

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GOLDEN POSSIBILITY FOR DONLEY IN 1941

For nearly twenty years the oil industry aided and abetted by courageous wildcatters have sought to locate the "mother pool" of oil in the Panhandle.

Many fine pools have been tapped and millions profited but the verdict has been that the "mother pool" has not been found.

Came the depression with its serious effects on oil prospecting, as in all other lines, and years have slipped by with no solution to the two notable occasions. mystery as to where the huge Midas pool might be.

Nearby counties have contributed their share of the marketable oil in this section of Texas, but so far there has been no production in Donley County. On a few occasions some very favorable showings have been found in Donley tests, but as interest lagged the encouragement has been pigeonholed for the time.

Today the picture is changing. The world war and its concommittant demand for more oil means that the industry is beginning to stir itself to provide new sources for the golden fluid. This is borne out by the steady procession of siesmograph crews in this and other unproven territory. There is large rumor that something "big" is about to come to Donley.

HIGHWAY PATROL

The highway patrol has quit the practice of saying "be care

Every driver should test Smithey Lloyd Hunt, Clora brakes for simultaneous gripping Hahn, Doris Jean Wallace, Peg- and have tire chains ready for use when needed; check condition of windshield wiper and defroster; make sure lights are in Pierce, Billy Jack Taylor, Mike good condition, even during the day, if needed to be seen in fog falling snow or sleet.

"On snow or ice keep speed down and the car in gear. Avoid situations requiring quick stops and sudden changes in direction. Speeds on ice should not be excessive even with the protection of tire chains.

"Chains or sand provide a much needed safety factor on Percival, Faye Poss, Clyde Price, ice, making 20 miles per hour reasonably safe. Without them the same speed is extremely hazardous and speeds well below 15 miles an hour are imperative. The common practice of lowering tire pressure gives only slightly more traction, and this s more than off-set by increased tendency to sideskid and skid on curves. It also damages tires, making them more susceptible to blow-outs after much opera-

tion under reduced pressure. "Non-skid tread tires are definitely helpful on dry and wet pavements and to a very limited extent on fresh, loose snow, but they give no more anti-skid protection on packed snow or ice than smooth tires. Tire chains are the best self-help for passenger car motorist. are vital for driving on ice and on snow - especially on hard packed snow. Chains on rear wheels alone will reduce stopping distance on ice 40 per cent, and if used on all four wheels 52 per cent. Chains provide a higher percentage of help on ice than on snow, but stopping distances are longer on ice than snow. At 20 miles per hour, for example, average stopping distances without chains are 68 feet on packed snow, and 169 feet on ice. With chains on rear wheels and at the same speed, the average stops are 40 feet on packed snow and 88 feet on ice. These reductions, however do not warrant normal high speeds possible on dry pavements. They provide a needed safety which should not be dis-

"On wet and even dry pavements, always anticipate ice on bridges, in shaded spots, around curves and over hills, and when thawing temperatures are dropping. On ice start by releasing the clutch slowly, with the engine idling and the car in second gear, and accelerate cautiously to avoid spinning rear

"Without chains or sand on an icy road it is unsafe to overtake vehicles unless the road ahead is clear for a half mile. Pump the brakes in stopping, even with chains, to prevent wheels from locking and sliding on rubber between cross links Slow down in gear to about ten miles an hour then release the clutch for the final stop. Keep steady foot on the accelerator to avoid spinning the rear wheels If a skid starts, turn the front wheels in the direction the rear is skidding - if possible.

'When it is slippery, try ou the brakes occasionally to ge the feel of the road. Maintain adequate vision through windshield windows. Circulate fresh air by opening cowl ventilator, rather than side windows, which in old cars tends to suck exhaust gasses through floor boards."

For pedestrians: Walk slowly and carefully, a fall may incapacitate you for weeks. Don't rely on ability of the motorist to stop on snow and ice. If he



TREE PLANTING IN **AREA TO BEGIN** IN JANUARY

The Forest Service will begin planting Shelterbelts in the Shamrock Area which includes Donley County, in early January, if weather condtions are favorable according to James W. Kyle, acting district officer.

It is reported that trees will not be available for all the belts applied for as Kyle says trees are available for approximately 125 miles of belts and the indications are at this time that many more than this will be requested. The acting district officer says that never before has there been the wide spread interest in Sheltrbelts that is being shown this year. He also states that the Forest Service will continue to accept applications as they are filed so long as trees are available. When it is known that applications cannot be acted on this spring county agents and newspapers will be notified and all future applications will be carried over to 1942.

Kyle says the keen interest in Farm Windbreaks is recognition of the Department of Agriculture's effort to conserve the soil and moisture in the plains states. The farmers are beginning to plant trees to keep their sandy soils from blowing and also protect their crops from

EIGHT FROM HERE ATTEND HIGHWAY FETE AT PAMPA

Eight Clarendon good road enthusiasts attend the Pampa highway banquet last Thursday night and heard General Robert Lee Bobbitt, member of the State Highway Commission, tell a crowd of 275 persons that the state road program would be secondary to defense roads.

attending from here were. Donley County Commissioners Garland Reeves, Carl Peabody and John Hermesmeyer, County Judge R. Y. King, G. T. Redding, Allen Bryan, Sam Lowe and Odos Caraway.

Bobbitt said that despite the need of building more roads in Texas, the state's requirements will be secondary, if need be, to the war department's urgent demand that the highway system of the United States be adapted for national defense.

The banquet was the highpoint of Pampa's observance of Texas Highway Week, December 2-7, proclaimed by Governor W. Lee O'Daniel.

County officials from Wheeler, Donley, Carson, Hemphill, Hut-chinson, Hale, Hall, mayors, city managers, and Plains legislators were among the special guests introduced, preceding Bobbit's The highway commission offi-

cial explained how the war department regarded Texas roads as a vital unit in the scheme of national defense and was asking that all roads over the nation be adapted to military needs, that they be strong enough to support military traffic. General Bobbitt further ex-

plained how the Texas Highway department was financed, how small was the percentage of funds available from national sources that found its way into Texas roads, after national needs had been provided for

To maintain the present highway system of Texas alone, without building any more roads, would require 19 years to make the present roads up to date, the general said. There is \$8,500,000 appropriated for maintenance of

In this connection the general emphasized that dirt roads as well as improved highways had to be maintained

"Good roads make good education possible. The road system of Texas and the free public schools are the two agencies of government closer to the people than any other.'

Recalling the Texas Highway department's history, Bobbitt gave a brief outline, telling how it was started in 1917, only 23 years ago, when there was only a "sprinkle" of paved roads, all these around the big cities.

While serving as speaker of the house, Bobbitt saw the onecent gasoline tax passed. It created quite a sensation at the time, the general said. Now the tax totals 5 1-2 cents, of which of 1 1-2 cents is a federal tax.

From the federal tax Texas receives back between eight and nine million dollars.



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

Not always have the collectors of susuriuos interest been known monly applied to them, but their basic methods have changed little through the years, writes Edmund Travis, widely known Texas newspaperman, in a brochure, 'A Century of Usury in Texas,' published this month by The Cordova Press, Inc., Dalles.

This 72-page booklet is the most comprehensive work on its subject that has yet appeared in Texas. It includes the history of usury, the law of usury, and the story of all forms of efforts that have been made to eradicate usury. Texas newspapers are commended for the work they have done in exposing the practices of loan sharks.






