Wellington Gets Set For Old Settlers Reunion & Rodeo

WELLINGTON—Bearded Dukes of Wellington, accompanied by the Skyrocket band and square dance sets, will form the caravan which visits all neighboring towns August 12 and 13 advertising the big 4-day Old Settlers Reunion and Rodeo and the AAU Swim Meet at Wellington August 17 through 20.

The Caravan will visit Clarendon on August 13th. This will be one of the largest celebrations the lower Panhandle has seen in the last decade, and more than \$1,500 in cash prizes will be given during the event.

Beginning August 12 and continuing through the celebration, Dukes of Wellington Week will be observed, with business men wearing western style clothes and old-time beards.

A big parade at 4 o'clock on the opening day will be one of the major attractions. Bands from all surrounding towns have been invited to take part. All cowgirl sponsors will ride their mounts, and many other groups will participate. There will be prizes for the oldest man riding, the oldest woman, the most typical cowboy and cowgirl of 50 years ago, for the best groomed set of whiskers and the old settler traveling the longest distance back home.

The rodeo performances will be featured attractions on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday nights, beginning at 8:00 p. m. On Thursday night after the rodeo an old-time cowboy and cowgirl square dance will be held at the community building.

Friday will be devoted to the reunion of old settlers of Collingsworth County. Held at the LaHue Grove, it will be an informal gathering to which all old-time residents of the county are invited. Dinner will be spread on the ground and there will be plenty of visiting and reminiscing about old times.

Oil Well Now Completed; No Oil

The Honolulu Oil Company stratigraphic test on the oil golf course was completed this week at a depth less than 1500 feet with no oil reported. It was understood that the well was drilled to more or less determine in which direction the oil showing strata, found in the Ozier well, was going and that the well was merely a test well of this nature more so than an outright attempt to get oil. Each well of this nature gives the geologists a little better picture of the underneath structure and eventually may lead to the opening of a shallow field somewhere in this area. Actual data that we would really like to know is very seldom revealed by the oil companies doing the drilling until an area is proven one way or the other.

WELLINGTON TO BE HOST TO AAU ELIMINATION SWIMMING MEET

Wellington will be host to the AAU Elimination Swimming Meet for the Panhandle area Thursday and Friday, August 19 and 20, John Lee, city recreation director, has announced. The meet will be held at the new Marian Airpark Swimming Pool, one of the finest in West Texas.

Swimmers from the entire Panhandle will take part and winners will be eligible to participate in the State AAU meet. Junior and senior eliminations and finals will be held in both swimming and diving. Ribbons will go to the winners of the first three places in each division and the three high point swimmers will receive trophies.

Earl Swearingen, secretary of the Plains Commission of AAU, Amarillo, will help run off the meet.

This is being held during the Old Settlers Reunion and Rodeo but the schedule is being worked out so there will be no conflicting events.

Local sponsors are the Chamber of Commerce and the Wellington Rodeo Association.

A mass meeting of the entire citizenry of Clarendon has been called to meet on the court house lawn at 7 a. m. Tomorrow (Friday) morning to launch the greatest and most complete clean-up drive in Clarendon's history. The purpose of the mass meeting is to acquaint everyone with the clean-up plans and just as soon as the meeting is over, everyone needing to go home and clean-up is to leave and those not having something of their own to do are requested to stay and do volunteer work on one of the trucks or help in any way needed.

Already, vacant lots are being cleared of rubbish and weeds over town. Alleys have been swept clean; streets will be rid of anything that might house the deadly germ of polio.

Every day new cases are reported from all over the Panhandle. Small children and grown-ups alike are unable to escape the deadly menace which threatens the health of thousands of Panhandle residents. Due to the very little knowledge science has found concerning the source and cause of the disease, people are naturally at a loss as to what to do to prevent it. Filth is the breeding ground of most germs, however, so it will be attacked first, in Clarendon as well as in all other towns threatened by the disease.

Committees have been appointed, Mayor Cap Morris said earlier this week, to organize and govern the campaign to rid this city of any and all attractions to germs. J. W. Murphy, Pete Kunz and Carroll Knorrp have been appointed to lead the clean-up campaign on the West side of town; Ray Noblitt, Johnnie Johnson and Elmer Chenault will lead the East side; and Frank Lyle, Gene Baxter and Allen Jeffries have charge of the north side. Ham McCampbell and Manuel Walker will have in their charge the cleaning up of the colored district.

Mayor Morris issues a frantic appeal to the people of Clarendon

to cooperate to the greatest of their ability in the clean-up when it gets underway in the morning at 7:30 a. m. Volunteer trucks and helpers will stop at your place to haul away refuse.

The committeemen in charge of all sections of the town, along with the Mayor and city commission, are urging everyone that has a truck, pick up or otherwise that is not urgently needed elsewhere to be at the court house with same at 7:00 Friday morning and they are also urging business men, clerks and all others that can to volunteer to man these trucks and be there at the same time.

The committeemen have voiced strong emphasis on several points in the drive which include the removal of out door toilets within the city, cleaning-up cow and stock lots, lids for all burning and garbage barrels, cleaning up vacant lots and an outright war against all weeds in the city.

"If you already have your place cleaned up, don't stop right there; get in and help your neighbors clean up a vacant lot or help man one of the hauling trucks" the committeemen urged.

All business firms have agreed to close their stores during the clean-up so that everybody might help. Polio, the Mayor said, must not strike here. That child of yours, those in the next house, those all around you—they deserve to be protected. Polio knows no mercy, but leaves small bodies contorted, crippled in its wake, and often death to its victim. Don't let this happen here. Join the clean-up force tomorrow and do your share. You may save someone's life, perhaps your own.

Dates Given To Register For Service

While Selective Service officials were completing plans Tuesday for the state-wide registration of men between eighteen and twenty-six years of age, Gov. Beauford H. Jester proclaimed Aug. 30 through Sept. 18 as initial registration period.

Col. Morris Schwartz, assistant director of the State Selective Service System, said local draft boards are meeting to select chairmen and secretaries. Schwartz said the organization job is about 70 per cent complete and that local boards would be ready for operation in about a week.

"We're more fortunate this time in that we have trained people in the field," he said.

He added, however, that one of

the troublesome occurrences experienced in the registration of men for the World War II draft is expected to come up this time. Registrants who are outside the jurisdiction of local boards too often fail to write in their legal addresses on line two of the registration form.

For example, a young man visiting in Dallas and registering there might possibly use a hotel address instead of his bonafide legal address.

Specific days on which men will register in the different age groups, as set forth in Governor Jester's proclamation, are:

1. Persons born in 1922 after August 30, 1922, will register Monday, Aug. 30.

2. Persons born in 1923 will register Tuesday, Aug. 31, or Wednesday, Sept. 1.

3. Persons born in 1924 will register Thursday, Sept. 2 or Friday, Sept. 3.

4. Persons born in 1925 will register Saturday, Sept. 4 or

Tuesday, Sept. 7.

5. Persons born in 1926 will register Wednesday, Sept. 8, or Thursday, Sept. 9.

6. Persons born in 1927 will register Friday, Sept. 10, or Saturday, Sept. 11.

7. Persons born in 1928 will register Monday, Sept. 13, or Tuesday, Sept. 14.

8. Persons born in 1929 will register Wednesday, Sept. 15, or Thursday, Sept. 16.

9. Persons born in 1930 before Sept. 19, 1930, will register Friday, Sept. 17 or Saturday, Sept. 18.

10. Persons born on or after Sept. 19, 1930, will register the day they are 18 years of age, or five days after.

Hours for registration on the days designated were proclaimed by the Governor as 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. Local boards will name registration points in each county.

AVERAGE PERSON'S VOCABULARY UNDERESTIMATED

You know more than you think you do! University of Texas Speech Professor Jesse Villarreal says the average person far underestimates the number of words he has in his vocabulary.

A group of persons asked to guess their vocabulary content will usually give answers ranging from 500 to 15,000—very low guesses, because tests have shown that the 1st grade child has a vocabulary of almost 17,000 words, says Dr. Villarreal. His college freshmen have made test scores indicating average vocabulary content of 100,000 words. Measurements made on college populations have shown an average vocabulary of 150,000 words.

Everyone, he says, is interested in a larger vocabulary, as evidenced by the fact that many people come by his office and want to take vocabulary tests to see how many words they know.

To increase word knowledge, Dr. Villarreal advises: try to learn new words encountered in reading and listening; look them up; preserve the original context in which the word was encountered; regularly review the collected information; read about the history of the English language's growth and development; and study word roots and common affixes.

Swine Breeders' Day October 20th At State Fair

Oct. 20 has been designated as Texas Swine Breeders' Day at the State Fair of Texas, Fred Hale, superintendent of the Fair's Swine Show, has announced.

An auction sale of purebred breeding hogs, sponsored by the Texas Swine Breeders' Association, will be the major event of the day. The breeders' association is working in cooperation with State Fair officials to make this the most complete swine show ever arranged in the history of the sixty-three-year old exposition.

Dates of the State Fair are Oct. 9-24 with the Swine Show scheduled for Oct. 13-22.

The State Fair will award \$5,218 in the breeding division, and \$2,150 in the fat barrow division. Various national swine breeders' association have announced special awards for the show. Choice hams will be given daily as prizes in a special identification and weight-guessing contest, Hale said.
