

# **Amarillo voters** reject banning public smoking

Amarillo voters narrowly rejected an overreaching ban on smoking in public places Saturday, but the Health Nazis aren't about to just roll over after their

The ban was defeated by a margin of 14,718 to 15.274; and even though her side got beaten, the chair-

woman of Amarillo Clean Air Now (CAN) thinks she sees a mandate to protect people from the evils of second-hand smoke.

"Almost 50 percent of Amarillo citizens want the right to breathe smoke-free," Casey McCann told the AMARILLO GLOBE-NEW S.

Unfortunately for McCann, "almost" doesn't count in elec-

The fact of the matter is that more than 50 percent of Amarillo voters correctly realized that smoking is a personal issue and more importantly that allowing - or not allowing - smoking in a restaurant or other establishments is a private property right that belongs exclusively to the property owner. No one should have that right taken away - not even by a vote of the people.

As far as the right to breathe smoke-free goes, no one has put a gun to anyone's head and made them work in or patronize an establishment where smoking is allowed. If that's a big deal to you, then quit or go eat somewhere else. But whether or not someone smokes in a place of business ought to be left entirely up to the owner of that business.

McCann's group doesn't see it that way though, and it is already considering organizing another petition to force the issue to another vote.

But if CAN wants to really accomplish something, it could utilize the power of the free market by recognizing and promoting businesses who voluntarily prohibit smoking. That way health-conscious restaurants could cater to non-smokers, other establishments could welcome smokers or have separate sections for smokers and non-smokers, and the rights of everybody would be protected.

# Legislature gets priorities mixed up

With end of the Legislative session drawing to a close in the coming weeks, state representatives got serious about taking care of Texas' affairs last week and voted to crack down on high school cheerleaders.

By a vote of 65-56, the House of Representatives voted to ban "suggestive cheerleading" performances and acted to give the Texas Education Agency (TEA) the authority to monitor such performances if it receives complaints and to take action to make school districts sorry if they allow too much bumping and grinding to be going on down on the sidelines

You might expect such a bill would be proposed by an ultra-conservative, Bible-thumping Republican. But actually it was sponsored by a self-righteous Democrat, Rep. Al Edwards of Houston, who claims that raunchy cheerleading leads to teen pregnancy, dropping out of school, and the spread of sexually transmitted diseases - although not necessarily in that order.

Edwards' bill doesn't define "suggestive cheerleading," but he has told reporters, "Any adult that's been involved with sex in their lives, they know it when they see it," he said.

Sounds like a dirty-minded old man with a thing for high school girls to me.

Critics have suggested that maybe - just maybe Legislators ought to be more concerned with things like financing public education and overhauling the state's broken down Child Protective Services before regulating cheerleading routines. Besides, the TEA has better things to do with its time - like giving ulcers to fourth graders who now live in fear of the TAKS test.

So far Edwards' bill hasn't gotten any traction in the Senate, and at least one of his Democratic House colleagues has shown more sense than he has.

"This is a ridiculous bill. I don't know how it got to the floor," Rep. Senfronia Thompson (D-Houston) told the Houston Chronicle. "We don't have any business mandating anything. We are spending time on '2-3-4, we can't shake it anymore.' It's an embarrass-

# Help small business provide insurance

According to a recent study, 27 percent of working adults in Texas have no medical insurance coverage - the highest rate in the country. Many of them have no health coverage because they work for small business owners who want to offer their employees insurance but are unable to provide this benefit. People who work for large corporations often have a variety of health plans from which to choose. With thousands of employees in different states and other countries, big businesses are able to negotiate a cost effective plan that enables them to offer affordable health benefits to their employees.

Health care and insurance costs are increasing across the board with rate increases of up to 30 percent during the last year alone. This hits small businesses particularly hard since they pay more for

health insurance already and often operate on razorthin profit margins.

Nationwide, 60 percent of uninsured Americans are employed by small businesses

There is a light at the end of the tunnel. I am co-sponsoring The Small Business Health Fairness Act, which would allow the creation of Association Health Plans (AHPs). AHPs would permit members of bona fide associations to pool their resources to get affordable health coverage packages from insurance companies.

AHPs would have to meet rigorous

standards - even more stringent than those followed by large national corporations and labor unions. Uniform federal regulation of AHPs will help businesses lower their administrative costs. The Congressional Budget Office estimates small businesses participating in AHPs will receive insurance premium reductions ranging from 13-25 percent.

Small business provides the bulk of jobs in the United States. They also represent the entrepreneurship and innovation which creates the industries of the future. Congress should help rather than create barriers to their success.

By promoting AHPs, we will encourage more small businesses to offer this benefit, which is not only good for workers and their employers but good for Texas and our healthcare.

# Free, low-cost drug offers not so great

Perhaps you have seen the infomercials or received offers like these: "Let us help you find free medicines! No Insurance? No Money to pay for expensive

As we all know, prescription medicine can be a very expensive part of an individual's healthcare. If your health care provider has prescribed a medicine and you can't afford to pay for it, you may be able to get the medicine for free or for a reduced cost. There are several kinds of assistance programs that maybe helpful to

Ads like those mentioned above abound. Some marketers and businesses are offering information on free or lowcost prescription drug programs for a fee. According to federal officials, consumers have been asked to pay as much as \$195 for assistance in finding free drug programs. In other cases the consumer is asked to pay a monthly membership fee and sign a contract. Consumers are urged to think twice before paying for information on how to find these types of

A Federal Trade Commission alert tells consumers that free information on discounted or free prescription drugs is available from physicians, pharmacists, and a new Web site, www.pparx.org. The web site provides information on patient assistance programs for consumers who lack prescription drug coverage. Consumers can apply for free or low-cost prescription programs or medicines on the Web site or ask their health care provider to help them apply. This newly launched initiative by PhRMA called Partnership for Prescription Assistance has recently gained national momentum.

According to the American Academy of Family Physician website, Mary E. Frank, M.D., president of the American Academy of Family Physicians, states, "Millions of Americans already benefit from patient assistance programs, but we know that millions more who may be eligible have not yet enrolled," In addition, she states "Because of this effort on the part of the pharmaceutical industry to simplify and broaden their assistance programs, each patient's personal physician will find

it easier to help them get the medications they need. That's why the American Academy of Family Physicians recommends this program to those we serve."

Patient assistance programs (also called PAPs) are sponsored by companies that make prescription medicines. Each company has its own rules about who qualifies for its PAP. In many cases, you will need to show that you don't qualify for private or public health insurance for prescription drugs. You also need to prove that your income is below a certain level. Each program has its own application process and health care providers must approve and sign most applications for these assistance programs.

Many physicians' offices offer help with patient assistance programs and obtaining affordable, reduced cost medications. In fact, many medical offices are committed to helping their patients receive necessary medications. They see it as an extension of the medical treatment they provide. If you are finding it difficult to afford your medications, you are encouraged to speak with your pharmacist or your health care provider.



# Specialist says age can cause sleep disorders

Humans devote about one-third of their lives to one activity but think little about it - until they cannot do it. This activity has a calming effect, often leaves one feeling refreshed, and promotes overall wellness. What is this activity? Sleep.

Along with the physical changes that occur as we get older, changes to our sleep patterns may also occur. As people age, they tend to have a harder time falling asleep and more trouble staying asleep. It is a common misconception that sleep needs decline with age; but, our sleep needs remain constant throughout life. Sleep occurs in multiple stages including dreamless periods of light and deep sleep and occasional periods of active dreaming. The sleep cycle is repeated several times during the night. Older people spend more time in the lighter stages of sleep than in deep sleep.

Insomnia is the inability to sleep and occurs more frequently among older adults. Insomnia may create serious effects, complicating other conditions or making a person too tired to function normally during his waking hours. People with insomnia can experience excessive daytime sleepiness, difficulty concentrating, and increased risk for accidents and

# Drugs in the News

# Impressive Test Results for Weight Loss Drug

Two-year data from test results of a drug aimed at helping people lose weight and quit smoking were presented recently at a meeting of the American College of Cardiology Scientific Sessions. The drug, called Acomplia (rimonabant), is a member of a new class or type of drugs researchers refer to cannabinoid receptor blockers. Drugs that work this way are thought to play a role in obesity, glucose metabolism, and smoking habits. Data presented at the session indicated that over 40% of the 1,507 persons in the trial who took Acomplia for 12 months experienced an approximate 10% loss in body weight. Data from the trial indicates that waist size decreased by 7.5 centimeters in those who got Acomplia compared to a waist size reduction in the placebo group of 3.4 centimeters. Another positive result from the trial was the tendency by those who got the drug to experience an increase in HDL cholesterol ("good cholesterol").

Acomplia has not been approved for prescribing by physicians. However, reports indicate that the manufacturer hopes to license the drug as an oral tablet (pill) in the US sometime in 2006.
