## FARM NEWS From the County PMA Committee

### SOMETHING FOR THE RAINLESS DAYS

Putting something away for a rainy day. That is what farmers do when they carry out conservation practices that help store moisture in the soil for the rainless days of summer and fall.

At this time when farmers are straining every sinew to produce enough to meet the nation's defense needs, it is vitally important to have that extra moisture in the soil in case it is needed.

The Agricultural Conservation Program helps stimulate the moisture saving practices by providing assistance for approved practices which help to conserve moisture to tide over "a dry spell."

Legumes and grasses used in rotation and plowed under regularly add organic matter. Organic matter helps the soil to absorb more of the moisture that falls—less of the moisture runs off and more soaks in. Farming on the contour, terraces, and contour strip-cropping help hold back the run-off and more moisture soaks into the soil.

The farming on the contour and strip-cropping practices were not approved for Donley County for 1951. Even though they were not approved and you cannot earn assistance on these practices it would be well worth your time to carry out these two practices.

### METAL SCRAP NEEDED

Iron and steel scrap is needed once again to keep the Nation's steel mills rolling at full capacity, says the National Production Authority, U. S. Department of Commerce. Spring "clean-up" offers farmers and ranchers a good opportunity to salvage the scrap (See FARM NEWS, Page Eight)

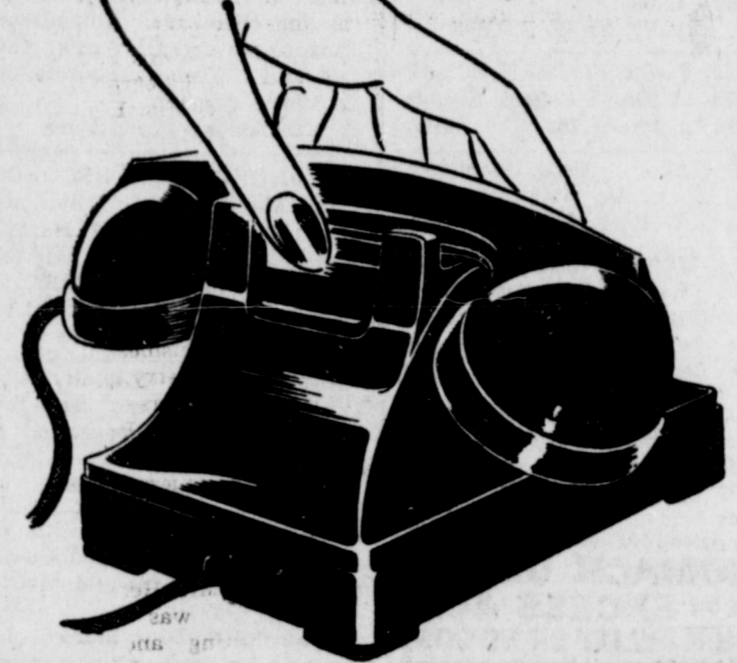

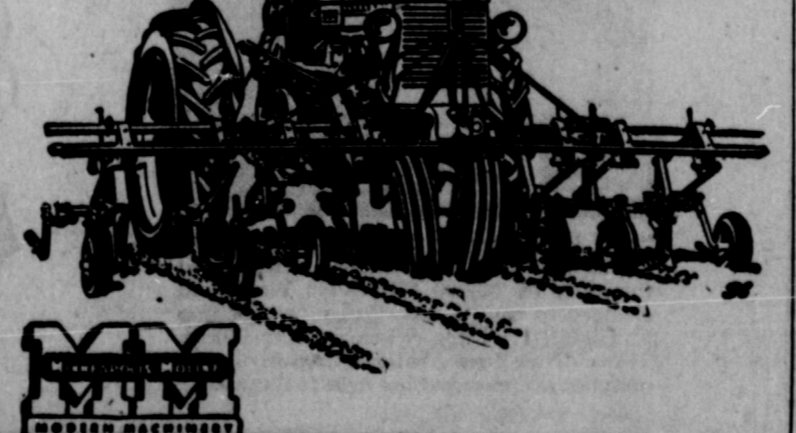

(Continued from Front page) so urgently required for military and civilian products.

About 67 million tons of scrap from all sources will be required to keep steel furnaces going in 1951. The all-time high of 61 million tons was attained last year. Therefore, steel mills require 6 million more tons of scrap in 1951 than was used in 1950.

Much of the scrap needed in 1951 must come from the farms and ranches of America—worn-out tractors, plows, rakes, and harrows, even such small pieces as plow points, bolts, and washers are to be found on almost every farm. It is needed to make the steel we must have for military equipment as well as new farm machinery. Disposing of surplus scrap is also a source of income. National ceiling prices have been established on scrap metal, but these are prices to the dealer after he has sorted, processed, prepared, and shipped the scrap to the mill. Local prices will neces-

sarily be less. But get in the scrap. The best grades of scrap metal are found on our farms and ranches, and it is urgently needed.

The index of prices received by farmers drop 1 percent from mid-February to mid-March. The index of prices paid by farmers

were up 1.5 percent above mid-February.

# PIGGLY WIGGLY

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### Exchange Teacher Writes Home From New Zealand

EDITORS NOTE—The following letter was written recently by Mrs. H. B. Naylor, who is an Exchange Teacher to New Zealand for one year, to homefolks after her arrival in New Zealand shortly after February 1st. Mrs. Naylor is the former Dorothy Smith, daughter of Mrs. Victor B. Smith and sister to Rayburn L. Smith of Clarendon.

(Continued from last week)  
True to schedule, we went to sleep on Sunday night and woke in a few hours on Tuesday morning. If I go on around the world I have lost that day forever. New Zealand is beautiful. It is very mountainous but on the hillsides and in the valleys every farm or sheep or cattle run is set apart by a hedge of trees. I presume there are fences too but you can't imagine how very lovely it makes the countryside. We circled several times over Auckland and came down at the aerodrome thirty five miles from the city. I had no difficulty getting thru the customs. Everyone was very friendly and nice from the mo-

ment I arrived. After a hair-raising bus ride into the city which I survived only because an old gentleman of the air force sitting beside me kept informing me about all of the points of interest on the way. I was met in the city by Miss Simpson, a reporter, and a man from the American Embassy. That bus went careening wildly down the wrong side of the road (or so it seemed to me) flying around curves into the path of the oncoming traffic. It was a terrifying experience. I spent a pleasant evening with Miss Simpson another thirty miles from town in the opposite direction. She felt obligated to invite a few people in to meet me and of course I was simply out on my feet by then. The next morning I went to the police court and registered as an alien, and flew down to Wellington. The Wellington aerodrome is miles out too and by the time I got into the city I was positively frozen stiff. Now this is summer here but, "Now mind you, this has been a very poor summer". I have been told a thousand times. Today is the first comfortably warm day since I have been here.

I was met by Mr. Dennis of the U. S. Embassy and Mr. Budge,

a N. Z'er, both from the Educational Foundation. They gave me a cup of tea and whisked me over to one of the Government buildings to meet Dr. Beeby, the highest official in education in N. Z. I spent two days in Wellington. It is quite beautiful. The harbor is really in the crater of a volcano. It is reputedly one of the best and most beautiful harbors in the world. I am sure of the latter point. The city is built on the hills in a semi-circle around the harbor. This is a country of trees and flowers. I have never seen so many beautiful wild flowers. The climate is just right and there are all of the familiar flowers and many new ones but so big and luxuriant that it puts most of ours in the shade as country cousins. I am sure there is not a roof in all of the country that is not painted and they are most colorful. You see all shades of red, yellow, orange, blue and even chartreuse. The houses, too, are epic and span and all look as if they had just had a new coat of paint. The business sections are very old and old fashioned looking, in all of the cities.

Christchurch is without a doubt the prettiest place I have ever seen. There is not a home nor school that does not have its flower garden. There are no slums in the country. Even the poorest sections of the city are not slums. You know they have had a socialist form of government longer than any country and while people grumble about some things I would say that as

a whole they are very well off. Of course it is a small country and I can see how such a plan could work here better than in a country as large as the U. S. If there were as many governmental agencies per capita in the U. S. practically every one would be a gov't employee. Christchurch is on a plain and very flat. The Cashmere Hills are between the Pacific and here and Lyttleton is the harbor ten miles over. To the west are the Southern Alps with some imposing peaks well over 12,000 ft. The city was laid out with a park in the center of more than 700 acres. There is a little river, the Avon, flowing through the city and there are the most luxuriant weeping willows and other huge trees all along its banks. There are little parks and squares with flowers all through the city, right in the business section and everywhere. The cathedral is the exact center of the square and is very beautiful Gothic architecture as are all of the government buildings, the University, Normal school and

many other buildings. The gardens around every home cannot be described. They say that the city is more English than any city in England and it was planned to be that way. I went out today and took up a roll of color film.

The people have been simply wonderful to me. I have not eaten but one evening meal on my own. In fact I have been wined and dined so much that I am really eager to be left a little alone. I think I will just conk out very soon unless I can find some time to rest.

All of the people and everything looked very funny to me at first but I have already become used to it. Everything is so very old fashioned. They dress just as people used to when I was a child and that is about the tempo of

everything. The boys wear short pants until fifteen or sixteen and they wear the funniest looking hats—both men and women. The cars are very old models, especially in Auckland. Some 1906 models are still being used and most of them antedate the twenties and many '20 models are still in use. All of the later ones or most of them are little Austins and baby models. I haven't been in a full sized car except Mr. Dennis's from the American Embassy. Everybody in Christchurch rides a bicycle. Old white-haired women dressed in their Sunday best wearing a fine feathered hat go wheeling along on their bikes. The ultimate though, was when a nun came tearing along, her robes and veils flying in the wind.

I have had mail only twice since I came. It is very slow and it makes me feel very, very far away. People here are not concerned about the war. It is never mentioned and I feel that I am living in an unreal world. It is impossible to tell what is going on at home.

End.

Everything closes now at midnight. That is, everything but the wife's jaws.

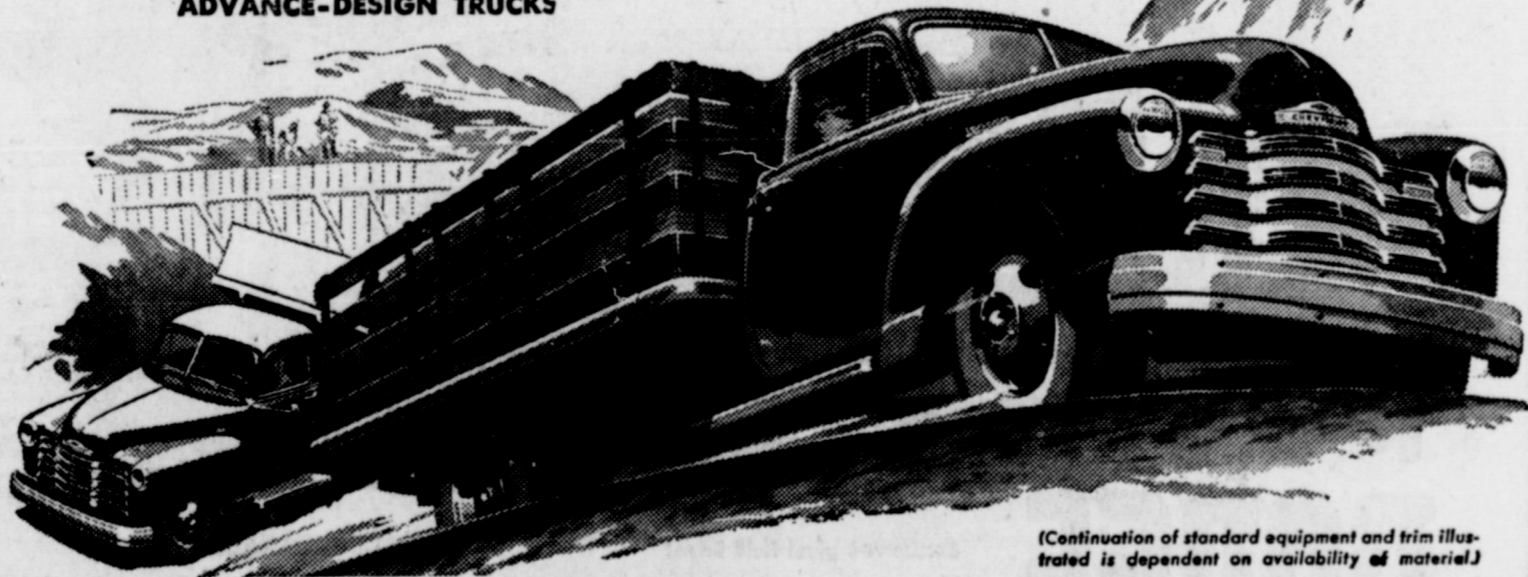

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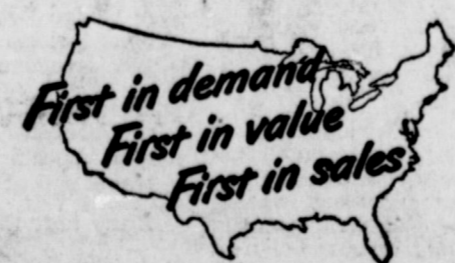

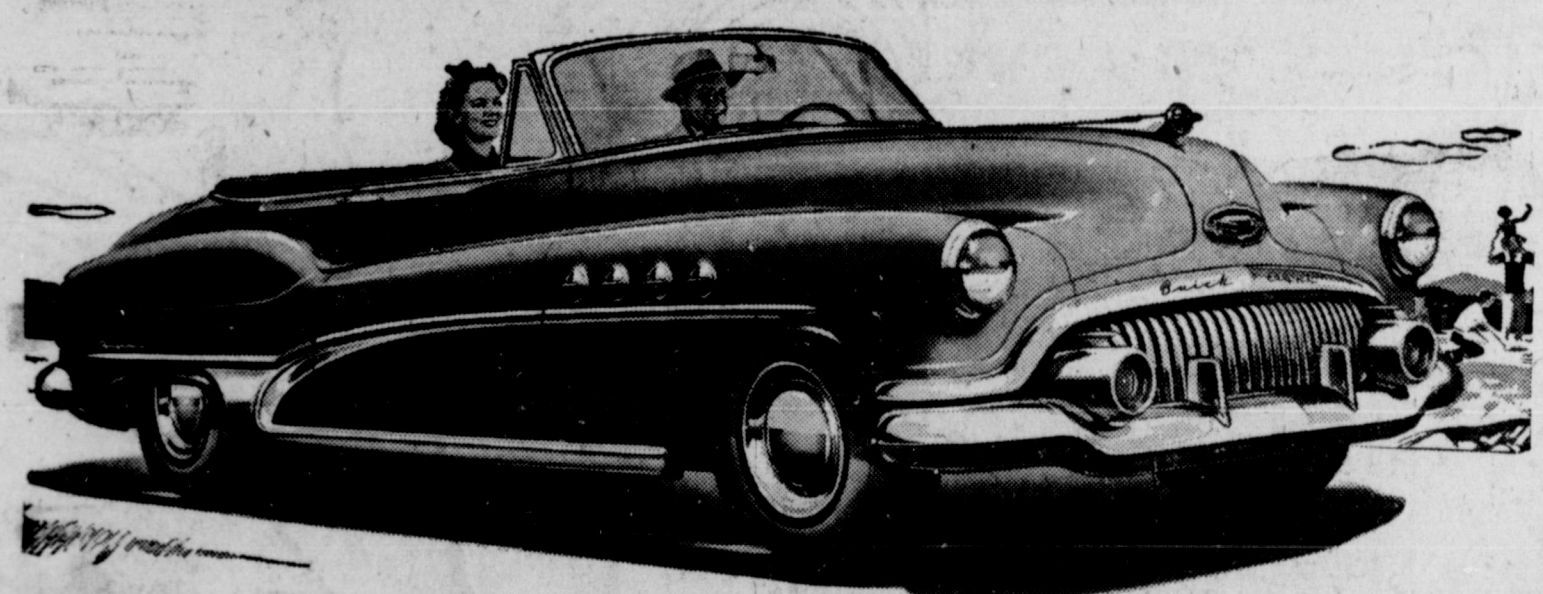
