Perry Restores Funds

Word was received late Tuesday as the ENTERPRISE was going to press that Gov. Rick Perry has acted to restore funds he had cut for Texas community colleges.

Clarendon College and community colleges across Texas were surprised in June when Perry vetoed \$153.9 million in appropriations for employee and retiree health insurance in fiscal year 2008-2009.

The cut meant a loss of more than \$461,000 for Clarendon College.

Support for restoring the funds came from across the state and from members of both the Republican and Democratic parties.

Details of the governor's reversal were not available Tuesday. A full report will be published next week.

Casting votes early

Early voting by personal appearance is underway in the Donley County Clerk's office for this November's State Constitutional Amendment Election.

Balloting began Monday and continues through November 2. A total of three people had voted as of Tuesday morning.

Texas voters are deciding the fate of 16 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

The general election will be held Tuesday, November 6.

Check scam alert

The Donley County Sheriff's Department is again warning people about check cashing schemes that can take a toll on a person's bank account.

The swindlers send a check or money order with instructions for the recipient to cash the check, keep ten percent, and send the rest to a foreign address.

In the most recent scam incident, a local woman received two checks - one for \$4,900 and another for \$4,850. The bulk of the money she was instructed to forward to Ghana. The checks later turned out to be fake.

"If you get a check in the mail and you aren't owed money or someone isn't paying you for a service, do not cash it and send it somewhere," Sheriff Butch Blackburn said.

Pancake supper

The Clarendon Lions Club will hold its annual Pancake Supper this Friday, October 26, in the Clarendon School Cafeteria.

The meal will be served at 5 p.m. Tickets are \$5 for adults and \$3 for kids 12 and under and are available from any Lion or at the door.

Proceeds benefit the charitable activities of the Lions Club.

Board accepts bid for nursing home

The Donley County Hospital Board accepted a \$1.25 million bid for the Medical Center Nursing Home during a called meeting Tuesday night.

The lone bid came from Community Care Management Services based in Denton under the name of Clarendon Realty, LTD.

The hospital district must still receive approval for the deal from its financial advisor, bond counsel, and

the company that sold the bonds to remodel the nursing home.

After those conditions are met, the district would proceed with final contract negotiations.

Funds from the sale of the nursing home would be put in escrow to pay off the bonds owed on the facility.

The purchase would include MCNH, the Community Services Building, and five acres of land for

future development.

No representatives from Community Care were present at Tuesday's meeting.

The firm's website bills the company as "the premier nursing care management firm in Texas" and lists nursing homes in Stamford, Fort Worth, and Mineola.

Acceptance of the bid came one week after the hospital board's regular meeting at which the district

awarded a \$373,234 contract to Kelly Wood Company to add four semi-private rooms to the nursing home's west wing.

District officials said the pending sale of the facility will not affect that project, and the cost of the addition is included in the sale price.

Kelly Wood was one of six bidders on the project. Construction on the expansion will begin Monday and should be completed within

140 days.

In other district business last week, Administrator Vicky Robertson reported a census of 51 residents in the nursing home and said the ambulance service received 69 calls in September.

Holly Eads gave the indigent care report. The district's outstanding liability for indigent expenses was \$4,471.92, and indigent expenses for September totaled \$7,020.83.

CISD to begin offering Pre-K Program to start in January

Clarendon school trustees green lighted a proposed Pre-Kindergarten program during their regular session October 15.

Superintendent Monty Hysinger said the program for four-year-olds will begin in January and will be reevaluated after a year and a half.

"We think it's a positive move, and there are a lot of positive reasons for starting education earlier," Hysinger said. "It develops social skills and early reading skills."

The school district has discussed offering Pre-K in the past and began to look seriously at the idea after the First Baptist Church closed its Pre-K program this fall. Clarendon Elementary Principal Mike Word had a meeting with the parents of prospective Pre-K students about a month ago.

"We've talked about this for four or five years, and it was either do it now, or it was just going to keep not happening," Word said.

A room is available for the class in the school's D-Wing, and administrators have already identified a potential teacher for the class, whose employment will go before trustees next month.

The new program will cost the school district \$28,000 to \$30,000 for the remainder of the school year.

Registration for the class will begin in December, and parents will have to fill out all the paperwork for

the school's Head Start program.

"If they qualify for Head Start, they will be placed there first," Hysinger said.

The Pre-K class will run the entire school day and will accept a maximum of 17 students. If more than 17 students enroll in the program, the class will be split into two half-day classes.

Hysinger says he hopes the Pre-K program will be an incentive for more people to come to Clarendon and enroll their kids here.

"If they ever start here, they'll see how good a program we have and stay," he said. "It could really build our elementary enrollment."

In other school district news, trustees approved a motion to work with Chancellor Financial, LLC, to help in securing alternative financing for constructing a proposed technology building. The facility would be built west of the Administration Building with revenue bonds and would not require an increase in taxes.

Trustees nominated Dan Hall, Che Shadle, and Casey Cobb for the Donley County Appraisal District Board of Directors.

A public hearing was held to discuss the district's 2007 School FIRST Rating annual financial management report. Clarendon CISD received a rating of superior achievement.

2007 cotton crop looking good

Donley County's first bale of cotton for 2007 was raised by Steve and Trish Schwertner, and gin manager Earl Shields said this should be a good year for local producers.

"Everybody's cotton looks good," Shields said. "I think we'll see a lot of two to three bale-per-acre irrigated cotton this year, and dryland cotton will pull one and a

half bales."

Shields and Steve Schwertner agreed that the crop is consistently good across the county.

"I think technology is helping us learn how to grow cotton," Shields said.

Schwertner said the varieties of cotton have improved. His prize bale came from a dryland patch of

AFD 5064. He also grows Fiber-Max 9063 on his irrigated land.

Shields also said the eradication of the boll weevil has helped immensely and that farmers also aren't dealing with the worm infestations they've had in the past.

The Donley County Gin had ginned 300 bales of cotton as of Monday, Shields said.

Legionnaires to hold annual fall convention in Clarendon

Gore finally gets what he deserves

Al Gore has finally won his Nobel Prize, reminiscent of the proverbial little nut that stood his ground, evolving into a giant oak. Now we can only hope that he runs for president, an office that, given recent history, surely deserves him.

Where else — except perhaps via the Kyoto Protocol on global warming, which Gore negotiated — can someone accomplish so little while spending so much? But, to get there, or at least to the Demo nomination, Gore's going to have to do something he has assiduously avoided: debate.

Gore's standard rule on live TV has been there will be no live challenge. The last time he ran for president (2000), he succeeded de facto, with George "Carbon Bonoxide" Bush as the token global warming flyweight. This time, debates happen.

That's because Gore represents a party gone global warming ga-ga, with some of the world's goofiest environmental legislation in history awaiting a Bush veto and a Gore signature.

Consider what Bernie Sanders ("T"-VT) has in the docket: A legislative magic wand that will require us to reduce our emissions of carbon dioxide by 90 percent in a mere 42 years. Since 1990, we're up a little under 20 percent. Sanders' legislation takes us back to the 1930s, a technological stone age. True, there's other, more "moderate" legislation. John Kerry's (D-MA) proposal would cut it back 80 percent. Dianne Feinstein (D-CA) is at 50 percent.

Each and every one has a good chance of Senate passage, and an even better chance of a veto. So, now that you have your Nobel, come out and fight like a man, Al, and don't even worry about picking on someone your own size.

The fact is that Al has ducked, feinted, dived away from, or fluffed each and every opportunity for a reasoned debate with any global warming scientist not of his choice, a choice he no longer enjoys. Heartland Institute, a Chicago think tank, spent over a million dollars filing ads in the Wall Street Journal, the New York Times and their ilk, begging Al to debate. No dice.

In a less public venue, my own Cato Institute sent kind and courteous letters asking him to share our pretty auditorium on Washington's Massachusetts Avenue, for a civil discussion with our scholars. Again, no dice.

Here's the rub: if any opposition were so easy to vanquish, Gore would relish the opportunity. Obviously there's a substantive and cogent argument he can't kill.

In essence, it is that Gore has massively departed from the scientific mainstream on global warming, even as that community may be itself biased by the funding afforded by emphasizing the negative.

For example, the United Nations' Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (of which I am a member, while Gore is not) predicts a mean sea-level rise of about 13 inches by 2100. Gore's book and movie contain an undated montage showing Florida sliding beneath the waves, something that could only happen with 13 feet or more.

How on earth does one accomplish such a disconnect from scientific reality?

Gore only has one scientist, James Hansen of NASA, whispering the sweet nothings into his ear that sea-level could rise this much or more in the next 92 years, as Greenland's ice sheets are destabilized by climate change.

No other scientist is willing to climb out on this limb, because it is simply not supported by the observed climatic history of Greenland since the end of the last ice age. For much of six millennia, ending 3,000 years ago, it had to be warmer, and yet the ice stuck like glue.

Hansen's amazing response, which you can read on his blog, documented at www.realclimate.org (not exactly a peer-reviewed scientific journal!) is that other scientists don't agree with him because they suffer from what he calls "scientific reticence." In other words, all his colleagues are chicken-bleeps because they don't agree with him.

How about the other pole? Every computer model mentioned by the United Nations shows Antarctica gaining ice this century because a slight warming will result in more precipitation which must fall as snow. Would Gore like that out in public? Or how about the fact that Antarctica just set its record maximum for sea-ice extent, as measured by satellite.

The world can only hope that Gore's Nobel propels him into another run for the Presidency. He received it for his climate lunacy. Now he can defend it and the Nobel Prize by merely debating those who must be so easy to defeat.

Give lawmen tools against terror

Protecting American lives is my most important duty as your Senator. This is an era in which violent extremists seek to do us harm. They strive to recreate the horrors of September 11, and they attack our troops in Iraq and Afghanistan daily. We have many tools to help our intelligence community foil terrorist plots overseas and on our soil. But some members of Congress advocate measures that would take away crucial intelligence assets and cripple our counter-terrorism efforts worldwide. We must be equipped to intercept calls between terrorists in order to prevent attacks they plan.

Last August, I worked with my colleagues to pass the Protect America Act of 2007. This important legislation amended and modernized the decades-old Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act of 1978 (FISA). Today, our enemies utilize cell phones, wireless Internet networks, and countless other technologies that were not in place when FISA was enacted 30 years ago. Consequently, the lawmakers of that era could not have contemplated the challenges we face in today's Global War on Terror.

Previously, terrorists exploited laws designed to protect Americans' privacy and placed phone calls unnoticed to conspirators within our borders. Our intelligence officers could monitor a call between two foreign locations unhindered, but conversations beginning or ending on our soil required a court order. In today's digital age, the time it takes to obtain these documents makes it impractical to intercept nearly instantaneous messages on cell phones and over the

Internet. And delays could mean the difference between life or death.

A recent news story in the New York Post is painfully illustrative. The Post reports that earlier this year, Al-Qaeda operatives ambushed seven of our soldiers on patrol in Iraq. Four were killed, and three were taken hostage. Our forces immediately began searching for the survivors, but they were quickly halted by red tape. Because some of the terrorists' cell phone calls were routed through U.S. networks, officers were forced to seek a court order to monitor their communications. Rescuers were delayed for almost ten hours while lawyers and judges decided whether or not they could search for their comrades. The trail went cold, our soldiers were executed, and the terrorists escaped. As one observer aptly noted, "How many lawyers does it take to rescue our soldiers? It should be zero."

The reforms of the Protect America Act give our law enforcement and intelligence officers new tools to prevent attacks against Americans. Appropriately, a court order is still required to listen in on purely domestic calls, between two people within our borders. But our intelligence community may now monitor phone calls originating outside our country, from Pakistan or Saudi Arabia, for instance, without time

consuming court proceedings. Prior to these reforms, al-Qaeda leaders could have placed a call to a sleeper cell inside America without fear of detection. Today, our forces have the ability to intercept and monitor this call quickly and unencumbered.

The Protect America Act expires in February, and with it the new flexibility and effectiveness we have given our intelligence community. Rather than making these vital reforms permanent, some of my colleagues support legislation to impose more regulations that handicap our intelligence community. In addition, their initiatives do nothing to prevent frivolous lawsuits against telecommunications companies that cooperate with intelligence officials to aid in the War on Terror.

I pledge to work to defeat these dangerous measures in the Senate, so the intelligence community has the tools it needs and the privacy of law-abiding Americans is protected. Some of my colleagues use terms like "warrantless wiretaps" and "domestic surveillance" to score political points. In reality, as its title suggests, FISA applies strictly to foreign intelligence and guarantees the proper judicial processes for purely domestic communications.

As our brave service members endeavor to protect us from terror attacks around the world, Congress must employ every possible means to protect our soldiers and cities from future deadly plots. We must ensure that those who sacrifice so much to defend our freedom have the knowledge and resources they need to carry out their mission.

Protecting our national sovereignty

Our state and our country are struggling to keep up with the effects of globalization—the increasingly free flow of ideas, information, goods, and capital across borders and around the world.

One major challenge is making certain that our national sovereignty is protected, even as international commerce increases. This is no small matter. Our sovereignty is the foundation for our freedom.

Sovereignty should rest strictly with the American people. We cannot allow a foreign country or an international organization to make decisions that should be our own exclusive province, based on our own national interests.

The U.S. Senate is currently debating the Law of the Sea Treaty (LOST), a document that I believe poses a threat to these concepts. The treaty has been signed by 155 countries. But President Reagan rejected it in 1982, and the Senate refused to ratify a different version approved by President Clinton in 1994. Now it's back.

LOST sets up an international bureaucracy under the United Nations that would control the world's oceans and everything in them as "the common heritage of mankind." Any revenues produced by exploiting resources, such as oil discovered in international waters, would be allocated and divided by international tribunals.

LOST agencies would have authority to levy royalties and fees—effectively the first international tax. Some critics believe the treaty would lead to decisions by an international tribunal regulating

the environment, not only in the ocean but all over the globe.

The Bush Administration is pushing the Senate to ratify the treaty this time. It's needed to ensure that our Navy can navigate anywhere, it says, and to protect our ability to share in undersea resources, such as petroleum that might be found under the Arctic Circle.

In my view, our historical experience with international organizations has not been satisfactory. We are often outvoted, without good cause. The United Nations has earned a dismal and deteriorating record for corruption, highlighted by complicity in the largest fraud in history, the Iraq oil-for-food scandal. More recently, the U.N. has been accused of tolerating bribes and kickbacks in dispensing aid to tsunami victims in Southeast Asia.

U.N. efforts have been particularly ineffectual in resolving real conflicts. I believe the best insurance for orderly management of the high seas—and effective protection of U.S. sovereign interests—is a strong U.S. Navy. This concept has served us well for 200 years.

In mid-October, the U.S. Supreme Court heard arguments on a criminal case from Texas that poses yet another threat to our sovereignty. The case involved Jose Ernesto Medellin, a foreign citizen convicted and sentenced to death in 1994 in the brutal rape and murder of two teenage girls in Houston.

Long after his sentence was final, Medellin's lawyers came up with a new appeal point. They argued that because Medellin was not a U.S. citizen, and

under the Vienna Convention the Mexican consulate should have been notified when he was arrested, his appeal should be reopened. This argument was accepted in 2004 by a foreign tribunal, the International Court of Justice in The Hague.

Medellin was indeed born in Mexico, but lived in the U.S. most of his life. He speaks, reads, and writes English and attended U.S. schools. Disappointingly, the Bush Administration has issued a directive to Texas officials attempting to enforce the foreign court's judgment and also backed Medellin's side at the U.S. Supreme Court.

I have argued that the President lacks constitutional authority to direct Texas to reopen Medellin's conviction. In my opinion, the President cannot by himself transform an international treaty, and especially a foreign court's judgment, into domestic law.

In recent years, some Supreme Court Justices have shown a willingness to cite the law of other countries as support for their interpretation of the U.S. Constitution. That's yet another unwelcome trend, in my opinion.

The U.S. constitutional system is the product of our unique American experience. It has produced the most successful country in history, a nation that has been "the shining city on the hill" to the rest of the world.

We should do everything possible to protect that legacy. The world depends upon our leadership.

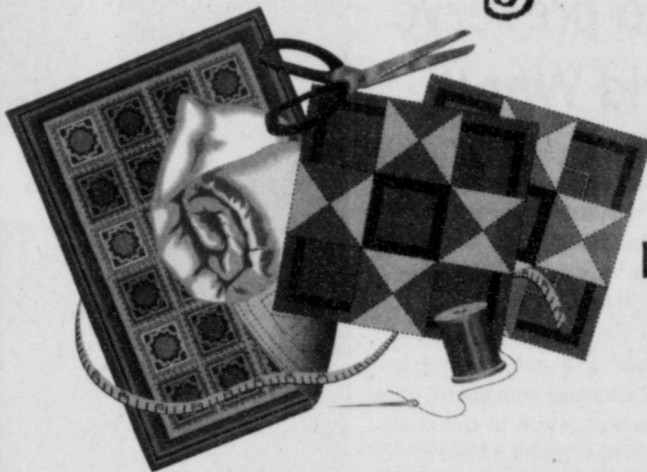

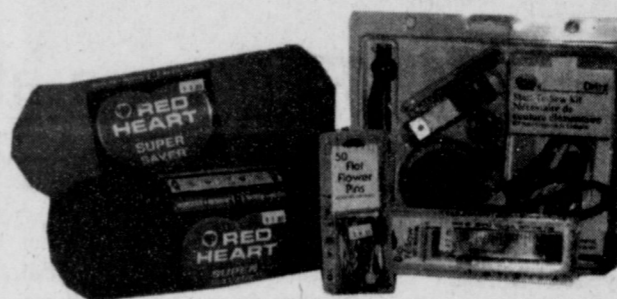

Extension offers Halloween safety advice

Everyone wants to have a safe and happy Halloween for themselves, their guests and their children. The last thing that you want to happen is for your child to be hurt on a holiday, it would forever live in the minds of the child and the family. Using safety tips and common sense can help you make the most of your Halloween season and make it as enjoyable for your kids as it is for you.

There are many ways to keep your child safe at Halloween, when they are more prone to accidents and injuries. The excitement of children and adults at this time of year sometimes makes them forget to be careful. Simple common sense can do a lot to stop any tragedies from happening.

Parents of trick-or-treating kids can get so caught up in the fun themselves that they might forget some simple safety ideas that could save everyone some trouble. Having a fun and safe Halloween will make it all worthwhile.

Below are just a few common

sense tips that can help.

1. Know the route your kids will be taking if you aren't going with them.
2. The best bet is to make sure an adult is going with them. If you can't take them, see if another parent or a teen-aged sibling can go along.
3. Know what other activities a child may be attending, such as parties, school or carnival.
4. Make sure you set a time that they should be home by. Make sure they know how important it is for them to be home on time.
5. Explain to children the difference between tricks and vandalism. Throwing eggs at a house may seem like fun but they need to know the other side of the coin as well, clean up and damages can ruin Halloween. If they are caught vandalizing, make them clean up the mess they've made.
6. Explain to your kids that animal cruelty is not acceptable. Kids may know this on their own but peer pressure can be a bad thing. Make sure that they know that

harming animals is not only morally wrong but punishable by law and will not be tolerated.

Help your child pick out or make a costume that will be safe. Make it fire proof, the eye holes should be large enough for good peripheral vision.

If you set jack-o-lanterns on your porch with candles in them, make sure that they are far enough out of the way so that kids costumes won't accidentally be set on fire.

Make sure that if your child is carrying a prop, such as a scythe, butcher knife or a pitchfork, that the tips are smooth and flexible enough to not cause injury if fallen on.

Kids always want to help with the pumpkin carving. Small children shouldn't be allowed to use a sharp knife to cut the top or the face. There are many kits available that come with tiny saws that work better than knives and are safer, although you can be cut by them as well. It's best to let the kids clean out the pumpkin and draw a face on it, which you can carve for them.

Treating your kids to a spooky Halloween dinner will make them less likely to eat the candy they collect before you have a chance to check it for them.

Teaching your kids basic everyday safety such as not getting into cars or talking to strangers, watching both ways before crossing streets and crossing when the lights tell you to, will help make them safer when they are out Trick or Treating.

Make Halloween a fun, safe and happy time for your kids and they'll carry on the tradition that you taught them to their own families some day!

KACV is continuing its efforts to collect, preserve, and educate about Texas Panhandle residents' World War II stories.

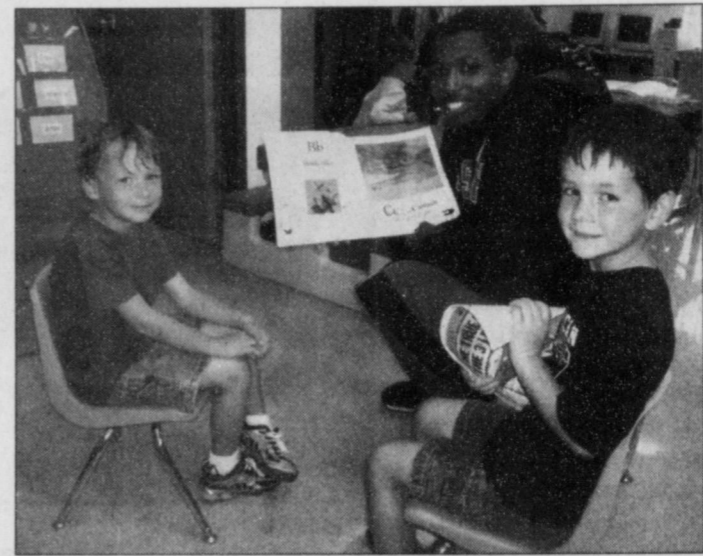

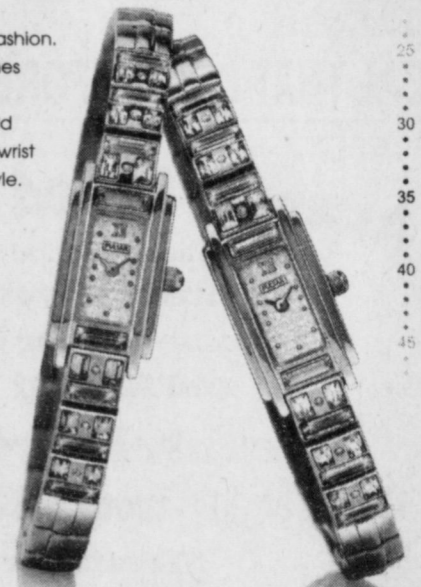

Extension to hold marketing program in Vernon next year

VERNON — How would you like to substantially boost net returns from your agricultural enterprise during the next decade? Sounds like a no-brainer, right?

"We are now recruiting for the 2008 Master Marketer risk management education program," said Stan Bevers, Texas Cooperative Extension economist at Vernon. "In post-training surveys we have conducted, more than 130 Master Marketer participants indicated their gross income increased an average of \$41,239 annually based on what they learned."

"There's no reason program graduates shouldn't receive this level of increased returns for the next 10 years. It's been three years since we hosted the program at Vernon, and in all likelihood this may be the last. For that reason, we encourage early sign up."

The first two-day Master Marketer session at Vernon is set for

January 16-17. Subsequent sessions will be held January 30-31, February 13-14, and February 27-28.

The training costs \$250 per person and includes meals and materials. The registration deadline is January 7, 2008.

The Master Marketer program is national award-winning risk management training that teaches participants how to develop marketing plans, evaluate opportunities, manage production and risk, and execute their risk management and marketing plans.

Participants learn from top industry and university professionals who apply case studies and simulation exercises in the classroom. The 64-hour curriculum is the most intensive marketing and risk management training offered by Extension nationwide, Bevers said.

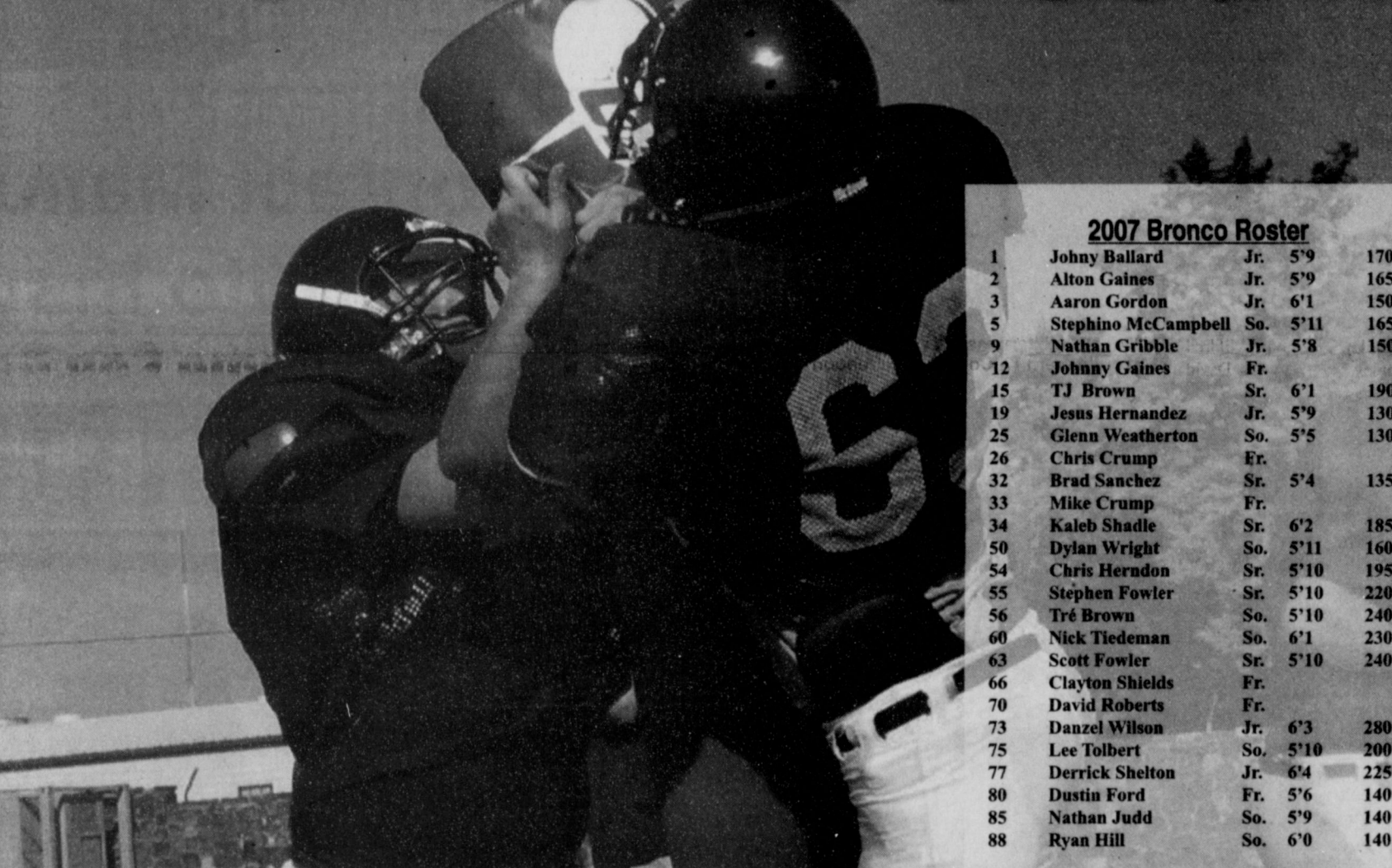
Drugs in the News

Migraine Drug May Help This Addiction
 A drug prescribed for migraine headaches is being evaluated for its possible use in helping persons addicted to alcohol taper off drinking. The drug is *Topamax* (topiramate). According to a study published in the *Journal of the American Medical Association*, a recent evaluation involved 371 heavy drinkers for a period of 14 weeks. About half of the group took Topamax and the other half took a placebo (dummy pill). Everyone was encouraged, but not required, to stop drinking. At the beginning, the average amount of alcohol consumed was approximately 11 standard drinks (wine, beer, or hard liquor) daily. By the end of the study, 15% of those who took Topamax had stopped drinking for seven weeks or longer. Only 3% of those in the placebo group had stopped.

Health experts not involved in the study were encouraged by the results. They felt that if other studies show a similar effect, Topamax may find itself as a treatment option for this hard-to-treat condition. It may offer hope for heavy drinkers who would rather seek help at their doctor's office rather than go to a detoxification or rehabilitation.

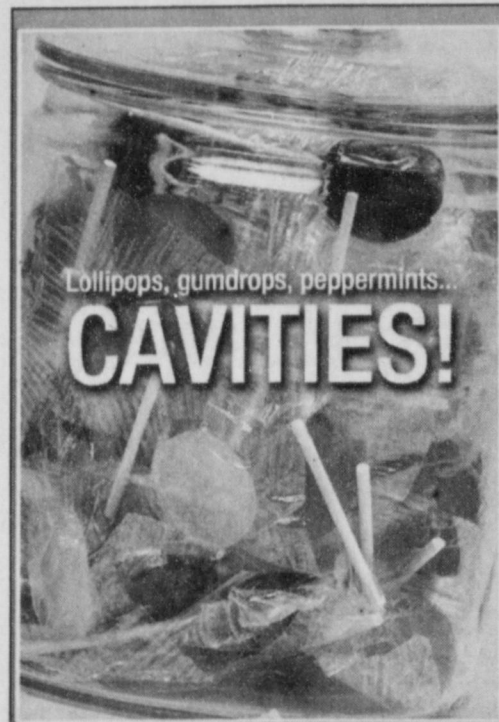
