## Broncos to play for Area title Friday

They have made the playoffs three years in a row and now the Broncos have added one more trophy to the case with a huge Bi-District win over Nazareth at Highland Park on last Friday night.

The 25-18 win gave the Broncos the right to play in the Area game this Friday, November 20, against Stratford, which is the defending state champ. Game time is 7:30 p.m. at Harvester Field in Pampa.

The Broncos began the game with determination. Three touchdowns early in the half gave them the clear domination over the Swifts that they were looking for.

Chris Crump opened the scoring on a

seven-yard run, and Brayden Phillips caught a 48-yard pass from Johnny Gaines to add another six. Gaines threw another strike to Stephino McCampbell that went 16 yards to increase the Bronco lead to 19 as Coby Braughton added the bonus kick.

But Nazareth was not out of the game as they hit a 43-yard field goal before the break. The Swifts would add two more touchdowns in the third quarter after the Broncos' Chris Crump added their last score from seven yards out.

Lots of drama ensued at the end of the game as Nazareth threatened to score with only seconds remaining on the clock. One last desperate attempt ended when Brayden Phil-

lips snagged an interception, and the Broncos were victorious.

"I was proud that we hung on at the end," head coach Gary Jack said. "I told them not to let up because Nazareth wouldn't give up. We made a few mistakes, and we played pretty solid for two and a half quarters. Then we just relaxed a little. It was a definite momentum change."

Jack credited Phillips, Chris Crump, and Johnny Gaines with having good games against Nazareth.

"Stephino McCampbell had 14 tackles, one sack, and one touchdown," Jack said. "Wes Williams ran the ball well, and Tré Brown and our line did a good job for us."

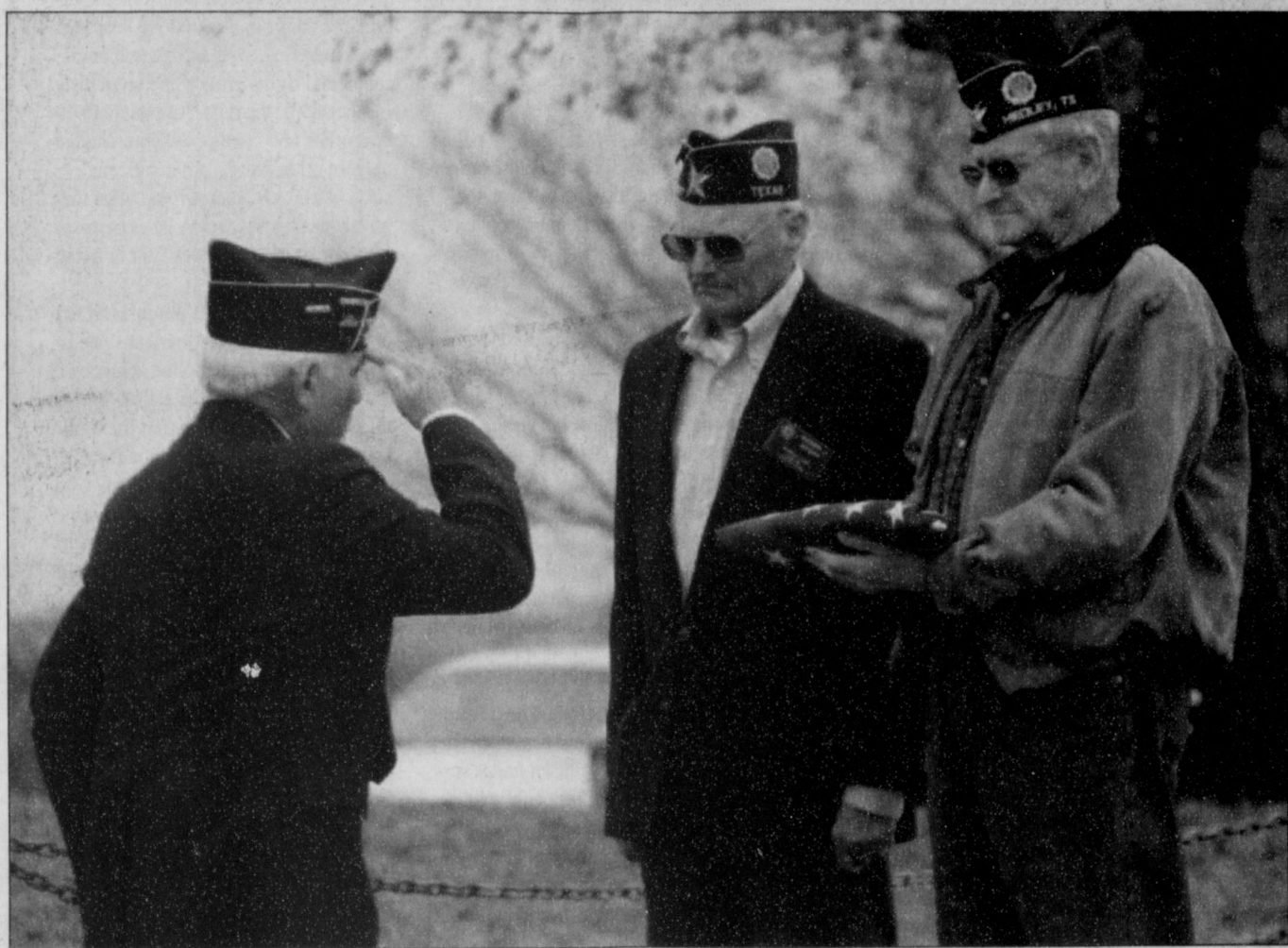
Jack knows the Broncos will have to play mistake free this week.

"If we play hard and get after it, we will be right there in the game," Jack said. "They [the Elks] have been a solid program for about a decade and have played in four state championship games in recent years. We are looking forward to the game."

Jack went on to say that the Broncos will have to execute their game plan to stay ahead of the Elks.

"We'll finally be fairly healthy," Jack said. "We are excited about the opportunity. If you're going to be one of the best, you've got to beat the best. We're going to gear up and play hard."

## Weatherton pleads guilty to felony DWI

The District Court heard five pleas took place which resulted in four deferred adjudications and one conviction last Monday in Clarendon.

A total of \$8,500 in fines was assessed as a result of the pleas that took place on November 9. The defendants were also required to pay a total of \$2,075 in court costs and \$202.13 in restitution.

David Leon Weatherton pleaded guilty to a third degree felony offense of driving while intoxicated and was convicted and sentenced to ten years in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, but the sentence was probated for a period of five years.

Weatherton was arrested in Donley County on May 6, 2009, for the offense that took place June 22, 2008.

Pursuant to the plea agreement, Weatherton is required to pay a \$3,000 fine to Donley County, \$565 in court costs, serve 10 days in the Donley County Jail, suffer 180 days driver's license suspension, complete a program for repeat alcohol offenders, complete an alcohol education program, and is required to have an ignition interlock device installed on his vehicle during the five-year probationary period.

Gabriel A Robles was placed on probation for two years for the class A misdemeanor offense of deadly conduct. Robles pleaded guilty and was placed on deferred adjudication.

The offense that took place July 4, 2009. Pursuant to the plea agreement, Robles was required to pay a fine of \$1,000 to Donley County, and \$390 in court costs, among other conditions of probation. If Robles violates probation, he could face up to one year in the Donley County Jail.

Kimberly Haire was placed on probation for a period of two years for the state jail felony offense of forgery. Haire pleaded guilty and was placed on deferred adjudication for two state jail felony forgery charges.

Haire pleaded guilty to a complaint and information filed by the State for the offenses that took place August 2, 2009 and September 28, 2009. Pursuant to the plea agreement, Haire was required to pay a fine of \$1,500 to Donley County; \$780 in court costs, and \$202.13 in restitution, among other conditions of probation. If Haire violates probation, she could face up to two years in the State Jail Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Chase Jeffere Wilson was placed on probation for a period of three years for the third degree felony offense of places weapons prohibited. Wilson pleaded guilty to the offense was placed on deferred adjudication for places weapons prohibited.

Wilson was arrested in Donley County on September 25, 2009, for the offense. Pursuant to the plea agreement, Wilson is required to pay a \$3,000 fine; and \$340 in court costs. If Wilson violates probation, he could face up to ten years in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

# Is Tweeting now a federal felony?

The ominous rise of the surveillance state continues unabated. With each passing day, hope fades that the Obama administration will diverge from George W. Bush's erection of a police state.

The government's treatment of Elliot Madison is a case in point. Madison, a 41-year-old self-styled anarchist and social worker, was arrested on September 24, 2009, and charged with violating a federal anti-rioting law. Madison allegedly listened to a police scanner (which, according to the New York Times, is legal) and blogged about it on Twitter to help fellow protesters avoid law enforcement at the G-20 summit taking place in Pittsburgh that same month. (Ironically, just months earlier, the U.S. government called Twitter a boon to democracy after Iranian protesters used it to organize anti-government rallies.)

One week later, agents with the FBI's Joint Terrorism Task Force raided Madison's Brooklyn home, seizing computers, books and papers, along with other assorted items, including his marriage license, Buffy the Vampire Slayer DVDs and a needlepoint depiction of Lenin. The list of what was taken stretches for pages.

All of this over a few Tweets? After all, Madison's tactics are fairly common these days. Monitoring police communications and movements during protests is one of the few means average citizens have in attempting to level the playing field against the pervasive surveillance tools of law enforcement agencies.

The police possess all manner of invasive and coercive technological devices at their disposal, which they used on protesters at the G-20 summit in Pittsburgh. As the New York Times reported, during the protest, "heavily armed police officers reacted to the anti-globalization protesters with tear gas, sonic weapons, rubber bullets and mass arrests." Sound cannons—which are suspected of causing damage to eardrums and perhaps even fatal aneurysms—were also used to disperse protesters.

Unfortunately, as Ryan Singel writes for Wired, "The federal anti-rioting statute is serious business, and is seemingly easy to violate. For instance, it is a felony 'to organize, promote, encourage, participate in, or carry on a riot; or [...] to aid or abet any person in inciting or participating in [...] a riot.' By that token, simply telling a person fleeing cops with batons which way to run makes you a felon. One wonders how the Southern Christian Leadership Council and Martin Luther King, Jr. would

have fared under that law, when he was in a Birmingham jail, writing letters urging people to support the direct-action program of sit-ins and marches. Those protesters were later attacked by police using dogs and fire hoses on the orders of Birmingham Sheriff Bull Connor."

Similarly, John Lennon could have been charged under this law for his "Power to the People" lyrics, which urged people to take to the streets and start a revolution. Truth be told, I could just as easily be charged under this vague law for the many commentaries I've written over the years urging Americans to take to the streets as well to stand and fight for their rights.

The point is that no longer matters what your particular gripe is, whether you're an anarchist, a tree hugger, a Tea Party protester, or something else altogether. The government is sending a clear message that Elliot Madison is not the exception but the rule: this is what happens to people who disagree with the government and act on it. They are targeted, tracked, placed under surveillance and, if they happen to violate any arcane laws, made examples of.

As the intelligence services cast their nets ever-wider in an attempt to shore-up their watch lists and look for suspicious activity, it's destroying our constitutional rights to privacy. And police tactics are eradicating our First Amendment rights to peacefully assemble, protest and speak our minds.

Moreover, what was once considered a peaceful protester is now, because of government paranoia, considered

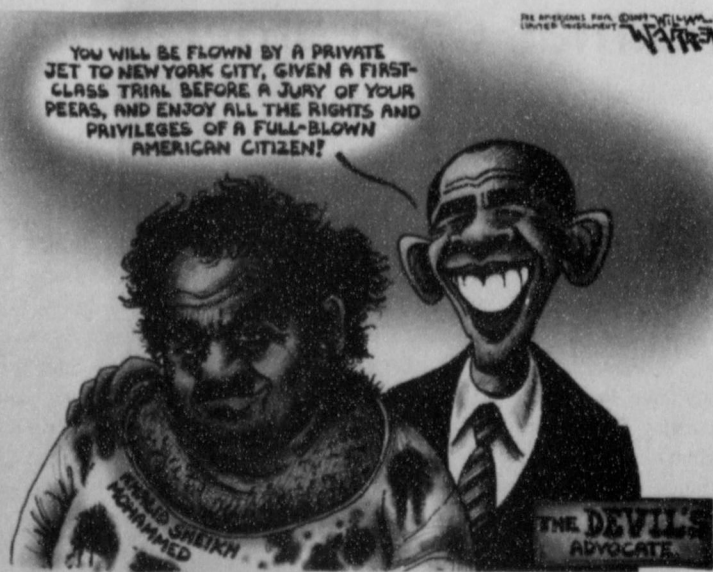

an extremist. A report produced by the Department of Homeland Security in April 2009 cast a wide net in its classification of "extremists" to include those on the right—such as those who "reject federal authority in favor of state or local authority" and oppose issues like abortion or immigration—and left-leaning "extremists" such as animal and environmental rights groups and anarchists. Furthermore, the report uses the labels "terrorist" and "extremist" interchangeably. In other words, when citizens such as Elliot Madison voice what the government considers to be extremist viewpoints, that is tantamount to being a terrorist.

Unfortunately, it's not just the federal government that Americans need to worry about. State police agencies are also getting in on the action. Earlier this year, it was revealed that the Maryland State Police had been conducting extensive surveillance on activists who were considered "terrorists." Among these, People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals were reportedly considered a security threat due to concerns that they might disrupt the circus; consumers fighting a 72% electricity rate were looked at with suspicion; the DC Anti-War Network, which opposes the Iraq War, "was designated a white supremacist group, without explanation"; and among the possible wrongs committed by Amnesty International, a well-known human rights group, was the so-called crime of "civil rights."

Clearly, freedom of thought and conscience are at serious risk today from federal and state agencies intent on suppressing actions they deem to be a threat to the status quo. It all adds up to an Orwellian government that would like nothing better than to dictate what we can think, read and believe. The thought police are not that far away.

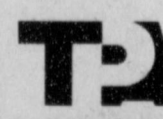

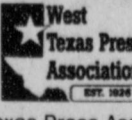

## City gets new holiday decorations, lights

It will soon be looking a lot like Christmas thanks to new holiday decorations purchased by the City of Clarendon.

City Administrator John Webb said he's purchased 24 seasonal banners and received permission from the Texas Department of Transportation to hang them from utility poles along US 287 from Sims to McClelland.

"We're going to start near the Sonic Drive-In and go all the way to the car wash," Webb said.

City workers are currently placing the brackets that will hold the banners on the poles and will put the banners themselves up after Thanksgiving.

The city has also purchased a 15-foot pre-lit artificial noble fir tree that will be placed on the east side of City Hall, and the municipal building itself will be dressed up with LED lights and other decorations.

Lights will also be strung on the trestle bridge and pavilion at City Park. "We are celebrating the spirit of Christmas," Mayor Chris Ford said. "We want to promote a season of joy with peace and goodwill to all."

The city will light its tree during a public ceremony on December 3 at 6:30 p.m. Hot chocolate and cookies will be served and carols will be sung.

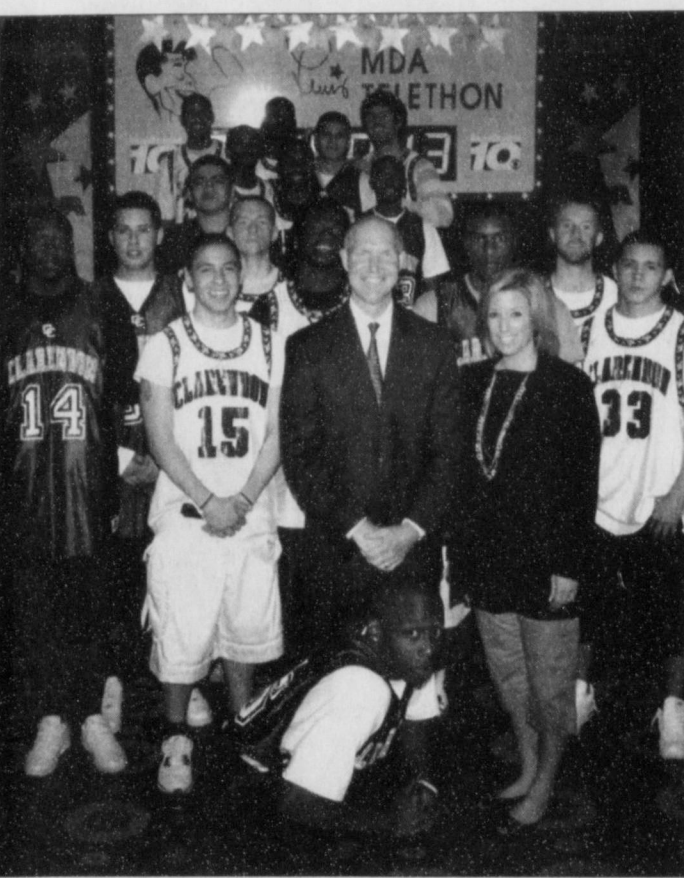

**Smokers asked to quit for a day this week**

As the official sponsor of birthdays, the American Cancer Society marks the 34th Great American Smokeout on November 19 by encouraging smokers to use the date to make a plan to quit, or to plan in advance and quit smoking that day.

By doing so, smokers will be taking an important step towards a healthier life – one that can lead to reducing cancer risk and creating more birthdays. Researchers say that quitting smoking can increase life expectancy – smokers who quit at age 35 gain an average of eight years of life expectancy; those who quit at age 55 gain about five years; and even long term smokers who quit at 65 gain three years.

Smokers who want to quit can call the American Cancer Society Quit For Life Program operated and managed by Free & Clear at 1-800-227-2345 for tobacco cessation and coaching

services that can help increase their chances of quitting for good.

Research shows that people who stop smoking before age 50 can cut their risk of dying in the next 15 years in half compared with those who continue to smoke. Smokers who quit also reduce their risk of lung cancer – ten years after quitting, the lung cancer death rate is about half that of a continuing smoker's. Some of the health effects of quitting are almost instant, too – heart rate and blood pressure drop 20 minutes after quitting.

"We know that quitting smoking is tough and that most smokers have to try several times before quitting for good," said Alan G. Thorson, MD, FACS, national volunteer president for the American Cancer Society. "The American Cancer Society offers a variety of effective resources ranging from online tips and tools to personalized telephone coaching

by trained specialists. We hope that smokers will use the Great American Smokeout to map out a course of action that will help them to quit, and in turn to stay well and celebrate more birthdays."

The Great American Smokeout Web site (www.cancer.org/GreatAmericans) contains user-friendly tips and tools towards a smoke-free life. In addition to tip sheets and calculators, the site also offers downloadable desktop helpers to assist with planning to quit and succeeding in staying tobacco-free. The Quit Clock allows users to pick a quit day within 30 days, then counts down the selected day with tips for each day; and the Craving Stopper helps smokers beat cravings by offering a fun distraction. The American Cancer Society created the trademarked concept for and held its first Great American Smokeout in 1976 as a way to inspire and encourage

smokers to quit for a day. One million people quit smoking for a day at the 1976 event in California. The Great American Smokeout encourages smokers to commit to making a long-term plan to quit smoking for good.

**Important tobacco use facts:**  
Tobacco use remains the single largest preventable cause of disease and premature death in the U.S.

Cigarette smoking accounts for about 443,000 premature deaths – including 49,400 in nonsmokers.

Thirty percent of cancer deaths, including 87 percent of lung cancer deaths, can be attributed to tobacco.

Smoking also accounts for \$193 billion in health care expenditures and productivity losses.

Great progress is being made in reducing tobacco use in the U.S., with adult smoking rates in 2007 declining among all adults to 19.8 percent.

**City making improvements to animal control facilities**

The City of Clarendon is making improvements to its dog pound, according to information presented at last Tuesday's Board of Aldermen meeting.

City Administrator John Webb told the board the city received a donation of \$5,600 from a citizen who was concerned about the welfare of animals picked up by animal control.

The money is being used to remove the old shed and cages and install a new 25' x 25' concrete pad and a new cedar block building. Webb said the building will have a place for cleanup and that an euthanasia area would also be put in.

The project is expected to be finished before the onset of winter.

In other city business, aldermen approved a request from the Bronco Parents to sponsor the Greenbelt Classic Basketball Tournament on December 10-12 with \$3,000 from the Motel Bed Tax.

A resolution was adopted to allow the city to apply for federal stimulus funds. The city is eligible for \$20,000 for upgrading street lights to be more energy efficient for installing pedestrian lights.

Aldermen also appointed Stephen Hall, Sherol Johnston and Terri Floyd to the Clarendon Economic Development Corp. Board.

**Commissioners okay sheriff's contract with college**

The Donley County Commissioners' Court met in regular session last Monday with a full agenda.

The court authorized an update of the Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan. The county's current plan was done in 2005.

A request to increase the district attorney's office budget item for restitution income was approved.

Commissioners considered and approved engaging Foster & Lambert LLC to conduct the county audit for \$12,375 and also approved budget amendments for the 2008-2009 fiscal year.

A contract between Clarendon College and the Donley County Sheriff's Office was approved. The sheriff's office will provide campus security for about \$23,000.

The court accepted a bid on tax delinquent property in Howardwick as presented by the Donley Appraisal District.

Commissioners cast the county's votes on the appraisal district board as follows: Wilma Lindley, 1,000; and Mitchell Martin, 610. The court also approved a contract with the appraisal district for the assessment and collection of taxes.

Commissioners also approved a request from the Chamber of Commerce to decorate the Courthouse Square for Christmas.

The court also met this Monday morning to canvass the returns of the November 3 election.

During that called meeting, the court also approved longevity pay for an employee in the district judge's office and approved a resolution to apply for federal stimulus funds to improve the energy efficiency of the appraisal district offices and the justice of the peace offices in Clarendon and Hedley.

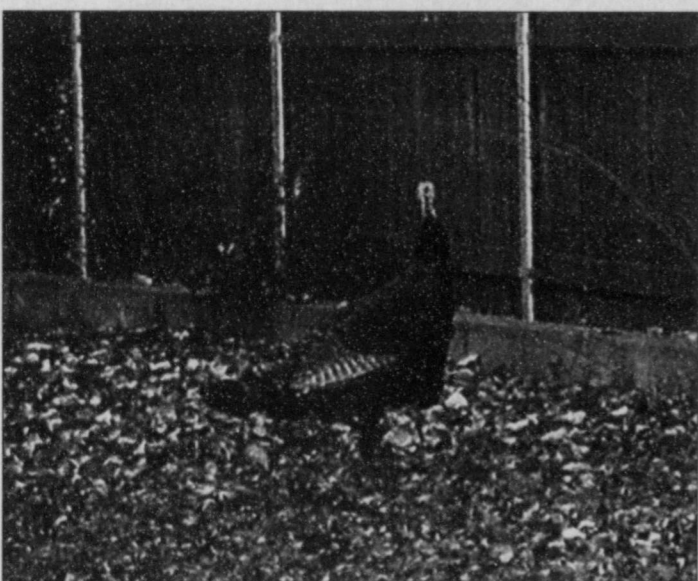

## Drugs in the News

### Investigational Flu Drug: Emergency Use Is Allowed

The FDA recently announced that due to the widespread number of Swine Flu cases being reported and the presidential declaration of a national emergency, it is allowing an experimental drug designed for the treatment of influenza infections be used to treat severe cases of H1N1 Swine Flu. The investigational antiviral drug is called Peramivir. This drug, which is given by intravenous injection, will be allowed for the emergency treatment of select Swine flu cases in individuals that are admitted to a hospital. According to a news release from the FDA, Peramivir will be allowed for adults if confirmed cases of Swine Flu do not respond to oral or inhaled therapy and when the attending physician feels intravenous (IV) treatment is appropriate.

At the end of last month, news reports indicated that as of mid-October, 46 of the 50 states were reporting "widespread" H1N1 influenza activity. One report indicates that this type of flu is now being reported in 168 countries around the world. In the U.S., the H1N1 flu has reportedly infected more than one million people.

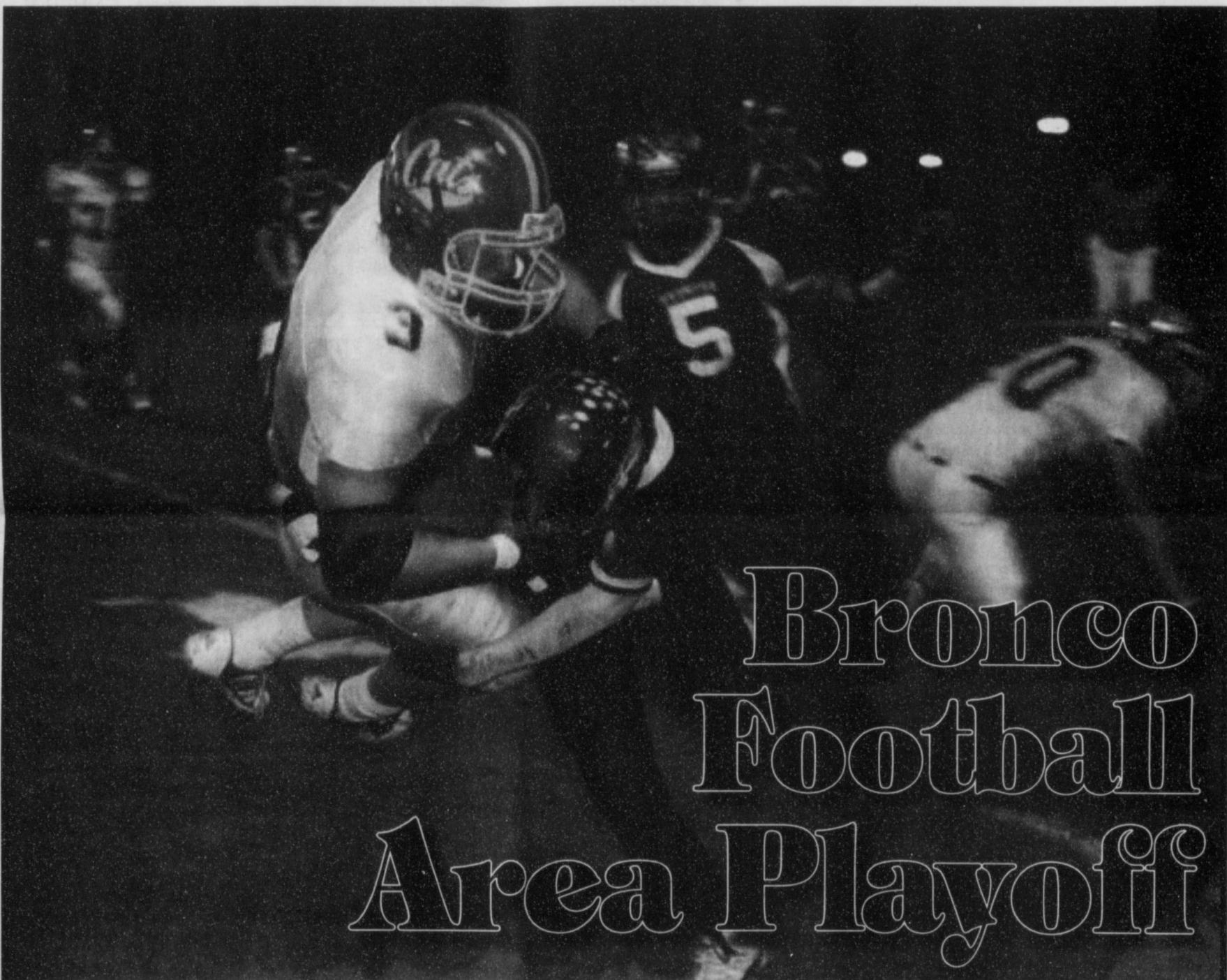

Scoring were: Shields 12, Verstuyft 10, Burton 4, Shelp 3, and Chambless 2.

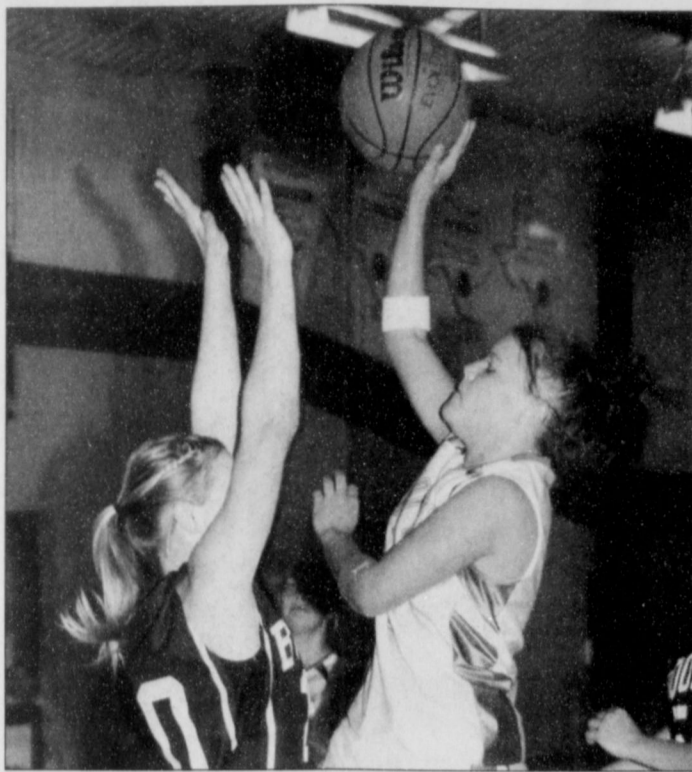
The Lady Owls will play in the Highland Park Tournament along with the Owls on Thursday, November 19, thru Saturday, November 21.

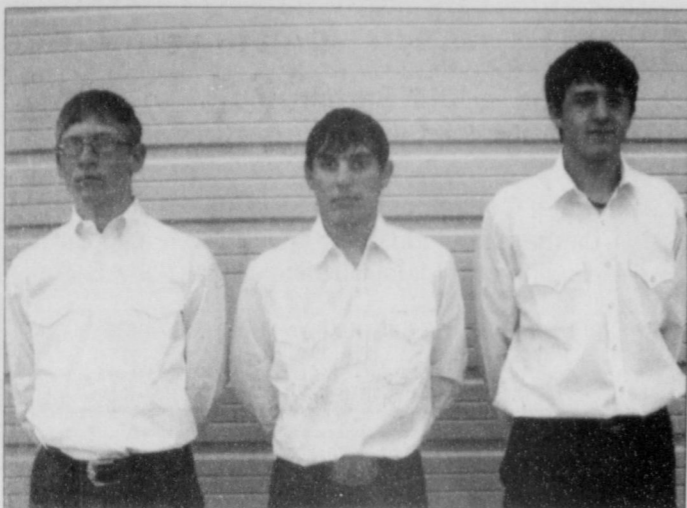

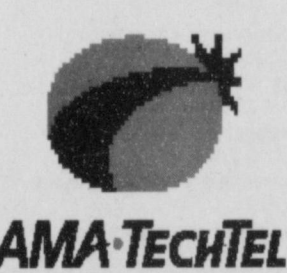
