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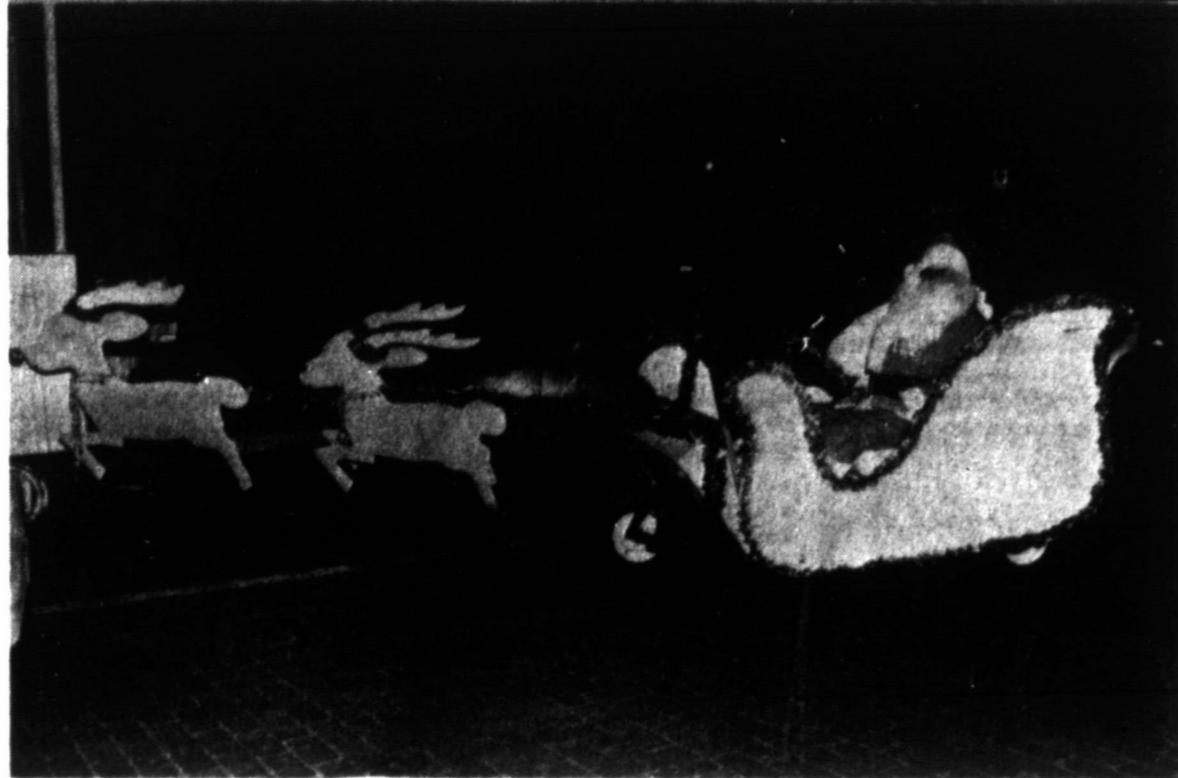

## Windbreak seedling trees available at DCSWCD

Landowners wanting to plant seedling trees for windbreaks, shelterbelts, erosion control and other conservation type planting may place orders now for trees through the Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District.

The evergreen trees available are Afghanistan pine, Austrian pine, Pinon pine, Ponderosa pine, Scotch pine, Arizona Cypress, Eastern Redcedar, Rocky Mountain Juniper, Blue Spruce.

Hardwoods available are Honey Locust, Pecan, Green Ash, Chinese Elm, Cottonwood, Golden Willow, Hackberry, Russian Olive, Lombardy Poplar, Aspen and Desert Willow.

Shrubs available are Caragana,

Cotoneaster, Honeysuckle, Lilac, Plum, Sumac, Sand Cherry, Nanking Cherry and Sage.

These trees are ordered for you from the Texas Forest Service and Colorado Forest Service. We will also be able to get Cheyenne, Shoshoni, and Wichita Pecan trees from Wheeler County.

Properly planted windbreaks help reduce the high winds and snow drifts this winter. Tree windbreaks increase the value of farm or ranch and also reduce fuel costs.

Trees also provide homes and escape cover for livestock and wildlife, or they can be turned into cash crops as fence post, firewood and Christmas trees.

Bronco Basketball

The Clarendon boys basketball team defeated Hedley in their first basketball game of the young season, 46-28. The Broncos playing tight defense allowed only three Owls to score. The Bronco offense came alive scoring 28 points. Randy Crump and James Ariola led scorers with 10 and 9 points. James Ariola led in rebounding with 14. Wes Hatley had 4 assists and Randy Crump was the defensive player of the game.

On November 22, Valley defeated the Broncos 67-61. In the first half, the Broncos had 15 turnovers that turned into too many Valley points, but in the second half, the Broncos came alive scoring 36 points, having only 3 turnovers and holding Valley to 28 points. Russell Alexander was the defensive player of the game. Randy Crump had 32 points and 8 rebounds to lead the Broncos. Wes Hatley had 10 points. Brent Hayworth had 8 assists.

The Broncos were defeated in the third game of the year by Panhandle 33-53. The Broncos had a good first quarter but scored only 5 points in the second and third quarters. In the fourth quarter, the Broncos outscored the Panthers 19-10. Randy Crump and Russell Alexander led in scoring with 8 points each. Randy Crump had 17 rebounds and was the defensive player of the game. Clay Sharp had 3 assists.

"This team is going to get better as we gain more experience. Most of these players are off last years junior varsity team," said Coach Loveless.

This weekend the Broncos play in the Wellington Tourney. Their opening game is Thursday against Samnorwood at 5:30. A Bronco victory would mean a Friday game against River Road at 5:30. Tuesday, December 10 the Broncos play Claude at 8:00 p.m. in Clarendon.

The boys junior varsity basketball team lost its first two games of the year. In the first game, the Broncos

were defeated by Valley 33-22. A tall Valley team controlled the rebounds and the Broncos made only seven field goals. Danny McCampbell turned in the best all-around game. Jay Gage, Danny McCampbell, Shawn Hermesmyer, and Todd Phillips had four points apiece. Todd Phillips had 5 rebounds.

The Broncos lost the second game to Panhandle 22-36. The Broncos got a slow start scoring only 9 points in the first half. In the second half, the Broncos outplayed the stronger Panthers and outscored them 14-13. "When these young men play well for a whole game they will be tough to beat," said Coach Loveless. Shawn Hermesmyer, Todd Phillips, and Danny McCampbell had 6 points apiece. Shawn, Todd, Jason Klinert, and Randy Gaines each had 5 rebounds.

Tuesday, December 10 the Broncos host Claude at 4:00 and on Thursday, Dec. 12 they travel to play in the Childress J.V. Tourney.

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# From The PEN of PASTOR PINION



## THE PHILOSOPHY OF EDUCATION (Continued)

In our discussion of the Philosophy of Education we have used as our models the public school philosophy of education which is "Progressive Education" and the Christian school philosophy which is "Traditional Education." In my last article I presented to you a brief history of Traditional Education. This week we want to look at a brief history of Progressive Education.

Progressive Education has its roots back in the early 1900's when a psychologist by the name of William James introduced what he called the pragmatic method. The pragmatic method maintained that nothing was of value to an individual unless it was useful to him. The pragmatic method denied the existence of absolutes of any kind, including the existence of God. John Dewey, while teaching at Columbia University, adopted this philosophy and used it as the basis of progressive education. Progressive education said, and still says, express yourself. Do your own thing. Get rid of your inhibitions. The individual is no longer important; it is the group that counts. Knowledge for the sake of knowledge is useless. You learn only by experience. Competition in any form is taboo. Nationalism is a dirty word. The American way is not the best way. If it satisfies a want, it must be right. This philosophy, when carried to its conclusion, results in no authority, no absolutes, no standards, no discipline, little or no character training, precious little education, and a multitude of educational failures - the "new math" and the "sight memory" method of reading, to name just two.

I believe that the strength and greatness of America today are being sapped by a godless liberal theology and a God-denying progressive philosophy of education. The two are heading hand in hand in the same downward direction.

We as Christians are quick to recognize liberalism in the areas of politics and theology. I think it is about time that we recognize liberalism in the field of education, mark it for what it is, and then avoid it.

Next week we will look at a comparison of the two philosophies.

## GOING STEADY Part 5

Someone has said, "Life is just one fool thing after another and young love is just two fool things after each other."

It does seem that falling in "love" brings about some strange actions and or reactions in young folks. True love is a wonderful, marvelous thing which defies description. It is something far beyond what has been depicted on the motion picture screen. It is more than sentiment. It is more than mere emotion. It is far more than simple physical attraction. It is much, much more than lust or desire. True love involves sacrifice and surrender. Furthermore, true love involves God, for God is Love. No one can know much about real love until he has come to experience the love of God.

Young love is sometimes called "puppy love." It is said of puppy love that it just leads to a dog's life. Such seems to be the case all too often. Many more times than not teenage romances disintegrate into a gruesome mess. What started out to be beautiful music becomes strident discord. What seemed like moonlight and roses becomes glowworm and skunk cabbage. Why? The one big reason is that teenage years are changing years.

We have been discussing the popular teenage pastime of going steady. One big disadvantage seems to be the fact that most teenagers are not emotionally nor mentally ready for such an intimate relationship. This is especially true in the society in which we live. One reason for the high divorce rate is the immaturity and inability to cope with responsibility on the part of thousands of young Americans. Most of today's teens are not ready to try to handle the special problems involved in going steady.

Let me list and comment on some other disadvantages.

1. No other dates. By limiting yourself to one boy or one girl as your steady date you automatically miss the wonderful opportunity of getting to know well many fine young people, their ideas, ideals and opinions. You limit your base of social contacts, and thereby stunt the growth of your own personality.

2. Miss out on some happy occasions. When your steady is ill or away and a dating function comes along, you miss out because the rules say you must not date someone else.

3. The green-eyed monster. Possessiveness seems to go along with going steady. Fight it as you may, you find jealousy filling your heart every time you see your steady with someone else - be it boy or girl.

4. Natural changes. The teen years are changing years. Bodies change. Minds change. Emotions change. Ambitions change. These changes may take place slowly and methodically or suddenly. Your steady may be the epitome of all your ideals today but six months from now both you and your steady may be very different.

5. Familiarity. The closeness of the going steady relationship often does two things which may lead to serious consequences. First, it weakens and breaks down natural barriers. Just by being together constantly you and your steady build a kind of premature trust in each other which leads you to believe that nothing you do together could be wrong. Secondly, it strengthens

temptation. The combination of these two factors has been the downfall of young folks in every walk of life. It has led into sin and ruin.

6. Emotions. When emotions control thought and action, there is sure trouble ahead.

7. Narrow base of selection. One of life's most important decisions is that of who your life's partner will be. Why limit your selection?

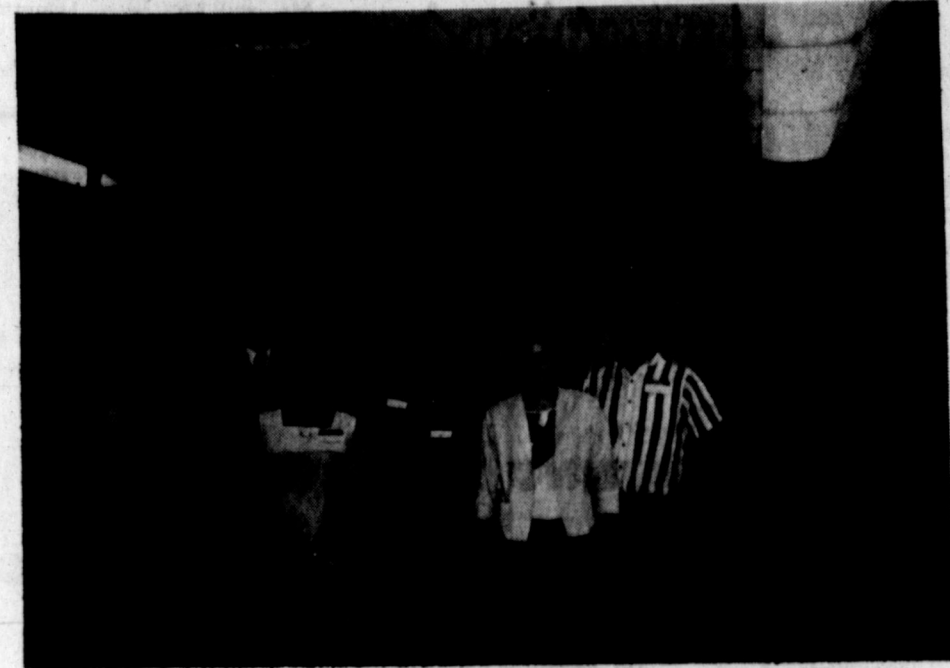






**Don't leave lights unattended.** Never leave your Christmas tree lights or outdoor decorative lights unattended. Be sure to unplug them when you go to bed or leave the house. Another wise safety precaution is to check all outdoor and tree lights BEFORE you decorate. Discard strands with frayed wiring and replace burned out bulbs.

**Avoid hanging ornaments on lights.** Make sure paper ornaments and tinsel do not touch light bulbs. Also, never adjust outdoor or tree lights while they are turned on or connected to a power circuit. Always use a wooden ladder or a metal one with rubber-tipped legs when installing outdoor lights. Be sure to stand on a dry surface.

**Never overload circuits.** Avoid overloading electrical wiring by using more than one circuit for your Christmas tree lights. Use heavy-duty extension cords to run to other circuits.

**Look for the U.L. seal of approval.** Only buy lights that have been checked for safety. The Underwriter's Laboratory's seal of approval is your guarantee that lights and wiring have been properly safety checked.

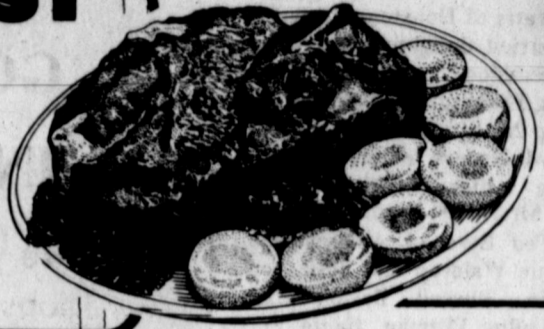

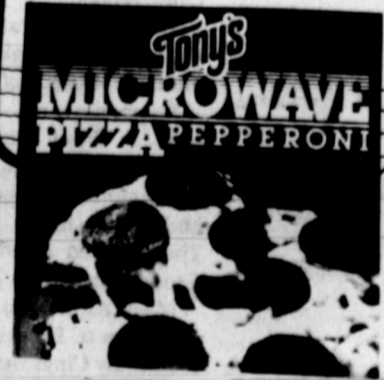

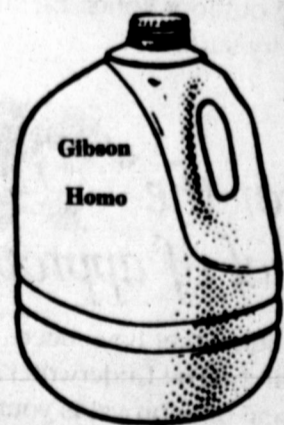

## Texas begins war against litter problem

It's a mess the size of Texas. And it cost Texans a whopping \$20 million to clean up last year.

If that sounds like garbage -- that's because it is. That's what it cost Texans last year to clean up trash on the state's highways and byways.

And the \$20 million figure does not include the tax dollars spent by city and county governments in clean-up efforts.

To some, it may be litter, but the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation calls it "trash".

In mid-November, the department will begin its very first all out war against trash. The battle plan calls for a three-pronged program that includes a media campaign aimed at habitual litterers, a statewide community beautification and clean-up program, and incentives for increased law enforcement.

"This is the first program of its kind in Texas, but with litter pickup increasing at the rate of 15 to 17 percent annually, trash on the side of the road has become an unacceptable drain on our budget," said J. Don

Clark, Director of the Information Services Section.

"There simply are better ways to spend that money, such as repairing roads and streamlining our highway system," said Clark.

To understand the problem better, the department, in late August and early September, initiated extensive research to determine who litters and why.

"To mothers of young men, the results are probably not surprising," said Betsy Todd, vice president of GSD&M Advertising, the firm hired to design and implement the media campaign.

"Our research showed overwhelmingly that in Texas, the habitual litterer is male, and primarily between the ages of 18 and 34. We also found that the age groups of 10 to 17 and 35 to 44 contribute their fair share," Todd said.

"Those who drive pickups in these age brackets, in particular, cause a disproportionate amount of litter. Pickups are involved in approximately 27 percent of all acts of littering; therefore, we have to com-

municate with these people," said Todd.

The advertising campaign for the highway department is designed to speak directly to the habitual litterers. Well-known Texas celebrities like George Strait and Johnny Rodriguez have already agreed to help.

Their message is "Don't Mess With Texas".

"It's certainly a switch from other slogans like 'Pitch In' and 'Don't Be a Litterbug,' but the research proved we needed a bold, aggressive message," Clark said.

The State will do follow-up research next August to determine if the campaign has been effective in reducing the estimated half-billion pieces of trash found this August during the visible litter count.

The research proved that the vast majority of Texans, even the habitual litterer, do not approve of littering. But almost all admit to littering from time to time.

"If we can get people to think before they throw trash on the side of the road, we are convinced we can reduce Texas litter," Clark said.

And if litterers are not convinced by the message, the increased law enforcement may help jog their consciences.

"The next time a Texan throws trash before he thinks, we want him or her to remember the price in terms of natural beauty and tax dollars," Clark said.

Besides, the fine for littering has been raised to a maximum of \$1,000. For those not worried about the State's budget, a \$1,000 hit to the personal budget may be a better incentive to use a litter receptacle rather than the roadside. "Messing With Texas" could get mighty costly.

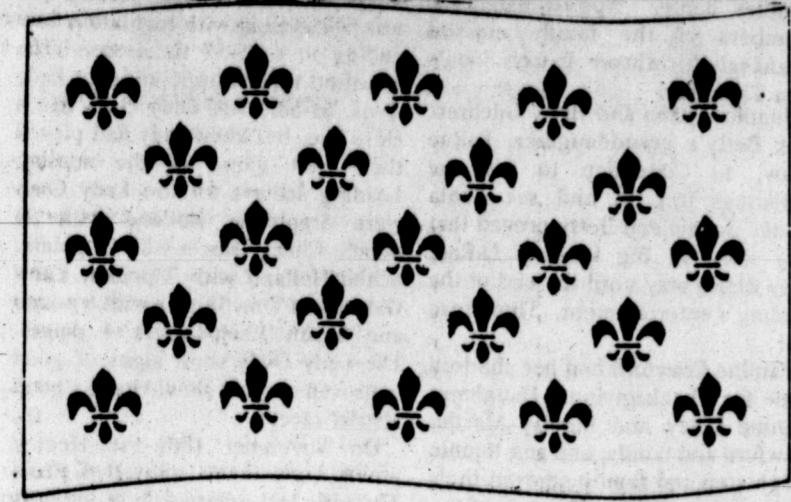

**TEXAS UNDER FRANCE**  
1685-1690

Planning to expand its base from French Louisiana, France took a bold step in 1685, planting its flag in eastern Texas near the Gulf Coast. Although claimed by Spain, most of Texas had no Spanish presence at all; the nearest Spanish settlements were hundreds of miles distant. French nobleman Rène Robert Cavalier, Sieur de la Salle, founded a colony called Fort St. Louis. But the effort was doomed by a series of calamities: shipwreck, disease, famine, hostile Indians, and internal strife resulting in La Salle's murder by one of his own company. By 1690, France's bold claim to Texas had evaporated. The French flag features a host of golden fleurs-de-lis emblazoned on a field of white, which was actually the French merchant-marine banner of the period.
