### **Emergency farm** loans now available

Applications for emergency farm loans for damages and losses caused by drought on January 1, 2008, and continuing are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located at 321 Sully Street in Clarendon.

Donley County is one of 46 ecently named by the Adminisrator as eligible for loans to cover production and physical losses esulting from the drought.

FSA Farm Loan Manager Larry Goetze said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 100 percent of their actual losses for the operating loan needed to continue the agriculture business, whichever is less. For farmers unable o obtain credit from private commercial lenders. the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan", Goetze said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to consider proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until February 27, 2009, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing, with possible delays into the new farming season,"



# Wild, wild Web being fenced in

At some point in history, America's Wild West became the Less-Wild West - with the rule of law taking over from the justice of the six-shooter, with codified norms of society replacing the often-unbridled ethics of frontier life.

We just may be seeing something of that kind of change beginning in the Wild West of the 21st century — the World Wide Web, with its Cyber Age pioneers who have been communicating freely for nearly 15 years. Such change would have dramatic implications for free speech, privacy and copyright laws.

The signs are there, like the spread of barbed wire that ultimately fenced in the open range.

In one of its final decisions of the last term, the U.S. Supreme Court approved congressional restrictions targeting child pornography. Apart from the impact the law may have in enabling prosecution of those who traffic in such reprehensible material, the decision is notable for the line it draws in Internet law for the first time — a "this far, but no farther" guideline - regarding sexually explicit material on

Meanwhile, other courts are considering lawsuits focusing on claims of copyright violations, with a potential for verdicts that may well rein in the galloping explosion of video material on social networks and sites like YouTube.

Clips from movies, news programs and entertainment shows have flooded such sites in recent years. But a federal court in New York is now hearing a \$1 billion lawsuit against YouTube for copyright infringement — and the judge has just required the site to produce data on which videos are being watched by

On a related front, in 2006, a teenage girl committed suicide after being harassed in an Internet hoax - a case that led prosecutors a few weeks ago to charge a Missouri woman with using the Web to drive the teen to take her own life. An FBI agent involved in the case said, "The Internet is a world unto itself. People must know how far they can go before they must stop? In May, the Missouri Legislature passed a new law that includes Web postings and computer messages under a legal definition of harassment.

Recent news reports also document attempts by both government and private companies to fence in the open range of material that gets space on the Web. In just this year, there have been congressiona calls for laws to keep potential terrorists from using the Internet to communicate and propagandize. And though telecoms are not the heavy hand of government, Verizon Wireless tried to block a specific kind of e-mail campaign by an abortion-rights group, and AT&T technicians decided to sanitize the lyrics of a rock band during a Webcast because of two lines that were critical of President Bush.

Even those rugged frontiersmen (and women) of the Internet, bloggers, are now facing changes that compare to those that fenced in the once-free-riding cowpokes. Where bloggers for years largely rode freely outside existing law and set their own rules, the world is changing. Now there are libel suits, and organizations created to set out standards for blogging. And news organizations are restricting what information bloggers can reproduce without fees or permis-

Then there's the question raised by a proposed federal "shield law" --- which would shield journalists from being ordered by courts to reveal confidential sources — as to whether bloggers are modern-day "outlaws" unprotected by such legislation.

An unfettered life on the open prairie has great appeal to the American spirit. In a 1945 Roy Rogers cowboy movie, the hero sings of his desire to roam under starry skies, and pleads in song, "Don't fence me in. / Let me ride through the wild open country that I love, / Don't fence me in."

## State must invest in water sources

Water is the lifeblood of Texas. Starting with our state's early inhabitants, the availability of water determined where Texans would live.

The insatiable demand also led to creative attempts to produce more water. Experiments in rain-making began in drought-plagued areas of Texas more than 100 years ago. In a memorable experiment in 1891, college professor John T. Ellis fired cannons at explosives that had been launched with balloons over South Texas.

"After several delays because of unsettled weather, a two-day bombardment of the sky apparently paid off with a downpour. But cynics said that Ellis had simply stalled until rain appeared inevitable, and doubts remained about the practicality of the technique," according to the Handbook of Texas.

As populations increased, Texans wanted dependable water reserves. Where towns sprung up, so did water towers. The municipal water tower is often the first sight as you approach most Texas towns. Along with their primary function, water towers provided city leaders an opportunity to welcome visitors and to advertise their community and its points of pride.

In Poteet, host of the Strawberry Festival each April, the tower is painted

to resemble the town's most famous product. The water tower in Luling, home of the annual Watermelon Thump festival, depicts its leading crop. Crockett promotes "Paradise in the Pines."

While all water towers rise above the landscape, some stand out for their design or message. Kemah on Galveston Bay built a water tower shaped and painted to resemble a lighthouse - in addition to operating as a lighthouse as well. Alice bills its tower as the "world's tallest, cement water tower."

Kermit, near the New Mexico border, painted its tower to resemble the beloved frog star of children's television. A tower in Plainview bears the name of another town, Rustwater, the fictional place featured in Steve Martin's 1992 film, Leap of Faith. San Benito's tower recognizes the town's famous son and Grammy-winning singer, Freddy Fender.

The most common tower design, however, is the "Tin Man" shape, reminiscent of The Wizard of Oz character. Other designs are used: Pedespheres sometimes are described as a "golf ballon-a-tee." Standpipes are tall columns. Some water tanks are supported by tripod structures. Many cities are building water spheres, which are large tanks supported by a number of pillars.

Some towers are central to local history. "In 1918 the six-year-old

Fentress water tower collapsed onto the town's only bank; cashier J. W. Lipscomb saved his life by dashing into the vault. This high water mark in Fentress history was viewed by some as divine judgment," the Handbook of Texas says.

In Columbus, the original tower - built of 400,000 bricks with walls 32 inches thick - defied attempts long ago to demolish it with dynamite. It now serves as a history museum.

Texas water towers promote the names of high school sports teams, including the Fighting Wildcats, Gladiators, Cubs, Pirates, Yellowjackets, Trojans, and Badgers. In Progreso, home of the Mighty Red Ants, the top of the tower is painted to resemble an anthill.

Whatever their size or shape, water towers are designed to ensure stable water pressure. Homeowners and businesses depend on them, as do firefighters. Many are used as a backup when emergencies threaten water availability.

By continuing to invest in lakes and reservoirs, water treatment systems, conservation and reuse programs, desalination plants, weather modification and new technologies, and by safeguarding the quality of our water, we can meet the future needs of Texas towns, agriculture, and businesses. This is an important part of being good stewards of the State we

# Measured response to housing mess

The housing crisis is eroding the confidence of our nation's homeowners, financial institutions, and investors at an accelerating rate. Americans are growing anxious that the equity they've paid into their homes may not provide the financial security that home ownership once guaranteed. Worst of all, nearly 1.9 million borrowers across the nation - more than 50,000 of them in Texas - who have filed for foreclosure on their homes this year live with diminished hope that their own symbol of the American dream will be realized.

The Federal National Mortgage Association (Fannie Mae) and the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation (Freddie Mac) each have similar roles in the home mortgage market. They buy mortgages from primary lenders - like banks - which make additional funds available to those banks to lend to other potential homeowners.

Fannie and Freddie were created by Congress specifically to make home ownership affordable and attainable for low- and middle-income Americans. Since 2000, Freddie Mac has provided \$821.6 million in low-cost mortgages to Texas families. And as of May 2008, Fannie Mae has purchased over a million home mortgages in our state. Across the nation, Fannie and Freddie own or

damage an already-fragile economy. Concerns about their viability have reinvigorated Congressional efforts to pass a sweeping housing bill addressing the core issues of the financial crisis.

Central to the legislation are longoverdue reforms, which establish a new, independent entity to regulate Fannie, Freddie, and the 12 Federal Home Loan Banks that were set up after the Savings and Loan crisis of the 1980s. The new entity will have the authority to set capital standards and establish prudent management practices. These provisions are designed to ensure the safe and sound

operation of Fannie and Freddie and better prepare them to weather unforeseen market challenges that may arise in the future.

The new rules will try to ensure that lenders do not entice people who are unable to make the payments to take on too much debt by requiring a minimum down payment. The legislation also raises the limit on the size of a mortgage, allowing families in high-cost areas of the country to access homeownership with fixed rate mortgages rather than exotic subprime loans. To spur home ownership, the bill includes a refundable first time homebuyer tax credit. Additionally, the package extends tax relief by allowing owners who do not itemize deductions on their tax returns to claim an additional standard deduction for the amount they pay in local property taxes, up to \$1,000.

Since March 2008, my office has responded to letters, emails, and phone calls from more than 5,000 Texans who are anxious about rampant foreclosures, falling home prices, and the trickle-down effects of ailing credit markets. I want all Texans to know that Congress is taking measured steps to ease the burden facing many homeowners, to continue to make loans available, and to soften the toll of the housing crisis on our economy.



### Staples kicks off nutrition program.

AUSTIN - Summer is a good time to take a break from many things, such as school and work. But it shouldn't be a time away from healthy eating.

Thanks to the Texas Department of Agriculture's Summer Food Service Program, which kicked off in cities statewide this month, Texas children won't have to go hungry this summer.

"We need to do everything in our power to make sure our children have access to nutritious meals during the summer," Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples said.

"That's why I'm excited nearly 2,700 sites across the Lone Stare State are teaming up with the Texas Department of Agriculture to feed children though the summer nutrition programs."

The Summer Food Service Program, created under the National School Lunch Act of 1946, is a federally funded program administered by TDA that reimburses organizations for sponsoring summer meals for low-income children.

The program is offered statewide in areas where more than 50 percent of the children are eligible for free or reduced-price meals under the National School Lunch Program. Sponsor organizations are typically schools, non-profits, and churches.

In 2007, 309 sponsors served more than 13 million meals to children through the program at more than 2,500 sites.





# Drugs in the News

Nose Spray Helps Children with Sleep Apnea According to an evaluation of over 60 children with a condition

called mild obstructive sleep apnea (OSA), the use of a corticosteroid drug called budesonide provides benefit. Results of the evaluation were published recently in the medical journal Pediatrics. Children received either budesonide as a nose spray or a placebo nose spray (no active ingredient), that was administered into each nostril at bedtime for six weeks. Researchers noted several th dren who received budesonide including an overall improvement in sleep, breathing became normal in over 50%, and improvements in sleep disturbance were still present even up to eight weeks after the budesonide spray was discontinued.

OSA is a medical condition in which the soft tissues in the nose and throat collapse, which blocks a person's ability to breath for brief periods of time while they are asleep. The condition is sometimes difficult to diagnose because children with OSA are not always overweight, nor do they frequently wake up at night as adults with OSA often do.
