During this time, citizens can use the city's recycling center on North Front Street to dump trash and other debris free of charge. Also, if any elderly or disabled resident has something they need hauled off but are unable to do so themselves, they are urged to call City Hall at 874-3438 to arrange assistance.

Thornberry will hold two district meetings

U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) will be in Pampa and Borger on Saturday to visit with local constituents and to hear their concerns about the challenges facing our nation.

Thornberry will be in Borger on Saturday, April 2. The meeting will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the Council Chambers located at 600 North Main. He will be in Pampa that same day, at 11:30 a.m. at the Pampa Community Building which is located at 200 North Ballard.

Ambulance Authority planning EMT training

The Associated Ambulance Authority is taking applications now for an EMT-Basic training class to be held April 18 through August 8.

Partial funding for the class is provided by Texas Tech University and the Texas Department of Transportation. Students will need to pay for their insurance and textbooks, which should cost \$100.

The class will meet from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. on Mondays and Thursdays at the ambulance building on the Medical Center campus.

City begins implementing new paving program

The Clarendon Board of Aldermen approved the engineering contract for the 2005 street paving program when they met in regular session March 22.

The action marks another step toward paving approximately 50 blocks of city streets this year.

City Administrator Sean Pate told the board that the city should have the money from the recently authorized tax notes by the end of this week.

In the meantime, surveyors from OJD Engineering have been marking selected streets as part of the program. Stakes are being placed 40 feet apart for cutting purposes, and the backs of the curbs will be placed 4½ feet inside those markers to allow for streets approximately 30 feet wide.

Residents are asked not to move the stakes and to be advised that the

stakes do not mark the edge of future paving. Space between the stakes and the new curbs will be backfilled.

Also, city crews have begun ripping the old pavement on Collinson Street as a precursor to paving in the coming months, and other streets will be ripped and prepped as the project gets nearer.

In other city business, the board approved Ordinance #355, canceling the May 7, 2005, election and declaring all unopposed candidates duly elected. Alderman Michael Tibbets abstained since he was one of those candidates.

Dee Dee Autry addressed the board on behalf of the Bar H Dude Ranch and asked for \$480 from the Motel Bed Tax Fund to attend the Texas Travel Councilors Show, where the Bar H would promote all of Donley County and the annual

events in Clarendon in particular. The board approved the request.

Pate advised that the City of Childress had declined to help with local propane inspections. The board decided to check with a local plumber to see if he could perform the inspections.

The board approved a bid on tax delinquent property in the North Ward community.

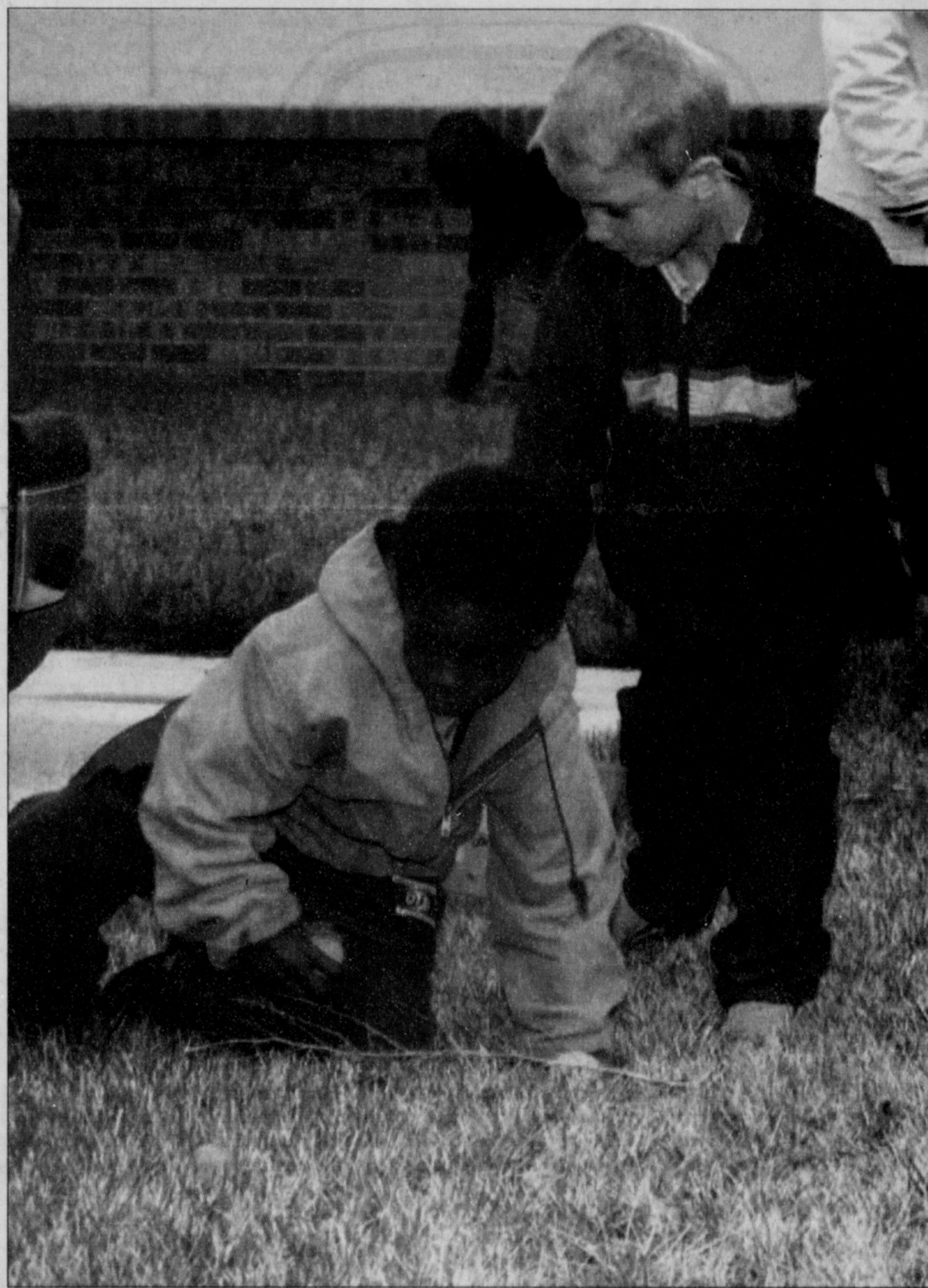
Aldermen approved the setting up of funds in a pooled account as recommended by city auditors.

Alderman Tibbets suggested the city contribute \$150 to a charity in memory of former sheriff Jimmy Thompson and also suggested that Thompson's widow receive a letter expressing the city's gratitude for her husband's 20 years of service to the community. The mayor directed Pate to carry out Tibbets' request.

Sign-up opens for '05 conservation program

TEMPLE - Farmers and ranchers in 20 different watersheds across Texas are among those invited to participate in the first national sign up of the historic new Conservation Security Program (CSP). The Upper Salt Fork of the Red River located primarily in Donley County with portions of Armstrong, Carson, and Gray Counties was one of the 20 selected. The sign up will be available from March 28 to May 27.

CSP, a part of the 2002 Farm Bill and administered by NRCS, is a voluntary program that supports ongoing stewardship of private, agricultural working lands and rewards those producers who are meeting the highest standards of conservation and environmental management on their

operations. In Texas, CSP, which is being made available on a watershed basis, will be available in specified watersheds throughout the state. Selected Texas watersheds include the Upper Salt Fork of the Red River watershed which includes portions of Donley, Armstrong, Carson, and Gray Counties.

Nationally, CSP is being made available on private agricultural land in 220 watersheds, covering about 185 million acres, in every state and the Caribbean. The national \$202 million budget will allow NRCS to offer an estimated 12,000 to 14,000 contracts to eligible farmers and ranchers.

Producers with over 50 percent

of their land inside the selected watershed boundaries have met the first criteria for program eligibility.

Producers interested in participating will need to fill out a self-assessment workbook prior to sign up to determine if their operations meet the requirements of the program. More information and the self-assessment workbook is available at local USDA Service Centers or www.tx.nrcs.usda.gov/programs/csp. Participating landowners will receive funding for practices primarily addressing water quality, soil quality, and wildlife habitat. They will be participating on three different tiers reflecting both their documented historical conservation management and additionally planned enhancements.

CC will raise tuition, fees

Clarendon College Regents voted to increase tuition and fees for the coming academic year when they met in regular session March 24.

The board raised tuition by \$3 per semester hour, the building-use fee by \$4 per hour, and the out of district rate by \$2 per hour.

CC President Myles Shelton said the action was necessary based on the level of funding the college is receiving from the state.

"It is apparently the intent of the Legislature to not put any new or additional money into community colleges, and they expect us to raise money locally," Shelton said.

Legislation now before the House of Representatives maintains CC's current appropriation of \$2.086 million per year. That's better than an earlier proposal which would have dropped CC's funding to \$1.643 million per year, but it does nothing to correct the cuts the state made two years ago.

"It is absolutely true that we've gone from being state supported to being state assisted," Shelton said.

The president also said CC's new rates put it at exactly the same level as Frank Phillips College in Borger and at a rate comparable to South Plains College in Levelland.

"We're still affordable, and we're still going to offer quality programs," he said. "We'll still be competitive."

In other college business, regents approved a resolution authorizing revenue refunding bonds to refinance Regents Hall. The move will save \$12,000 to \$18,000 annually or \$254,000 over the life of the bonds, which will be paid off in 2022.

The board considered the repair of faulty showers in the west wing of Regents Hall and accepted bids from Quality Ceramic Tile of Amarillo and Shadle Construction of Clarendon.

The Livestock & Equine Advisory Committee presented a list of short- and long-term goals associated with the CC Livestock & Equine Center. On the short-term list were items pertaining to pens, feed storage, a watering system, road and parking issues, and security lighting. Long-term goals included class, office, and meeting rooms.

The scholarship allocation planning for next year was adjusted to reflect increases in tuition and fees.

The board received an update on its ongoing litigation with Reynosa Construction. A remediation has been scheduled in the case for this Friday.

Regents approved hiring Jeff Rhodes as the new Dean of Students. He was previously the registrar at Odessa College. The employment of Betty Baldwin as a custodian was ratified, and the board accepted the

CC judging contest boosts businesses

Spruell said increased sales during the contest usually begin at 12:30 p.m., and Dairy Queen will be ready.

"We will have enough staff, enough food and expect no problems," she said. "We will be extremely busy, and very happy."

The event will also have an impact on Clarendon College. Johnny Treichel, Clarendon College livestock and meats judging coach, said the event is the biggest recruiting tool for the college.

"This is the only time each year the college has this many potential students on campus," he said. "And we are pleased to have such positive support from the community."

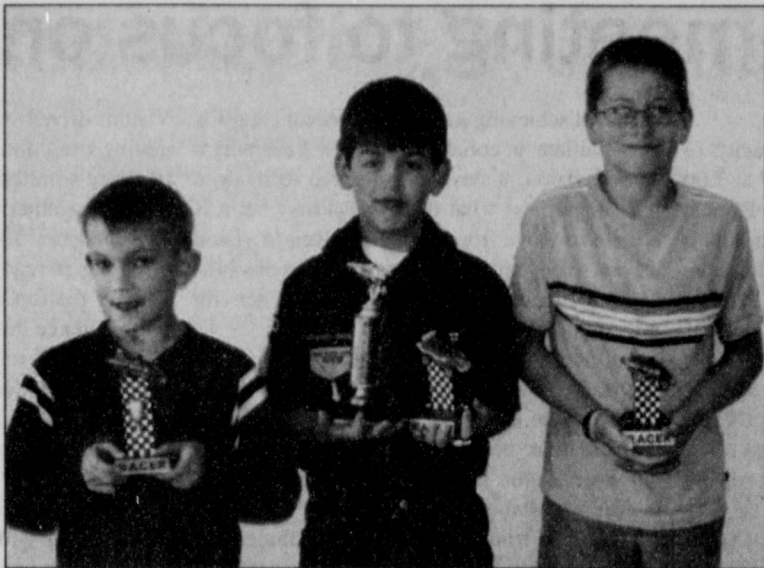

The chamber of commerce is helping with the Turkey Strut this year, and All-American Outfitters will be hosting 27 people for a filmed hunt later this month.

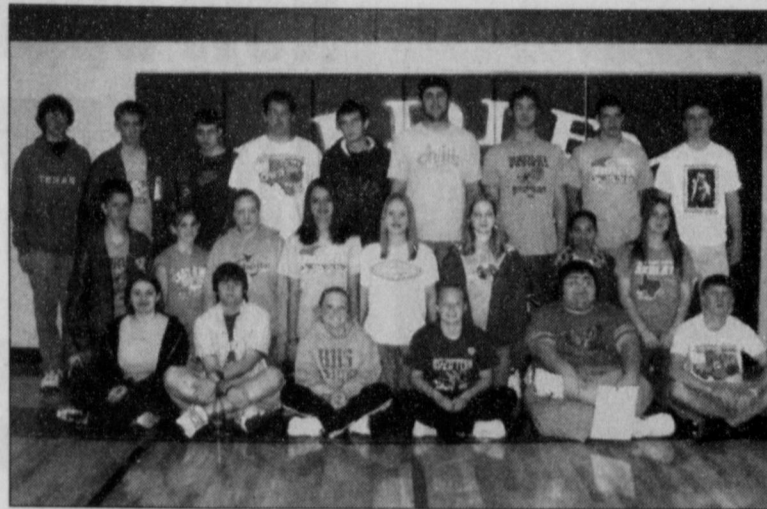
The executive committee will present its nominees for 2005-2006 officers next week.

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Drugs in the News

Diabetes Screening and Use of Drugs: New Recommendations

Two groups of physicians recently recommended that people who are diagnosed with diabetes should receive aggressive treatment with drugs early on after they have been diagnosed with this condition.

In some cases, two or more diabetes drugs should be used. These physicians feel that it is very important to get the blood sugar of newly diagnosed diabetic under control as soon as possible in order to prevent, if possible, the complications of diabetes that develops in later years.

Diabetes drugs that are taken orally include those that stimulate the pancreas to make more insulin, those that make the body more sensitive to using the insulin that the body produces naturally, those that decrease the amount of glucose made by the liver, and those that slow down the absorption of carbohydrates from the food we eat.

The American Association of Clinical Endocrinologists now recommends that people at high risk for diabetes be screened starting at age 30.
