



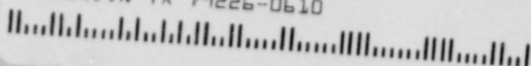

# CISD making technological leap One-To-One initiative to provide laptops for most students

Laptops for most students and a campus-wide wireless network will thrust the Clarendon school system fully into the 21st century next fall.

The Clarendon ISD Board of Trustees voted unanimously last Monday night to implement a One-To-One education initiative that school officials say will put technology in the hands of students 24/7.

"Every child from fifth to the 12th grade will have their own laptop computer and will basically

have access to information anytime," Superintendent Monty Hysinger said.

The school has been studying the One-To-One idea for about two years, and Hysinger formed a special committee to look at it in depth last spring. Clarendon specifically looked to Floydada and Highland Park as examples to go by.

"We polled our teachers. Eighty percent returned the survey, and 98 percent of those supported the idea,"

Hysinger said.

Today's kids are already adept at multi-tasking, and technology is second nature to them, the superintendent said. The initiative also is reflective of the demand in today's labor market for skilled employees who are not only productive but also creative.

"We want to change the concept of kids just being receivers of information," Hysinger said. "We want to teach kids to filter and produce

information."

CISD will budget \$150,000 to \$175,000 per year to lease about 400 Apple MacBooks. Additionally, the school will spend between \$150,000 and \$200,000 up front to install a new Cisco wireless network that will be accessible throughout the junior high and high school.

Every classroom will become a virtual computer lab as One-To-One takes the first step toward the possible elimination of the traditional

textbook.

The initiative will begin in a week or two with the acquisition of MacBooks for teachers, which will be followed by several days of training over the next year.

Then over the spring and summer, CISD will build a new technology facility west of the Administration Building that is expected to cost between \$800,000 and \$1 million, which officials say they can

## Legion honors two vets

Two Donley County men - Calvin S. Holland and M.O. Weatherly - were honored when American Legion members from across the Panhandle gathered at Clarendon College October 27 for their annual fall district convention.

District Commander Barry Schoenhals of Darrouzett was very pleased with the convention, which was hosted by Hedley's Adamson-Lane Post 287.

"I've been to dozens of conventions at various levels, and this was clearly one of the best," Schoenhals said. "I can't compliment Post 287 and Clarendon College enough as they were simply outstanding in their efforts to make us feel welcome. The facilities and the food were perfect."

The convention was dedicated to WWII veterans Weatherly and Holland, according to Post 287 Commander Jack Moreman.

Monte O'Neal Weatherly was sworn into the Army on August 3, 1944, in Oklahoma City. After a stint in Ft. Still and training at Camp Fannin in Tyler, Weatherly was sent to Europe, where he crossed the English Channel and was assigned to the 106th Infantry Division. He was engaged in the Battle of the Bulge, which lasted 43 days from December 16 through January 28, 1945. The battle led to the defeat of Hitler's army, after which the 106th was assigned to guard many German prisoners of war.

Weatherly's division was then sent back to the US to prepare for the invasion of the Japanese mainland. But while on ship two days out of New York, they learned about

## Farm Show to be held November 29

AMARILLO - The 23rd annual Panhandle Farm and Ranch Management Symposium will be November 29 at the Amarillo Civic Center, said a Texas Cooperative Extension agent. The event will be in conjunction with the Amarillo Farm and Ranch Show.

The Amarillo Farm and Ranch Show is scheduled for November 27-29. Exhibits will be open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on November 27-28, and 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on November 29. A \$2 admission fee will be charged for the first time this year, with all

proceeds going to benefit area FFA organizations.

Registration for the farm management symposium will begin at 8 a.m., said Leon Church, Extension agricultural agent in Potter County and moderator for the event.

The program will start at 8:30 a.m. with Dr. Brent Bean, Extension agronomist in Amarillo, speaking on weed issues and potential options for no-till or minimum-till wheat and sorghum production.

Other topics will be: Chemical modes of action, Jack Lyon, retail

account manager for DuPont. Future of the bioenergy industry in the Texas High Plains, Dr. Steve Amosson, Extension agricultural economist, Amarillo. Pesticide laws and regulations, Levon Harmon, Texas Department of Agriculture.

Three pesticide license continuing education credits and three certified crop advisor credits will be offered; one in integrated pest management, one in laws and regulations and one general, Church said.

build with no tax increase. The 6,500 square-foot center will house the district's video conferencing room, its servers and network equipment, and a large workroom.

Students will then receive their MacBooks next fall in either September or October, Hysinger said. Loaners will be available when one of the laptops has a problem, and parents will be asked to spend \$50 on an insurance policy in case the computer is damaged.

"With the first claim, the school will split the deductible with the parents," Hysinger said. "The second

claim, the parents pay the deductible; and after the third claim, the student will no longer be allowed to take the laptop home."

Hysinger said the school hopes One-To-One will open a world of opportunity to economically disadvantaged kids, and he believes the initiative will benefit all students by better preparing them for college or the workplace.

"We also think that this program - like our new Pre Kindergarten program - will be something that will attract people to live in Clarendon," Hysinger said.

Our service veterans are a special group of people who often are either forgotten or not properly thanked. Veterans Day is an American holiday honoring military veterans. Both a federal holiday and a state holiday in all states, it is celebrated on the same day as Armistice Day or Remembrance Day in other parts of the world, falling on November 11, the anniversary of the signing of the Armistice that ended World War I.

Veterans Day is largely intended to thank living veterans for their service, to acknowledge that their contributions to United States

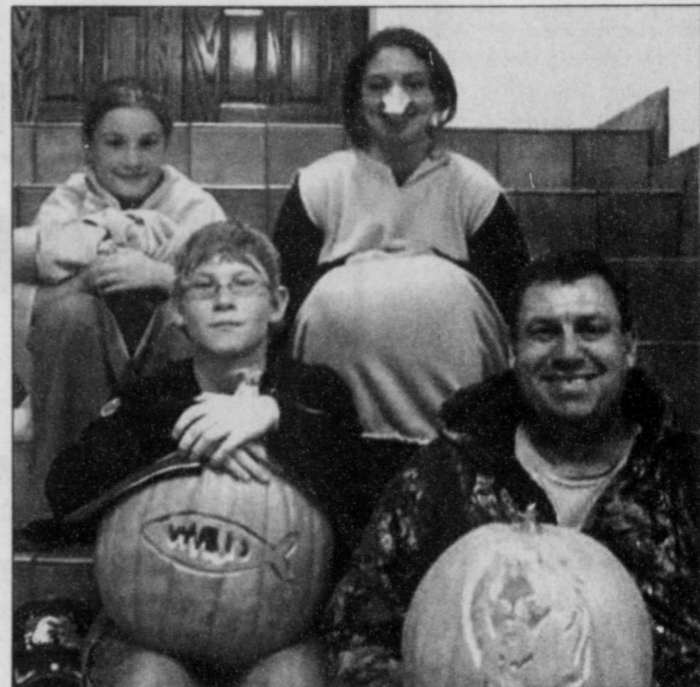
national security are appreciated, and to underscore the fact that all those who served - not only those who died - have sacrificed and done their duty.

We proudly wore these bracelets as a symbol of hope that the P.O.W.'s and M.I.A.'s would return to their families alive.

I either wore or carried in my pocket or purse a bracelet for over 20 years. During a trip to Washington,

# Veterans: Holland, Weatherly recognized

the two atomic bombs the US had dropped on Japan and the subsequent surrender of that empire.

Following the war, Weatherly was sent to Texas and served as an MP on troop trains between Ft. Worth and El Reno, Okla., and later troop movement to Sweetwater. He was discharged on January 2, 1946, in San Antonio. He served 35 years as Hedley's city manager and also served as manager of the Rowe Cemetery and justice of the peace during that time. He joined Hedley's Adamson-Lane Post 287 of the American Legion in 1950; and today, his son, Gary, and grandson, Curtis, are both members also.

Calvin S. Holland, son of Mr. and Mrs. W.C. Holland, went Missing In Action when his plane was shot down on the west coast of Borneo October 24, 1944.

Holland was born in Donley County on August 19, 1924, and graduated from Lelia Lake High

School at age 16 in 1941. He joined the US Army in 1943, was inducted at Ft. Sill, Okla., and was trained at the Laredo Air Force Base. He served on a B-24 bomber crew as a gunner and radar operator with the Thirteenth Air Force in the Southwest Pacific. At the time of his disappearance during a reconnaissance mission, Holland had flown approximately 30 missions.

Holland's elder brother, Eldon, was also in the Air Force in the region and traveled to Morati Island when he learned of Calvin's disappearance. He learned that Holland's plane had radioed that they were hit, were on fire, and were attempting a nighttime water landing. That was the last anyone heard from them.

Holland's older brother, Buford, still resides in Donley County.

The convention concluded with a joint memorial service coordinated by District Chaplain Roger Dempsey and his wife, Debbie, of Darrouzett.

In 2007, District 18's achievements were historic, earning them one of the top spots in the Department of Texas. During the year, district officers received two Department Awards of Merit, Department Legionnaire of the Year, and District Goal Award; were winners of the National Race to the Top; and were delegates to the national convention in Reno, Nev.

As far back as junior high, the Broncos set goals for their team and Friday night before a loud and proud hometown crowd, one of their goals was achieved. The Broncos clinched a play off spot in District 3-1A for the first time in several years.

The Broncos' talent has been very apparent during this season, but their true strength has begun to show through game after game. All of the coaches and most of the fans have noticed what keeps this team pushing forward week after week, even after some unfavorable results. It is heart - plain and simple. And this year's Bronco team has plenty of it. Each time the Broncos have found themselves trailing their opponent, they have gone deeper to find the strength to push on. They will need to draw on that when they face Quanah for the title.

"We've got a great chance to win it all," head coach Gary Jack said. "The pressure is off to make the play offs, but we still want to be District Champs."

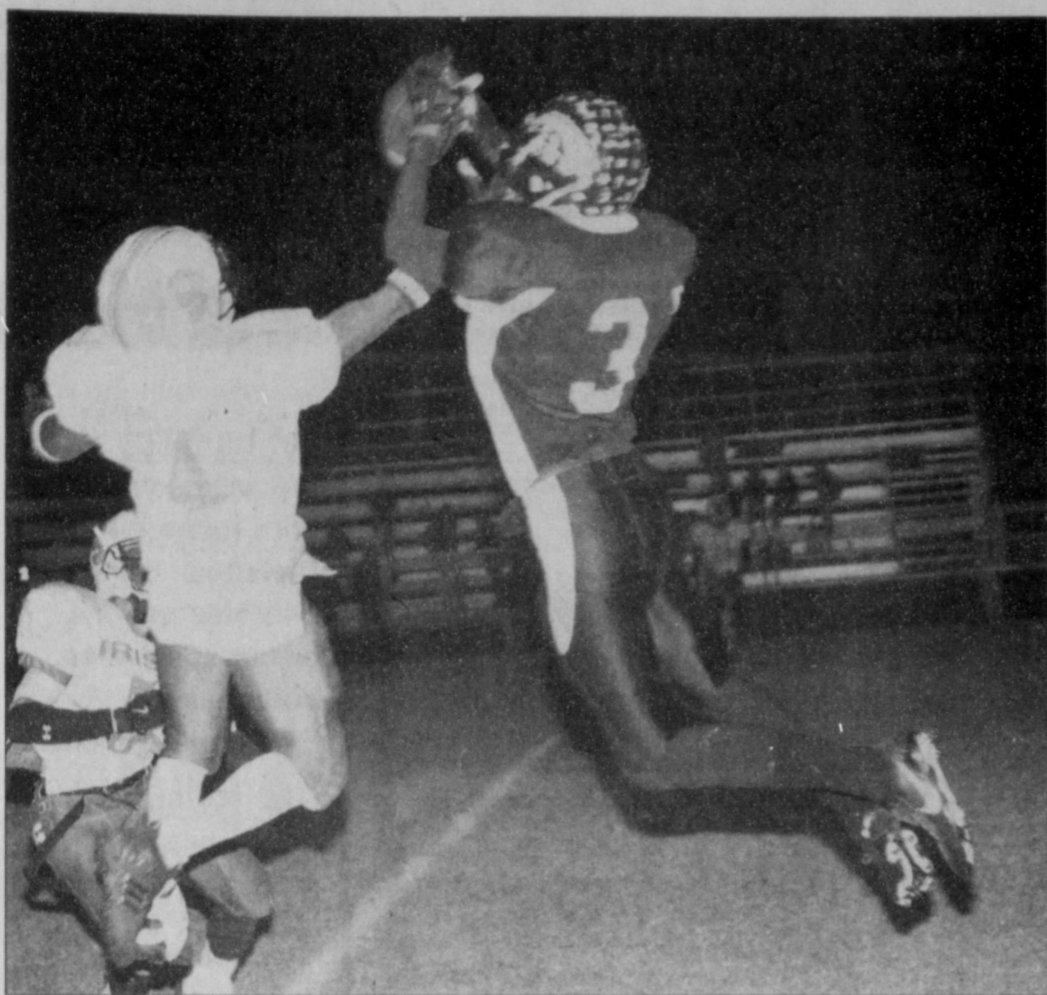

## Drugs in the News

### New Treatment for Advanced Breast Cancer

The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently approved an important new type of drug for the treatment of advanced breast cancer. The new drug, which is called Ixempra (ixabepilone), has been approved for cancer of the breast that does not respond to other therapies. A spokesman for the FDA indicated that the drug is also cleared for use alone or along with other drugs such as Xeloda in metastatic breast cancer. One report indicates that Ixempra represents the first new type of chemotherapy for advanced breast cancer in the more than 10 years (following the approval of Taxol in 1992). The drug, which is a part of a new group of drugs called epothilones, is designed to kill cancer cells. In clinical trial, Ixempra either shrank cancer cells, or the cells did not grow for an average of just over 5 months.

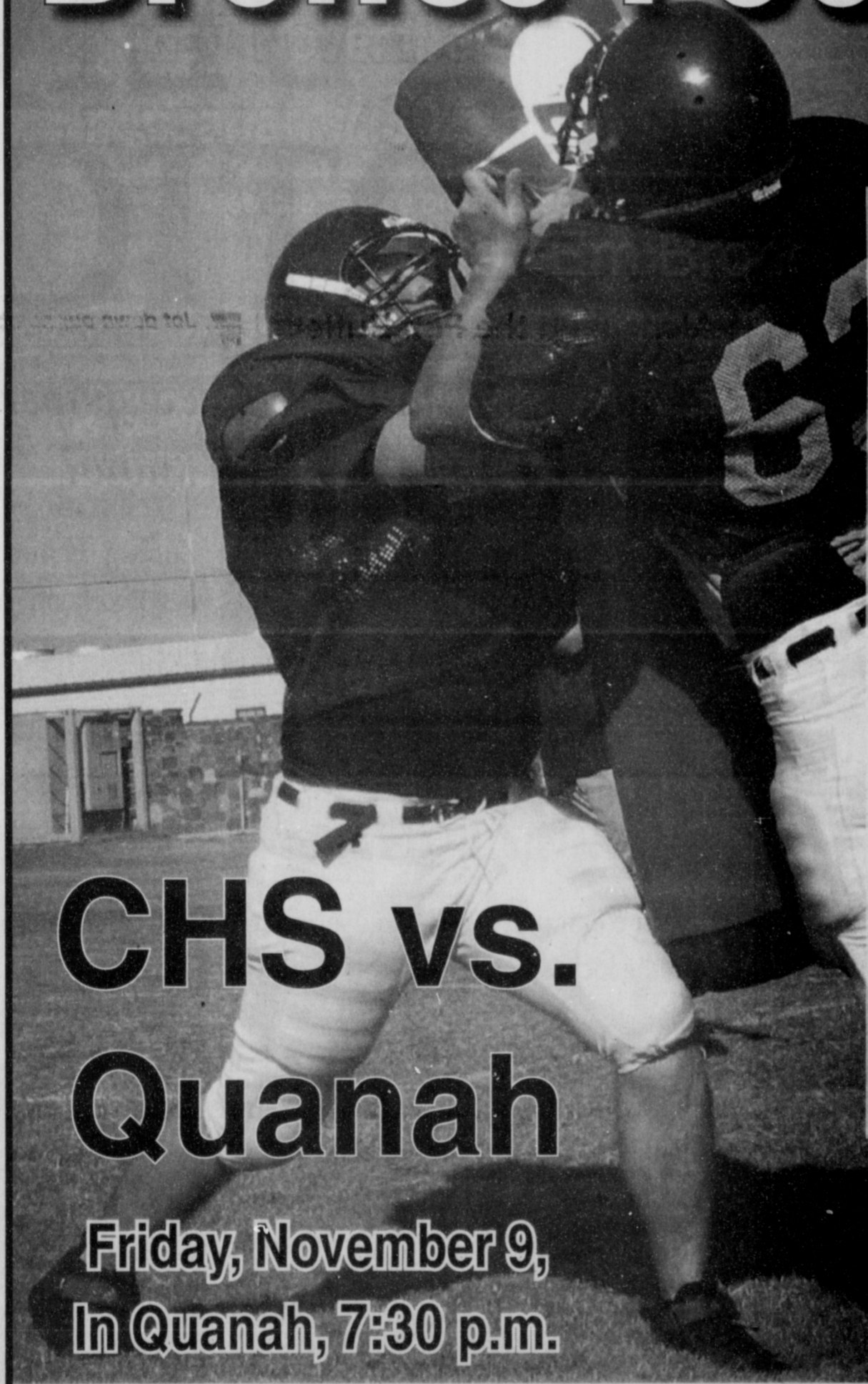

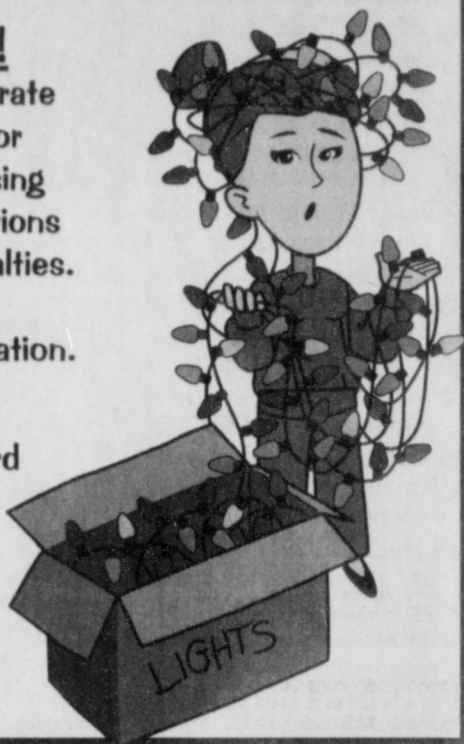

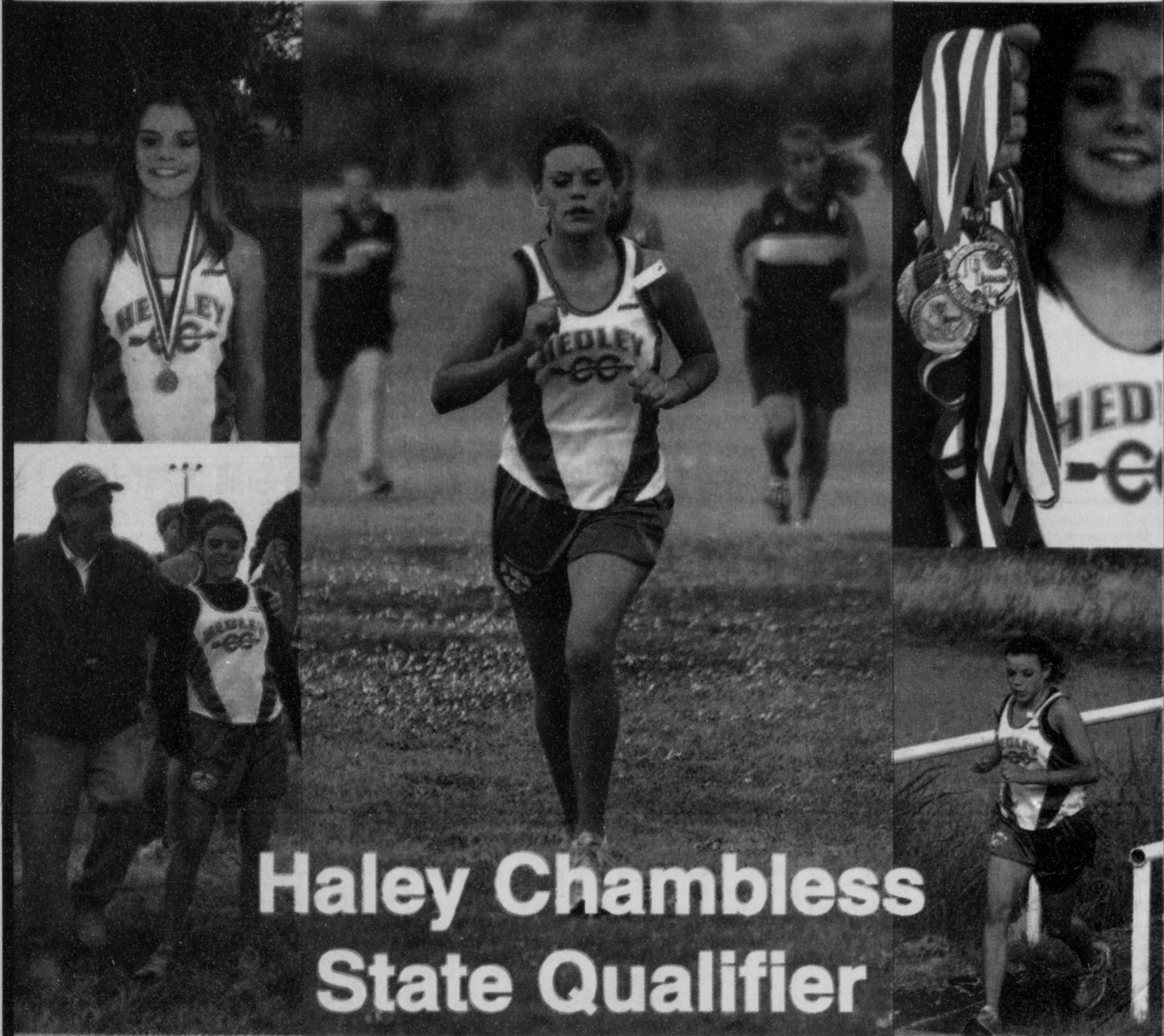
