




**Dispose of Unused Prescription Drugs** 

New attempts to protect the environment and prevent the abuse of prescription drugs is resulting in suggestions as to how Americans should dispose of outdated or no-longer-used drugs. Earlier this year the federal government launched new guidelines for the proper dis posal of drugs, which included the mixing of drugs with coffee grounds or kitty litter. A recent report indicates that over 6,000 pharmacies around the country have signed up to participate in a project with the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration. Enrolled pharmacists provide a list of abuse-prone drugs to the public.

The EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) indicates that most city sewage handling systems are not designed to handle pharmaceuticals and personal care products. They claim that mixing drugs with kitty litter or coffee grounds is usually a better alternative to flushing drugs down the toilet. Place the mixture into empty cans or bags that can be sealed and put in the trash. This helps protect small pets and children from being harmed accidentally.




