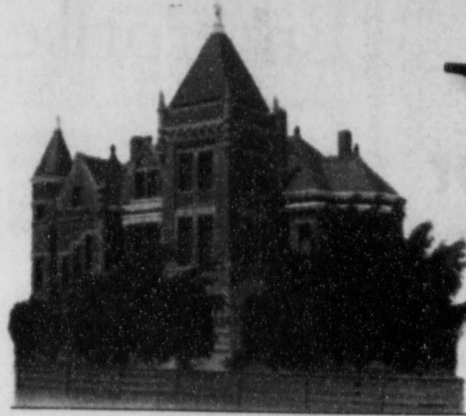

Clarendon ISD to hold registration August 6

Clarendon CISD will be holding registration for elementary, junior high, and high school students in the cafeteria from 6:00 p.m. until 9:00 p.m. on August 6 and 7, 2007.

Students will receive classroom assignments and schedules at this time. The student's parent must be present in order to complete the registration process.

High school students who want a schedule change should come to the high school between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. from August 6 through August 23. Schedules will be considered final after those dates.

It is extremely important that all parents complete the federal lunch form. For those that qualify, students may receive free or reduced priced lunches. CISD needs all parents to complete the form regardless of qualification. This program helps determine funding for the district.

New students to the district are asked to come to the school office between 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. on August 8. Please bring records from the student's previous school, a copy of the student's birth certificate and social security card, and a copy of the student's immunization records.

Property appraisal values show slow growth

Clarendon College Regents received more bad news Thursday when the Donley County Appraisal District reported little growth in taxable property valuations for 2007.

CC officials were already stressed by Gov. Rick Perry's veto last month of more than \$460,000 in state funding for the college and are now faced with a local tax base that is not growing as fast as in recent years.

The appraisal district is reporting a total tax base of \$171,772,641 in the college district in 2007, which includes all of Donley County. That is up less than three-tenths of

one percent over last year's base of \$171,291,227 or an increase of \$481,414.

By comparison appraisals increased \$5.39 million or 3.2 percent from 2005 to 2006 and were up \$5.9 million or 3.7 percent from 2004 to 2005.

Appraisal district officials could not pinpoint any one reason for the slow growth.

"There was basically not much of an increase in any of the categories," Chief Appraiser Paula Lowrie said. "Usually there is a big increase in values for utility properties, but we didn't have that this year."

The value of single-family residences in the county increased from \$69,955,263 last year to \$70,498,197 this year; but other categories, such as mineral values and special inventory values declined.

The appraisal district reported 574,768 acres in either farm, irrigated farm, or pasture production. Values for agriculture property declined from \$144,550,501 last year to \$144,490,225 this year.

The total market value of all property - including personal property - in the college district was reported at \$336.5 million, which is up from \$317.6 million last year.

The total market value is the actual value of property before adjustments, exemptions, and abatements are applied.

The tax base for the City of Clarendon actually shrank from almost \$52 million last year to \$50.8 million this year, but the value of single-family residences in the city rose slightly from \$27.9 million last year to \$28.1 million this year.

The average single-family home in Clarendon is valued at \$33,927 this year.

"Things just are not selling as much over values as they were," Lowrie said. "We also did a com-

plete on-site review of houses in Clarendon. A lot of values went down because of depreciation."

Lowrie said slow growth or a decline in values does not affect some entities like it does others.

"The school is looking at a lower tax rate anyway, but the state is making up the difference," she said. "The city has other means of raising revenues, but the college has no where to go."

Lowrie said that property values will likely look better in the next couple of years as improvements that have been abated begin to come back on the tax rolls.

Thornberry introduces energy bill

WASHINGTON, DC - Congressman Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) has introduced H.R. 3089, the "No More Excuses Energy Act of 2007," to encourage domestic production of energy.

"It is time to take away the political excuses for high energy prices and America's dependence on foreign energy resources, particularly imported oil," said Congressman Thornberry.

"Everyone understands supply and demand. It is time for Congress to quit trying to blame other countries, or the oil companies, or anyone

else for the decisions Congress itself has made."

The "No More Excuses Energy Act of 2007" includes provisions that:

Encourage new refinery construction by requiring the Internal Revenue Service to take action to allow tax exempt bonds to be used for construction of certain refineries, and to make federal lands available for refinery construction.

Reduce green house emissions by offering a tax credit for CO2 captured for use in marginal oil wells.

Boost alternative energy devel-

opment by extending the Wind Production Tax Credit for 10 years.

Lift the Congressional Moratorium on drilling in along the Outer Continental Shelf potentially providing 17 billion barrels of oil.

Open the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge to responsible drilling, potentially producing nearly a million barrels per day for several decades.

Encourage investment in a much-needed industrial base for building new nuclear power plants by reducing the tax burden on that industry.

Local jobless claims reach 5.2 percent

The number of people looking for work has increased, according to seasonally non-adjusted data from the Texas Workforce Commission.

The unemployment rate in Donley County reached 5.2 percent for June with 96 people looking for work out of a workforce of 1,833.

That figure is up from the 3.9 percent unemployment rate in May when 72 people out of 1,765 were out of work.

One year ago in Donley County, 114 people out of 1,934 were out of work, and the unemployment rate was 5.9 percent.

Statewide, the June seasonally adjusted unemployment rate remained at 4.1 percent, unchanged from May, its lowest point since the current series began in 1976.

The unemployment rate is down from 4.9 percent a year ago. Seasonally adjusted nonagricultural employment in Texas grew by 8,300 jobs in June.

Texas employers now have added 213,500 jobs over the past 12 months for an annual growth rate of 2.1 percent.

"This remarkably low unemployment rate reflects the strength of the Texas economy," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chair Diane Rath. "Workers have abundant opportunities as Texas employers continue to expand."

"As I travel across the state, employer confidence is high," said TWC Commissioner Representing Employers Ron Lehman. "We have recorded job growth in 10 of 11 industry sectors over the past year, with only Information showing a slight decline of less than one percent."

Financial Activities gained 1,100 jobs in June, contributing to an annual job growth of 10,900. Mining continues to maintain the highest annual job growth rate at 9.2 percent, adding 600 jobs during the month.

"With job growth comes opportunities for Texas workers to expand skills sets and advance their careers," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Ronny Congleton. "This opens up positions for entry-level workers, creating a larger, stronger Texas workforce."

Enterprise earns first place plaques at WTPA

THE CLARENDON ENTERPRISE WON two first place plaques and finished third in the hunt for the title of the best small weekly newspaper in West Texas during the West Texas Press Association's 2006 Better Newspaper Contest.

The awards were presented to the ENTERPRISE during the WTPA's 77th annual convention in Ruidoso, New Mexico, last Saturday.

In addition to the first place awards, the local paper received one second place certificate and two third place certificates in Division D (weeklies with circulations of 1,800 and below).

The ENTERPRISE received first place in the General Excellence competition, and Roger Estlack was awarded first place in the Column Writing category for pieces on the birth of his first son and the death of his father.

Second place honors were awarded to the ENTERPRISE in Photography and third place recognition for Editorial Writing and Feature Writing.

This year's Division D Sweepstakes Award went to the ELDORADO SUCCESS, and second place Sweepstakes went to the Big Lake Wildcat. Both papers are published and edited

by outgoing WTPA chairman Randy Mankin.

"Randy puts out two quality newspapers, and he is an innovator in the newspaper business," Estlack said. "He has been out in front of most papers in Texas in terms of digital delivery of the news, and he is very deserving of every award he gets."

Accepting awards on behalf of the ENTERPRISE were Ashlee Estlack and Anndria Kidd.

Also during this year's convention, Roger Estlack was recognized for his work as the president of WTPA during 2006-2007 and was elected to serve as the organization's board chairman for the coming year.

Earlier this month, Estlack was appointed to serve on the board of directors of the Texas Press Association by TPA President Phil Major of Henrietta.

Brownwood publisher Bob Brincefield chaired the Ruidoso convention and succeeds Estlack as president of the West Texas Press Association.

Attending this year's convention and representing the ENTERPRISE were Roger, Ashlee, and Benjamin Estlack; Anndria Kidd; and Michael Newhouse.

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CISD Trustees offer two contracts

The Clarendon ISD Board of Trustees met in regular session July 16, 2007, in the CISD Functional Living Center.

Budget amendments were considered and approved.

Clarendon Elementary Principal Mike Word reported to the board the results of the early reading assessment given to each kindergarten, first grade, and second grade students. He also reported the results of the third grade students. He presented the progress of CISD students and on the assessment plans for 2007-2008.

A motion to continue participating with Texas Association of Public School (TAPS) Property and Liability Fund for Property/Casualty Insurance Coverage was approved.

Salary and stipend schedules for the next two years were approved as presented, and travel reimbursement guidelines were also approved as presented.

Trustees accepted the 2007-2008 Student Code of Conduct and reviewed and acknowledged the 2007-2008 Campus Student Hand-

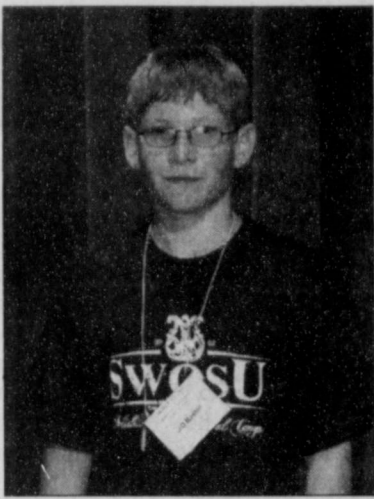
books and the 2007-2008 Athletic Student Handbook.

The 2007-2008 Teacher Professional Development Appraisal System (PDAS) Calendar and the list of Teacher Appraisers for the 2007-2008 school year were approved.

The board authorized a copier rental proposal by Xerox. The copier rental will be placed through the Texas State Procurement Commission (TSPC) as part of the state rental contracts.

The board voted in favor of employing the following persons as recommended by Superintendent Monty Hysinger: One Year Probationary Contract, Linda Forrest - Family Consumer Science, and One Year Probationary Contract, David Lowrie - High School Science, subject to science certification through an alternative certification program.

Hysinger took the board members present on a tour of the campus to discuss current conditions, future needs, and future renovation possibilities.

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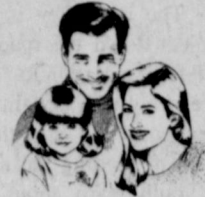

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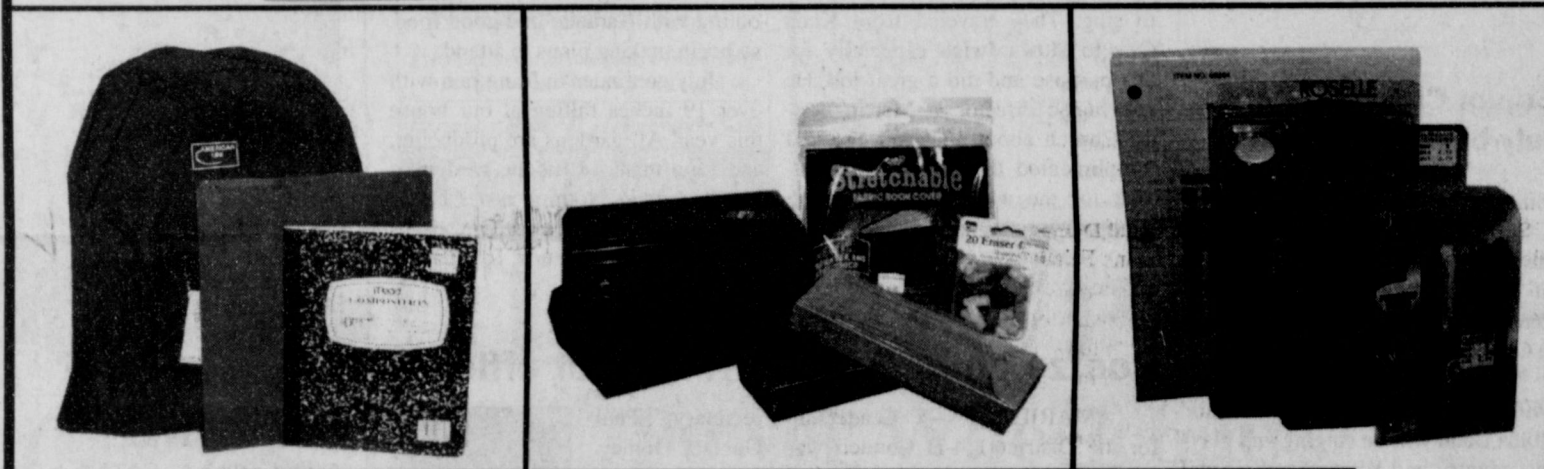

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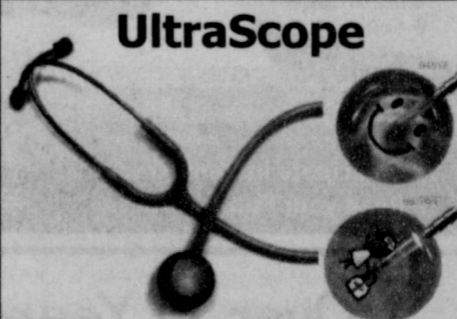

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CC Regents hear accreditation report

The Clarendon College Board of Regents met in regular session July 19 to take action on several items. Regents considered and approved changing the college calendar to reflect the LVN pinning date on Friday, December 16, 2007.
A contract was awarded for janitorial services at the CC Pampa Center. The new service will cost about \$19,000 but will save the expense of hiring an employee and paying benefits.
The bid for athletic insurance was awarded to the college's current vendor, and the board renewed CC's property and casualty insurance with the Texas Association of School Boards.
A letter of engagement with Fox, Byrd, & Company was accepted for the 2006-2007 audit.
The board discussed campus security for the coming year and directed Interim President W.R. Auvenshine to discuss current security provisions with the Donley County Sheriff's Office.
Auvenshine reported that CC has received full accreditation from the Southern Associations of Colleges and Schools (SACS) for its distance learning programs.
"This allows Clarendon College to offer up to 50 percent of a person's degree through the Internet," Auvenshine said.
College officials also reported that the residence halls are already full for the fall semester with more students being added to a waiting list.

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Drugs in the News

New Drug Approved for Sleep Problems
The FDA recently approved a new oral drug for three conditions associated with excessive sleepiness in adults. The drug is Nuvigil (armodafinil), a slightly modified version of Provigil (modafinil), another sleep disorder medicine. Conditions for which Nuvigil may be used include excessive sleepiness associated with narcolepsy, shift work, and obstructive sleep apnea. The drug targets the sleep area of the brain and is considered safer than stimulant-type drugs, such as amphetamines, that are sometimes used for these same conditions. According to news reports, when the drug becomes available in the US, which could be up to 3 years away, it will be provided in 3 strengths to make use of the drug easier in all these conditions. In addition, the company that makes Nuvigil says it plans to study its use in other conditions such as bipolar disorder and for sleepiness in persons with Parkinson's disease.
For persons with shift work sleep disorder, it will be recommended that Nuvigil be given once daily about an hour before the start of the work shift. It is not taken during sleep hours, nor is it intended as a replacement for sleep.
