## Mayor's Proclamation

WHEREAS, October 24th has been designated by the General Assembly of the United Nations as the day to be observed throughout the world as the anniversary of the coming into force of the United Nations Charter; and

WHEREAS, during this, the fifth year of its existence, the United Nations is on trial before the world as the champion of peace with freedom for all mankind; and

WHEREAS, it is of the greatest importance that citizens in every community of this country give expression to their support of the United Nations;

NOW THEREFORE, I, Major Hudson, Mayor of Clarendon, do solemnly declare October 24th a day of special commemoration in that it is the fifth birthday of the organization which can maintain peace on earth among men of good will; further, I request that every bell in this community ring out at eleven o'clock on the morning of October 24th as a reminder to every citizen to join the rest of our country in a prayer for the success of the United Nations in this hour of crisis; that the citizens of Clarendon are united in support of the United Nations and in the belief that there SHALL BE PEACE.

## LAKEVIEW HIGH FIELD HOUSE BURNS DOWN

The Lakeview high school field house burned to the ground Thursday night with all football equipment and most basketball equipment lost. School officials estimated the loss at \$5,000.

The team was forced to cancel its contest with Silvertown, slated for Friday night. Officials said the game would probably be played in November, if equipment became available.

The fire was not discovered until the building had burned down. It was believed to have started around midnight, and cause of the blaze was undetermined.

The building, an Army barracks moved from Amarillo, furnished football dressing rooms and a physical education classroom.

Gabie Betts Burton Library Notes

The book list of new copies added last week for your pleasure and information, begins with "Trises, Their Culture and Selection" by Gwendolyn Anley. This writer is a well known authority on her subject. She was a successful editor of the Iris Year Book and is an active member of the Iris Society. Having grown her own iris garden for years, she understands the difficulties which confront the beginner as well as those matters which are of interest to the expert.

The children are always delighted with books by Berta & Elmer Hader, so we are happy to say their new book is "Squirrely of Willow Hill" that has just been received. These Hader books are usually true experiences of these writers and the illustrations are pictures made from their home. They are always exquisitely illustrated. The Blaze stories are experiences of Billy and Blaze and are fascinating horse stories for little people. Our latest book is "Blaze Finds The Trail." This is four or rather all of the Blaze series by C. W. Anderson. Children's books are so beautifully illustrated that any age would enjoy them.

Our fiction has become rather difficult to select as it is all under the classification "Not for a Conservative Library." If we chose something that is outstanding it has usually run as a serial in one of the popular periodicals.

This week we have "Belles On Their Toes" by the authors of "Cheaper By The Dozen." I think it was a Ladies Home Journal serial. Then we have Daphne Du Maurier's "The Parasites." She wrote "Rebecca" and "The King's General," but the format of this story is apparently not of the family type novel, but as a best seller it rates high. Last we have Frank S. Slaughter's "Divine Mistress." His books are very popular, but not to compare with those of Cronin for general appeal. Both men are doctors but A. J. Cronin is not a practising physician, and has a home in America in one of the Eastern states. His stories and books are well told and the material is worthwhile.

The past week has been the "grand finale" for picture identification puzzle solvers. All of the encyclopedias and the unabridged dictionary have been in constant use, and also various small reference books. It is fascinating to observe the strenuous efforts put forth by the numerous contestants. The work is quite technical, and educational past time.

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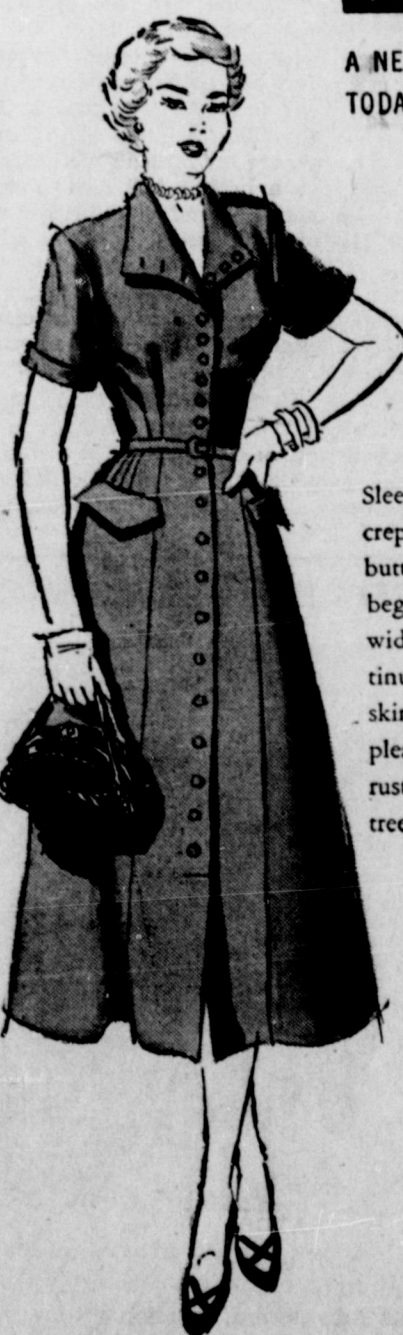

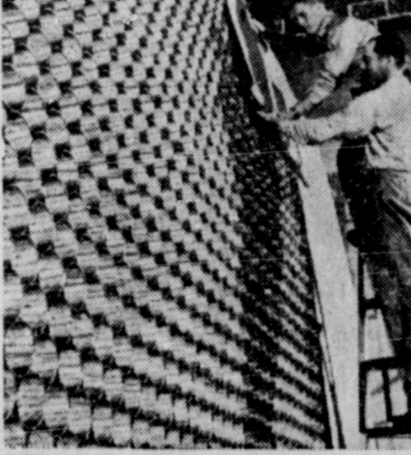

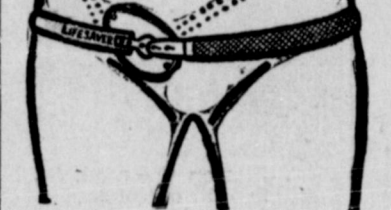

**Greenbelt's Golden Mary Rated As Tested Dam**

COLUMBUS, OHIO—A Texas registered Jersey cow has been rated as a Tested Dam by the American Jersey Cattle Club. The distinction was awarded Greenbelt's Golden Mary for having three offspring with official production records. She is owned by J. R. Gillham of Clarendon, Tex.

The cow's progeny averaged 11,442 pounds of milk and 583 pounds of butterfat on twice daily milking, mature equivalent basis. The tests were checked by Texas A&M College and The American Jersey Cattle Club.

Gillham's cow also has been classified for breed type. She was rated as Very Good, equal to a score of 85 to 90 points on the breed's score card which gives 100 points for a perfect animal.

The production testing and type classification work carried on by Gillham are part of a program offered by The American Jersey Cattle Club to make possible the continuous improvement of the Jersey breed. The Club's national headquarters is in Columbus, Ohio.

**COTTON, CORN AND**

Ways in which farmers of Texas may meet the cotton needs of the Nation next year without cutting into the conservation gains of recent years were outlined this week by B. F. Vance, Chairman of the State PMA Committee.

He pointed out that the supply of upland cotton for 1950-51 is now estimated at about 16,405,000 bales. Total disappearance in the 1949-50 season was 14,812,000 bales. As a result there will be no acreage allotments on cotton in 1951.

This may tempt cotton growers to cut into their recently made conservation gains but Vance points out that much of this can be avoided by a little careful planning. As he sees it, one way to increase cotton production is to increase the acreages of winter cover crops now. With double the usual amount of cover crop seed available, there is a real opportunity to do this. Where the ground can be prepared for cotton following the plowing under of a green manure crop, cotton yields also are increased. Mr. Vance said: "We should be increasing rather than decreasing the acreages in grass and legumes and in cover and green manure. Now is the time to do everything possible to maintain our soil reserves for they will be needed much more later on."

soil conservation measures mandatory for all farmers. - - After all, we are just custodians of the land for posterity. We have no right to destroy or injure it."

When our farmers have money, small business is good and our cities become prosperous — but when farmers lose their buying power, small town business dries up and unemployment increases in the cities.

Too many otherwise honest men cheat their land by robbing it of its fertility.

People who think the price support program on eggs has caused them to have to pay high prices for their eggs should be advised that the support price to the farm has been 25 cents per dozen.

This is a good time of the year for farmers to check up on pasture improvement practices and to plan a continuation of the work this fall and winter.

Neither the nation, nor the farmer, can afford to lose that topsoil from which must come the

food and fibre for present and future generations.

Today, we are farming about the same amount of cropland we farmed in 1910, yet, today we have about 58 million more people and each eating 10 percent more food. Agriculture marches on - - -

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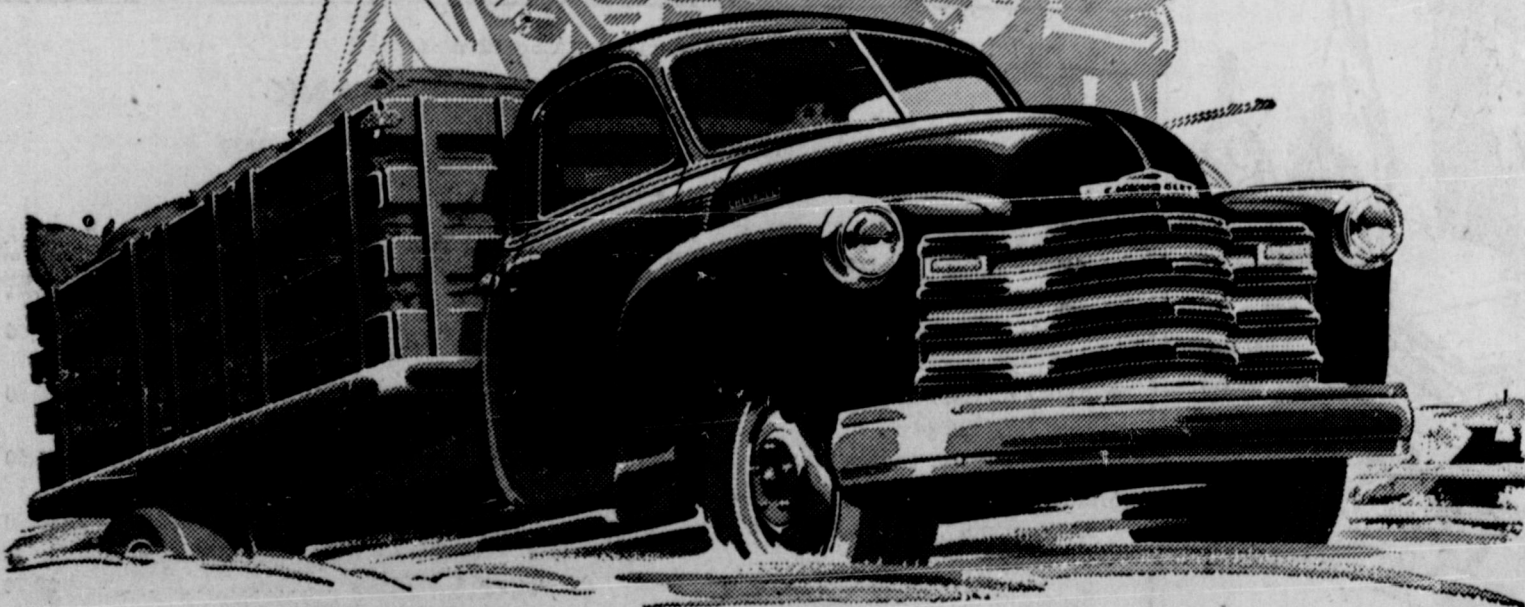

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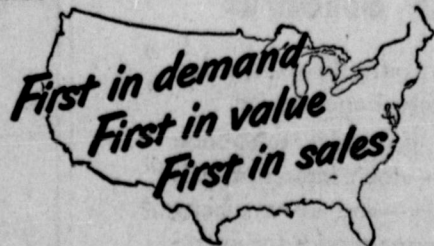

### Whitewing Kill Reported By Commission

AUSTIN — Texas sportsmen participating in the 1950 whitewing hunt in the lower Rio Grande Valley bagged an average of 7.1 birds during the three-day open season, according to the Executive Secretary of the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission.

Excellent cooperation on the part of hunters in collecting whitewing information enabled Game Department technicians to add much valuable information to their knowledge of this species. Few violations were reported and the Executive Secretary commended hunters for their cooperation.

The combined efforts of hunters and Game Department personnel on the ground and in the air produced data showing that 9,948 cars bearing 28,721 hunters were concentrated in the hunting area.

The Executive Secretary said that out of an estimated population of 900,000 whitewings, gunners bagged a total of 203,440 birds during the seven hour and thirty-nine minutes of shooting time. During 1949 hunters bagged an average of 7.6 birds or a total of 14,925 more than the number killed in 1950. Unfavorable weather conditions were responsible for the lower bags in 1950.

The overall crippling loss was

49,687 or enough birds to supply an average bag for 6,997 additional hunters! High winds were believed responsible for this increase over the 33,936 whitewings lost in 1949.

The Executive Secretary said that very few of the 729 whitewing doves banded in 1950 were reported by hunters. One bird banded nine years ago was killed in 1949 and one three year old bird was killed during the past season. Hunters are urged to send any bands they may have in their possession to the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission in Austin.

**Archaeologists Discover Remains of Early Spanish And Indian Settlements**

AUSTIN — Remains of early Spanish and Indian settlements, dating back to 1750 and before, were discovered by University of Texas archaeologists in a survey of the area to be covered by the Rio Grande's Falcon Dam reservoir.

Jack Hughes of Dallas headed the field party, which last summer recorded locations of remains and mapped those areas to be under water soon in the 100-square mile area below Laredo, University Archaeologist Alex D. Krieger supervised the work.

The National Park Service supplied funds for the project, sponsored by the University's Anthropology Department.
