> Text: "But Mary kept all these things, and pondered them in heart."-Luke 2:19.

A study of this text is like looking upon a radiantly beautiful face and wondering, what thoughts must be holding sway. We have this difference, however, that we are not left in doubt as to what, "These things," refer.

Let the Angel announce, it, and the Heavenly Chorus sing! Behold I bring you tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior. which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you: Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a

"And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying, Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace, and good will toward men."

The Shepherds to whom this wonderful message was given made haste to go to Bethlehem to see for themselves what had come to pass.

The sky poured its brilliance into a star as a signal to Wise men in the East that a new King was born. They, too, came to worship him and to offer their gifts of "Gold, frankincense and

Who would not know that Mary was overwhelmed with the wonder and mystery of it all? She undoubtedly was filled with awe in the midst of her joy, over the birth of this baby, whom the angel had never been heard on land or sea. What did it mean to have lowly men and great men coming to worship her child?

We can imagine that her mind turned back to the Annunciation when she had said to the angel, "Behold the handmaid of the Lord; be it unto me according to thy word," and with that sublime trustfulness, she placed "These things," in the treasure house of her heart, where holy sentiment and the beautiful are enshrined for-

This event, this night of glories, would not be allowed to drift into dim memories, but Mary would ponder them in many hours of deep meditation. Years in the future she would look into this treasure-house and see the baby of Bethlehem, lying in a manger. She would be awakened at night by dreams of the heavenly host praising God and singing, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, and good will toward men."

What could this all mean — this unusual child — this song of the angels? May we not imagine that her thoughts, would again turn back to the past months-and that she would remember the angel had told Joseph she would have a child and he would be called-"Jesus, for he would save his people from their sins?" It is not too much to say that she saw some of these things come to pass in her own lifetime. We know that multitudes of every generation have been saved by Him. We know that all our worthwhile interest of civilization have been made possible by this Savior of men. We know that the painter and sculptor, has something in His work that goes beyond the mere mechanics. We know that music reaches a long hidden recess in human hearts because of the love Jesus gives. Everything is made better and lovelier because He

Let us like the shepherds and wise men, be sensitive to the things God would reveal, and like them, offer what we may have to give. Let us like Mary in awe and thanksgiving, receive the "Mystery of the Divine" to be kept in our hearts and pondered over through the years to come.
