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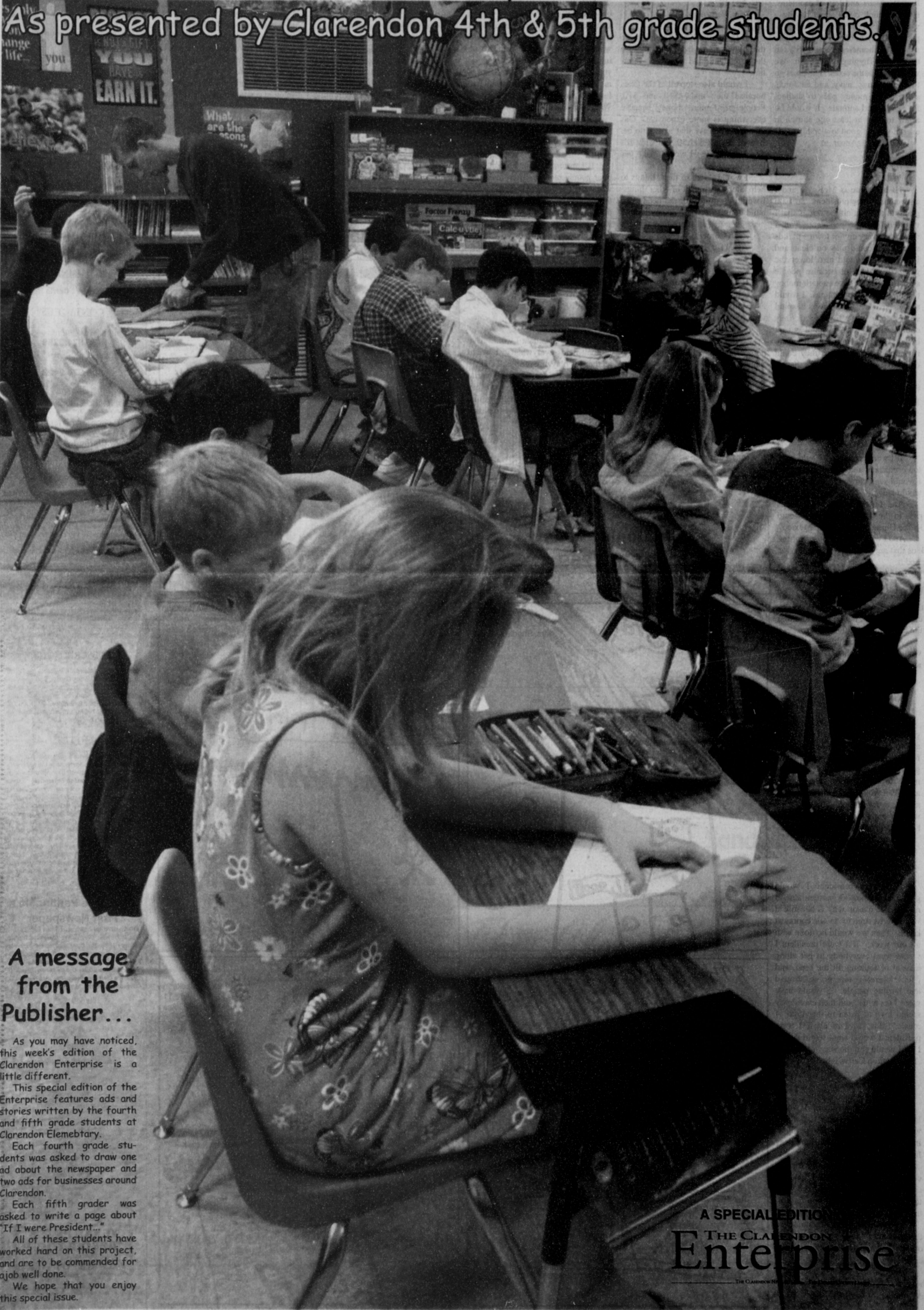

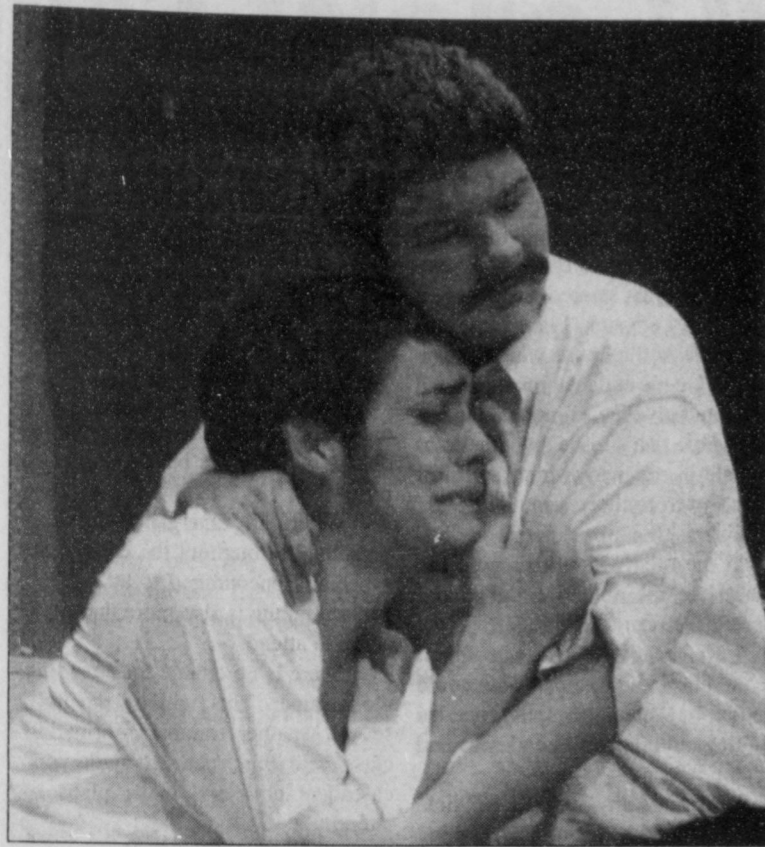

COLLEGE STATION - When their country calls, Texas Aggies go to war. To honor thousands of Aggies who have served and sacrificed in all branches of the military over the past 100 years, the Texas A&M University Corps of Cadets and Corps of Cadets Association have donated a copy of *Texas Aggies Go to War* by Henry C. Dethloff with John A. Adams Jr. to every high school library in the state of Texas, a donation totaling nearly 1,800 books.

Texas Aggies Go to War celebrates the school's distinctive Corps of Cadets and its military contributions while honoring the individual sacrifices of its members. Those students who read its pages will find a comprehensive account of the distinguished war record of Texas A&M.

The stirring stories in the book include the horrific experiences of some of the eighty-seven Aggies who were stationed at Corregidor and

Bataan on December 7, 1941; the perils of five Aggies who participated in the raid over Tokyo with Jimmy Doolittle; the heroics of the seven leaders of the Ranger assault at Normandy on D-Day; and examples of vigorous support and devotion to duty given by Aggies in Korea, Vietnam, and the Middle East.

In the foreword, George H. W. Bush states, "Since the university's founding in 1876 Texas Aggies have provided exemplary leadership and service to their state and their country in peace and in war....*Texas Aggies Go to War: In Service of Their Country* is a remarkable story, one that makes me value and admire my adopted university all the more."

The donation of these books will ensure that students across the state can be inspired by these Aggies' stirring stories of selfless service, integrity, excellence, loyalty, and leadership.

Flu shots are recommended and available

Flu shots are recommended and available

The Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) will be giving flu shots at the Texas Department of State Health Services office in Clarendon, from 9:30 a.m. to 11:45 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. on April 10.

The Clarendon DSHS office is located at 5 Medical Drive

The DSHS officials are reminding people that it is still important to take precautions against getting the flu. Flu shots are recommended and currently available.

"Getting a shot is the one best

way to prevent flu, which can cause serious sometimes deadly complications," said Dr. David Lakey, DSHS Commissioner. "The flu shot together with simple precautions such as washing your hands frequently, covering your cough and sneeze, and staying home when sick are good ways for people to protect themselves and their families from infection."

Flu season typically runs October through March, and flu shots can be given at any time during this period or later as long as the vaccine has not reached its expiration date.

There has been a regional

increase in flu cases within the past month and flu is currently widespread throughout Texas. The peak for flu illnesses in Texas is usually January and February and could run longer.

Flu vaccine is currently available, and no one will be turned away for being unable to make the \$10 donation request. The flu shot takes about two weeks to become effective.

Flu is a viral respiratory illness. The illness is spread when an infected person coughs, sneezes, or talks, releasing the contagious virus into the air.

Children make easy victims for internet predators

Most children know more about the Internet than their parents do. This knowledge gap keeps parents in the dark about their kids' online activities. As shown in the statistics below, parental supervision in cyberspace is dangerously lax:

Pornography is the #1 seller on the Internet! Over 100,000 sites offer child pornography illegally.

Of the illegal internet sites, the number one age group of men who look at pornography on the internet is 35-45; and the number two age group of men is 13-17.

There is not a definite age group for females. Internet pornography is read and purchased evenly across all ages.

The largest consumer (that means they have paid money for an item) is in the 12-17 age group of

both female and male.

25 percent of parents do not supervise their children's internet use at all. Only 52 percent of parents moderately supervise their children's internet use. How do you moderately supervise? Either you supervise or not.

An estimated 62 percent of teens report that their parents know little or nothing about their web activities. 71 percent of all parents stop monitoring their child's use of the Internet after the child turns 14, not knowing that 72 percent of all Internet-related missing children are 15 years of age or older.

Internet predators take advantage of the lack of responsible adult supervision of children using the Internet.

The key is monitoring your child's Internet activity. Make sure

you and your child know what to watch out for on the Web. Remember, because of the anonymity offered by the Internet, people you meet online may not be who they claim to be. Encourage your children never to share personal information about themselves on the Internet.

Smart Web Parents can protect their kids by doing the following: Keep the computer in a family room so that you can monitor their computer usage.

Talk to your children about the dangers of the Internet. Stress that the rules you set are to protect them, not control them. Make sure your child understands they need to be careful online.

Install an operating system that makes you the administrator. For example, in Windows XP or Mac OS X, create a password that will allow

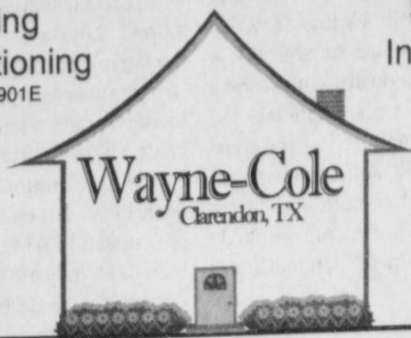
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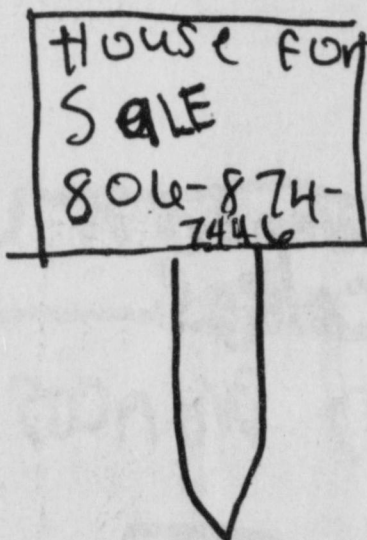
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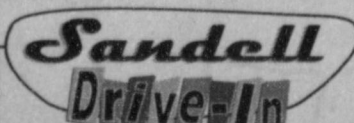

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Drugs in the News

New Uses for Cholesterol-lowering Drug
A popular cholesterol-lowering drug called Lipitor (atorvastatin) is back in the news. The manufacturer recently announced that the FDA had approved five new indications for this drug. These include indications for reducing the risk of nonfatal heart attacks, strokes, certain types of heart surgery, hospitalization for heart failure, and pain in the chest related to heart disease. According to news releases, these new indications will allow physicians to prescribe Lipitor for persons with existing heart disease. The approval of these five new indications is based primarily on the results of two studies. In one of these studies, persons who took 80mg experienced significant reductions in heart-related events and the risk of hospitalization for heart failure compared to those who received only 10 mg of the drug. Lipitor is the most commonly prescribed cholesterol-lowering drug. Although Lipitor is very commonly prescribed, it should not be used by persons with liver problems or women of child-bearing age or women who are nursing. The most common side effects are mild and include abdominal gas, constipation, and heartburn.

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
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Clarendon Broncos continue dominance on the diamond

Singles player Dominique Mason lost 0-8 to Perryton in the first match, and Billy Ceniceros lost 3-8 to Gruver.

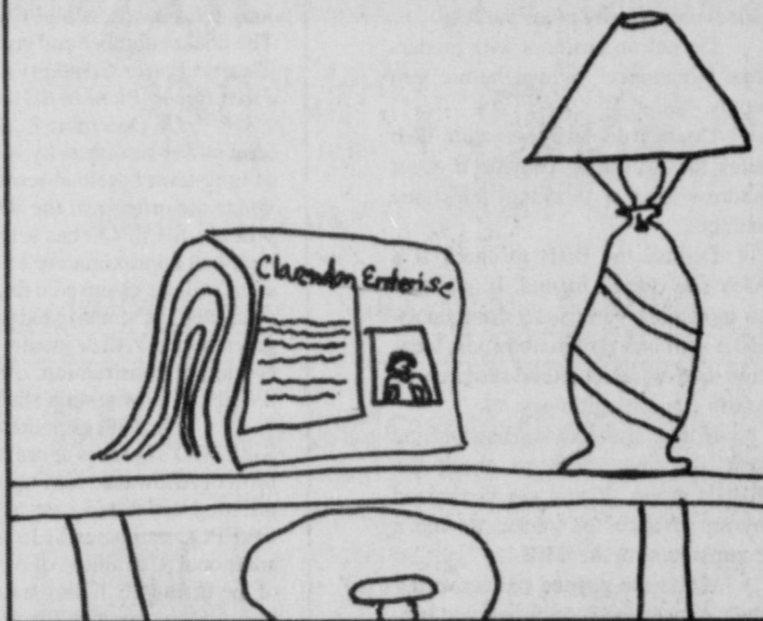
Despite the losses, Coach Colby Waldrop was pleased with the effort. "This was only our second meet," Waldrop said. "We will have our district match this weekend."

Better Business Bureau warns of impersonation

The Better Business Bureau system warns of a proliferation of Web sites that are impersonating legitimate lenders to steal money from consumers. Victims across the U.S. and Canada report losing money, sometimes more than \$1,000 each. The Web sites in question promise loans to anyone, regardless of the person's previous credit history.

"People with the poorest finances are being victimized. Many mistakenly believe they have no other option," said Janna Kiehl, CEO of the Better Business Bureau.

According to BBB experience, victims used Internet search engines to locate lenders that "guaranteed" low-interest rate loans for people with bad credit histories. After submitting the online loan application, they were contacted by a company "representative" who said they were approved.

Before they can receive their loan funds, however, they must first pre-pay a fee. The loan applicant is told to wire the money or send a money order, usually to a location in Canada. The consumer never receives the loan and cannot recover their money. They also risk having their identity stolen if they provided their Social Security number or bank account number.

"These bogus lenders are clever.

They use a variety of tools to imply legitimacy," Kiehl warned.

Intrest (sic) Plus Financial used a Milwaukee address that was home to a legitimate company, not affiliated with the scam lender.

Statewide Capital Group falsely claimed to be located in Omaha and presented a sophisticated Web site offering a variety of lending services at low rates.

Lloyds Financial Group used a false street address in East Peoria. Its Web site promised debt consolidation, personal loans and business loans "regardless of the person's previous credit history."

Home Guard Funding Ltd. (a.k.a. PeachState Financial Services) fraudulently claimed the BBB of Central Georgia's address in Macon as its own.

Advance fee loan scams are illegal in the U.S. and Canada. To avoid detection, fraudulent loan operators move quickly, frequently reopening under new names.

"If you have trouble qualifying for a loan, you do have options. There are nonprofit organizations in every state with trained credit counselors who can assist individuals with debt problems,

Contact the BBB (www.amarillobbb.org) for tips on selecting a trustworthy credit coun-

selor," Kiehl suggested.

BBB suggests some do's and don'ts to avoid bogus loan web sites.

Do not use online search terms like "bad credit loans" or "guaranteed loans" that may lead you to fraudulent sites.

Do not wire money or send a money order to secure a personal loan. Legitimate offers of credit do not require an up-front payment of a fee for collateral, processing, insurance, taxes or any other purpose.

Do not do business with lenders that "guarantee" a loan before you apply.

Do not do business with Web sites that refuse to provide a street address and a working telephone number.

Do use the BBB to check if a Web site can be trusted. In addition to informing you of any complaints, BBB staff can visit the business location and conduct other research to verify a site's legitimacy.

If the site has a BBBOnline seal, do click on it to check the BBB's report. If you are victimized by an advance fee lender, do file a complaint with the BBB.

While the chance of recovering the payment fee is minimal, your experience will help BBB's warn other consumers and assist government investigations.

On February 20, 2007, Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO) filed a petition with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) requesting Certificate of Convenience and Necessity (CCN) authorization for a nominally-rated 600 MW ultra-supercritical coal-fired power plant to be located in Hempstead County in southwest Arkansas. As part of its long-term electric supply resource plan, SWEPCO has determined that it needs to obtain additional long-term capacity and energy supply resources in the near future. In an effort to meet these long-term needs, SWEPCO selected this generating unit through a competitive bidding process. The docket number and style of the case are PUC Docket No. 33891, *Application of Southwestern Electric Power Company for Certificate of Convenience and Necessity Authorization for a Coal-Fired Power Plant in Arkansas*. SWEPCO is not seeking to change its rates in this proceeding.

On December 8, 2005, SWEPCO issued a market-based, competitive solicitation for long-term power resources by way of a Request for Proposals (RFP). The RFP solicited up to 600 MW of long-term baseload resources to be available by the summer of 2011. Based on an evaluation under the criteria in the RFP, along with the oversight by the independent monitor of the RFP process, SWEPCO has selected a nominally-rated 600 MW ultra-supercritical coal-fired generating plant approximately 15 miles northeast of the City of Texarkana, Arkansas. The plant's emissions will be cleaned using Best Available Control Technologies. SWEPCO was the entity that submitted the winning bid proposal for this facility in response to the RFP. Three other entities have given notice of their intent to participate in the ownership of the generating plant, subject to the execution of construction, ownership and operating agreements, for a combined total of 160 MW. SWEPCO's ownership share is thus expected to be 440 MW.

The total estimated direct cost of the entire plant is approximately \$1.343 billion, of which SWEPCO's share is approximately \$0.986 billion. When the \$231 million of carrying costs in the form of Allowance for Funds Used During Construction (AFUDC) are added to SWEPCO's share, the total estimated cost to SWEPCO is approximately \$1.2 billion for the plant. In addition, SWEPCO estimates \$136 million of transmission investment will be necessary, together with an additional \$21 million of AFUDC on that transmission investment. SWEPCO's total estimated cost of the facility including transmission and all related AFUDC is \$1.374 billion. The plant unit will be built by American Electric Power Services Corporation (AEPSC) as SWEPCO's agent, and all AEPSC goods and services will be supplied at cost.

SWEPCO requests that its CCN be amended to include the generating plant described in this filing. SWEPCO has already made similar filings with the Arkansas Public Service Commission and the Louisiana Public Service Commission.

The deadline for intervention in this proceeding is April 20, 2007, and a letter requesting intervention should be received by the Commission by that date. CORPUS CHRISTI - A booming scrap metal market and the dramatic increase in wire thefts had AEP Texas officials very concerned. AEP Texas is asking customers and the public to report any suspicious activity near the company as well.

"We are seeing an increase in thefts of copper and aluminum wire from facilities across our AEP Texas service territory," said Lou Villagoomez, AEP Texas Regional Security Coordinator. "This creates serious safety hazards and service reliability issues for our company and for our customers. We want to raise public awareness of the dangers and consequences of this activity. We also

are taking action to apprehend and prosecute these thieves as we work hand-in-hand with local law enforcement."

Not only is this type of activity extremely dangerous, it is illegal. AEP Texas is working with law enforcement and businesses that process scrap metal across the state to identify and recover equipment stolen from its facilities. These efforts already have resulted in the recovery of some materials and the arrest of individuals suspected of committing the thefts.

The company says it also is deploying new security technology around its facilities and substations,

and making procedural changes to how it stores wire and equipment not already in use.

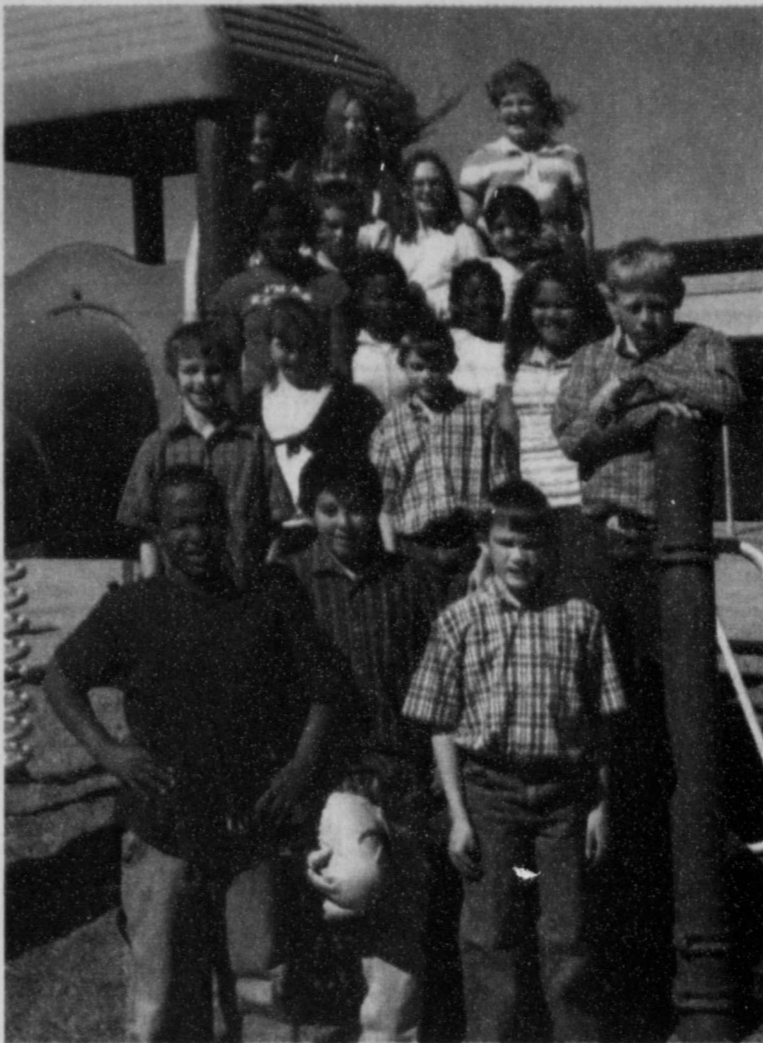
