

# City draws criticism at hearing

A public hearing on the city budget last Tuesday drew sharp criticism from one citizen about the contract between the City of Clarendon and the Donley County Sheriff's Department.

The citizen, who signed in only as "Paul," opened his questioning by inquiring why the law enforcement line item was \$131,500 and asked what the city gets for that money.

Mayor Chris Ford explained that \$1,500 pays for the city's share of the electricity at the city-county radio tower and that \$130,000 goes to the sheriff's department.

Mr. Paul asked again what the city gets for its money, and Mayor Ford said 24-hour police protection.

Mr. Paul then asked if city taxes go for the police protection and noted that county taxes already pay for that. He also inquired about speed control through the city.

The mayor said the question about traffic control would have to be directed to the sheriff.

Sheriff Butch Blackburn told Mr. Paul that the city's funds help him provide 24-hour coverage to the city and also noted that the contract shifts all law enforcement liability from the city to the county.

Mr. Paul asked if the city is part of the county, which the mayor said he took as a rhetorical question.

"Isn't the sheriff obligated to respond to calls in the city?" Paul asked.

"Yes," the mayor responded, "but how he allocates his resources are solely at his discretion."

Alderman Will Thompson said the contract is in the best interest of both the city and the county and said the sheriff would be forced to cut positions without it.

After the public hearing was closed, the Board of Aldermen moved into its regular meeting with the sheriff's contract up for discussion first; and Mr. Paul spoke up on the topic again, this time inquiring why the new contract allows Class C tickets to be filed in the county court

Sheriff Blackburn explained that he has asked for an increase in his contract this year; but since the city couldn't not come up with the \$10,000 extra, this would help make up that revenue. The money would go to the county's general fund.

Mr. Paul restated that he thought the money should go to the city if the city is paying the sheriff. He asked how much money this amounted to, and city officials said about \$4,000.

"You're not writing enough tickets then," Paul told the sheriff.

"If you don't like the way it is, you can run for sheriff," Blackburn responded.

Aldermen later approved the contract as part of the motion to approve the city budget for FY 2010.

The board also voted to set the city's ad valorem tax rate at 65¢ per \$100 valuation; approved a bid for health insurance; and approved the budget for the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation.

# Time for us to defend our Constitution



Yet we would do well to do more than pay lip service to the Constitution once a year. Formally adopted

on September 17, 1787, it has long served as the bulwark of American freedom and as an example for struggling nations

Unfortunately, the rights enshrined in the Constitution are under constant attack. In fact, the protections and limita- to power tions on government power which were once so greatly



As government invariably, perhaps inevitably, oversteps its authority. Americans are faced with the pressing need to maintain the Constitution's checks against governmental power and abuse. After all, it was not idle rhetoric that prompted the framers of the Constitution to begin with the words "We the people."

If we are to maintain our freedoms, "we the people" need to become activists, even revolutionaries, for freedom. We forget the country started with a revolution. However, speaking truth to power is not an easy task. There can be no room for timidity or lukewarm emotions. We must meet the challenges of our day with passion, dedication and courage. And we must demand that our government respect our rights. Here are a few suggestions:

1. Get educated. Most Americans are largely uneducated about their constitutional rights and liberties. Yet without knowledge, very little can be accomplished. Thus, you must know your rights. Take time to read the Constitution. Study and understand history, because the tales of those who seek power and those who resist it are part of an age-old story. Understand the vital issues of the day so that you can be cognizant of the threats to freedom. I emphasize with people that the Bill of Rights is only 462 words. It takes about five minutes to read if you are a slow reader. Know the Bill of Rights and teach them to your children.

2. Get involved. Become actively involved in local community affairs, politics, and legal battles. Think nationally but act locally. If our freedoms are to be restored, taking action at the local level must be the starting point. Getting involved in local politics is one way to bring about change.

Seek out every opportunity to voice your concerns and demand that your government representatives account for their actions. Be relentless. And recognize that you don't have to go it alone. Engage those around you in discussions about issues of importance. Challenge them to be part of a national dialogue. And remember that those in power fear and respect numbers. Thus, while one person with a protest sign at a city planning meeting may be an irritant, three individuals with the same sign at the very same meeting constitute a movement.

3. Take action. Be prepared to mobilize at a moment's notice. It doesn't matter who you are, where you're located, or what resources are at your disposal. What matters is that you recognize the problems and care enough to do something about them. Whether you're 8, 28, or 88, you have something unique to contribute. You don't have to be a hero. You just have to show up and be ready to take action.

Effective use of the media is essential. Attracting media coverage not only enhances and magnifies your efforts. It is also a valuable educational tool. It publicizes your message to a much wider audience. It is through the media-television, newspapers, Internet sites, bloggers, and so on-that people find out about your growing resistance movement.

4. Don't back down. What was it that led to the successful activist movements of the past led by such people as Martin Luther King Jr.? Resolve and the refusal to be put off. When the time came, King was willing to take to the streets for what he believed and even go to jail if necessary. Thus, if any movement is to be truly successful, it must be manned by individuals who seek a greater good and do not waver from their purposes. After all, freedom is not free. There is

always a price to be paid and a sacrifice to be made. 5. Finally, keep hope alive. Although our rights are increasingly coming under attack, we still have certain freedoms. We can still fight back. We still have the right to dissent, to protest, and even to vigorously criticize or oppose the government and its laws. It won't be easy, but take heart. And don't give up.

Much like the colonists who dared to stand up to Great Britain in 1776, we too must confront the massive machinery of government. They brought about a revolution because of their courageous tenacity. Likewise, if we are to pull through these trying times with our freedoms intact, it will take the dedication of each and every one of us.



health care debate. Current federal proposals would preempt common sense lawsuit reforms that Texans fought so hard to achieve and from which they have benefited so

Right now, 30 states have adopted some variant of medical malpractice lawsuit reform. These reforms have accomplished their intended purposes: to encourage doctors to stay in practice, increase the number of difficult cases physicians accept, and provide better access to health care for that state's citizens. Disallowing those 30 states' reforms adopted to curb frivolous lawsuits against doctors would be disastrous to the delivery of high-quality, affordable for patients. health care - particularly in Texas.

The "commerce clause" of the U.S. Constitution authorizes the Congress to preempt state law. It is threatening to do so under the bill being debated in Congress, which will increase the opportunity to file frivolous medical malpractice cians move to Texas, increasing physi-

Through the establishment of a national "standard of care" and subsequent medical regulations, state laws imposed on all medical providers and tort claimants will be nullified. The hard work done by state legislators to allow doctors to provide care they believe is medically necessary and to protect doctors from meaningless harassment will be replaced by a committee which will tell doctors where they can practice, what they can charge, and the manner in which they can help their patients. Any deviation could result in a suit.

In Texas, for example, doctors are immune from suit when they donate their service to charity care. All of the medical providers who gave so generously to our neighbors from Louisiana after Hurricane Katrina did so with the confidence they could not be sued. A

Only in Washington, D.C. would someone come up with the idea that to "fix" health care we need to sue doctors more often

Don't tread on success in Texas

It is inexplicable why public policymakers view this as appropriate. Rather than having more physicians and better access to health care, we may soon have access to health care insurance without access to doctors. This is much like having a stack of Confederate currency - it's just paper with meaningless words printed on it.

Even in states with lawsuit reform, too much time and energy is devoted each day managing paperwork to ensure that physicians are not sued or made to defend themselves from frivolous burden that takes time away from caring

Texans have already made this clear. With Proposition 12 in 2003, Texans changed our constitution to reduce frivolous suits against doctors. The results have been amazing.

We have seen 15,000 new physicians' ranks in Texas by almost one third. The amount of additional charity care in Texas has increased by more than

federal pre-emption ends that protection. \$600 million per year. Hospital and clinic expansion is at an all time high, measured in the billions of dollars per year of capital improvement.

Why? Because Texas adopted these very clear and simple public policies: requiring a report from a physician in a similar field stating an act of malpractice resulted in an injury when suit was filed; limiting only non-economic damages (i.e. pain and suffering) to \$250,000 against a doctor and an additional \$500,000 against up to two medical institutions; and prohibiting evidence of phantom damages. There is no limitation on actual damages.

Texas went from almost last in states in physicians per person to the middle in just six years, and continues to claims. Congress should not worsen this move up the list. The growth has been particularly phenomenal in rural Texas. This is real access to health care, even for those without health insurance.





Knox unflavored gelatine, 1/4 cup water, 1 pkg (8oz) Philadelphia cream cheese, softened, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 pkg (10oz) frozen strawberries in syrup, thawed, 1/2 cup milk, 1 cup whipping cream, whipped. Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Mix crumbs, 3 Tbsp.sugar and butter; press firmly onto bottom of 9" pan and bake for 10 min., Sprinkle gelatine over water in small saucepan; let stand 1 min. Cook on low heat 3 min. or until gelatine is completely dissolved, stirring constantly; set aside. Beat cream cheese and ½ cup sugar in large bowl with electric mixer on med.speed until well blended. Drain strawberries, reserving liquid; set strawberries aside for later use. Add reserved strawberry liquid to gelatine along with the milk; stir until well blended. Gradually add to cream cheese mixture, stirring until well blended. REFRIGERATE until slightly thickened. Gently stir in whipped cream and strawberries; pour over crust. Refrigerate several hours or until firm. Store leftover cheesecake in Reffigerator.

# AGAPÉ CHRISTIAN CHURCH

In 1 Corinthians 13:1-3, the Apostle Paul provides a brief, forceful, and somewhat sardonic discourse on what could well be taken as the nature of spiritual pretentiousness among Christ's followers today. In this section of scripture he actually addresses very few of the multitude of gifts provided to believers by the indwelling Holy Spirit. And, this succinct little homily seems to apply equally to the individual Christian, to a group of believers, or to the Lord's church as a whole, as each case dictates.

To be sure, Paul is not downplaying the spectacular or the miraculous. In fact, he encourages believers to, "...eagerly desire spiritual gifts." The point of his argument in these verses, however, is clear. By themselves, spiritual gifts amount to nothing. Without question, they are not the ultimate test of authentic Christianity and must never be used in that way. Obviously, to Paul's mind, none of these grace-gifts are indispensable to the security of the spiritual man or woman. But, there is one, he intimates, which is indispensable to the believer (13:4-7) and it is the measure of true Christianity.

Those who are truly spiritual are patient and kind; they are not envious, not boastful, not proud or rude, self-seeking or easily angered. They keep no record of wrongs; they don't delight in evil. Rather they rejoice in the truth, they protect, trust, hope, and preservere. You see, Paul enjoins us to desire, "...the most excellent way," to desire the one indispensable grace-gift......Love. Love is the one incontrovertible mark of the truly spiritual. Among all the Spirit's gifts, love has the transcendent preeminence. Paul doesn't depreciate other spiritual gifts, but he steadfastly refuses to recognize any positive assessment of any of them unless the gift is discharged in love!

# STATEMENT OF INTENT TO CHANGE RATES

SWEPCO's request is based on the financial results for a 12-month test year ending on March 31, 2009. The effect of SWEPCO's proposed rate changes would be to increase its adjusted test year revenues by \$74,988,528, an increase of 34.56%, exclusive of fuel revenues. This increase has three components: 1) an increase of \$27,052,578 in base rates (the part of the rates not including fuel costs or riders); 2) an increase of \$31,626,764 associated with the establishment of two new Generation Cost Recovery Riders; and 3) an increase of \$16,309,186 associated with the establishment of a new Reliability Rider.

In addition, when rates are changed in this proceeding, it will result in the termination of the merger savings and rate reduction riders related to the merger of American Electric Power Company, Inc. and Central and South West Corporation that are currently in effect. The termination of these riders will increase SWEPCO's revenues by \$6,933,882 based on test year amounts. The combined effect of SWEPCO's requested change in rates and of the termination of the merger savings and rate reduction riders will be a 37.75% increase in SWEPCO's revenues, exclusive of fuel revenues.

The overall impact of the rate changes listed above, considering both fuel and nonfuel revenues, is a 20.01% increase. The impact of the rate change on various customer classes will vary from the overall impact described in this notice.

SWEPCO has proposed that its requested rate changes become effective on October 2, 2009. The proposed effective date is subject to suspension and extension by actions that may be taken by the Commission and other regulatory authorities.

# TARIFF REVISIONS

SWEPCO is proposing revisions to most tariffs and schedules. These changes include, but are not limited to: 1) merging of the SWEPCO North Texas Tariff with the SWEPCO East Texas Tariff; 2) instituting the three new riders discussed above; and 3) obtaining a Commission determination of the baseline values that will facilitate future Transmission Cost Recovery Factor (TCRF) filings pursuant to PUC Substantive Rule (SUBST. R.) 25.239, and approval of the form of the tariff sheet to be used to implement future TCRF updates.

# RECONCILIATION OF FUEL COSTS

SWEPCO has also requested authority to reconcile its fuel costs for the period from January 1, 2006 through March 31, 2009. This request is pending in a separate PUCT proceeding, Docket No. 37162.





New Class of Cancer Drugs Promising

Medical researchers recently published results of a study related to a new class of drugs for the treatment of cancer. A description of the study appears in a recent issue of the New England Journal of Medicine. One half of a group of 33 study participants with metastatic basal cell skin cancer experienced shrinkage of the cancer. Shrinkage of the cancer continued for an average of nine months. One report indicates that researchers were so pleased with the results that they have scheduled more studies and have ongoing studies in other types of cancer. The anti-cancer compound used in these studies is called GDC-0449, a product designation given by researchers. This compound is known to interfere with the so called "Hedgehog Signaling Pathway". This is a pathway in the body which involves proteins that play a role in the growth of cells, includingcancer cells.

Basal cell skin cancers are a common cancer type seen in adults. Although surgery is often successful against this type of cancer, it sometimes spreads. Medical experts indicate that new drugs are needed to work against spreading basal cell cancers.

(Romans 1:18-21) "For the wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness of men, who suppress the truth in unrighteousness, because what may be known of God is manifest in them. for God has shown it to them. There is only one explanation for the universe, mankind, etc., and that is an Eternal Being. 3. Non-believers who have come to "imagine" all sorts of substitutes for the true God are "futile in their thoughts." (2 Thessalonians 1:7-9) "and to give you who are troubled rest with us when the Lord Jesus is revealed from heaven with His mighty angels, in flaming fire taking vengeance on those who do not know God, and on those who do not obey the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. These shall be punished with everlasting destruction from the presence of the Lord and from the glory of His power,

This passage by the same author, Paul, confirms what he said earlier. Vengeance will be taken out on those who "don't know" Him (passages earlier said there is no excuse for that). Also, retribution will be handed to those who won't obey Him. Friends, it is simple. There is a God and He wants us to be submissive to Him. Not much to ask in exchange for everything we have and hope to have in the next life, not to mention the most important gift, Jesus Christ!
