Wildfires burn more property last week

Local firemen had their hands full again last week as parts of Donley County were consumed by flames.

Two separate fires destroyed two structures and threatened several homes, according to Clarendon First Assistant Chief Jeremy Powell.

An April 5 fire in Howardwick's Saints' Roost Division started about 1:30 p.m. and was caused by an electrical short on a power pole, Powell said.

The blaze burned a travel trailer, a pickup, and a storage building and consumed four to five acres; but it could have been much worse.

"If the wind had come from the north and the fire had jumped that road, it could have gotten into some people's homes," Powell said.

Clarendon and Howardwick firemen worked for four and one-half hours to contain the fire.

The next day, the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department dispatched two units to Gray County in a mutual of Pampa and gave that community assistance for about eight hours.

The same afternoon, a downed Homer Hardin place near County Road K on SH 70 and eventually destroyed an estimated 5,000 acres.



Rep. McKinney does disservice to US Congress

US Representative Cynthia McKinney tried to give Capitol Police a lesson in "good touching" and "bad touching" but ended up apologizing when faced with possible criminal charges related to assaulting an

The Georgia Democrat, who is black (not that

it should be important), was stopped by security officers the afternoon of March 29 when she sidestepped a metal detector upon entering the Capitol build-

Now this is not out of the ordinary for members of Congress, who frequently don't have to live by the rules they set for the rest of us like paying into

the Social Security scheme, etc. Representatives and Senators just flash their nifty lapel pin and breeze right through the security checkpoints. On this day, however, Rep. McKinney wasn't

wearing hers, and the police officer didn't recognize her as a member of the esteemed United States Congress. He asked her to stop and go through the metal detector. Witnesses say she ignored his requests repeatedly, and then the officer put his hand on her shoulder. McKinney then reportedly turned around and went psycho on the man and hit him in the chest with

Later that evening, she apologized and called the incident "unfortunate," but she was soon singing a different tune and claiming the whole thing was racial profiling. Apparently the policeman should not assume that she was not a member of Congress just because she wasn't displaying the proper identification and had changed her hairstyle so that her appearance was not immediately recognized.

When asked about the incident by several news shows, McKinney repeatedly blew off the whole thing as "much ado about a hairdo."

It's not clear whether Rep. Patrick McHenry has changed his hair style or not, but the North Carolina Republican told reporters that he is routinely stopped by Capitol Police any time he is not wearing his ID pin. He did not charge that he was being stopped just because he is white but rather accepts it as a "due course of security."

McKinney, however, has a history of making every issue into a racial one. She is cut from the same cloth as Representatives Shelia Jackson Lee, Eleanor Holmes Norton, and Maxine Waters - loudmouth women who do little to serve their constituents other than to moan, whine, and hurl unfounded accusations.

The "racial profiling" in this case disappeared suddenly when McKinney was reportedly confronted by 21 black members of Congress, who apparently told her to put a sock in it so as to not interfere with the Democrats' own ranting about national security.

One wonders for how many more decades our country will have to endure people like McKinney before we get past issues of race. Certainly there are racists in America, but it's doubtful that they are so nearly prevalent as McKinney would have us believe. And McKinney making up charges of racism when she is just too lazy or too arrogant to follow proper procedure only weakens her position when there are real issues of race to be discussed.

Since the incident, McKinney has been praised as "competent, courageous, and committed" by Rev. Darrell D. Elligan, who is the president of Concerned Black Clergy, in speaking with the Associated Press.

"She has our support unconditionally," Elligan said. "She is not a threat to the security of our coun-

Perhaps she is not a threat to our nation's security, but she is a disgrace to the United States Congress, which is saving a lot.

America needs more people who can rise above race and look directly at issues of character, integrity, dignity, and honesty. Sadly, Cynthia McKinney falls short when it comes to all of those qualities.

Howardwick and Donley County suffered a major blow Sunday morning. The death of volunteer fireman James McMorries was a shock to the system, one that drives home how precious life is and how dangerous the job of a fireman is.

James McMorries gave his life to help others, and for that his family can take great pride and, hopefully, some small measure of comfort.

I'm sorry to say that I didn't know Mr. McMorries very well at all since he was a relatively new resident of our county. My father and brother had done some electrical work for him, but my own personal experience was limited to two meetings of the Al Morrah Shrine Club. And yet for having known him for so short a time, I already thought of him as a friend.

My wife and I sat across from James and his wife, Tanis, at one of those meetings. He was full of life and full of joy. There was a sparkle in this plain Texan's eye, and he spoke with obvious excitement and anticipation about settling into retirement and enjoying many years to come entertaining his grandchildren.

But cruel fate had other plans, and James' time on

this Earth was cut short.

After walking around the perimeter for 15 minutes, we had found neither the cache nor a viable plan for entering the com-


pound. The fence was impenetrable.

Drug plan enrollment deadline nearing

I am sure most of you have heard something about Medicare Part D, the new prescription drug coverage for seniors. All Medicare beneficiaries are eligible for it. It is a voluntary benefit. No one is required to take it. However, an important deadline is coming up for those who would like this coverage.

The first enrollment period for Medicare Part D ends May 15, 2006. If you are currently on Medicare - and you want to add this benefit - you must enroll by that deadline to avoid a possible penalty. Those currently eligible for the benefit could be charged higher premiums if they sign up

after May 15. Almost 28 million people across the country are already enrolled and receiving the new prescription drug benefit. In our congressional district, approximately 60 percent of those eligible have signed up for

The Department of Health and Human Services estimates this coverage will save seniors an average of \$1,100 a year on the cost of their medicines. Some retirees will save significantly more than that average. But, Medicare Part D does not give enrollees all of their medicine for free. And, it is not a typical "one size fits all" government

program. It is insurance provided by private companies with part of the cost paid by the government. Like other insurance, there are premiums, deductibles, co-pays, and other costs.

Medicare Part D could be a big help for those with very high drug expenses. Under the standard plan, once a beneficiary's out-of-pocket drug expenses for one calendar year reaches \$3,600, they will be required to pay just 5 percent (or a small co-payment) for the rest of their drug purchases that year. All of their other drug purchase costs will be covered by the plan.

There is also extra assistance available for those with a low income. For Medicare beneficiaries who meet the eligibility guidelines, the savings on drug purchases will be substantial. Millions of low income Medicare beneficiaries could pay no more than \$5 per prescription.

The prescription drug benefit will help many people, but it is still important to remember that it is not mandatory.

You may decide you do not want it. You may already be receiving good coverage through another source such as an employer or a union.

If you decide to accept this benefit, you will need to find a coverage plan that is right for you. About 20 organizations have been approved by Medicare to sell plans in Texas. Companies offering this insurance must meet certain requirements such as covering all medically necessary drugs. But, these companies are also competing with each other on things like prices and how benefits are packaged. People looking for the plan that is right for them will need to carefully examine what is offered. In most cases, beneficiaries will be able to change plans once a year.

Hard-to-Treat Skin Condition Studied

Eczema is a skin condition that is caused by genetic link, allergens, or irritants. The symptoms generally include dry, red, itchy skin that can also crack and bleed in severe cases. There is currently no cure for eczema, but treatments help to relieve symptoms. A recent study published in the Lancet found promising results with azathioprine (Imuran) in patients suffering from refractory eczema. Azathioprine is a drug used to suppress the immune system and is commonly used to control the body's immune response in transplant situations and rheumatoid arthritis. The medication was dosed once daily and used in persons who had failed to respond to topical steroids. Although the study found a wide variety of responses, it showed an overall significant improvement in eczema symptoms and quality of life.

Side effects were mild, and the most commonly seen was nausea.
