Comets To Meet Flying Queens In Opener Saturday Night

The Clarendon Junior College Comets, nationally ranked girl's basketball team, will blast the lid off their 1958-59 basketball season at Plainview Saturday night when they meet their arch rivals, the Flying Queens of Wayland College.

This is the traditional opening game for the Queens who will be celebrating their annual homecoming festivities.

The Queens are expected to have their usual fine team again this season. They will be returning most of their stars from last season who lost only one game, that to the Nashville Business College team in the semi-finals of the National Tournament at St. Joseph, Missouri. The NBC girls went on to win the national championship. Wayland had won the national title the previous four years and had hung up a record of 109 consecutive wins.

Clarendon has never been able to beat the Queens, although on several occasions, they have come close. Wayland, of course, is a four year college which gives them a very definite advantage over a two-year school. The Queens have never been defeated by a junior college.

Coach Buddy Travis of the Comets is going all out to post a win over the Queens this year. The Comets and Queens have scheduled six games this season. They are playing two games each at Plainview and Clarendon and have scheduled games at McLean and Pampa. Wayland this season will have a second team which they will call the Queen Bees. This team will be made up of freshmen and sophomores and the Comets will meet this team in two games.

Travis has been working his girls hard since the beginning of school in an effort to get them conditioned for this opening game. He has announced that he will probably start sophomores Nancy Chalenor, Myrlene Nichols, Janice Martin and Virginia Sellers along with freshmen Georgia Binford and Gay Ivey. The four sophomores were all regulars on last season's team. Miss Martin, this year's captain, is from Cleo Springs, Oklahoma. The other three sophomores are all co-captains. Miss Sellers is from Hawley, Miss Nichols from Bula and Miss Chalenor from Plano.

Newcomers to the starting lineup, Georgia Binford and Gay Ivey, are both outstanding players from the high school ranks last season. Miss Binford is from Sugar Land and was an honorable mention all-state player last year. Miss Ivey is from Pettit, was an all-district two years and played with Dowell's Dolls in the National Tournament last year. Other freshmen who will see

plenty of action include Jean Sanders from Hedley, Janie Brotherton from Canyon, Melva Kelton from Sugar Land and Traverne Gillham from Canyon.

College Representatives Attend Girls Basketball Meet At Abilene

Coach D. E. Travis Jr. and Dean Oliver J. Abel, attended an organizational meeting of the Texas College Women's Basketball Association called by coaches from Howard County Junior College and Weatherford Junior College at Abilene last Sunday noon.

The success and resulting publicity of the Women's basketball program at Clarendon and Wayland Colleges has aided in creating interest and desire for the initiation of the program in a number of other colleges in the state. The beginning of other teams in state colleges will be an advantage to the program at Clarendon, wherein it will be possible to schedule the same number of games previously played by the Comets with a drastic reduction in travel expense.

The Association was organized on an experimental basis and the following officers were elected to head the organization in its initial year. Dean Oliver J. Abel of Clarendon, President; Mrs. Betty Jo Crum, women's physical education director and girls basketball coach, Weatherford Junior College, vice president; Miss Smith, physical education director and girls basketball coach, Howard County Junior College, Secretary and Treasurer. Seven colleges were represented in person or by proxy. Wayland Queen Bees, Clarendon Junior College, South Plains College of Levelland, Weatherford Junior College, Howard County Junior College of Big Spring, Henderson County College of Athens, and Mary Hardin Baylor of Belton.

Each team agreed to play six games within the association the first year, not exceeding two games with any one team and to participate in a state tournament at the close of the season. Weatherford Junior College was selected as the site of the first annual state tournament and Clarendon Junior College was selected as an alternate site if conflicts prevented Weatherford from being available. The dates were set as March 6th and 7th of 1959.

Six members of the Broncho team will be playing their last game for Clarendon this week. They are Morrow, Richerson, Milton Mann, Weatherly, Lefew and Mays. Mays is only a junior in school but will be playing his last game of eligibility because of his age.

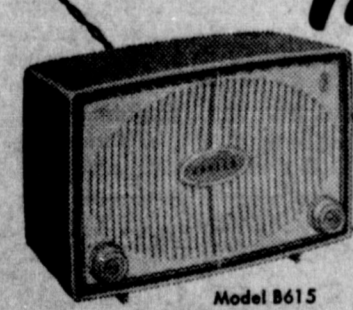

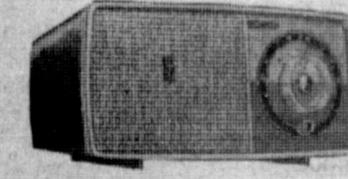

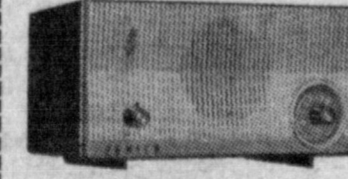

The terracing season is in full swing in the Donley County Soil Conservation District. Many co-operators have applied for the practice this year. Several sys-

tems have already been completed. W. P. Christal and W. V. Bain of Lelia Lake, B. E. Jones of Clarendon, and Mrs. Ora E. Bray of the Goldston community are at present rebuilding their systems.

Terraces are constructed primarily for the control of erosion. However, terraces also benefit the soil by diverting water to protected outlets, or by holding water until it is absorbed. They also act as guide lines in contour farming and permit more inten-

sive use of the soil. To be most effective, terraces should be used along with other practices such as conservation crop rotation, cover cropping and stubble mulching.

All co-operators who are constructing new terraces or rebuilding old terraces are urged to bring or send the measured lengths of each terrace in the system to the local Soil Conservation Service office as soon as possible. Technicians of the local office indicate that the sooner these lengths are received, the sooner the final check can be made for the completion of the system.

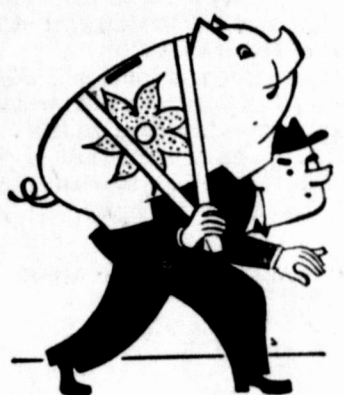

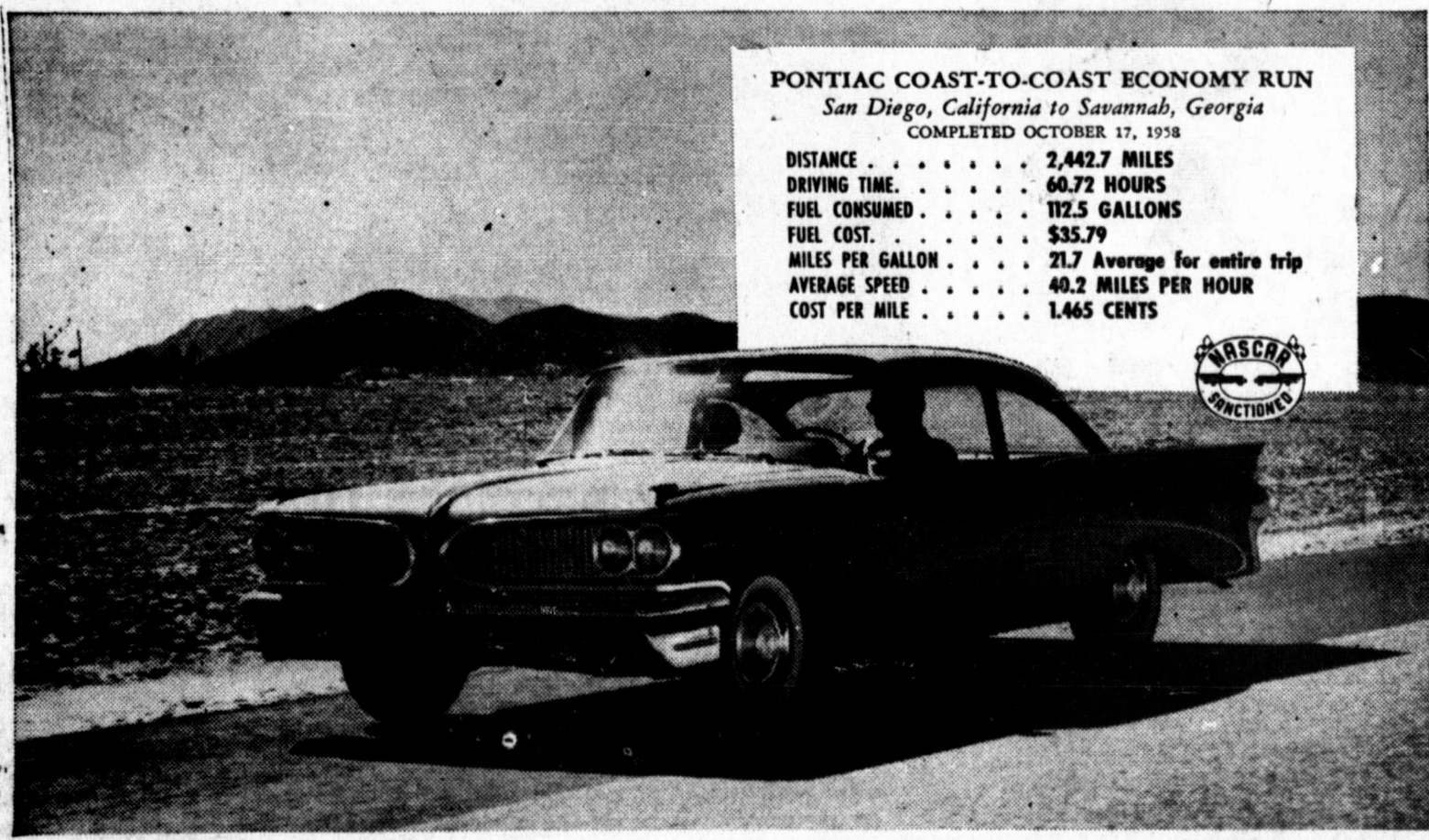

Canadian Hands Broncs 38 to 8 Setback

The Canadian Wildcats exhibited a devastating ground attack here last Friday night to smother the Clarendon Bronchos by a score of 38 to 8. The Wildcats were paced by their great quarterback, Kenny Abraham, and three other tough runners, fullback Jim Wilborn, and halfbacks Hobby McPherson and Warren Rivers. The big Wildcat line was led by tackles John Wheeler and Tony Briggs, guard Joe Wheeler and end Merland Clapper.

The Bronchos started the game strong and it looked for a few minutes like they might be upset. The Bronchos kicked off to the Wildcats, forced them to punt and took over on their own 48 yard line. They marched down to the Canadian three where Neel Carter fumbled and a Wildcat recovered to end the threat.

After a scoreless first quarter, John Morrow hit John Richerson with a pass in the end zone on a play that covered eight yards for the score. The play climaxed a 56 yard drive by the Bronchos. Darrell Leffew went through the line for the two points and the Bronchos led 8 to 0. However, the moments of glory for the home team were short as the Wildcats took a 14-0 lead on a play that covered 65 yards for their first score with McPherson punching the ball over from the one-yard line. Abraham circled left end for the two points that tied the score at 8 to 8. Canadian took the lead late in the second period when Abraham hit Joe Wheeler with a long pass on a play that covered 60 yards and a touchdown. Abraham again made the extra points and Canadian was ahead 16 to 8 at the half.

Broncho ace halfback Dewey Wilson suffered a broken wrist in the first half and was lost for the remainder of the game. The Wildcats completely dominated play the last half. Early in the third quarter, Abraham raced 78 yards for a touchdown and passed to Joe Wheeler for the conversion. A little while later in the same period Abraham passed to end Chris Beaty for another score. The Wildcats' last touchdown came in the fourth quarter on a 25 yard run by Abraham and a conversion by Rivers.

The statistics of the game were heavily in favor of the visitors. The Wildcats made 20 first downs to 6 for the Bronchos and rolled up 421 yards rushing and passing as compared to 124 for the Bronchos.

Morrow, Richerson and Leffew carried the offensive load for the Bronchos while these three boys along with Milton Mann, Ronnie Tyra, Dennis Bradshaw, George Mays, Bill Hermesmeier, Charles Percival, Wayne Mann and Ted Weatherly were defensive stand-outs.

said, will continue at 1 cent per pound from shorn wool payments and 5 cents per 100 pounds of live weight from unshorn lamb payments. These are the same as the rates that prevailed during the past 3 years.

The wool incentive payment program as originally authorized was to run for 4 years through March 31, 1958, and the 1955 referendum covered those 4 years. Another referendum will be held in the fall of 1959 to determine whether the promotion program should continue for 3 more years under the extended wool program authorized in the Agricultural Act of 1958.

ACP EMERGENCY PROGRAM

Those producers who are interested in any of our ACP Emergency flood damage practices will be glad to know that our County has just received an additional allocation of funds in the amount of \$10,919.12. These practices must be substantially completed by Dec. 31 of this year, so if you are planning to repair flood damage to terraces, diversion terraces, dams, etc., come by this office as soon as possible to make application.

We still have a substantial balance in our regular ACP account. Those producers who are planning to carry out any of these practices will need to make application as soon as possible as these practices, too, must be completed by Dec. 31.

Plans and elections for delegates to the District and State Teachers Association meetings in the near future were completed in short order.

Due to the removal of the Secretary of the local unit to another County it was necessary to elect a replacement. Oliver J. Abel, Dean of the Clarendon Junior College was elected to fill the vacancy left by Mrs. Gene Moore's removal to Hamlin where she is employed as an English teacher in the High School. The following teachers of Donley County were elected to the house of delegates of the District IX Convention of the Texas State Teachers Association which will be held at Amarillo in March of 1959. J. S. Hinds of Hedley, J. H. Spires of Lelia Lake and Oliver J. Abel of Clarendon. Ruth Richerson, County Superintendent of Donley County Schools, and chairman of the Membership Committee of the State Association, made a report on the Membership enrollment for the 58-59 school year. Most of the schools of the district have 100% of their teachers registered at this early date.

LELIA LAKE SCHOOL NEWS

Resanding of the gymnasium floor has been a project of this week, and a refinish job should make it look brilliant for basketball games. Arnett, Okla. furnishes the opposition for the first regularly scheduled games for both boys and girls on the evening of Tuesday, Nov. 18. They will be played at Lelia Lake.

AUSTIN—Texas' No. 1 industry is still "up against it." Oil industry leaders and state government officials are pressing harder for an effective federal plan to restrict oil imports.

Gen. Ernest O. Thompson, member of the Texas Railroad Commission, has called for "positive remedial action immediately."

"Oil and oil products imported into the United States continue to mount and absorb more and more of our domestic market demand," said Thompson. "This restricts domestic exploration and development and continues to make the United States more and more dependent on foreign oil. Foreign oil cannot be counted as available in case of war."

Thompson implied that he thought mandatory limits on oil importing should be set. (At present only a voluntary limitation program is in effect.) Thompson noted that lead and zinc imports had been cut by presidential order and "some such action must be taken in regard to imports of oil and petroleum products."

In meetings over the state, industry spokesmen talked in equally urgent terms. Lester Clark, Breckenridge producer, told the Independent Petroleum Association of America that the oil business is "sick."

"Since 1955, total well completions are off 21 per cent, exploratory crews have fallen 25 per cent and rotary rigs are off 33 per cent," reported Clark.

At another meeting the Gulf Coast Association of Geological Societies was told that during the first half of this year total oil imports increased 5.3 per cent while domestic demand slumped 4.7 per cent below the 1957 average. Impact of this on the domestic industry was a 13.7 per cent cutback and a \$3,000,000 a day loss in income.

Foreign oil production is increasing faster than foreign demand, Jerome J. O'Brien of Monterey Oil Co. told the geological group. Foreign oil interests, therefore, are dependent on getting a share of American buying—the one big oil market in the world. Biggest question in the industry, said O'Brien, is who will get this American market.

Undersecretary of the Interior Elmer F. Bennett told Texans the President's special cabinet committee on fuels is studying proposed plans to cut back im-

ports. But, he said, the administration would not be "stampeded into mandatory controls."

TOUCHY TOPIC

Next legislature is forewarned of the difficulties that will be involved in passing any law on industrial safety.

A meeting of the Joint Commission on Industrial Safety developed into heated disagreement and ended in a deadlock. Commission Chairman M. B. Blair wanted the group to approve and recommend to the legislature a plan for a state system of safety regulation and inspection in industry. Rep. Joe Pool of Dallas urged that no recommendation be made until public hearings had been held to get labor and employer views.

Blair's proposal was rejected. Pool's was approved by a 4-3 vote, but Chairman Blair ruled the motion out of order. It ended with agreement to send the Commission's collected data to the governor and legislature with no recommendation.

Commission is a nine-member group authorized by the last legislature to study and make suggestions on industrial safety laws to the upcoming session.

DIABLO DAM PUSHED

Both Gov. Price Daniel and the State Board of Water Engineers have given their official approval to plans for construction of Diablo Dam on the Rio Grande River.

Need for the dam was dramatically illustrated by the recent heavy floods on the Rio Grande, said J. T. Ellis Jr., the governor's aide in water matters. Rampant waters caused an estimated \$7,000,000 property damage, and about \$31,900,000 worth of water was lost for useful purposes.

Next step toward getting the dam is for the International Boundary and Water Commission to prepare final plans and go to Congress for an appropriation. Diablo will be a joint project of the U. S. and Mexico with this country putting up \$48,600,000 of the \$80,000,000 cost.
