Donley Fair, Horse Show And Races Promises To Be Best Ever Held Here

The Donley County Fair, Horse Show and Races to be held in Donley County on Sept. 30th and October 1st, promise to be the biggest ever held in Donley County. H. M. Breedlove, county agent and manager of shows in the county, stated that the show board met in his office this past Saturday and worked out most of the details and premiums for the coming show.

The agriculture community exhibits will offer strong competition throughout the county and will be judged by an agriculture expert from out of the county. The list of commodities for display on the community exhibits are now being prepared and will be ready for the committees in each community next week. The premium on the community agriculture exhibits will be forty dollars for first place, thirty dollars for second place, twenty dollars for third place and then ten dollars for all other exhibits.

The poultry show to be handled by Curtis Mears and E. V. Quattlebaum will have single exhibits of both young and old birds and then sweepstakes and pens of both old and young birds with prize money running in three places from one dollar down to fifty cents with a total of eighty-three dollars for prize money on poultry.

The horse show will be held at the roping grounds on September 30th at 2 p. m. and in charge of this department will be Joe McMurtry and Harry Brumley. There will be two breeds of horses, Thoroughbreds and Quarter horses. The classes will be from 1949 filly colts and stud foals up to brood mares and aged stallions with eight classes in each breed. There will be three prizes in each class from eight dollars for first, seven dollars for second and five dollars for third. There will be an entry fee of two dollars for each horse entered in the horse show. There will be a kid pony class for judging the best pony on performance and handling and reining with three places and same money prizes as the horse show.

The horse show will also feature a performance class for adults on the best saddle horse being judged on reining ability, confirmation, and to be shown under the saddle. The prizes in this class will be, first \$8.00; 2nd, \$7.00 and 3rd, \$5.00.

The races will be held at the airport on the afternoon of the first of October at 2 p. m. and a charge of one dollar for adults and fifty cents for children will be assessed for spectators. The race committee is Pat Slavin, Bob Head, John Blocker, Joe McMurtry and Harry Brumley. The races to be run are follows and a ten dollar entry fee will be charged for each horse. A four horse starting gate will be used and the first four horses entered will be those to run, except the cow horse race which will start lap and tap. Entry fees to be added to prizes given by the county fair board.

Burial will be in Rowe Cemetery at Hedley with the Burns-Bain Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

The sheriff's department had a busy time last Thursday night in rounding up two men here suspected of burglary, attempted robbery, petty thievery and perhaps assault with intent to murder.

Held in the local jail here are Robert Roy Honeycutt, 34, of Amarillo and Roy V. Shelton, 32, of Dumas.

These men are believed to be the same parties who shot at a city policeman at Dalhart last week, also suspected of robbing an Amarillo residence, robbing the service station of Mrs. K. C. Reed on Highway 66 last week at which time \$100 in cash, \$36 in checks and \$20 in traveler checks were taken and several other petty crimes.

They are being held here for questioning in connection with the reported planned robbery of a Golden Light coffee salesman and various other charges.

Sheriff Wright received three different reports Thursday night of men shooting from a car near the Baptist church. A youth, a third party of the group, contacted the sheriff and reported the plans to hold up the coffee salesman. He told the sheriff they had instructions to even kill if necessary to get the salesman's money and were in the act of slipping up on the intended victim when the gun accidentally discharged. The gun was found in front of Miss Elizabeth Stevens home in East Clarendon by a young boy. Honeycutt was reported to be a former salesman for the Golden Light Coffee company and was supposedly familiar with the salesman's route and the amount of money he would be carrying at the time.

Dalton Swinney reported that shots were fired as he rode near the car on his horse. The horse was frightened and fell to the pavement and just as soon as the horse was quieted down, Swinney took off up an alley.

The youth that was with the two men claimed that he had been forced to accompany them on their crime spree and gave officers information that assisted in recovering much of the loot taken in the previous robberies.

NEW LAW PASSED BY CONGRESS:

The 81st Congress has passed a public law providing that the farm acreage allotment for wheat for the 1950 crop for any farm shall not be less than the larger of

- (a) 50 per cent of—
 - (1) the acreage on the farm seeded for the production of wheat in 1949, and
 - (2) any other acreage seeded for the production of wheat in 1949 which was followed in 1949 and from which no crop was harvested in the calendar year 1949,—adjusted in the same ratio as the national average.

INCREASE IN BUDGET

Now we should have plenty of money for fall practices such as seeding small grains on the contour for \$25 an acre, leaving stalks or stubble on land for \$25 an acre, terracing, applying Super Phosphate, and several other good soil and water conservation practices.

FACTS AND FIGURES ON SEEDING WHEAT TO STAY IN COMPLIANCE—

(a) An acceptable wheat mixture must be seeded in the same operation. The over-seeding of seeded or volunteer wheat with a sufficient quantity of other small grains will not qualify the acreage as a mixture of small grains.

(b) The acreage of mixed grains must reasonably be expected to produce a crop containing sufficient other grains other than wheat that the acreage could not be harvested as wheat for grain or seed.

(c) If the small grains other than wheat in the mixture fail to reach maturity and the remaining wheat plants are permitted to reach maturity, then such acreage shall be classified as seeded wheat and will be credited against the farm allotment in determining performance in 1950.

AUSTRIAN WINTER PEAS AND HAIRY VETCH

We are now issuing approvals for seeding Austrian Winter Peas and Hairy Vetch. The ACA payment for peas is \$5.80 per 100 lbs. seeded; for Hairy Vetch the payment is \$15.40 per 100 lbs. seeded, and our payment for application of Super Phosphate, which must be applied to the peas and vetch, is \$1.02 per 100 lbs. If you are interested in any of these practices, drop by the office and let us help you.

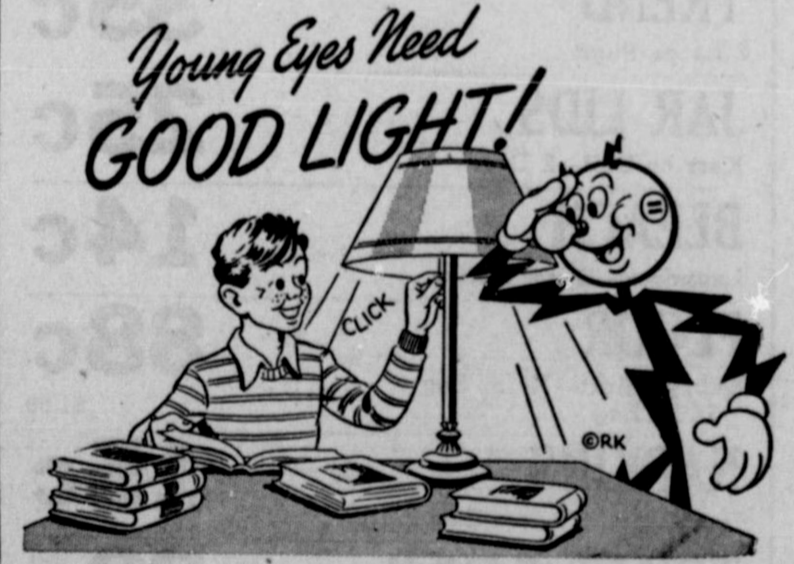

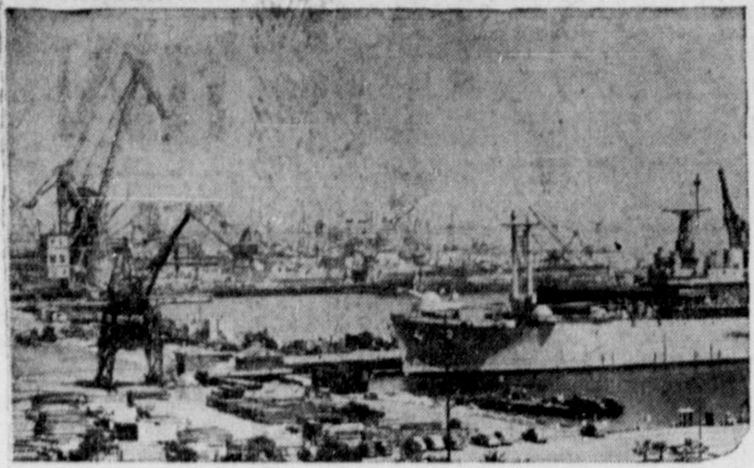

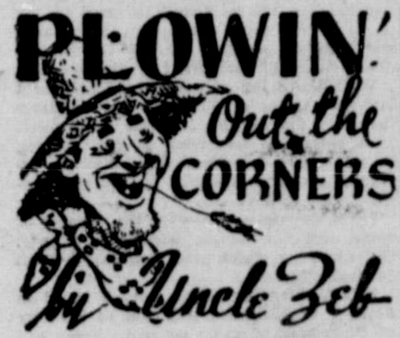

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

Q—Are all workers and their families protected by old-age and survivors insurance?

A—No. At present, the system operates only for wage and salary earners in private industry and commerce.

Q—Can anyone draw Social Security payments without having worked in jobs covered by Social Security?

A—Yes, in certain instances, survivors of veterans of World War II who die within 3 years after discharge are eligible to draw survivors insurance payments. This is true even though the veteran may have been a farmer or in some other occupation not covered by social security.

A—In general, the following types of workers are excluded from coverage under social security: agricultural workers, domestic workers in private homes, the self-employed, employees of religious and charitable organizations, and employees of the Government — Federal, State, county, and local.

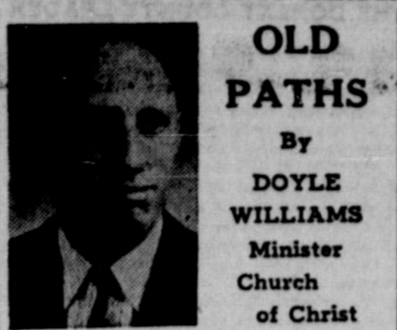

The Gospel of Christ was not intended by its Divine Author for a few learned or wise men, but for "every creature," learned or unlearned wise or foolish. That which is intended for the people at large—the great mass of mankind—in the nature of the case, must be simple, easy of comprehension, and applicable to the people. It must be of such a nature that the people can lay hold of it without long, deep, and profound research. This is evident from some scriptures now to be introduced. Gal. 1:8. Paul says, "Though we, or an angel from heaven, preach to you any other Gospel than that which we have preached, let him be accursed." This is an apostolic and divine anathema. It ought to be considered with great care. The intention of it is to preserve the Gospel in its purity, as the Lord gave it, without being mutilated or in any way perverted. It was intended for the eyes of the preachers of the Gospel, to make them feel the awful responsibility of handling the Word which may not be mutilated (corrupted, or perverted by man or angel, without incurring the curses of Heaven.

In connection with the language of the Apostle Paul, turn and read near the close of the New Testament, "I testify to every man that hears the words of the prophecy of this book, if any one add to these things, God will add to him the plagues that are written in this book; and if any one take away from the words of the book of this prophecy, God will take away his part

from the tree of life, and from the holy city; which things are written in this book." These utterances are full of meaning, and placed at the close of the book to warn every one of the terrible doom of the man who shall add any thing to or take any thing from this book. Is it claimed that this is simply true of the Book of Revelations? That may be; but it is not equally true of every part of the Book of God? May we add to the writings of Matthew, Mark, Luke, Paul Peter, James, and Jude, but not to the writings of John? By no means. We may not add to any thing the Lord has said, pervert, corrupt it, or preach any other Gospel. If we do, the curse of Heaven will fall on us.

We connect two more passages with these. The Lord says, "He who believes not shall be condemned." Mark 16:16. He who believes not the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God abides on him." Jno. 3:36. Stop and think on this. This clear and terrible meaning is the first thing that strikes the attention of every one. He who believes not the Gospel shall be condemned. He who preaches any other Gospel shall be accursed. He who adds any thing to it shall have the plagues recorded in it added to him. He who shall take any thing from it shall have his part taken out of the book of life, and out of the holy city.

This should be enough warnings from God, to invite the attention of every living creature on earth, to a more careful study of God's Holy Volume; without addition or subtraction, from its holy pages.
