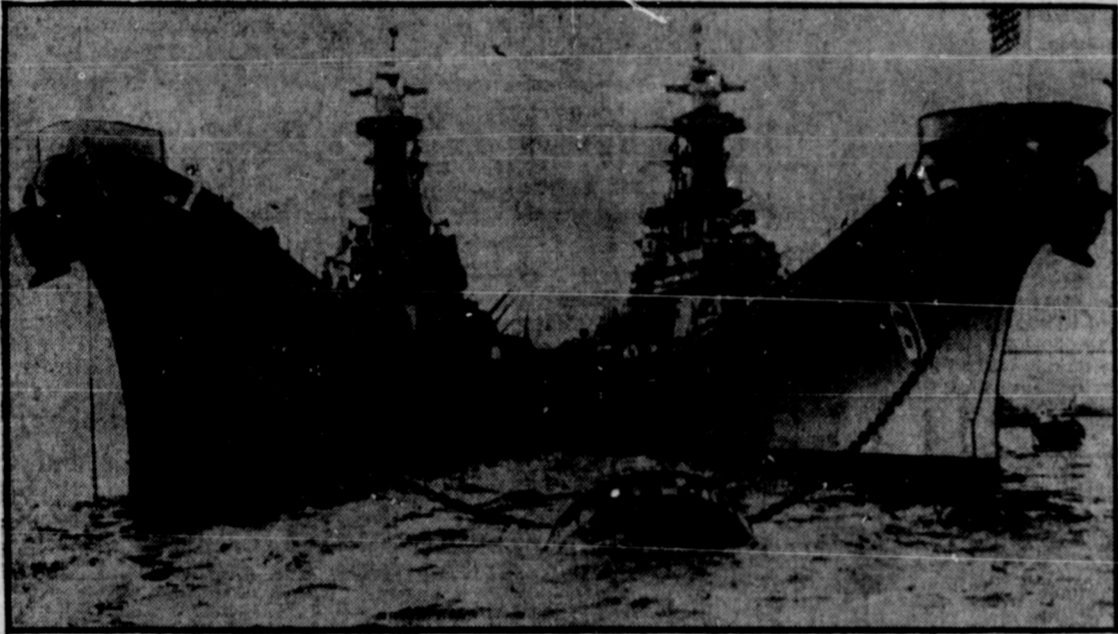

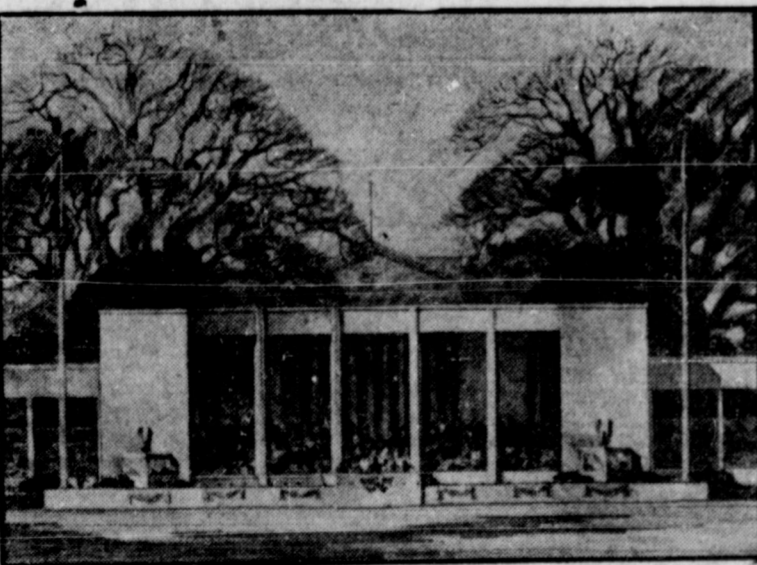

1953 Cotton Production

The United States Department of Agriculture announced 1953 acreage and production goals for spring-planted crops on December 2nd, says County Agent H. M. Breedlove. Included in the announcement was a goal of 22,800,000 acres and 13,000,000 bales for cotton which compares with 26,460,000 acres in cultivation on July 1, 1952 and a 1952 crop of 14,894,000 running bales.

The sharp reduction in cotton acreage and production goal from 1952 average and production has been brought about by a lower export demand than has been present for several years, a leveling off in the domestic demand for textiles and increased competition from synthetic fibers.

The Secretary of Agriculture, Mr. Brannan, has written the State Agricultural Mobilization Committee on the 1953 cotton goal as follows:

"I am sure I do not have to convince you of the difficulty of the cotton outlook at this time. Supplies of American cotton are mounting and unless we do some careful planning we will face mandatory production controls in 1954. Fortunately, we have the machinery necessary to inform all producers of the importance of these adjustments. It is my hope that we can put as much effort into such a campaign this year as we did to get the needed increases in recent years.

"The Department in arriving at a national goal for the 1953 crop took into consideration the current and indicated supply and demand for cotton. On this basis, a production of 13 million bales appears adequate to take care of expected consumption and exports in 1953-54. This level of production will make available a supply of cotton for meeting foreseeable domestic and export demands for cotton and should provide an adequate carryover. Better uses can be made of our land, labor and other resources than that of producing surplus supplies of cotton. If cotton production in 1953 is held to 13 million bales, it probably would strengthen the market price and should avoid the proclamation of marketing quotas for the 1954 cotton crop. Production on the basis of average yields from the State recommended acreage goal almost certainly would result in the proclamation of quotas under existing legislation."

Skelton Services Held Wednesday

Funeral services for H. B. Skelton, nephew of L. H. Skelton of Clarendon, were held Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock in the First Methodist Church at Panhandle. Mr. Skelton was killed when the plane he was presumed to be piloting crashed while he and three companions were hunting coyotes, near Panhandle Sunday afternoon.

Mr. Skelton operated theatres at Panhandle, Gainesville and Temple. He was born at Florence, Texas, attended Baylor University and before moving to Panhandle had lived at Groom, Claude, and Clarendon.

Survivors include his wife, three sons, his parents, six brothers, and two sisters.

Presbyterian Pastor To Be Installed Here Sunday

Dodge of Amarillo, who will preach the sermon; Dr. Fincher, retired minister of Amarillo, who will charge the congregation; Dr. Ewing of Amarillo, Rev. Dodge's elder, who will charge the pastor; and Mr. Lee Shaller, an elder of the local Presbyterian Church, who will complete the Commission. The public is cordially invited.

A supper of sandwiches and drinks will be served the Commission and the members and their friends who come at 6:30 P. M. Dr. Lang will be with the officers of the First Presbyterian Church and the Board of Women's officers at 4 P. M. on Sunday afternoon in a Stewardship meeting. Every officer is urged to be present.

Funeral services were held Tuesday morning at Hereford for Rev. M. M. Beavers, former Clarendon resident, with Rev. Edgar Neal, pastor of the Hereford Methodist Church, officiating.

He retired from the ministry in 1939. He was 80 years old at the time of his death. Burial was in the Hereford Cemetery.

Donley county's new sheriff Truett Behrens and deputy F. A. Fitzgerald, along with Highway Patrolman, S. R. Bain, had their first real activity since being sworn into office, Monday afternoon of this week when they received word from Sheriff Moore of Claude to intercept a 1947 Pontiac headed in this direction, that had crowded two Claude men off the road between Amarillo and Claude.

The driver of the car, Calvin Reid, negro from Amarillo Air Field, was hemmed in near Martin and apprehended. It was found that Reid was AWOL from the Air Base and the car was stolen from R. H. Gerkin at Amarillo earlier in the afternoon. Reid was placed in the local jail for the authorities at Claude and Amarillo.

City officials have announced that all booster pumps of the water system will be shut off next Sunday, Jan. 11th, (weather permitting) so that a master meter might be installed. **To The People of
 The 18th District
 By Cong. Walter Rogers**

THE NEW YEAR:

This letter will reach you as the curtain falls on 1952 and rises again on 1953. The American people, both young and old will stand, as they have in past years, on the threshold of great opportunities for progress and achievement in the New Year. Our lives and our efforts will be dedicated to the fulfillment of a desire that has dominated the minds of Americans since this country was founded, the desire for peace. Every lead and clue to the final realization of this desire must be thoroughly explored and scrutinized. The attainment of this desire will open doors of opportunity for the advancement and progress of civilization that have been heretofore closed solely because so much of the world's efforts have been devoted to means and machines of destruction rather than construction. The chan-

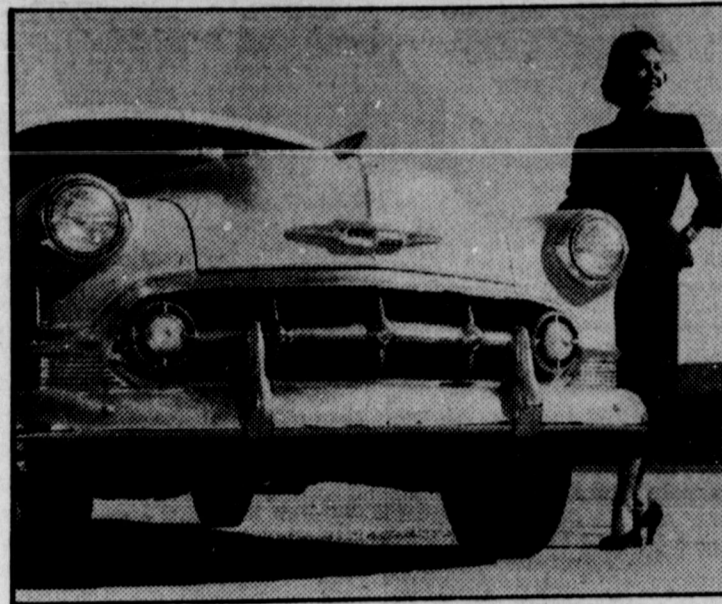
neling of these efforts into peaceful pursuits will bring great blessings and benefits to the people of America and the rest of the world. The delay alone in research for the development and expansion of our natural resources has been tragic, simply because the money and the time had to be spent on war research and war materials. This is most clearly apparent to those of us who live in our section of the country. The great potentialities of the Southwest and especially the Panhandle of Texas are lying dormant. Water is our number one problem, and it remains unanswered because of wars and rumors of wars. If peace could prevail, it could be quickly answered. However, war or no war, it must be answered in the near future. We cannot delay much longer the impounding of surface waters, as could be done by the construction of the Canadian Dam, nor can we delay further research and exploration in the field of irrigation. With an ample supply of water, the Panhandle of Texas

could become one of the most fertile and richest regions in the world from an agricultural standpoint. With our vast fuel supply, a stable water supply could result in the Panhandle becoming one of the great manufacturing centers of the world. Few regions in the world have the great opportunities that are open to us in the Southwest. Our resources must be developed and our initial task is to solve the water problem. This must be done whether peace is attained or not. We cannot continue to expend our natural resources at the present rate, without further development and expansion. If we fail to further develop and to expand our present facilities to utilize our resources, we could be contributing measurably to a weakness in the future that could rebound to the benefit of Russia. This must not happen. An ample central water supply must be created not only for the northern part of the Panhandle and the western side, but also for the eastern and southeastern sections of the district. Much work has been done towards such a project in the southeastern section of the Panhandle that would be of immense benefits to the Hall, Childress, Cottle and Motley Counties vicinity. The pressure for the development of these facilities must continue if we are to continue in our forward progress. The year 1953 should see great strides made in that direction.

THE EISENHOWER APPOINTMENTS:

Most everyone in Washington seems to be well pleased or satisfied with the appointments that have been made by General Eisenhower. It is generally talked that the new President is not being dominated by political motives, but is seeking to satisfy himself as to the ability of the

appointees, rather than to satisfy the political bosses of the several states. There is much comment here about the fact that Eisenhower is not consulting the governors or the senators of the states from which he chooses the appointees. There is much conjecture as to whether or not this will subsequently cause trouble between the President and the political leaders and high office holders in the states from which he has picked his men. Certainly it should not cause a break if the man chosen does a good job. Eisenhower is certainly to be commended for accepting full re-

sponsibility in these appointments. Should one of them turn out bad, it would be the result of an honest mistake and not the result of a political play. The American people have always been willing to accept an honest mistake where there was a sincere desire to do right. They have never been willing to accept a mistake that was the result of political expediency alone. Texas need not worry about a mistake being made in Eisenhower's choice of his Secretary of the Navy. I have known R. B. Anderson, of Vernon, Texas, for twenty years. In fact, he preceded me in

the University of Texas law schools. Subsequently it was my pleasure to have him as an instructor in one of the law courses. His brilliance of mind is well tempered by a natural ability to understand and appreciate the problems of his fellow man. He is to me a living example of a true American success story. Bob Anderson, by his own integrity, his own ability, his own industry, has made the most of the opportunities available to every American, whether he be rich or poor. If Eisenhower has done as well on all of his appointments as he did on his Secretary of the Navy, he need have no fear as to his own success.

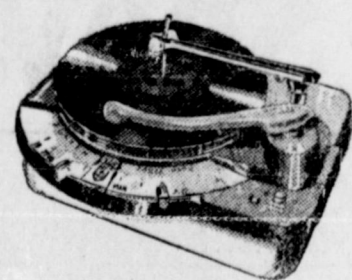

Faith Gospel Mission

It was some trouble to them and they, perhaps made a sacrifice to be with us, but we are thankful for friends who are willing to help and to be cooperative in the Lord's work.

HAY PROGRAM:

The Drought Emergency Hay is still coming into the County a few cars at a time. We have been told that Hay would still be shipped into the County, but possibly just enough to fill the old orders, which have been requested. To date we have received 75 cars of Hay for the entire County.

1953 ACP PROGRAM:

784 producers have signed the form 201 for 1953 either requesting or not requesting assistance for practices to be carried out on his farm. Out of the 784 producers who signed the form 201's only 547 approvals will be issued. The remainder of the producers did not ask for assistance. The 1953 approvals should be mailed out to the producers around the 15th of January. Be sure not to start your 1953 practices until you have received your approvals.

Agricultural Shorts

The Agricultural Conservation Program has proved an effective means of getting farmers to adopt soil and water conservation practices on their farms. Once practices have been established, it has encouraged shifts to other needed practices.

In order to fill the expanding farm needs for these products it is necessary for the mills to operate at or near capacity the year around. This depends upon the extent to which orders on the mills are sufficient to utilize the available rolling capacity.

Farmers can be particularly helpful in solving the present situation by anticipating their needs for the coming crop season and either placing their orders immediately or advising their anticipated requirements. In this way the full demand can properly be gauged and provided for by distributors and the steel mills.

FINAL DATES:

For Commodity Loans the final Dates for Wheat, Grain Sorghum and Barley is January 31, 1953. Cotton April 30, 1953.

Application for Payments:

Any producer who has carried out a practice in 1952 should come into the PMA office and sign an Application for Payment. This will have to be done in the very near future, so if you are one who has not attended to this matter be sure to do so soon.

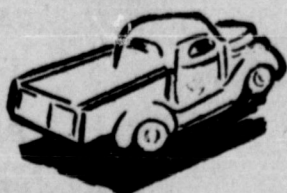

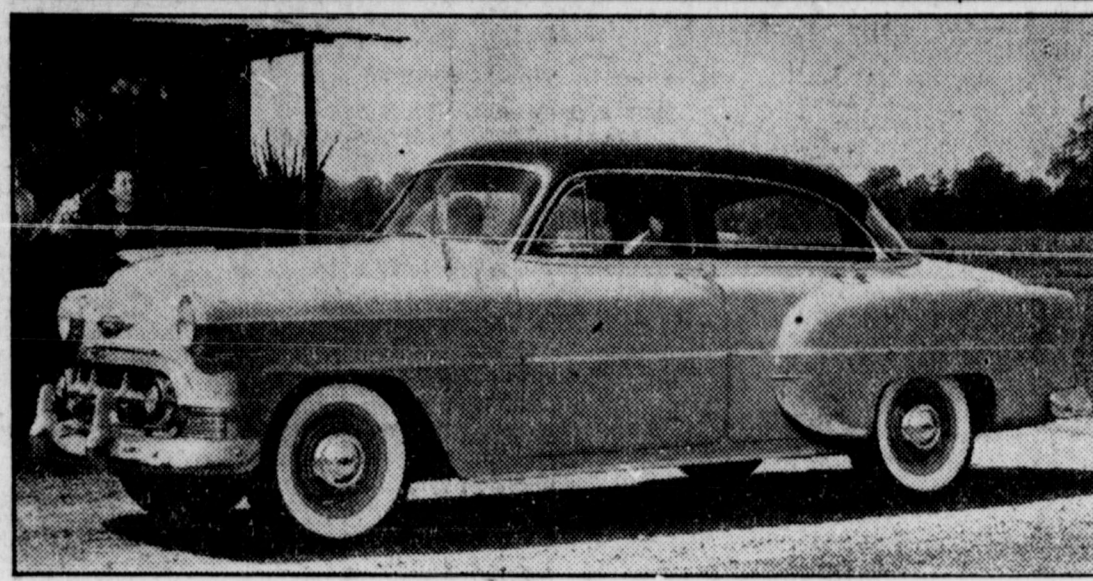
There is a lot about tomorrow that I do not understand;

Farm Bureau Leaders To Meet Jan. 16 In Amarillo

Legislative strategy and organization plans for the Texas Farm Bureau in 1953 will be discussed at a special District 1 conference of state and local Farm Bureau leaders Jan. 16 at the Herring Hotel in Amarillo, Texas, according to Stanley Garnett, state director from this district.

The meeting is one of a series of legislative and organization conferences being held this month in 12 of the 13 Farm Bureau districts in the state. The sessions will begin at 10 a. m. with a report on the last state board meeting by the district director.

Legislative, organization and publicity conferences start at 11 a. m. and continue until noon. Vice-president C. H. DeVaney of Coahoma will preside at the legislative meet, State Field Representative Leon M. Lane will preside at the organization conference and Information Director

Bill Hoover will meet with local newspaper reporters and county Farm Bureau publicity directors. O. R. Long, southern field representative of the American Farm Bureau Federation, is scheduled to speak at a noon luncheon for the group.

Conferences will resume at 1 p. m. and continue until 2 p. m. At that time, DeVaney will speak to the assembly on "The Challenge To Texas Farm Bureau Federation." Following his talk, Lane will speak on the topic "Now Is The Time." A discussion period is scheduled after the speeches.

To be discussed in the conferences will be issues expected to come before the 53rd session of the Texas Legislature which meets Jan. 13 in Austin. These include legislation affecting rural roads, non-highway gas rebates, water and seed laws and many more issues vital to persons engaged in agriculture. The Texas Farm Bureau Federation was considered the most influential lobby at the last legislative session.

Among other things, the state farm organization led the fight that saved the rural road program in Texas and non-highway gasoline rebates. The Farm Bureau was also instrumental in obtaining other legislation favorable to the farmers and ranchers. Allied with the Farm Bureau in the road program battle were the rural letter carriers and county judges associations. Had the fight been lost, it would have meant, among the many repercussions, that the counties would lose their present road bond assumption monies, and that new sources of revenue would have to be found to finance county governments.

In the light of the vital issues expected to come before the legislature, DeVaney has urged all persons interested in the welfare of agriculture in Texas to join the Farm Bureau movement.

"The maxim 'in unity there is strength' is all too true," he stated. "The people in the rural areas of the state who depend upon the soil, either directly or indirectly, for a living must band together to protect their common interests in an expanding industrial economy. Even now, the farmer must buy from, sell to, and rely on services of economic groups that are strongly organized. This is an age of organization. The farmer must organize, too, if he is to survive."

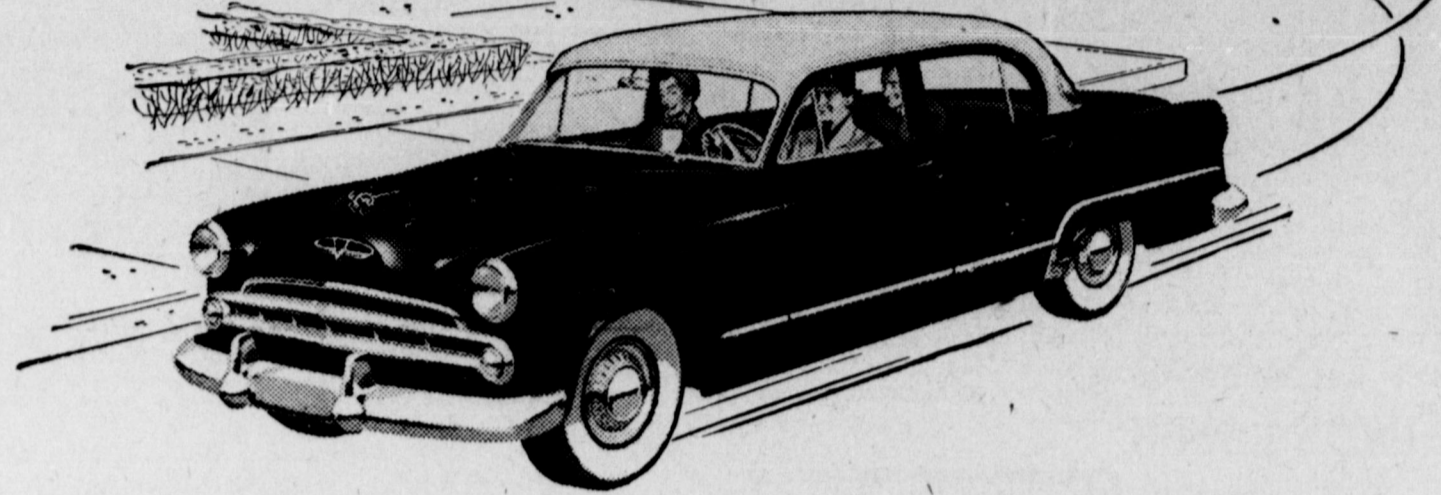

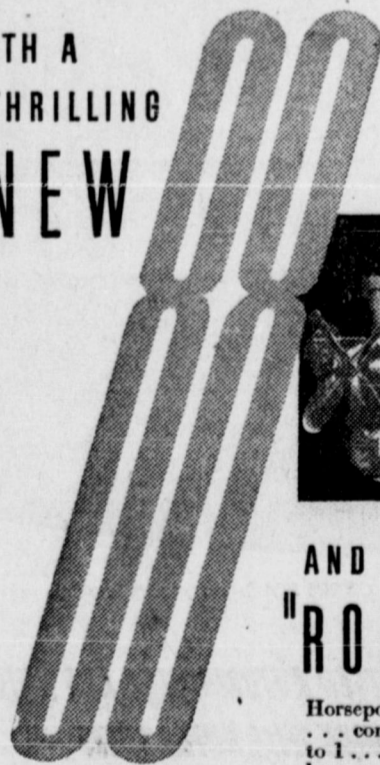
