ACP Emergency Flood Damage Program

Donley County has received an allocation to assist farmers and ranchers in repairing the damage done to terraces and dams by the flood rains that occured last spring in our county. Cost-sharing assistance will be based on a percentage of the actual cost of carrying out the work. For this reason, if the work is not done by a contractor, it will be necessary for the farmer or rancher to furnish written statements of the actual cost on each practice carried out.

Wheat Program For 1961 The wheat program for 1961 will be essentially the same as for 1960. Farmers who have a wheat allotment of less than 15 acres or no allotment at all may plant up to 15 acres of wheat on the farm and market the total production without penalty. The minimum price support for the 1961 crop has been announced at \$1.78 per bushel on a national average.
