

As a personal beneficiary of Sir Frederick G. Banting, who was killed this week in an airplane accident up in Canada, this editor desires to pay tribute to one of the high achievements of medical science of the century—the discovery of insulin which has brought life, health and happiness to thousands of diabetics the world over.

Dr. Banting, a modest young Canadian physician, made the eventful discovery in 1922, and in 1923 was knighted and given the Nobel prize for his contribution to science. Today there is scarcely a village in the whole world where one or more diabetics do not use daily his life-guarding remedy of insulin. Only in the prison camps of Germany, is there a shortage of this necessary suppliment to health balance.

Ingratitude, we are told, is the greatest sin of the modern world, but this editor feels enormous gratitude to Dr. Banting for his discovery. Without it this pen would have been stilled several years ago With it, we probably have little short of the normal span of life-insofar as diabetes is concerned. We laud Dr. Banting, and we deplore his passing. The world can ill afford the loss of such a man as he.

In this connection, let us say that American industry producing insulin has reduced the price from time to time as volume and improved methods were discovered, until insulin is within the reach of everyone. Thus science and democracy work for the benefit of the masses.

Let us give renewed support to free enterprise and Democracy which alone promotes constructive progress through science.

> Inching up prices, not by leaps and bounds but just a gradual raise of a cent here and a cent there, is what will happen in Texas if the "Fair Trade Act," is introduced in the Texas Legislature by the Representative from this district, Richard Craig of Miami, and Representative Arthur Cato of Weatherford.

This is not new legislation for Texas. Such a bill, only not near so sweeping in powers of manufacturers to raise and control prices, was passed by the last legislature and vetoed by Gov. O'Daniel when the Attorney-General advised him that it was unconstitutional.

We have no doubt but what the bill in its present form is constitutional for it is the product of one of the most power ful lobbies at Austin manned by a lobbyist that knows all the tricks of his trade with the financial backlog of the big, rich manufacturers of the east at his beck and call and use.

The Fair Trades Act as introduced by Craig and Cato does not limit the retailer to a minimum price for resale of commodities. It says that "The buyer will not resell except at the price set by the vender. This means that not only the producer can set retail prices, but it also gives this power to wholesalers and

re defined as growers, bakers, makers, manufacturers or pubishers. Commodity is defined as any subject of commerce.

Advocates of the Fair Trades Act make a great ado about such legislation being for the benefit of the independent merchant. This great United States has been built on the principal that "Competition is the life of trade." Would it be independence if the manufacturer, the wholesaler and the jobber had the power to tell every Texas retail merchant sell merchandise?


