BUG CARRIES EQUINE SLEEPING SICKNESS

COLLEGE STATION — Dr. C. H. Kitzelman of Kansas State College reported recently to the American Association of Economic Entomologists that a blood-sucking insect that feeds on horses, mules and other animals in the west carries equine encephalomyelitis, or horse sleeping sickness. The office of information to the United States Department of Agriculture quotes Dr. Kitzelman that this constitutes the first case in which neurotropic virus had been isolated from an insect in nature.

had been captured in pastures where horses had died of the sleeping sickness were ground up and a filtered, germ-free extract from their bodies was injected into guinea pigs. The guinea pigs developed symptoms of encephalomyelitis and died. The virus able to cause the disease in other guinea pigs was isolated from their bodies. The insect is known in Kansas as the "Mexican bed-bug."

The horse population of Texas increased from 686,442 in 1935 to 714,000 in 1936, or a total gain of more than 28,000. A like increase in the number of mules and mule colts was noted for the same period.

Comment On Fair Trades Acts

P.M. New York City's non-advertising and impartial newspaper, has just concluded a series of stories showing how that state's so-called Fair Trade Act has drained millions of dollars yearly from New York consumers by inching up prices.

Inching up prices, not by leaps and bounds but just a gradual raise of a cent here and a cent there, is what will happen in Texas if the "Fair Trade Act" is introduced in the Texas Legislature by the Representative from this district, Richard Craig of Miami, and Representative Arthur Cato of Weatherford.

This is not new legislation for Texas. Such a bill, only not near so sweeping in powers of manufacturers to raise and control prices, was passed by the last legislature and vetoed by Gov. O'Daniel when the Attorney-General advised him that it was unconstitutional.

We have no doubt but what the bill in its present form is constitutional for it is the product of one of the most powerful lobbies at Austin manned by a lobbyist that knows all the tricks of his trade with the financial backlog of the big, rich manufacturers of the east at his beck and call and use.

The Fair Trades Act as introduced by Craig and Cato does not limit the retailer to a minimum price for resale of commodities. It says that "The buyer will not resell except at the price set by the vender. This means that not only the producer can set retail prices, but it also gives this power to wholesalers and jobbers.

Producers or manufacturers are defined as growers, bakers, makers, manufacturers or publishers. Commodity is defined as any subject of commerce.

Advocates of the Fair Trades Act make a great ado about such legislation being for the benefit of the independent merchant. This great United States has been built on the principal that "Competition is the life of trade." Would it be independence if the manufacturer, the wholesaler and the jobber had the power to tell every Texas retail merchant the exact price at which he could sell merchandise?

If this Fair Trades Act is passed as it now reads, Texas retail merchants will have no voice in determining their margin of mark-up to take care of overhead, profit and loss. The manufacturer, wholesaler or jobber will just say this item will cost you Mr. Merchant, 80c and you must sell it for just what we say or to jail you go.

We agree with Jim Carroll, secretary of the Texas Merchants' Association, when he said, "This is the most outrageous attack of the rights of the consumers of Texas in our legislative history."

Merchants of Ochiltree county, if you don't want the power to set selling prices of your merchandise taken from you; and consumers of Ochiltree county, if you don't want to pay higher prices for every commodity... write your representative and senator protesting this so-called Fair Trades Act that the big manufacturers are attempting to saddle on the people of Texas at a cost of millions of dollars annually from the pockets of the consumers. — Herald, Perryton, Texas.

It isn't by accident that for years Hitler has promised his people an inexpensive car. If he could make that promise good so that almost every family in the country had its own little automobile, it would make more difference than all the territorial conquests in the world."

PHYSICAL FITNESS EMPHASIZED AS PATRIOTIC DUTY

AUSTIN — "The practice of medicine is frequently referred to as the 'healing art.' While this conception of the duties of the family physician is and always will be vitally important, it by no means necessary for one to be ill in order to benefit from the services of which he is capable. To limit one's interest in the family physician to the care of sickness is to disregard entirely his capabilities in connection with the attainment and maintenance of the highest possible individual vitality," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"The present emergency is emphasizing the need of physical fitness. All-out preparedness, with the stresses and strains associated with high speed production of war materials and the yet unknown factor of personal cooperation in the defense program which may be required of every one sooner or later, no longer makes half-way individual health measures exclusively a personal concern. While neglecting to achieve maximum personal health has always been an unwise policy, this attitude, in light of the present emergency, represents also a lack of patriotism."

"It may be stated that today's armed forces have improved their preventive health measures so that the man now meeting the physical requirements and joining the service will belong to a highly protected segment of the nation's population from the standpoint of both disease prevention and health promotion. Nevertheless, the majority of Americans, however closely related their work now may be or may become to national defense, are not favored by this unusual protection. Thus, individual initiative will have to be relied upon instead. It is at this point that a full appreciation of the services that can be rendered by the family doctor can be applied to individual and national advancement. As a discoverer of latent physical defects, he has at his command information and modern methods of detection.
