Deadline approaching for emergency funds

Producers in counties affected by the recent wildfires may be eligible for financial assistance through the Emergency Conservation Program (ECP). The deadline to apply for the cost-share program is May 31.

"One reason the fires in our area were so devastating is that thousands of miles of fences were burned. These funds can help restore those fences, but folks who are interested must apply before the deadline," said US Rep. Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon).

ECP provides farmers and ranchers with emergency funds and technical assistance to rehabilitate ranches and farmland damaged by natural disasters. Producers should contact their county FSA offices for information.

Clarendon well served by Selvidge

The City of Clarendon has been fortunate to have as its chief executive a man who has given much of his life to serving his community in one form or another. Mayor Tex Selvidge has carried out his duties faithfully, and it was with regret that the Board of Aldermen accepted his resignation Tuesday night.

Likewise, it is with sadness that this column bids him farewell as a city servant.

Being mayor is not an easy task, and not just every man or woman is up to it. As citizens we have entrusted Tex - we are all on a first name basis with him - with the duty of administering our city and presiding over

the Board of Aldermen. In fact, in the 105 years since this city was incorporated, no other person has been entrusted with that task longer than he has.

Clarendon was first privileged to have Tex as a city leader in the 1970s, and he served as mayor from 1977 to 1980 - with a stint as an alderman bookending that term. In 1997, this community returned him to office and has reelected or chosen not to challenge him ever since.

One could say that this longevity is due to his popularity, that he knows everyone, and that most everyone likes him. But that would be selling the man

As your correspondent at the city meetings, I have watched Tex deal with tough and complex issues on topics that frequently had no clear answer and more than once split the board. Time and again he would guide the aldermen, point them toward the path he thought was right, and, above all, what he thought would benefit the city.

'We have to keep in mind what's best for our people," he has told them on more than one occasion. "Put aside your personal feelings and do what's best for the people.

And no matter how heated the argument, the board did frequently follow the direction he gave them. It wasn't always unanimous, but that never seemed to bother Tex, at least not publicly. He staunchly maintained that it was fine to disagree with him and that everyone is entitled to his or her opinion.

Let us all remember what Tex has taught us by example about doing your best to work to improve our community. We all owe him a debt of gratitude we cannot repay, and we should all thank him for what he has done for us.

Ode to a Fallen Festival

Longtime readers will recall that back in 2001, your humble editor was overwhelmingly elected as Donley County's first Turkey King. It was the will of the common bird, which was evidenced by the fact that your faithful monarch was chosen not as a declared candidate but by a stealth write-in campaign that turned conventional poultry politics on its head.

Lo, I became even more distressed to learn there would be no transition, no new king to lead our kind. And whilst I did sympathize - nay, empathize - with the busy schedules of those who are the powerbrokers of the poultry part, I felt that something great and grand had been lost and that our great Turkey civilization had fallen as surely and decidedly as mighty

Still I summoned the courage that had been vested in me by my fellows lo those many years ago and, feeling it incumbent on a bird of my station, made a brief appearance at this year's festival. But I was overcome with emotion when I saw not throngs of people but only a dozen or so little chicks dancing about never the while realizing that their feet were but kicking up the dust of what was once a great and glorious empire.

My tail feathers drooped as I returned to my royal transport, and it was then that I came to the clear and undeniable conclusion that it was over. What had started with fun and laughter and a whole community in stitches has since collapsed and passed over to the great beyond - not with the heavy sigh of one whose life has been troubled but with a giggling gobble, gobble of one who just remembered the punch line of joke from long ago.

The neck of our great celebration now lies stretched on the butcher's block, awaiting the final axe to fall that will mark the terminus of its reign on earth. And as I lay down my crown and kick the dust on to the grave I pray that time will recall our days with pleasure, and that future generations will know we tried to do our best for all bird-kind.

The Turkey Strut is dead. Long strut the turkeys!




On April 30, 1999, the United States Senate passed a resolution that designated May as National Military Appreciation Month. 

Always tell your doctor when you are taking nutritionals. You may not like what they say, but experience and education are on their side.

Some Questions About Glucosamine from last week:

Glucosamine and diabetics? There is some concern but just test regularly and you will know if your blood sugar is rising. I do not see how there can be enough glucose in glucosamine sulfate to raise blood sugar but if yours does, it

Why didn't I mention chondroiton along with glucosamine and MSM? Chondroiton is a huge molecule and doesn't appear to be easily absorbed from the intestinal tract. It also seems to add a lot to the cost of the product. It is in a lot of formulas; and if you like that formula, wouldn't let it concern me one way or another.

Many so called cartilage builders contain vitamin C, bovine cartilage, and other items. These are okay but I would not spend a lot of extra money for them. Just use common sense and if one brand doesn't help, try another. There is no magic cure.

If cartilage is truly built, I believe more knees would be "healed." I think it is adding to the viscosity of the joint and helping to protect carti-

lage and bone left.

Two sure fire ways to help yourself to loose weight is to ride a stationary bike, with doctor's approval. If you're 50 lbs. overweight, a lot more than your knees is going to be hurting, and the bike will help strengthen your knees withour impact. Once again, get your doctor's ok.

The American Diabetes Association estimates that over 18 million Americans have diabetes, and over 90% of these have Type 2 Diabetes. Type 2 Diabetes is due to decreased insulin production and resistance to insulin. Oral medications are among the most common treatments for this diabetes type and include: metformin (Glucophage), glipzide (Glucotrol), pioglitazone (Actos), rosaglitazone (Avadia), and others. Even with many medication options, some patients fail to maintain blood sugar control.

Exantide (Byetta) was recently approved by the Food and Drug Administration for treatment of Type 2 Diabetes in patients who are already on an oral diabetes medication but have not reached goal blood sugars. Interestingly, this drug is secreted in the saliva of a lizard known as the Gila monster, and works by increasing insulin production. Additionally, it causes suppression of glucose (sugar) secretion, reduction of food intake, and slowing of stomach emptying. The product comes in pre-filled syringes and is injected under the skin twice daily. Similar products are currently under investigation.



Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a

- *the market or special appraised value placed on your property;
- *the unequal appraisal of your property;
- *the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll;
- *exemptions that may apply to you; *qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal;
- *the taxable status of your property; *which local governments should be taxing your property;
- *the ownership of property; *the change of use of land receiving special appraisal;
- *any action taken by the appraisal district that applies to and adversely affects you.

Your Appraisal District staff urges you to review the value records of your property at any time prior to the day of the Appraisal Review Board Hearings tentatively set for July 14, 2006, at the Donley County Appraisal District office. Some protests result from errors or misconceptions which we are pleased to correct.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board.

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice a protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphold their determination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. The CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 307 S. Sully or P O Box 1220, Clarendon 79226; phone 806-874-2744.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court or an Arbitrator: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. As an alternative and within the same time period, you may file a request for binding arbitration with the county appraisal district in certain cases.

Tax Payment: You must pay either the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

DEADLINE FOR FILING PROTESTS WITH THE ARB*

Usual Deadline: On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause. Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year, Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines: For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually Feb. 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

Thornberry backs bill to prevent tax increase

WASHINGTON, DC - The U.S. House of Representatives acted recently to keep the country's continuing economic growth from being derailed by tax increases. Congressman Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) voted in support of H.R. 4297, the 'Tax Increase Prevention and Reconciliation Act of 2005," which passed the House by a 244-185 vote.

"Without this bill, millions of Americans from all walks of life will be hit with higher taxes. That is not what we need at a time when our economic recovery is moving along," said Thornberry.

H.R. 4297, which is expected to be considered by the U.S. Senate later this week, will keep approximately 15 million Americans from being vulnerable to the Alternative Minimum Tax (AMT).

The bill also blocks increases in the tax rates for dividend income and capital gains income - action that the U.S. Treasury Department estimates will save 28 million families an average of almost \$990 on their 2006 tax

Although he is pleased with the passage of H.R. 4297, Thornberry said more work remains to be done.

"This bill is a good one, but it does not eliminate all potential tax ncreases this year. I expect us to vote soon on other legislation to hold the line on taxes," said Thornberry.

Former Pantex workers to meet

Former Pantex workers are invited to attend a town hall meeting in Amarillo on June 2.

The town hall meeting is part of the Pantex Former Worker Program (FWP) funded by the U.S. Department of Energy Office of Environmental Health. The program is administered by Drexel University School of Public Health through a contract for services. It is under the Direction of Arthur L. Frank, MD, PhD, a physician board-certified in Occupational and Preventive Medicine, to assure occupational medicine expertise in the performance and interpretation of medical screening tests. A local office has been established to identify and assist eligible former workers with enrollment paperwork.

The town hall meeting will provide a forum to share information about the national former worker program, summarize general findings from the local screenings to date, answer questions about both the screening program and the Energy Employee compensation program (EEOICPA) administered by the U.S. Department of Labor. 
