### Holiday Tournament For CJC Bulldogs

The Clarendon Junior College Basketball team reported back to the Coach last Tuesday from their Christmas festivities to get in a couple of days of drills and conditioning preceding their entry in the Howard County Junior College holiday invitational basketball tournament. This promises to be one of the strongest tournaments for Junior College participation in the nation.

Dean Abel, while visiting in Kansas last week, lifted the following article from the Hutchinson News. The article was written by the Hutchinson sports-writer Fred Mendell, who had secured the information from Joe Much, Editor of Junior College Sports. "Prior to the National Junior College Athletic Association regional tournaments it would be tough to spot a stronger tournament than the one planned at Howard County Jucio gym, Big Springs, Tex., Dec. 29-31."

Seeded No. 1 at Big Springs is Tyler, loser to Parsons Kansas in the 1960 finals of the National Tournament, currently rated No. 1 nationally and the team which has captured more national titles than any other.

Other entries include San Angelo College, a former National Champ, which has five starters back from last year; Howard County itself, reported best in years; Amarillo, Frank Phillips, San Antonio, Clarendon, Decatur Baptists and others which fans of this area will recognize as always-dangerous competitors.

Coach Young's Bulldogs who are presently leading the conference with an average of 74.2 points per game for 10 games and who have won their last 3 consecutive games will meet Paris Junior College's strong quintet in their first game of the tournament at 4:00 p.m. today.

Coach Young will have 10 boys from which to select, all of whom have appeared in 8 or more games of the 10 games played to date this season, to carry the green and white colors of the Clarendon Junior College through the tournament.

### 1960 Is Wet Year With Over 40 Inches Of Moisture

1960 will go down in history as one of the wettest years for this part of the country with a grand total of 40.79 being tallied here so far with the prospect of additional moisture before the new year begins Sunday.

The above total was the amount measured here in town by our official weather observer. Farmers in other parts of the county measured considerable more moisture with Horace Green, farmer near Ashtola, measuring over 50 inches.

Moisture by months was as follows: Jan.-1.58; Feb.-1.56; March-1.28; April-.22; May-5.86; June-8.97; July-6.13; August-2.68; Sept. 2.98; Oct. 8.51; Nov.00; Dec.-1.32.

November was an unusual month with no moisture being recorded at all April which is ordinarily one of the wetter months only produced .22 inch, October and June were the top months with over 8 inches.

We have finally received a bulletin from the U.S. Department of Commerce showing the official 1960 Census of Population for Donley County and divisions therein.

The report shows a total population for Donley County at 4,449. Clarendon division 3,140; City of Clarendon 2,172; Hedley division 1,309 and City of Hedley 494.

It shows the State of Texas at 9,579,677. This is a gain of 1,868,483 or 24.2 percent, over the 7,711,194 inhabitants of the state in 1950.

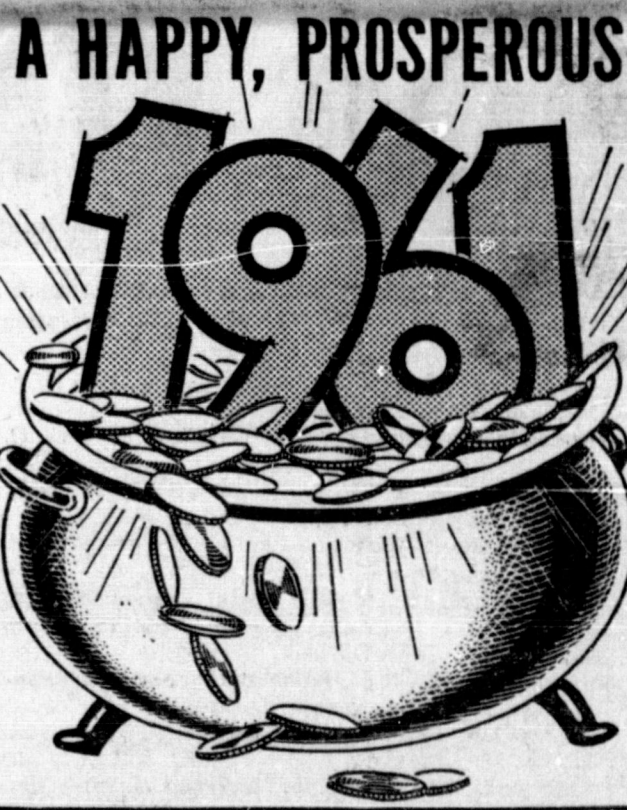

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN — So far this year, the average number of persons killed in Texas traffic accidents has been slightly more than four per day.

But during the 10-day holiday period, the average is expected to jump to nine. Department of Public Safety is predicting 90 traffic fatalities in the 10 days from December 23 to January 1. In the first 49 weeks of this year, the traffic toll was 2,025.

Tabbed the worst day of the year is Saturday, December 24. Tying for second in the DPS predictions was Friday, December 23, and Sunday, December 25. New Year's day will rank third. DPS predictions, though based on sober experience, are not the last word. During last year's holidays, which were marked by an intensive safety campaign, drivers brought down a predicted 111 deaths to an actual 97. A similar cut would hold this year's holiday motorcides to about 80.

More important than totals and averages to the man at the wheel is whether he himself will wind up a statistic. Best way to get "home for Christmas" and back again, DPS officials advise, is to obey traffic laws scrupulously.

Says Col. Homer Garrison Jr., department director, "Experience

has shown without a doubt that in most fatal traffic accidents, at least one violation of the traffic laws is a causative factor."

**TAB TAKE DOWN** — Revenue from the new tax bill passed by the Legislature in 1959 is running nearly 11 per cent below expectations.

The Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy (a legislative study group) reports income for the first year of \$81,700,000, compared with a predicted \$91,100,000.

A big part of the discrepancy came from a cut in cigarette smoking after the tax jumped from five to eight cents a pack. Revenue from hotel room rentals also fell short of predictions. Income from the severance beneficiary tax on gas is tied up pending a final court decision on whether it's constitutional.

Besides these new tax setbacks, an old faithful revenue raiser, the motor fuel tax, is off. State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said gasoline tax revenue was down .23 of one per cent from July to October. Cited as possible causes were compact cars and "piggyback" shipment of trailer trucks by rail.

**F-M ROAD CHANGE URGED** — Texas Good Roads Association will ask the next Legislature to authorize use of the \$15,000,000-

a-year farm road allocation for maintenance as well as construction of rural roads.

At present, the state spends \$27,000,000 a year on upkeep of the vast farm road system. This comes from regular Highway Department funds since the \$15,000,000 is an automatic general revenue appropriation which can be used only to build new farm roads.

TGRA favors continuing to take the F-M road money from the general revenue fund. This is to "get back" part of the \$70,000,000 a year in highway-use taxes (gasoline, car registrations) that go to non-highway purposes. It recommended giving the Highway Department authority to zone the new divided highways for higher speed limits, up to 70 miles per hour.

**GAS TAX HELD VOID** — Texas' severance beneficiary tax on natural gas took another legal tumble when the Third Court of Civil Appeals agreed with district court in holding it unconstitutional.

Case goes now to the Texas Supreme Court and then to the U. S. Supreme Court to be settled finally.

Thus far, the severance beneficiary tax is having worse luck than the gas gathering tax which the Civil Appeals Court held constitutional in 1953. It was finally knocked down by the U. S. Supreme Court.

Thus far, \$11,016,414 in severance beneficiary taxes has been paid to the state under protest. This cannot be spent, however, as long as the tax is being contested in the courts.

**SAUNDERS CASE CLOSED** — Court of Criminal Appeals has closed the books on the perjury charge against former State Insurance Commission Chairman J. Byron Saunders.

A district court sentenced Saunders to two years in prison on the charge that he lied to a legislative investigating committee about money he received from an insurance company. Appeals Court threw out the conviction, saying that false testimony before a legislative committee is not perjury in the legal sense.

Travis County Dist. Atty. Les Proctor twice asked for re-hearing, contending the decision left legislative committees without authority to get truth from witnesses. But the court made the decision final by overruling Proctor's motion with no written opinion.

**PROPERTY OWNER VOTE UPHOLD** — Texas Supreme Court issued an opinion upholding the action of Laredo election judges in restricting the vote in an urban renewal election to property owners.

In the Laredo election, a proposal that the city participate in the federal urban renewal program lost. Urban renewal supporters challenged the election because of the property owner restriction on voting.

San Antonio Court of Civil Appeals ruled that the restriction was unconstitutional because the proposal did not call for spending money. Supreme Court disagreed, pointing out that an urban renewal agency could spend money and issue bonds. High court sent the case back to the civil appeals court with instructions to reconsider.

**SHORT SNORTS** — Texas Railroad Commission decided to continue December's oil quotas through March. This means production of 2,799,157 barrels a day on a nine-day producing pattern. Earlier, Commission Chairman Ernest O. Thompson had suggest-

ed that perhaps Texas should start producing more oil to keep other states from grabbing the market. . . . Despite protests of several legislators, the State Library Commission voted to merge the Texas Rural Library Service and the State Library's extension division. Five employees lose jobs in the change. . . . Governor Daniel appointed John Barron, Bryan attorney, to succeed District Judge W. T. McDonald, who was elected to the Court of Criminal Appeals. McDonald will succeed Judge Lloyd Davidson, whom he defeated for re-election.

### HINTS ON STORING COTTON PLANTING SEED

College Station — Do you store your own cotton planting seed? If you do, it would be a good idea to check the seed for stored grain pests. Fred Elliott, extension cotton specialist, and C. F. Garner, extension entomologist, say these pests occasionally infest stored cottonseed. This is especially true if a large percentage of the seed are cracked or if the seed is stored in infested bins.

Cottonseed should only be stored in bins that have been thoroughly cleaned of waste material such as old grain, trash or feed sacks, the specialists say. Sometimes it is necessary to sweep the ceiling and walls and clean the floor to remove hidden waste. It is also a good practice to cover cracks with builder's molding to prevent seed from collecting in them. Waste grain, seed and other materials beneath and near the bins should be destroyed.

After the bin and surrounding area have been thoroughly cleaned, they should be sprayed with a 2 1/2 percent solution of either Methoxychlor, TDE or premium grade Malathion. Methoxychlor and TDE are also available as wettable powders and emulsion concentrates.

Dusts can also give satisfactory protection against insect pests. Toxaphene (20%), DDT (5%) or malathion (4-5%) should be mixed with the seed at the rate of 2 oz. per bushel.

Elliott and Garner warn that treated seed should never be crushed or used for feed. For further information on treating stored cottonseed contact the local county agent.

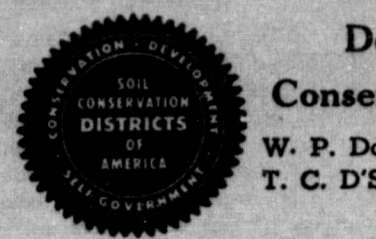

December is a good time to make a survey of your rangeland. Do you have ample forage on your range to carry your livestock through the winter months and still have sufficient grass remaining to furnish a good protective litter? Surely you are not a member of that unlucky group having to furnish bundles or hay each day, in addition to cake, throughout the winter.

Supplying livestock with a daily ration of high protein feed in the winter is a necessary practice when grasses have lost much of their own protein, for research has shown that the percentage of protein drops as the plant matures — in some grasses as much as ten per cent. Supplying additional forage during times of heavy snow and ice is also necessary and practical but should not be required throughout the entire winter season.

To the rancher, sound practical economics means harvesting his forage on a 12 month basis by the use of grazing livestock. When forage supply becomes short and he has to dig into his earnings to furnish additional hay or bundles, his net profit is being consumed by hungry livestock. Why spend money carrying forage to livestock when it can be raised on a serve yourself basis? How can you, as a rancher, afford to do this? Actually you cannot afford it. Certainly you are making a profit or you wouldn't continue in the ranching business but, are you making the maximum profit expected from your land?

Having ample forage at the end of the growing season to carry livestock through the dormant season means that you have recognized the need of leaving approximately one half of the yearly production for winter consumption. If you haven't already done so, walk across your rangeland and check the height (volume by weight) of your grass. Next, compare this figure with the same grass found along an ungrazed fence-row. I hope that after making your comparison you can turn away with confidence and knowingly state that you are satisfied with the amount of forage now on the ground. If you had difficulty in making your comparison, ask your local Soil Conservation Service technicians for advice. Some other items you

may want to consider or have the technician check are: (1) What is the potential productivity of my rangeland? (2) How many animal units can I safely graze? (3) Am I presently overstocked? (4) How can I make my program more flexible to allow for the drouthy years?

**DIVERSIONS**  
Diverting water by means of a diversion terrace has been in operation for quite some time in the Donley County Soil Conservation District.

The purpose of such diversions is to prevent soil erosion. It does this job by intercepting and conducting surface runoff to a safe outlet at a safe speed. Another purpose for a diversion is to divert excess surface runoff water for livestock. An example of this being a terrace built to put more water in a stock tank.

One type of diversion, the level closed in diversion, serves to hold water on the land until it can be absorbed.

It should be noted that the diversions mentioned above should not be installed to take the place of standard terraces. For a standard terrace system will usually do a much better conservation job on cropland than diversions. This, of course, depends upon slope of land, soil tendency to erode, etc. Long gentle slopes that do not require standard terraces possibly should have diversions installed to break up concentrations of water.

The most common uses of diversions are: (1) divert outflow water from cropland, (2) divert water into or out of farm ponds, (3) protect certain types of land from runoff of adjacent land, and (4) serve as a part of a standard terrace system where the system is not adequate to control erosion.

Two government cost share programs are available to help install these diversions. One is the Great Plains Conservation Program and the other is the

ACP Program. For help concerning either, contact any member of the Donley County SCD or technician with the Soil Conservation Service. Both will be glad to give what help they can.

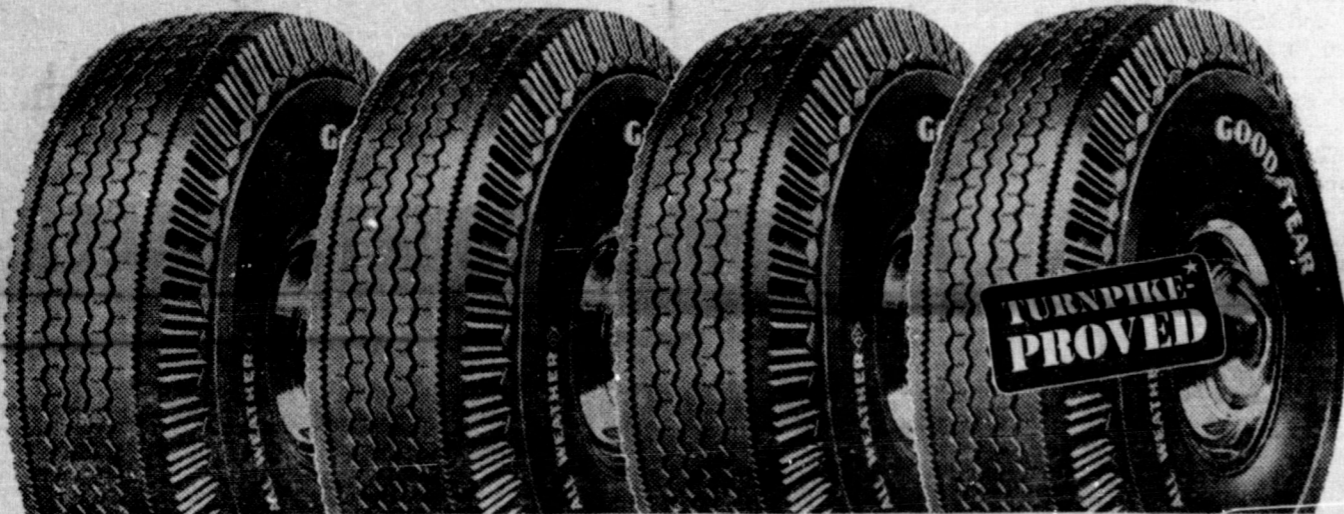
