Breedlove Stresses Cottonseed Shortage For Planting

Two hundred farmers and ranchers attended meetings held by county agent H. M. Breedlove last week over Donley County. The purpose of the meetings was to advise farmers on the shortage of cotton seed for planting and to warn all cotton farmers to get their seed at once if they do not have enough to plant this spring. Breedlove also discussed fertilicers, chemical poisons for cotton nsects and outlook for cotton prices and the amount of cotton requested by the department for the 1951 year. There are no con trols on cotton in 1951 and the government is asking for better than sixteen million bales for the Now at Low Ebb 1951 year; this is a larger crop stated that if sixteen million bales was made this year that the country still would not have the normal carry over from year

to year. The world situation brought about this request for more cotton but Breedlove is warning all farmers not to plant so much cotton that they will hurt the conservation work done on the farm. "We must plant cotton on land that is suitable to the growing of cotton and have plenty of feed on the farm," he

The 1951 farm program was also discussed and all of the practices discussed explaining how money could be earned under each practice for conservation work done on the farm. All types of agriculture and feeding was discussed at the meetings and a general discussion was held at the end of the meetings.

COTTON NEEDS

President Truman, in his talk to the Nation in December, included cotton among the raw materials which are most important in our national preparedness. He urged cotton growers to produce more cotton in 1951 to help out in the defense of our Nation.

B. F. Vance, State PMA Committee Chairman, commenting on the cotton situation this week said, "The Secretary of Agriculture has asked cotton farmers to produce at least 16 million bales of cotton in 1951.

"We know that our carryover of cotton next August, the beginning of the cotton marketing year, will be at minimum levels. We also know that according to most careful Government estimates, nearly 16 million bales of cotton will be needed for our own civilian and military uses and for needs in friendly foreign coun-

"This means that a 16-million bale crop in 1951 would add little or no cotton to our aiready small reserve. 

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT

Washington, D. C.

December 21, 1950

1. Establish 40 hour week for yardmen with increase of 23 cents effective October 1, 1950, and additional 2 cents effective January 1, 1951.

2. Set aside 40 hour week agreement until January
1, 1952, and establish 6 day work week for yardmen.
Effective with the first pay roll period after 30 days
from the date of execution of the formal agreement, yardfrom the date of execution to work on the 7th day to be from the date of execution of the formal agreement, yard-men required by the carrier to work on the 7th day to be paid overtime rates except engineers who shall receive straight time rates for the 7th day. This does not create guarantees where they do not now exist. On and after October 1, 1951, three months' notice to be given of desire to go on 40 hour week. Provide for consideration of availability of manpower and 4 cents per hour if and when the 40 hour week actually becomes effective.

3. Settle rules for 40-hour week and 6 day week. Grant yard conductors and brakemen other rules such as daily earnings minimum, car retarder operators and footboard yardmasters as recommended by Emergency Board

Pooling Cabooses (Conductors and Trainmen)
Reporting for Duty
More than One Class of Service
Switching Limits
Air Hose (Conductors and Trainmen)
Western Differential and Double Header and Tonnage Limitation (Conductors and Trainmen, all Territories)

6. Road men to receive 5 cents per hour increase effective October 1, 1950 and additional 5 cents per hour increase effective January 1, 1951.

Quarterly adjustment of wages on basis of cost

of living index (1 point to equal 1¢ per hour. First adjustment April 1, 1951. Base to be 176).

8. Agreeement embodying principles applicable to yardmasters to be entered into for benefit of yardmasters.

9. Effective October 1, 1950, the basic hours of dining car stewards shall be reduced from 225 to 205 hours per month; no penalty overtime to accrue until 240 hours have been worked, the hours between 205 and 240 to be paid for at the pro rata rate.

Effective February 1, 1951, overtime at time and one-half shall accrue after 220 hours have been worked. The basic monthly salary to be paid for the 205-hour month shall be the same as that now paid for the 225-hour month. Except that four dollars and ten cents (\$4.10) shall be added to the present monthly rate effective January 1, 1951.

10. In consideration of above, this agreement to be effective until October 1, 1953, and thereafter until changed or modified under provisions of Railway Labor Act. Moratorium on proposals for changes in wages or rules until October 1, 1953, as follows:

No proposals for changes in rates of pay, rules or working conditions will be initiated or progressed by the employees against any carrier or by any carrier against its employees, parties hereto, within a period of three years from October 1, 1950, except such proposals for changes in rules or working conditions which may have been initiated prior to June 1, 1950. Provided, however, that if as the result of government wage stabilization policy, workers generally have been permitted to receive so-called government wage stabilization policy, workers generally have been permitted to receive so-called annual improvement increases, the parties may meet with Doctor Steelman on or after July 1, 1952, to discuss whether or not further wage adjustments for employees covered by this agreement are justified, in addition to increases received under the cost of living formula.
