Post Office Urges Early Mailing Of Christmas Cards And Packages

The Clarendon post office is facing the heaviest Christmas load of greeting cards and parcels in its history, according to postmaster J. C. Estlack, judging from the amount being mailed and gotten ready at this time.

An urgent appeal is being made for early mailing to insure your cards and packages reaching their destination before Christmas day.

Out of state parcels should be mailed right now. Texas parcels should be mailed within the next ten days.

Stock up with 2-cent stamps you will need later for unsealed card mailing. It is always advisable to use 3-cent stamps on out of town cards and seal them. They then may be forwarded or returned to the writer if your address is placed in the upper left hand corner of the envelope.

In mailing packages, tie securely. Use heavy cardboard boxes and tie with heavy twine. Never use shoe boxes, hat boxes or similar material. Wrapping paper is not necessary on strong boxes. Never use thin paper that tears easily. Address plainly on one side only, with your return address in the upper left hand corner. Packages are not mailable without your return address. It is a good idea to place your return address on a slip of paper and place it inside the parcel. Pack fragile articles with plenty of cushion packing, remembering that your package may be in the bottom sack with a ton of mail on top of it along the journey to its destination. Insure articles worth while and insure for enough to pay you to take the trouble to have it traced if lost or destroyed.

Do not seal articles except for first class or registered mailing. When you receive notice of the arrival of a package, bring the notice with you and call prompt-

ly. The package may be located much quicker with your notice in hand.

Out of consideration to the line waiting behind you, have the exact change and don't wait until the last minute in the day. The post office force will appreciate your cooperation. Every employee wants to serve you efficiently and promptly. Please help them.

Seal your cards mailed to an address in town and use a 1-cent stamp. If you don't seal it, a 2-cent stamp is required. Unsealed cards may be mailed anywhere in the states with a 2-cent stamp if not overweight. The usual card is not overweight. Don't add anything else with the card like a letter or message of any kind unless you use a 3-cent stamp.

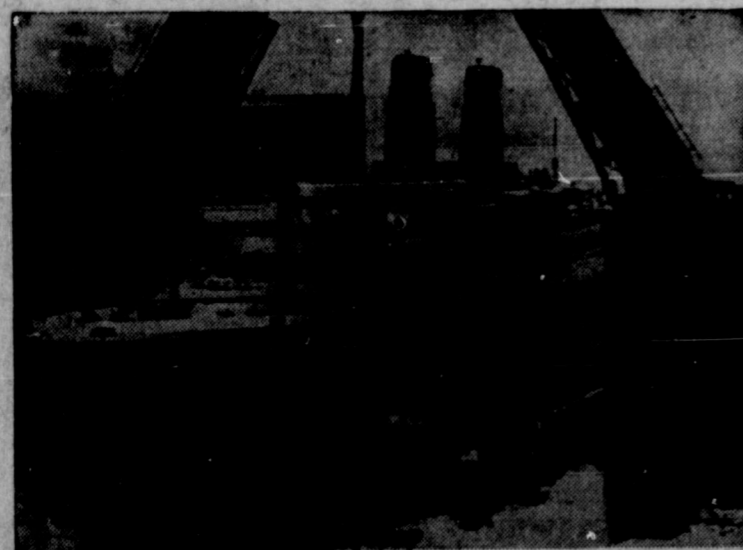
FORMER RESIDENT DIES AT AMARILLO

Pioneer Appears On Television

A Clarendon resident and pioneer of Donley County paid tribute to the Panhandle area when she appeared on television recently. She is none other than Mrs. Lena Antrobus. The program, conducted daily from 2 until 3 o'clock, from Oklahoma City, is under the direction of Dan Williams, husband of the former Marilyn Maher, granddaughter of Mrs. Antrobus. It is sponsored by some six business firms of that city.

Mrs. Antrobus, after being seated, was invited to tell about pioneer days in the Panhandle. As questions were asked her and answered, wares of stores sponsoring the program were shown. While recalling experiences of the past, Mrs. Antrobus calmly continued her knitting, completing a baby set which she gave to the Methodist Church Bazaar in Oklahoma City, bringing the organization \$5.

As is the custom on this program, five children taken from kindergarten were present to sing. In tribute to Mrs. Antrobus, they sang, "Home On the Range." She told them one of her favorite stories, quoted her favorite Bible verse and was asked her views on life. Following the program she was given her picture taken on television.

Mr. and Mrs. Antrobus came to Donley County in 1887 by way of team and wagon from Wichita Falls. They had been married in Kentucky and though the railroad had been constructed thru the present town of Clarendon, it was not then in operation. The big item of interest at that time was the digging of a water well for if a good well could be had a town was to be built on the railroad. The only residents here at that time were those who lived in the railroad camp.

Mr. Antrobus died several years ago. The couple's six children are all living. They are Mrs. O. C. Watson, B. C. Antrobus, both of Clarendon; Ed Antrobus of El Paso; Mrs. Ernest Maedgen of Lubbock; Mrs. Grant Mercer of Ft. Worth and Mrs. Tren Star-gel of Oklahoma City. She can proudly boast of eleven grandchildren and eight great grandchildren with one grandchild living in Germany and a great grandchild living in Alaska.

One of her favorite pastimes is her knitting and she recalls that her baby sets have been sent to Germany, Alaska and Japan as well as over the United States.

Mrs. Antrobus, who is 83 years old, wrote the following poem on her past birthday. It perhaps expresses best her views on life.

I am really eighty-three years old—
And by rights should be feeble and grey—
My eyes should be dim, my feet be slow—
But you see that I am not that way.

My hands still find some work I can do;
My feet take me where I should go—
My eyes can see the beauties of life,

And my heart makes me love you all so.

I am thankful for all my children and friends;
They mean so much to me each day—
But I thank the "Lord" most—
Who has brought me this far,
And will guide me the rest of the way.

Clarendon Broncs To Be In District 1-A

A report from the Texas Inter-scholastic League last week end placed the Clarendon Bronchos in District 3-AA along with Childress, Memphis, Paducah and Wellington. An error was made in the enrollment for Clarendon High School placing them in this district and this error was corrected this week when Supt. H. T. Burton received word from Rodney Kidd at Austin stating that Clarendon would not be in district 3-AA but would be placed in district 1-A. Members of 1-A will include Clarendon, Le-fors, McLean, Panhandle, Wheeler and White Deer and possibly Canadian as we understand an error was made in their enrollment also.

It was reported that this newly formed district would hold a meeting this week to work out schedules for the 1951 season.

Changes made in the different districts affecting the Panhandle area are as follows which will give some of the more popular teams more competition: District 1-AA will include Dalhart, Dumas, Perryton, Phillips and Shamrock. 1-AAAA will include Abilene, Amarillo, Borger, Pampa, Lubbock, Odessa, San Angelo. These newly formed districts will produce plenty of competition and will equalize the power according to high school enrollment. It would have been pretty rough on the Broncs had they been placed in the district with Childress. They will have more evenly matched competition in the district they are now in.

Donley Farm Bureau Board of Directors Set Work For 1951

The Donley County Farm Bureau Board of Directors met Friday afternoon in Clarendon and set up their plan of work for 1951; reported on the state convention that was held in Mineral Wells on November 20-22, and gave a comprehensive survey of the facilities of the county Farm Bureau.

President Lee Shaller, said, "The Donley County Farm Bureau will incorporate the following in their program of work in 1951: agriculture tours, county barbecue, better insurance program for farmers, if controls are ever put back into effect on cotton that more even distribution of acreage be considered, to back club boys programs in county, to take part in all programs that will further agriculture for the farmers of Donley County.

Mr. Shaller reported that the voting delegates of Texas established \$6.00 as the minimum membership fee, oppose the Brannan Plan, work towards better rural roads, retain the 4c tractor gasoline refund, and sponsor a better agricultural program in 1951. Fifteen members of the board were present.

Whereas, the International Crisis is drawing more tense and more critical by the hour, and Whereas, Russia and Red China have demonstrated to the world, their unwillingness to establish peace short of bloodshed and appeasement of their petty whims, and Whereas, The lives of our fighting forces in Korea are endangered to the point of com-

plete annihilation, and Whereas, we are unwilling to sit idly by exchanging politics and diplomacy for shells, atrocities and humiliation; THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: that Clark-Brock, Post 128 of the American Legion, Department of Texas, urge our President and Congress to enact and enforce legislation sufficient to invoke full mobilization, production and controls to meet present or anticipated needs for the armed forces in time of total and all out war, AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that since we, the United States

of America, is furnishing by far the majority of troops, money and material to prosecute the war, not be dictated to from any other nation as to how we deploy and protect our troops or how we use our weapons for such purpose, and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that Russia be advised of the cessation of appeasement to her or any of her satellite nations, and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that the Universal Military Training Program as suggested by the AMERICAN LEGION be enacted into law and put into operation immediately, and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that if Russia is unwilling to cooperate in bringing about a peaceful settlement of world affairs, sever diplomatic relations and treat her the same as an enemy nation in every respect.

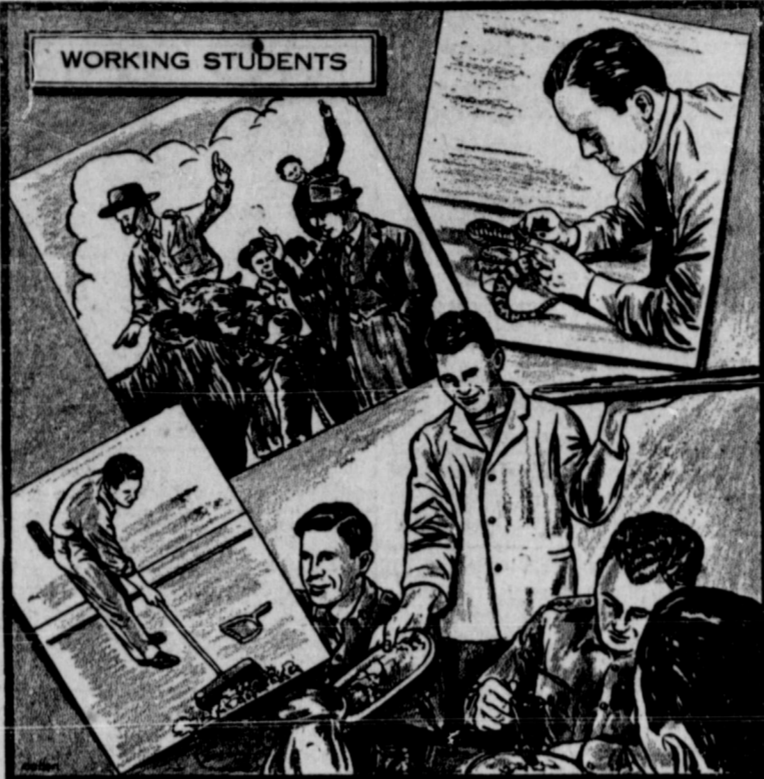

We know we must keep our economy strong—and we know, too, that we can't long maintain a strong economy without strength and stability in agriculture—the Nation's call to preparedness should give us all new incentive to build even more rapidly toward a stronger, sturdier democracy that can and will withstand any challenge."

"By improving the economic opportunities for family farmers and for family farm ownership, we offer our best proof of the right to leadership in behalf of farm people throughout the world," he declared. "We must fully recognize the fundamental importance of our family farm concept to the preservation of democracy."

"By strengthening the foundation of those farms, by giving them greater opportunity to produce for freedom, by setting them forward as an example for free men all over the world, we will continue to prove that America can and will fulfill the responsibilities of leadership for which all free nations of the world are looking to us."

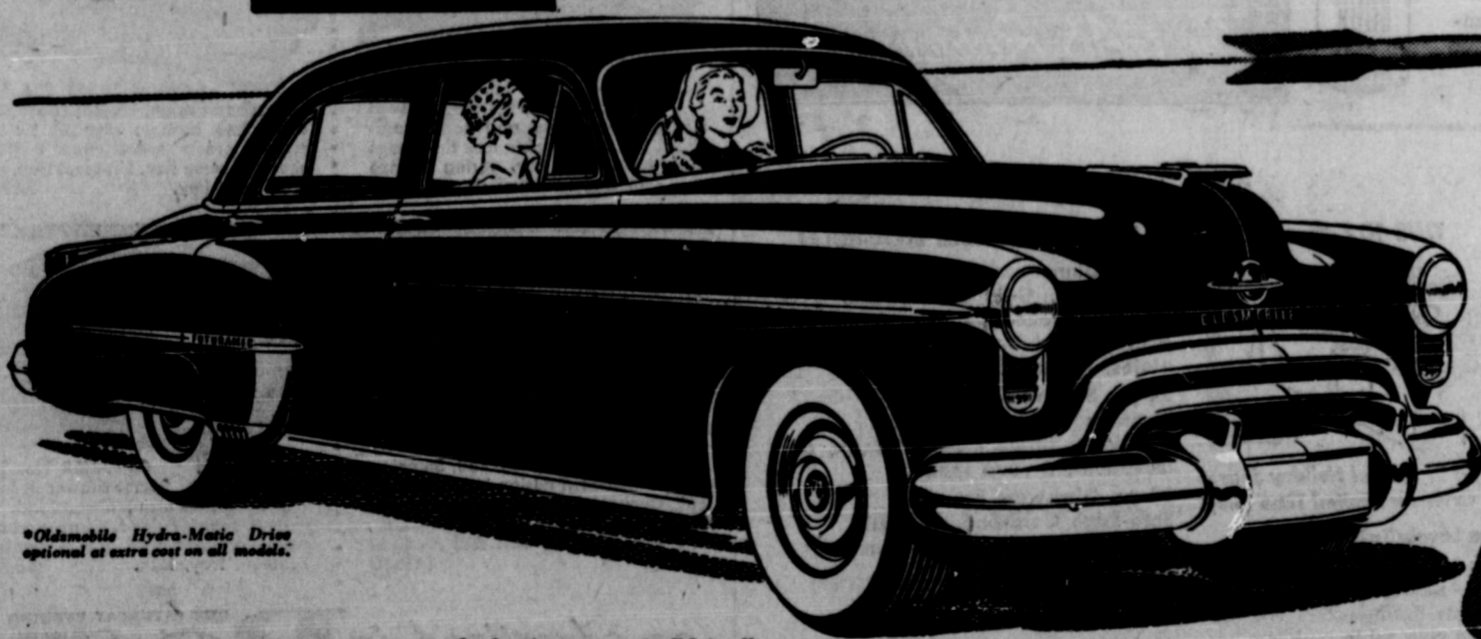

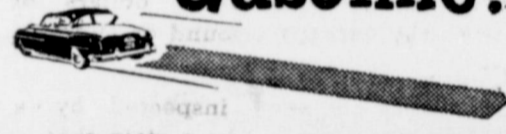

Donley Farm Bureau Meets To Determine & Outline Procedure Of Program for 1951

A meeting of the Directors of the Donley County Farm Bureau was held at the County Agent's office Friday night, Dec. 1 to determine and outline the procedure of a program for 1951.

Mr. Marvin Carter, organization Director of the Texas Farm Bureau and Mr. G. A. Dietz, Assistant Director of District 1 were there to help us in our plans.

Mr. Carter stressed the point, that our service plan was one of the important factors in carrying out our program for next year. All members of the Farm Bureau are eligible for Blue Cross and Blue Shield and Farm Bureau Insurance: Life, Fire, and Casualty, ie, Insurance on your Automobile. The Life, Fire, and

Casualty may be obtained at a savings to you.

The membership dues of \$10.00 was voted down at the State Convention, but our dues to the State and National Federation were raised to \$5.00 with a minimum of \$1.00 for the County, with the privilege of the County setting theirs any where they wished.

We decided to let Mr. Carter and Mr. Dietz take a survey of District 1 and try to go along

with them at what ever figure they attained. It looks likely, that they will be set at \$2.50, making a total of \$7.50.

We were informed at Mineral Wells that we needed some 5,000 more members in order to obtain another delegate to the State Convention. We needed 40 in our County. We got our quota for the County and the State quota was also reached. That gives us a total of over 52,800 members in Texas.

A committee was appointed to study and direct action to improve our service program.

A membership committee was appointed to direct our member-

ship drive for another year and our goal was set at 500 members, which if achieved will give us over a 50% membership in the County.

I regret that I am unable to give you these committeemen at the present time, but you will be hearing more about them later.

The possibilities of establishing a county office was discussed.

We decided to have a chorus contest. I suppose one would call it between the various communities that are interested. Possibly continuing on up to bi-district and district contests.

Mr. Carter and Mr. Dietz are conducting these meetings through-

out District 1, which includes practically all of the northwestern part of the Panhandle, 18 counties I believe.

At this time I would like to introduce the proposal to collect 1c per acre on your allotted planted acres of wheat. Since there was no wheat raised, in order to have a little capital to finance the wheat program now planted, it is necessary to kick in just a little. I am sure it would surprise Claude Moore almost into a tantrum (maybe) if each of you that plant wheat would walk up and present him with a check for \$1.00 for each 100 acres that you have planted. Just make the check payable to the Donley County Wheat Producers Association, and if you can't find Claude, I am sure it would be all right to leave it with Flip Breedlove or Mrs. Ritter. It will be a lot more convenient for him to pick them up there than to see

each of you individually. "Thanks."

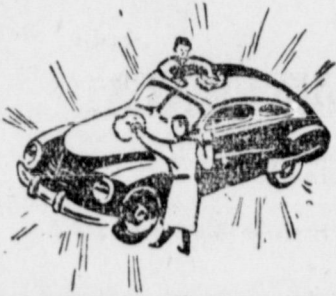

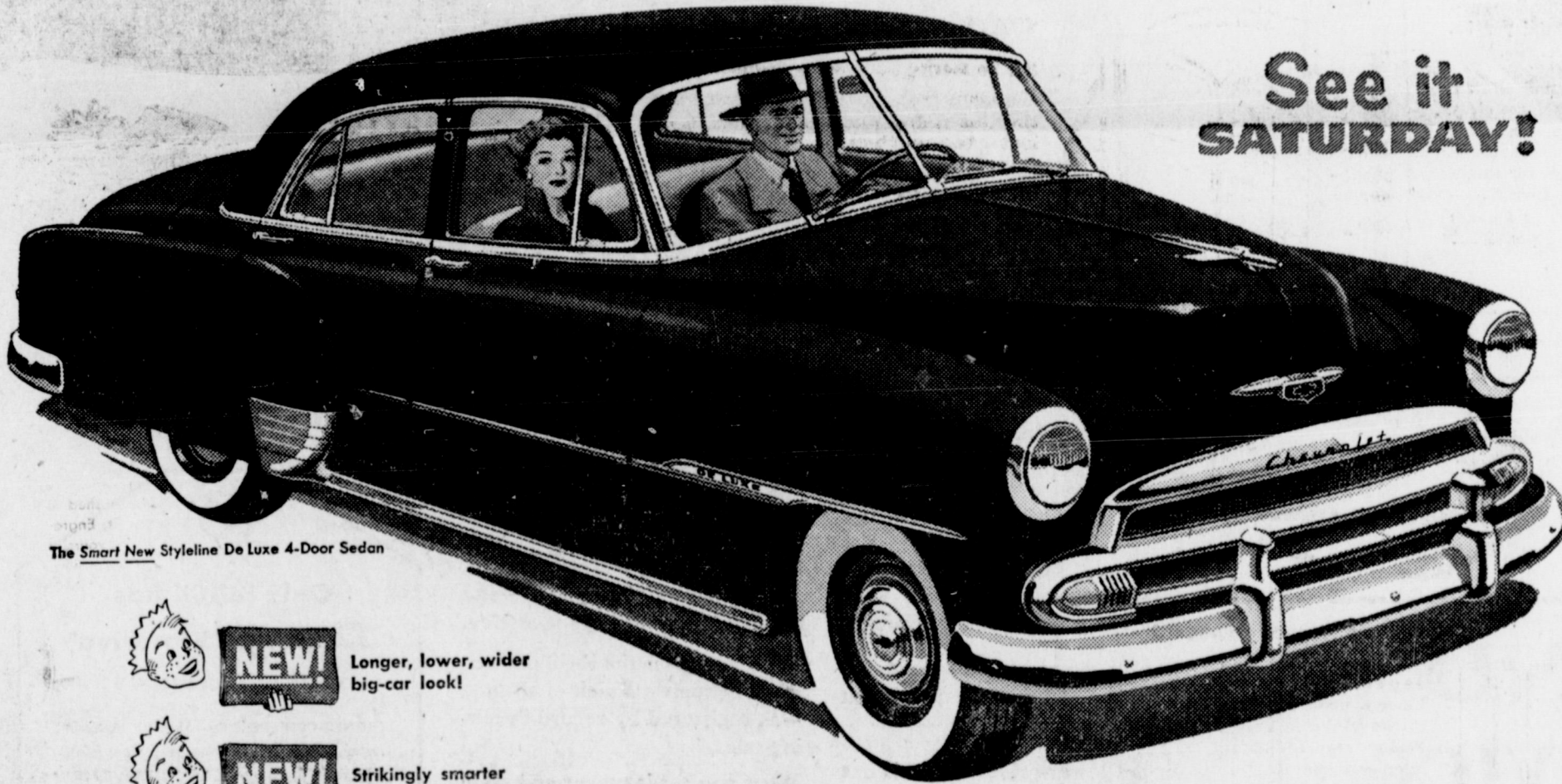

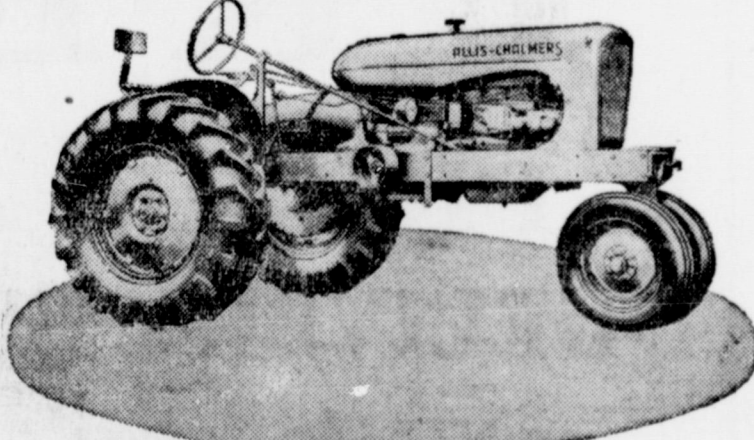
