher health insurance premiums — sometimes by as much as 20 to 30 percent.

The latest evidence of what this bill will mean came recently when McDonalds, along with 29 other companies and organizations, were granted waivers or exceptions from the federal government, allowing them to opt out of a key mandate in the new health care law. The waiver allows the groups to maintain coverage below the new law's standards. These companies made clear that they

would have to drop existing coverage completely or raise employee premiums by as much as 200 percent if they had to comply with the requirement of the new law.

Passing a new law and then having to exempt 30 companies from complying with it six months later does not build confidence in the new law. In fact, Speaker Pelosi's remark that they had to pass it to find out what is in it seems to be coming true. It also raises questions as to how some companies and unions could get a waiver and others did not. Would it not be better to exempt everyone from the new law?

Unfortunately, this health care law is having the effects that some of us warned it would have. It is limiting choice, taking away what people already have, raising costs, and making some child-only plans a thing of the past. The new law is a prime example of an approach to lawmaking that we have seen a lot recently — Washington always knows best.

As we have seen in the last 20 months, too many of the things Washington does disrupts the market. In this case, the government takeover of health care is already causing the cost of health

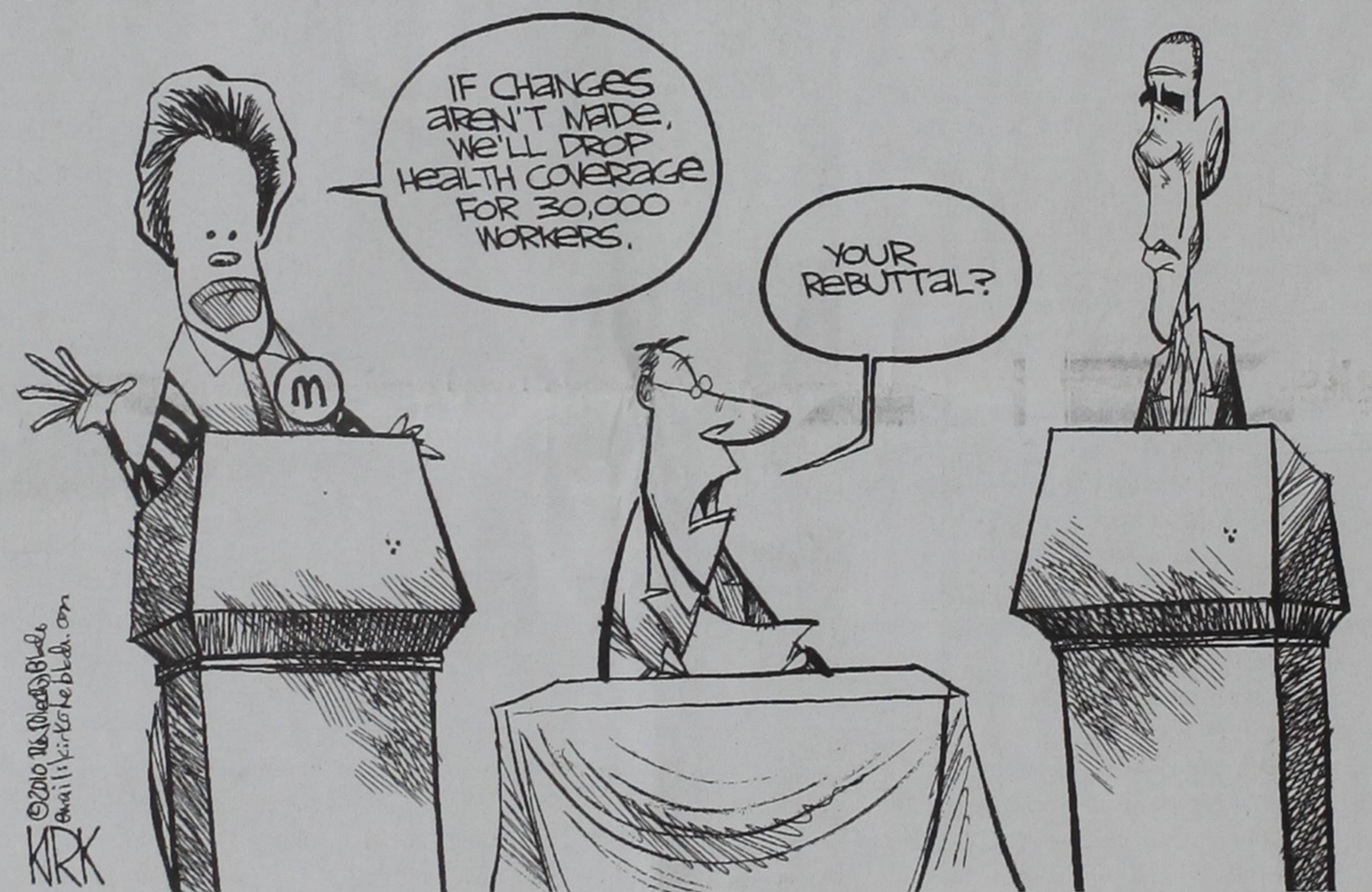

care to rise because of the immediate regulations that are taking effect this year. What will happen to the market when all of the provisions of the massive government takeover of the health care industry take effect in 2014?

There are concrete steps that Congress should take to lower costs and provide for the most vulnerable in our society, and the American people have called on Congress to do so. To start, giving small businesses the option to pool together with other businesses, just as corporations and unions do, would allow them to offer insurance to their employees at a lower cost. Allowing access to health care for people with pre-existing conditions and permitting people to buy insurance across state lines would have a positive effect. And common-sense medical liability reform would reduce unnecessary spending, lower health insurance premiums, end junk lawsuits and curb the practice of defensive medicine that adds billions of dollars of costs to our health care system.

Health care reform is needed. But we need to reform in individual steps rather than a 2,000-plus page bill that could result in thousands of pages of regulations. Washington does not know best when it comes to the most private and personal aspect of our lives, and we must work to repeal the health care law and replace it with reform that is centered on the patient. Now that would be health care reform we can all believe in.

## Preserving US space leadership

For more than 40 years, the United States has led the world in human space flight and the critical research and technology development that supports exploration, scientific study, and the medical breakthroughs that have fueled our economy and created thousands of private sector jobs. NASA's highly skilled employees have worked tirelessly to maintain this leadership. And Texas has played a central role in that work throughout NASA's remarkable history.

Earlier this year, however, the outlook for NASA was grim as we confronted a budget environment that would not support the continued human space flight activities of the agency without some significant changes. At the same time, the Obama Administration's proposal canceled many key NASA manned space flight systems and would have led to the rapid and catastrophic loss of personnel and skills needed to develop a new launch system capable of taking us to new destinations beyond lower earth orbit and the moon. The Administration's proposal would have effectively ended the era of U.S. dominance in space exploration while threatening our utilization of and \$100 billion investment in the International Space Station. The President's original proposal endangered the missions that are the lifeblood of the Johnson Space Center in Houston, and crippling job losses seemed inevitable. In other states with key NASA missions, workforces were also jeopardized.

On September 29, Congress passed an authorization bill for NASA that made significant changes in the President's stated plan and now we are in a much better position to preserve the future of human spaceflight in America. The President signed this measure into

law on October 11. I believe the new law provides a robust mission for NASA with significant support for important scientific research and technology development and an enduring commitment to exploration.

The crux of the new approach is simple. We will use as many as possible of the skills, parts, and resources we already have on hand to lower development costs without compromising capability or performance. We will build one launch vehicle and one crew exploration vehicle at a time rather than multiple ones. Ensuring there is a launch system and exploration vehicle under development preserves the key missions of the Johnson Space Center. There will be an ongoing need for Mission Control and astronaut training done in Houston and the Bay Area. There will be an additional shuttle flight, which will allow for the delivery of additional supplies to ensure the viability, extension, and use of the space station, another key function of the Johnson Space Center. This extra flight will also preserve critical skills and workforce, much of which can be transitioned to the new program.

I fought for this legislation because it was the right solution to the extraordinary challenge we were presented. But this is not the end of the struggle for NASA and communities, like Houston, whose economic well-being are intertwined with the agency's. Rather, the new law is a foundation upon which to

build as we move forward toward a sustainable American space program with a robust mission for the Johnson Space Center and a bright future for its brain trust.

As a state, we should brace ourselves for challenges as the workforces of Johnson Space Center and NASA contractors are calibrated to the new mission. There are some who have already lost their jobs, and others may follow; but the core of NASA's mission, and the vast majority of its talented scientists, engineers, and technicians will remain. Undoubtedly, in the months ahead, more questions will be raised about NASA funding and the feasibility of the approach laid out in the new law. I know the enormity of this task, and I promise that my work to advance the future of human space flight and to preserve the critical role of the Johnson Space Center and Texas' NASA workforce will continue.

I want to personally thank the Texas communities that have stepped in and offered assistance and support to displaced NASA employees and contractors. I hope businesses within the aerospace industry will take advantage of the world-class skills these workers possess and will work together with community leaders to identify further opportunities. I will continue my efforts to ensure full and faithful implementation of the new law.

While producing a budget that is more sustainable and providing efficiencies for the wisest use of taxpayers' dollars, we are preserving the research and exploration that will add to the economic security and future of America.

hogs rooted them out."

Throughout the years, Benson has witnessed drastic innovations in the farming industry, from having field hands pick the cotton by hand to having cotton strippers and putting in his first irrigation system.

"One of the best things that happened was going from steel wheels on a tractor to rubber," he said "That made farming a whole lot easier."

According to Chisum, as a young farmer Benson was "the catch of the town."

"All the girls wanted to go out with him," she said.

He met his wife, Avis Lee McElvany at a party held by Willard and Francis Skelton.

"The whole point of the party was to get us together," Benson said. "It was a frame up."

He married Avis on December 24, 1941.

"For their honeymoon, they took a train to Dallas to see the football game," Chisum said. "They loved to travel."

They were married 40 years when she passed away in 1981.

They had two daughters together: Judith Lynn Cornell and Andrea Jill Finch.

"Avis Lee was the homemaker," Chisum said. "She stayed home with the kids while C.L. went to work

every day at the farm."

Now, Benson has four grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

"You should've seen how happy he was when his great-grandchildren came to his birthday party," Chisum said. "You can really tell how much he loves them."

According to Chisum, Benson was completely independent until last May when he fractured his hip. Now, he requires around the clock care.

But he still continues to amaze her with his good health.

"He's on very little medication for his age," Chisum said. "His diabetes came about two years ago, and we have that under control. His longevity of life is golden raisins soaked in gin. It keeps him from having arthritis, and it works."

Chisum said that Benson is a "fabulous" person, and she enjoys the time she spends with him.

"C.L. is my hero," she said. "He is truly a huge inspiration to me."

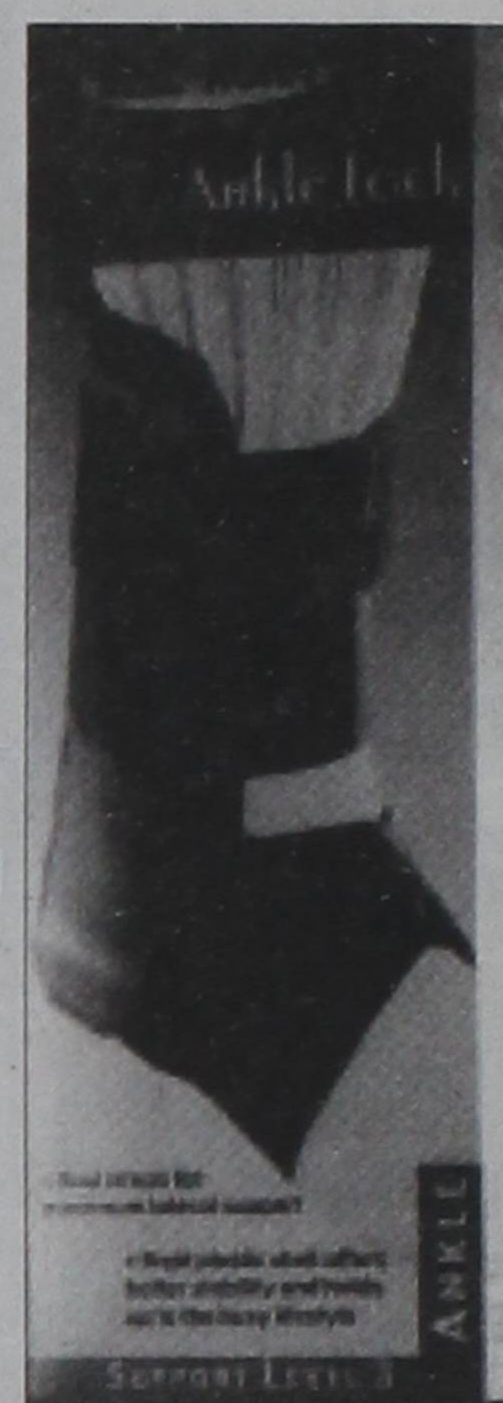

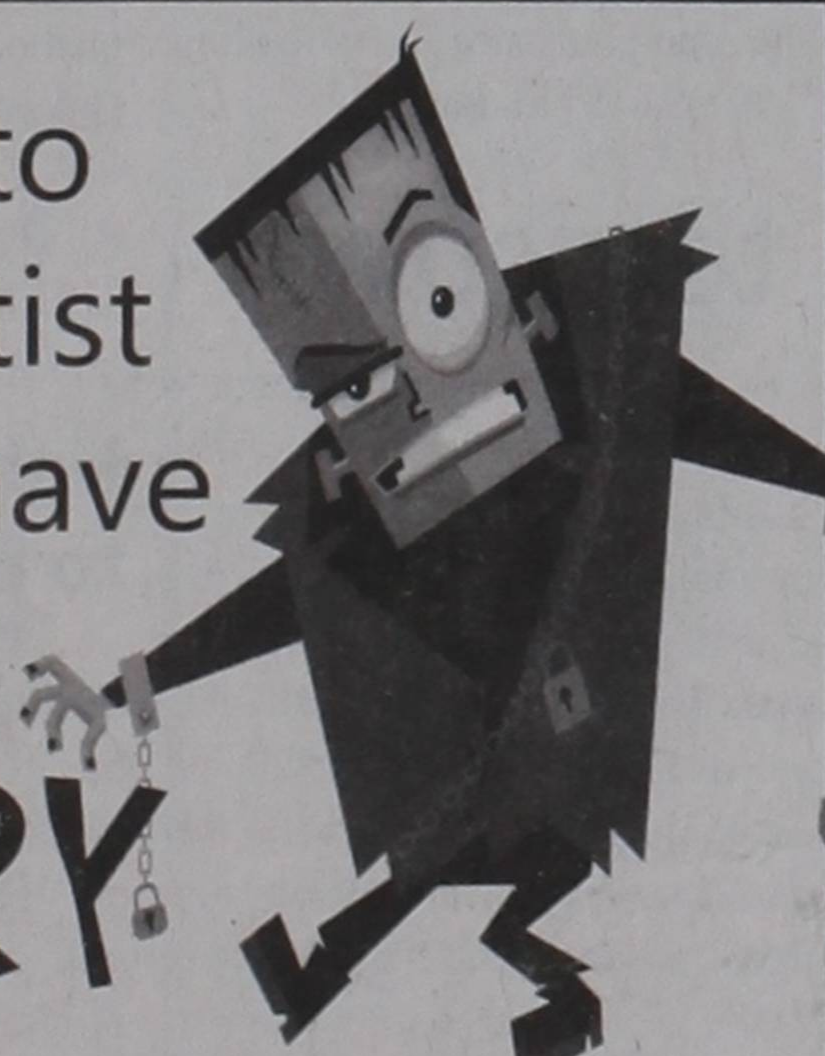

**Under the Law No Social Security COLA for 2011**

Monthly Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits for more than 58 million Americans will not automatically increase in 2011, the Social Security Administration announced today.

The Social Security Act provides for an automatic increase in Social Security and SSI benefits if there is an increase in the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) from the third quarter of the last year a cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) was determined to the third quarter of the current year. As determined by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, there is no increase in the CPI-W from the

third quarter of 2008, the last year a COLA was determined, to the third quarter of 2010, therefore, under existing law, there can be no COLA in 2011.

Other changes that would normally take effect based on changes in the national average wage index also will not take effect in January 2011.

Since there is no COLA, the statute also prohibits a change in the maximum amount of earnings subject to the Social Security tax as well as the retirement earnings test exempt amounts. These amounts will remain unchanged in 2011. The attached fact sheet provides more

information on 2011 Social Security and SSI changes.

Information about Medicare changes for 2011, when available, will be found at [www.Medicare.gov](http://www.Medicare.gov). The Department of Health and Human Services has not yet announced if there will be any Medicare premium changes for 2011. Should there be an increase in the Medicare Part B premium, the law contains a "hold harmless" provision that protects more than 70 percent of Social Security beneficiaries from paying a higher Part B premium, in order to avoid reducing their net Social Security benefit. Those not protected include higher income

beneficiaries subject to an income-adjusted Part B premium and beneficiaries newly entitled to Part B in 2011. In addition, almost 20 percent of beneficiaries have their Medicare Part B premiums paid by state medical assistance programs and thus will see no change in their Social Security benefit. The state will be required to pay any Medicare Part B premium increase.

**AgriLife Extension holding calving clinic on Nov. 2**

MIAMI – Texas AgriLife Extension Service will host the "Improving Beef Reproductive Efficiency: Calving Clinic" November 2 at the Roberts County Project Center in Miami.

"We can make every effort to improve the reproductive efficiency of our cow herd, but it's all for nothing if we don't get a live calf on the ground," said Brandon Dukes, AgriLife Extension agent in Roberts County.

Knowing when cows or heifers need assistance with calving is an extremely important skill producers must possess, Dukes said.

The clinic will include a demonstration of delivery of a calf with emphasis on appropriate timing and proper techniques of intervention to assist calving heifers and cows with dystocia, he said.

The program will begin at 11:30 a.m. with registration, followed by a free lunch sponsored by Cattle County and Hi Pro Feeds. RSVPs are requested on or before October 28.

The program will include Dukes discussing selection for calving ease with Dr. Buddy Faries, AgriLife Extension program leader for veterinary medicine in College Station, conducting the demonstration.

Faries has been conducting these types of presentations for a number of years, and "even if you have pulled 1,000 calves, you are sure to gain some insight into better methods of conducting this task," Dukes said.

The game will be Friday, October 22, in Bronco Stadium beginning at 7:30 p.m.

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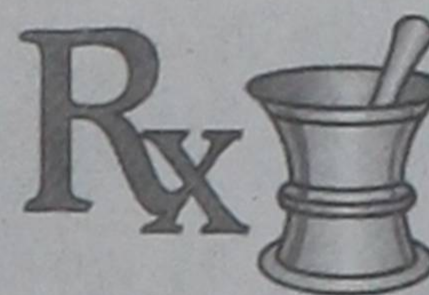

## Drugs in the News

### Oral Treatment for Multiple Sclerosis

In previous years, the management of multiple sclerosis (MS) has been limited to injection therapy. The US Food and Drug Administration recently approved the first oral medication geared toward slowing the progression of disability associated with relapsing forms of multiple sclerosis. Gilenya (fingolimod) in efficacy studies showed an 80 percent reduction in the frequency of MS flare-ups when compared to placebo. It also showed a 52 percent reduction in the frequency of flare-ups when compared with interferon-beta-1a, an approved injectable drug for the management of MS. Gilenya is available only by prescription as a 0.5mg capsule.

Multiple sclerosis is an autoimmune disease that affects the brain, spinal cord and eyes. It is unusual to find people who have the exact same symptoms. This makes the MS difficult to diagnose. Symptoms may include numbness in the limbs, or more severely, paralysis and loss of vision. This new approval is designed to improve the quality of life in persons affected by multiple sclerosis since there is no cure for this condition.

**THE MIRACLES DID NOT SWAY THEM**

Have you ever wondered why those who witnessed miracles performed by Jesus weren't moved to follow Him? It is hard to understand that. In John 6 you read of Jesus feeding the 5,000. In the same chapter He walked on water. In chapter 9 He healed a blind man and this caused all kinds of controversy instead of converting people.

In chapter 11 he resurrects Lazarus. In chapter 20 we see the empty tomb of Jesus. The book of John ends with this verse: "And there are also many other things which Jesus did, which if they were written in detail, I suppose that even the world itself would not contain the books that would be written."

Of course there are other recorded miracles in the previous gospels and they will tell the same story. There were people who watched Jesus Christ perform miracles and signs to prove that He was from God. Some got it. Usually that day never comes because the years of procrastination have hardened or calloused the heart of any with good intentions.

The fact is some people won't convert because of their lack of love for anyone or anything other than their own pleasures. Miracles didn't convince them. Today the best sermons spoken or Bible class held won't move some people. Kind gestures and benevolence will not move them. 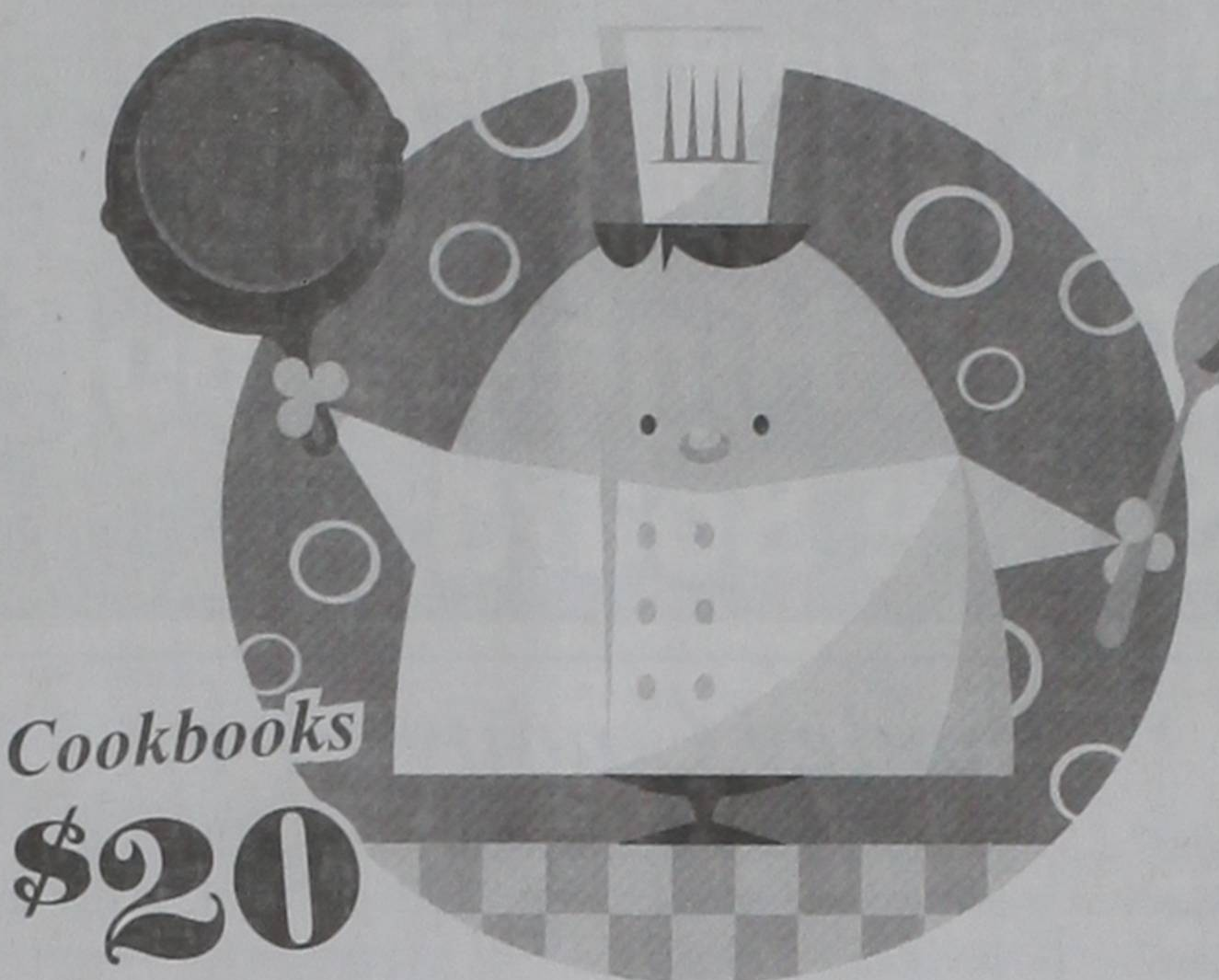

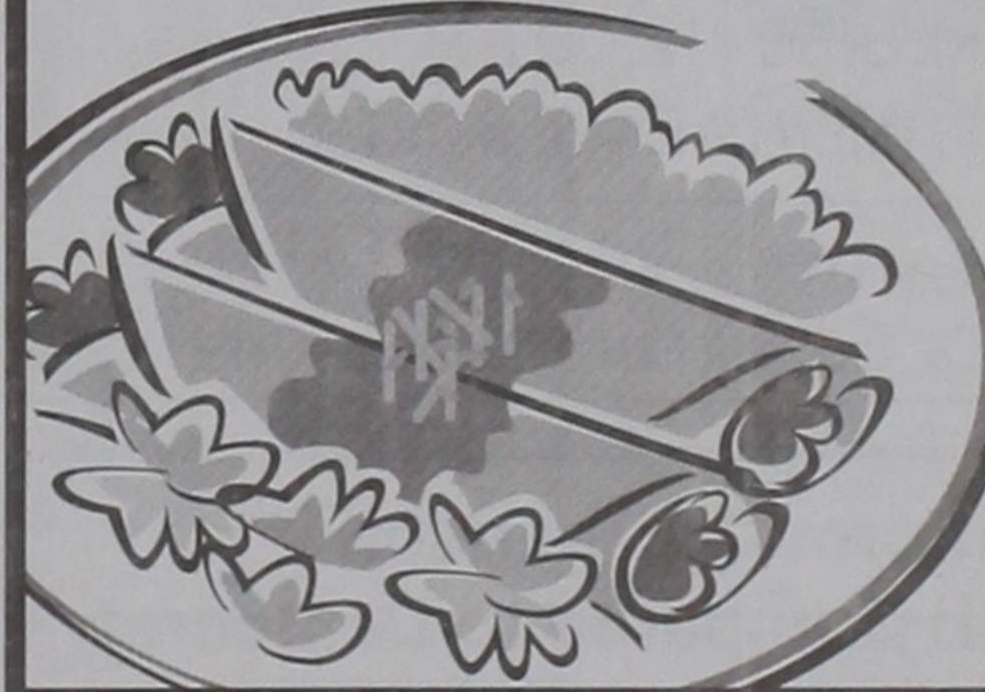

### AgriLife Ext. to host convention

PAMPA - "Proper Use of Drugs in Show Animals" will be presented by the Texas AgriLife Extension Service offices of Roberts, Gray and Carson counties on Nov. 2.

The program will be held at 6:30 p.m. in the Clyde Carruth Show Barn, located in Recreation Park in Pampa.

Various preventive and therapeutic medicines may be used for disease management in show-market livestock and poultry, said Brandon Dukes, AgriLife Extension agent in Roberts County.

These include vaccines and bacterins, antibiotics and antibacterials, parasiticides and corticosteroids.

Exhibitors of show animals must ensure that carcasses are free of violative and illegal residues of drugs, chemicals and feed additive, Dukes said.

Therefore, only substances

approved for the animal species being treated should be used, and these must be administered prudently.

The keynote speaker will be Dr. Buddy Faries, AgriLife Extension program leader for veterinary medicine.

Faries has extensive knowledge of medications and withdrawal times, and handles the residue avoidance program for the major livestock shows in Texas.

Program topics will include: proper use of medications, chemicals and feed additives, residue avoidance, food safety and the Quality Counts program.

### Troopers to ride buses

As part of National School Bus Safety Week (Oct. 18-22), Highway Patrol troopers in many areas of Texas will ride school buses looking for motorists illegally passing school buses.

"Loading and unloading are the most dangerous times for students who ride school buses, and motorists should remember that state law requires them to stop for a school bus when its red alternating flashing lights are on," said David Baker, DPS Assistant Director—Texas Highway Patrol. "We'll have Highway Patrol troopers riding random school buses across the state, and we'll issue citations to drivers who violate the law."

Motorists who are cited for driving past a stopped school bus whose red alternating flashing lights are activated can expect to pay up to a \$1,000 fine.

Although 35,000 school buses transport 1.4 million Texas children daily, school buses provide one of the safest modes of transportation, accounting for less than one-half of one percent of Texas roadway crashes.

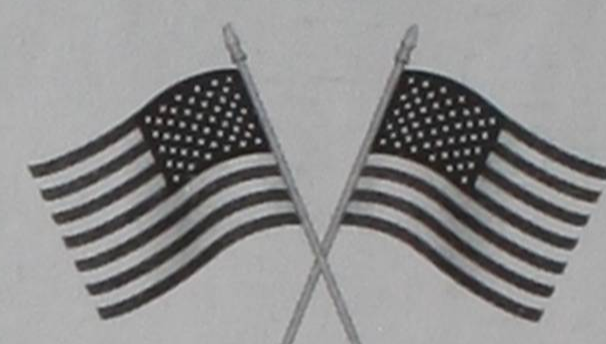

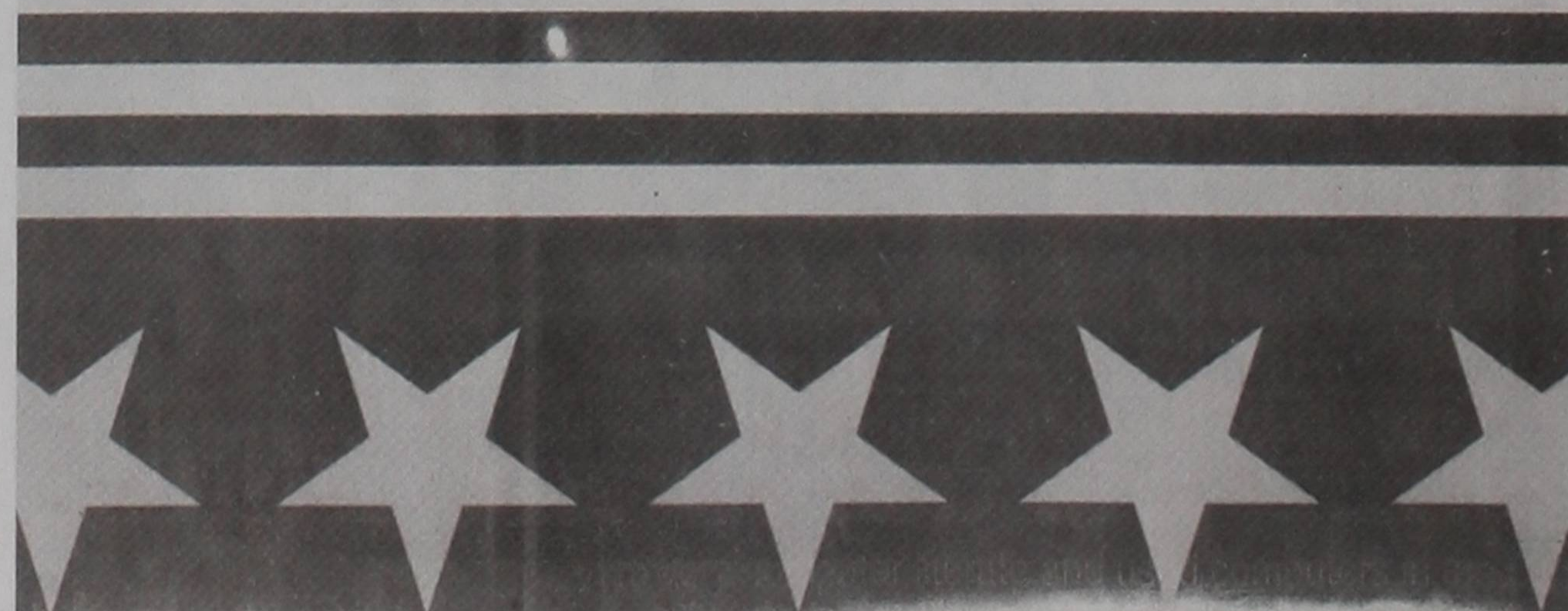
