

Today, America once more celebrates its Independence, for it was July 4, 1776, one hundred and sixty four years ago, that we started out as a free and independent nation giving to all the right of American freedom.

And today, Independence still stands for the liberties and privileges we enjoy and for the sacrifices which made them possible.

We, the people of the United States, should pause and give thanks that such freedom still exists and no longer hinges on the wars which have wracked Europe in centuries past.

We should be doubly thankful for the Declaration of Independence which freed us from the domination of European whims and struggles. Especially is this so today, at a time when the whole European continent is in the midst of one of the most violent upheavals in its history.

Faced with that upheaval, however, we see ahead a new struggle for independence. Confronted by the prospect of a Europe dominated army and navy, but without any by the wrong kind of taxes, by by Hitler's totalitarian philosophy, we find we must face the problem of acquiring economic independence of the Old World. There will, of course, be political and diplomatic considerations, but the most serious problem is that which will stem the inevitable attempts of Hitler to gain a foothold in the economy of Latin America.

It will cost lots of money and require great sacrifices. But if the program succeeds and we win this new fight for Independence and the democratic ideology, it will not be too high a price to pay.

They must be preserved. It would be a bitter and ironic victory if, in order to defeat an enemy, we sidetracked the system of free enterprise and the personal liberties which distinguish the American way of life from the tyrannies of Europe and Asia.

Let's keep this country American. Government experts and civilian authorities are studying how to provide for our actual defense and each citizen's part in it. Meanwhile, the rest of us can help by doing our work, whatever it is, as well as we can.

Now the same citizens actually petition the highway department to by-pass their town.

They realize at last, say engineers, that most highway traffic s non-local and through travelers will not stop to buy gasoline, hot dogs, soda or anything else they can get most anywhere on their route. Then too, cross state arteries add to traffic hazards in community.

The practice of the highway department is to build good spur roads from new highways to towns when they are taken off the main roads. This is no inconvenience to local and regional travelers who need to reach the particular town.

Currently the department is by-passing San Marcos through which U. S. 81 winds a tortuous path which often adds 15 minites to north-south motoring time. New Braunfels and Waco on the same highway have been by-passed. Motorists in south Texas can whiz past Alice on U. S. 281, with nothing but a side for the town. The same holds for Goldthwaite, Mullen and Kileen on U. S. 190 and





Water Saves Labor No Place as Much as At The Farmhouse

COLLEGE STATION, June 25. - A tendency to consider a farm home water system a luxury and not a labor saving device is gradually becoming overcome in Texas, according to M. R. Bentley, agricultural engineer for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service.

He cites the paradox that while water is the most necessary and useful item around the home, many families give little attention to making the water supply convenient. "Probably the heaviest work around the farm house is carying in water or carrying out waste water. This heavy work may be lightened greatly by the installation of a kitchen sink with water piped to it and a waste pipe to dispose of waste water", he says.

Contrary to popular belief, a simple water system of this type does not cost a great deal.

HOT WEATHER

ADVISED ON SUPPLYING SUFFICIENT MOISTURE FOR PLANTS

COLLEGE STATION - July and August, months when most of Texas receives scant rainfall confront thousands of gardeners with the propin of supplying sufficient moisture for plants. Annuals and perennials, in order to produce flowers, must have an ample supply of water during this period, and shrubs and trees set out during the year which have not yet established the Council of National Defense good root systems often need assistance in order to survive the driest part of the year.

To gardeners beset with these problems. Sadie Hatfield, specialist in landscape gardening for the A. & M. Colleve Extension Service, offers these suggestions: Moisture for summers growth

of plants should be retained by frequent cultivation or by supplying a mulch of rotted straw or leaves

If irrigation is used it should be supplied liberally and slowly about once in ten days. Then it should be conserved by culti-

Removal of competing plants will leave moisture for desirable plants.

Supplying semi-shade for proplants will prove valuable A practice semi-shade for pro-

tection of cuttings or other young plants will prove valuable A practice common among many flower growers of sprinkling the top of the ground ev-

ery morning is particularly dis couraged by the specialist. Light sprinkling causes roots to seek moisture near the surface where they are easily killed and are likely to be injured by winter






