New hours for dump

Effective October 1, 2007, the Donley County Dump will be open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays, and will remain open through the lunch hour.

The County Dump is located on County Road T east of Hwy. 70 South.

Attendant David Sharp will be available during these hours to help county residents unload their trash into the BFI roll-off box.

Residents are reminded that all chemical containers must be steam-cleaned before dumping. All tires must be quartered. No building materials over four feet long and no composition shingles are allowed.

The County Dump is available for rural county residents only.

BoxTop deadline

Clarendon Elementary is still collecting BoxTops for Education and Campbell's Labels for Education.

The school gets 10 cents for each BoxTop, and their goal this year is \$500 to help pay for their AR (Accelerated Reader) trip in May.

Drop off any BoxTops or Labels with Marianne Rattan in the office or send it to school with any elementary student. To receive the December check, the school has a deadline of October 15.

Jobless figures fall

Donley County's unemployment rate for August fell to 4.6 percent as the number of people looking for work dropped to 77.

The seasonally unadjusted data from the Texas Workforce Commission showed a local workforce of 1,686 with 1,609 people employed.

The size of the workforce was higher in July at 1,780, and the unemployment rate was higher also at 5.3 percent and 94 people looking for work.

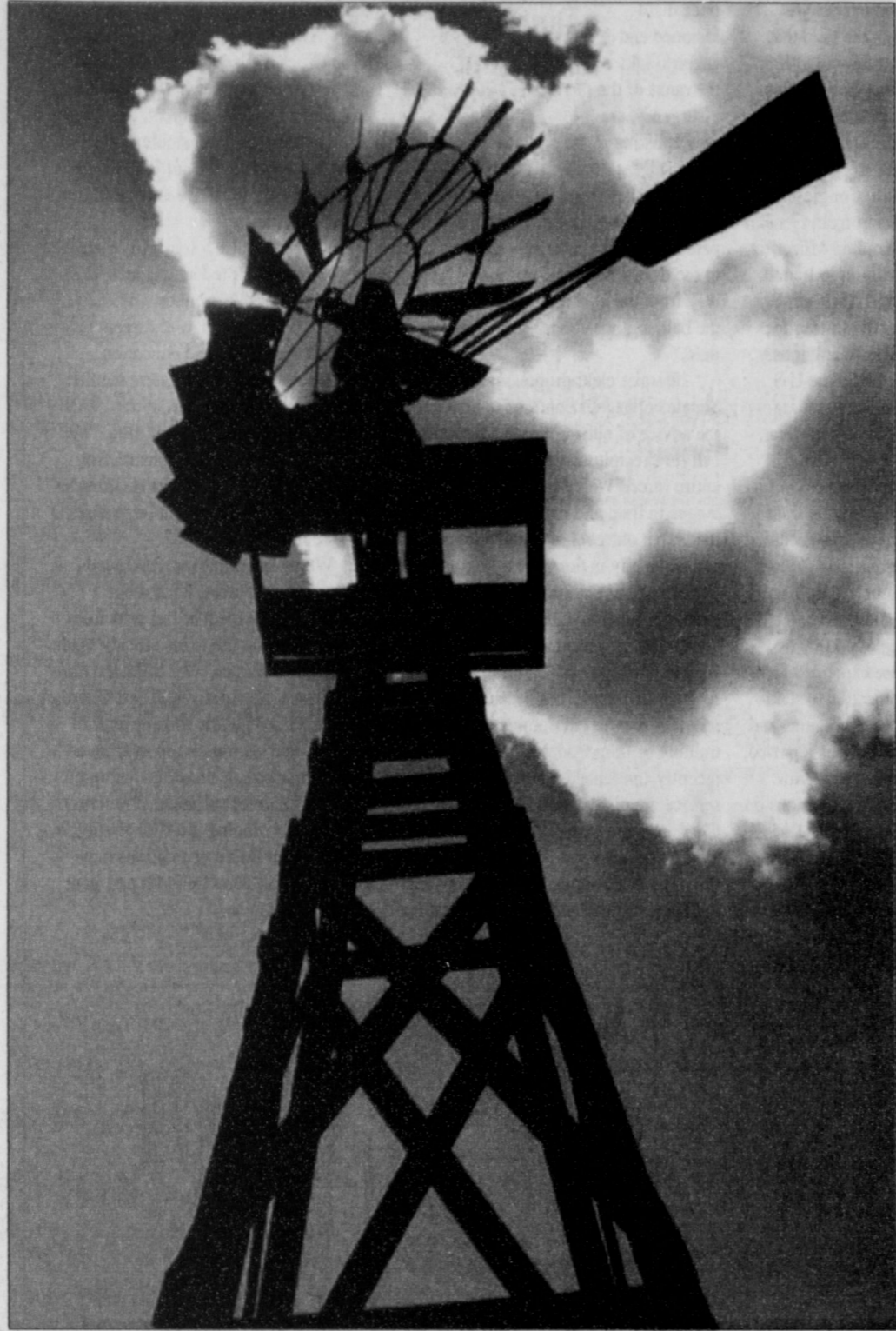
One year ago, Donley County had an unemployment rate of 5.2 percent with 95 people looking for work out of a workforce of 1,811.

Statewide, the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate fell to 4.2 percent in August, down from last month's 4.4 percent, and down from 4.9 percent a year ago.

County okays budget

Donley County Commissioners approved a \$1.95 million budget for the coming fiscal year September 20.

Commissioners also adopted ad valorem tax rate of \$0.4253 per \$100 valuation and a debt rate of \$0.085914 per \$100 valuation. The rates will increase taxes on a \$100,000 home by \$22.72 per year, commissioners said.

NRCS taking applications for EQIP funding

TEMPLE - Texas agricultural landowners interested in participating in the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) need to apply by November 16, 2007, if they have not already done so to be eligible for the next round of funding, according to the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

"Although EQIP is a continuous sign-up program, some producers may not have signed up yet," said Don Gohmert, NRCS state conservationist for Texas. "We will rank all eligible applications received by the

end of the ranking period on November 16 for 2008 funding. There is a strong possibility that EQIP funds will become available in October."

EQIP promotes agricultural production and environmental quality. Through EQIP, farmers and ranchers receive financial and technical assistance to help install conservation practices and to implement management systems that promote conservation. Financial assistance is on a cost-shared basis with the producer. The technical assistance is provided at 100 percent of the cost

by NRCS. According to Gohmert, there are a few changes in EQIP for 2008. NRCS is adding another statewide resource concern to the program at the recommendation of the State Technical Committee. Funding will be provided in 2008 specifically for conservation practices that improve habitat for the pronghorn antelope in west Texas.

Also new in 2008 will be a process to streamline payments. Instead of the traditional percentage-of-cost rates, NRCS will offer flat-rate pay-

ments based on a schedule for each conservation practice. "Landowners will know up-front what the payment in dollars will be," Gohmert said.

"One important component of EQIP that remains the same is the input needed from the local level to make EQIP address the most pressing resource concerns there," Gohmert said. "Our local offices may be holding program development group and local working group meetings very soon to gather that input." NRCS offices and local soil and water conservation district

officials will have more information about local meetings.

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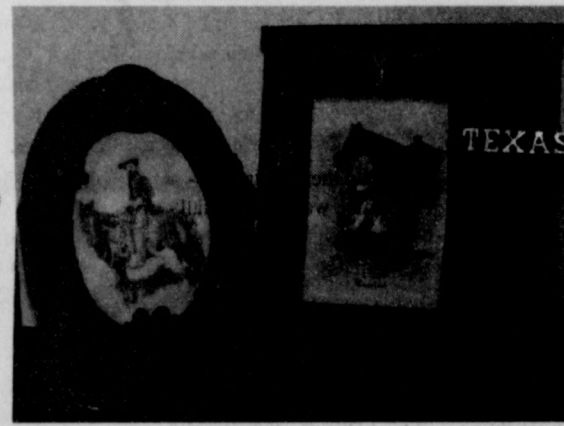
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College troupe ready to '...Murder Marsha'

"Let's Murder Marsha" is a comedy in three acts written by Monk Ferris, produced with special arrangement with Samuel French.

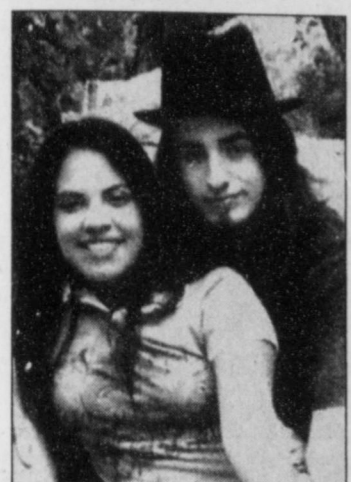

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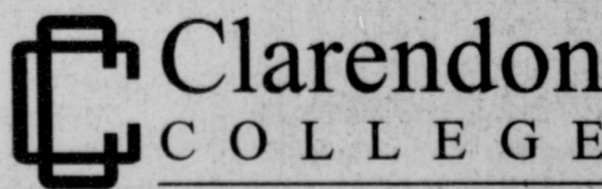

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Broncos lose close game to Gruver

On paper, the Broncos won the match up with the Greyhounds, but the scoreboard told a different tale.

The Broncos' only scores came from Aaron Gordon's two field goals from 30 and 26 yards out. Gordon hit the first field goal for the first score of the game in the first period. Gruver was not able to score until the second period when they went ahead by three. They scored again in the third quarter to take a nine-point

lead, and Gordon's FG in the fourth quarter narrowed the gap to six.

"We really outplayed them," head coach Gary Jack said. "We took the opening kickoff and drove it right down the field, but we just couldn't get it in the end zone. We held them on their possession, and marched right down the field again, but could not get six."

The Broncos racked up 308 total yards compared to only 217 for the Greyhounds.

"In my opinion, we were the better team," Jack said. "But we lacked the intensity we needed to get the win."

According to Jack, Aaron Gordon played a great game. To go along with his two field goals, Gordon had an interception and some receptions on offense. Jack also cited Johnny Gaines, Alton Gaines, and Danzel Wilson for playing good defense.

"Johnny had 12 tackles, Danzel

had 11, and Al had 10 tackles."

"It seemed like we were going in the right direction for the season," Jack said. "We lost our momentum a little bit, but we are going to work hard to prepare for Sunray. It will be a tough game Friday night. It will be a good challenge for us."

The Broncos will play Sunray Friday night, September 28, beginning at 7:30 pm. Come support the Broncos and be loud and proud as Clarendon takes on the Bobcats.

Correction to the September 5 men's game: Travis Wilson was the winner with a 64, and Ellis Knight was second with a 66.



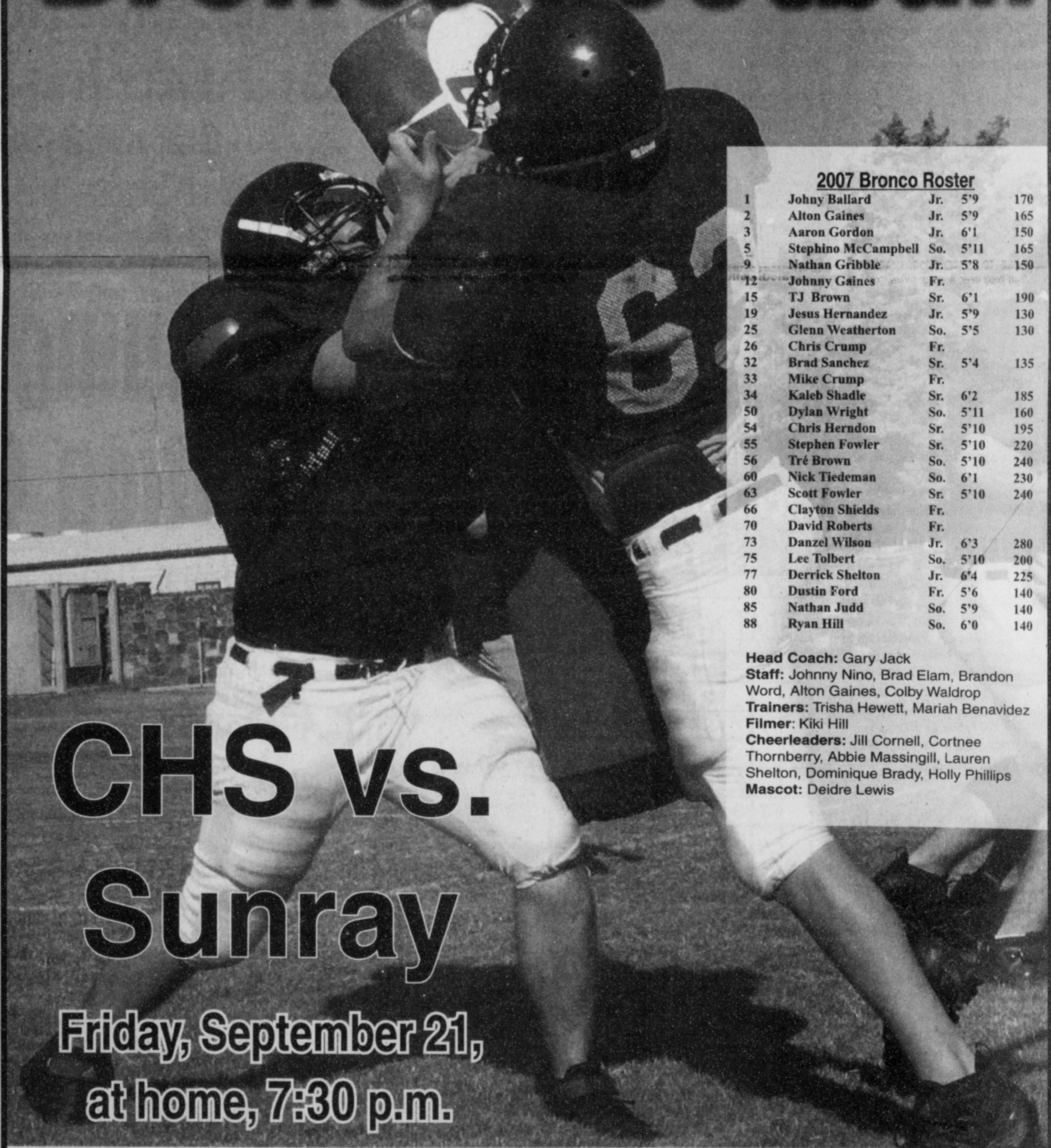

CC Regents adopt new retirement system

The Clarendon College Board of Regent met in regular session September 20 in the VIP Room of the Bairfield Activity Center.

The board adopted the ad valorem tax rate as it was proposed and advertised.

The board also approved the PARS retirement system for part-time employees as an alternative to Social Security. CC could save \$30,000 with this system because while the employee still contributes 6.2 percent, the college would only have to put in 2.0 percent. The advantage to the employee is that the money is theirs; and if they quit, the employee gets all the money back.

Regents also discussed the search for a new college president.

Auvenshine submitted a 12-month timeline proposal to the board along with a list of people who comprised the college's last presidential search committee in 1998-1999. Board Chairman Charles Deyhle directed Regents to review the materials before the next meeting.

Dean of Instruction Debra Kuhl reported on adjunct faculty and upcoming continuing education classes. Acting Dean of Students Tex Buckhaults reported on stepped up efforts to attract traditional students to CC, and Dean of Administrative Services Ray Jaramillo reported on efforts at the CC-Pampa Center to boost recruiting and develop more workforce and continuing education programs needed in that community.

Hospital Board okays wind farm abatement

The Donley County Hospital Board approved a wind farm tax abatement September 18 identical to one previously approved by the county.

If the power is sold in the SPP, Iberdrola, the company operating the farm, would receive an abatement as follows: 90 percent for years one and two, 80 percent in year three, 70 percent in year four, and 60 percent in years five through ten. But if the power is sold into ERCOT, the company's abatement would be less.

The portion of the wind farm in Donley County is expected to cost \$90 million.

Drugs in the News

Some AIDS Drugs Show Promise Against Cancer

Researchers at the National Cancer Institute have evaluated prescription drugs for AIDS called protease inhibitors as to their ability to work against different types of cancer. These particular drugs were chosen because of their effect on a protein that is involved with many types of cancer. In the medical journal Clinical Cancer Research, these scientists report the results of their evaluation in test animals. Of the six protease inhibitors studied, three inhibited cancer cell growth. According to a Reuters report, the scientists have started a clinical trial in humans that will involve Viracept (nelfinavir), one of the protease inhibitors that performed well in the test animal trials.

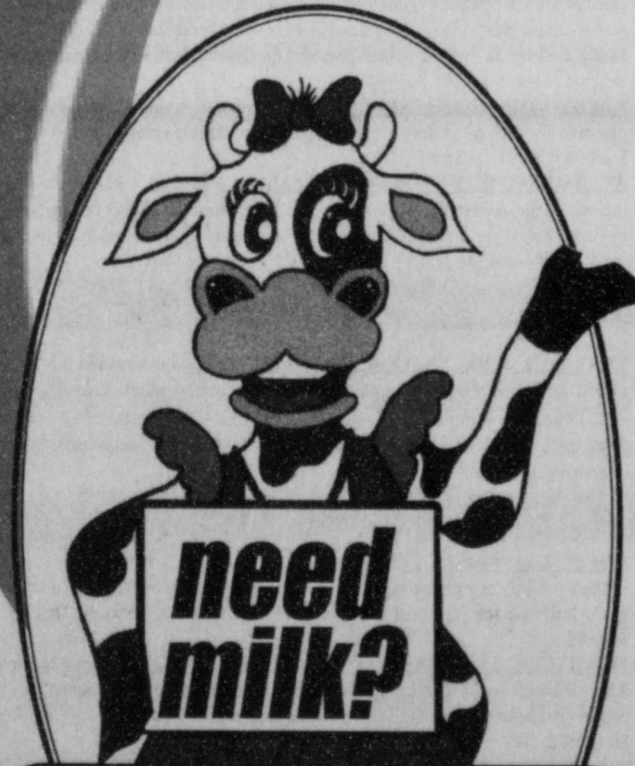
Other protease inhibitors include Agenerase, Lexiva, Crixivan, Kaletra, Norvir, and Fortovase. They all block an enzyme in the body called protease. This enzyme is responsible for producing long protein strands that are need to assemble new viruses. When the enzyme is blocked by these drugs, new virus particles cannot mature. In such instances the HIV (human immunodeficiency virus) cannot infect new cells.
