Bagworm

Control Important

Bagworms are one of the major pests of junipers and other trees and shrubs in Texas. Spring hatch begins in mid-May in the Lubbock area this year and is now almost complete. Insecticide control is most effective in late May and early June when the bagworms are small, says County Extension Agent Tanksley.

In the spring, bagworm larvae emerge from hatching eggs inside last year's bags and begin feeding on leaves. They soon begin to

construct their own protective bag of silk, twigs, and leaves, making them comouflaged and hard to see. As the larvae and their bags continue to grow, control becomes more difficult.

Bagworms feed throughout the summer months, building their bags until the bags are about one and one half inches long, Tanksley adds. In the fall, the bagworms become adults, mate and the females lay eggs inside their bags. They then overwinter in these bags in tree shrubs. Each overwintering female bag on a tree contains from 500 to 1500 eggs.

"Since the bagworm only completes one generation a year and spreads very slowly from plant to plant, picking the bags off infested plants in the winter will help a lot toward controlling this pest," says Tanksley. "But if bagworms were present on the plant last year and control measures were not applied, chances are very good that an insecticide will be needed this spring.'

Insecticides which can be used to control bagworms include sevin, dursban, diazinon, malathion, dylox and orthene. The biological insecticide Bacillus thuriengensis can also be used. To obtain effective control, adds Tanksley, through coverage of the foliage important. He reminds to always read and follow label instructions when applying

insecticides.

'Some of the reasons for the crops looking so good include the recent timely moisture which was large enough an amount, with some supplemental irrigation, to benefit climate producers. Good conditions for crop emer-

ence and growth is another factor helping the producer With a cotton base of 175,000 acres,

Tanksley estimates that cotton is planted on 140,000 to 150,000 acres in the county. Cotton is emerging in five to seven days, according to

Tanksley, who is attributing the fast germination and emergence to ideal weather conditions for cotton growth. At this time, there is little

to no seedling disease, and the biggest factor for cotton getting off to such a good start being the moisture received.

"We realize the producer has been frustrated by the dry, windy conditions," added county agent, "and that soil erosion has been a problem, along with poor irrigation efficiency and some other problems. But overall, the

county, based on reports I have received," he added, "from about 214 west, from two to four inches of very good rain has been recorded. From 214 east, only

producers have received enough to establish a crop. "Within the next 10 days

"We will begin to see stand reductions, and the cotton in a stress situation." With 97 percent of the

cotton in the county planted, and from 75 to 80 percent of the cotton emerged, the crop is up and to a good stand at this time. The county agent says believes the 'heavier than usual' planting of cotton is due, in much part, to the continued drought in other surrounding counties to the south and east of Bailey County.


Tanksley says most of the counties have not yet received enough moisture to plant their crops, so county producers believe the mar-

ket will be stronger this fall. "At this time, we see a lot of the producers beginning to cultivate their fields in the irrigated areas and they are beginning to work on the weed problems in their fields. commented Tanksley.

Some 22,000-25,000 acres of corn have been planted in Bailey County, and the county agent says the corn is "in excellent condition across the county.

"Most of it is in the eight to 10 leaf stage, and are developing very Farmers are laying by their fields, and expect to begin irrigation on their crops within the next Tanksley says that when the corn gets to the 10-14 leaf stage, the water need is

The county agent reminded that wheat took the brunt of the cold and drought until May when the beneficial rain was received.

He said the lack moisture will be resulting in reduced yields in both irrigated and dryland wheat crops. Some dryland wheat has been grazed out, cut for hay, or plowed up and abandoned because of the blow-out and poor yield potential. Where the irrigated wheat received adequate moisture, wheat should be excellent, he said.

Tanksley expects the dryland crop to be reduced by 25-50 percent, as the May moisture was too late to benefit that crop.

In some areas, roads in the county have become impassable due to the blowing and drifting sand, and these are some of the problems facing farmers, who are also finding deep sand in their fields. It will take time to work these problems out, explained Tanksley.

"But, the county farmers' attitudes are good, they are working hard despite being so affected by the weather and the low markets. They figure these are minor pro-

There are no bad insect or disease problems at this time for the farmers, accord-

ing to Tanksley's survey. Nearly 10,000 acres of alfalfa are planted in the county and the producers are making 'up and down' yields in their first cutting. The alfalfa producer has been affected by the high wind and lost a lot of water to evaporation and blowing away without reaching their

However, yields are one half to two tons per acre in the first cutting and if the ideal weather conditions hold, they should find very good yields in their next cutting.

Tanksley reminded that statewide, hay is in very short supply, and suggests that all farmers producers who have hay to sell, contact the ASC office and put their name on the list to be mailed to potential buyers all over the state.

Tanksley says young potatoes are blooming now, and are setting very early. They will be harvested during the next six weeks, with the young potato crop reported to be in excellent condition and high yields expected.

Other vegetables are still very small at this time.

Livestock and range conditions are not so good at this time, according to the county agent. He said some producers have been forced to market their cattle early or reduce their main cow-

He expects range conditions to still be throughout this year, and up to a year necessary for the
