Many plans are being made for the improvement of teaching and learning for the second semester of this school year of 1970-71, reports Superintendent Arling Cordell.
Chief among these are the continuing In-Service Workshops jointly sponsored by PESO, Amarillo Service Center, and by area schools. These will be held in Memphis January 6, 13, 20, 27 and on February 10 and will teach representatives of our staff on elementary and secondary levels professional skills in instructional planning. These staff leaders will, in turn, conduct In-Service Training for the entire faculty.
Your Superintendent will also be in a three-day workshop in Austin Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of this week when the Administrator's Conference on Advisory Topics is conducted.
Special Education will be a prime topic at this Austin Conference, and many new methods of improving this program will be studied.
Your Board of Education, the faculty, and all the school employees invite you to visit your school, learn about your children's progress and needs. Come to see us.
We note at the school that a number of windows have been shot with B B Guns. We ask parents to check with your children who have these guns and help protect our school property. Register Now To Be Eligible To Vote

Bronchos took on Vega Thursday for their first game winning by a score of 58-47. By quarters the score was 16-14, 33-29, 48-37 to the final. Kenny Bacon was high with 23 points; Wayne Carter dropped in 12 and Mack Tomlinson hit 12. High for Vega was H. Sides with 16.
Friday, the Bronchos played Claude. They took this game 54-36 with the tally running by quarters 6-7, 24-15, 38-27. Bacon was again high with 17 and Carter hit 16. Ronnie Hill tipped the basket for 9. High for Claude was Tim Odom with 19.

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County Banks Reveal Financial Condition At End Of Year 1970

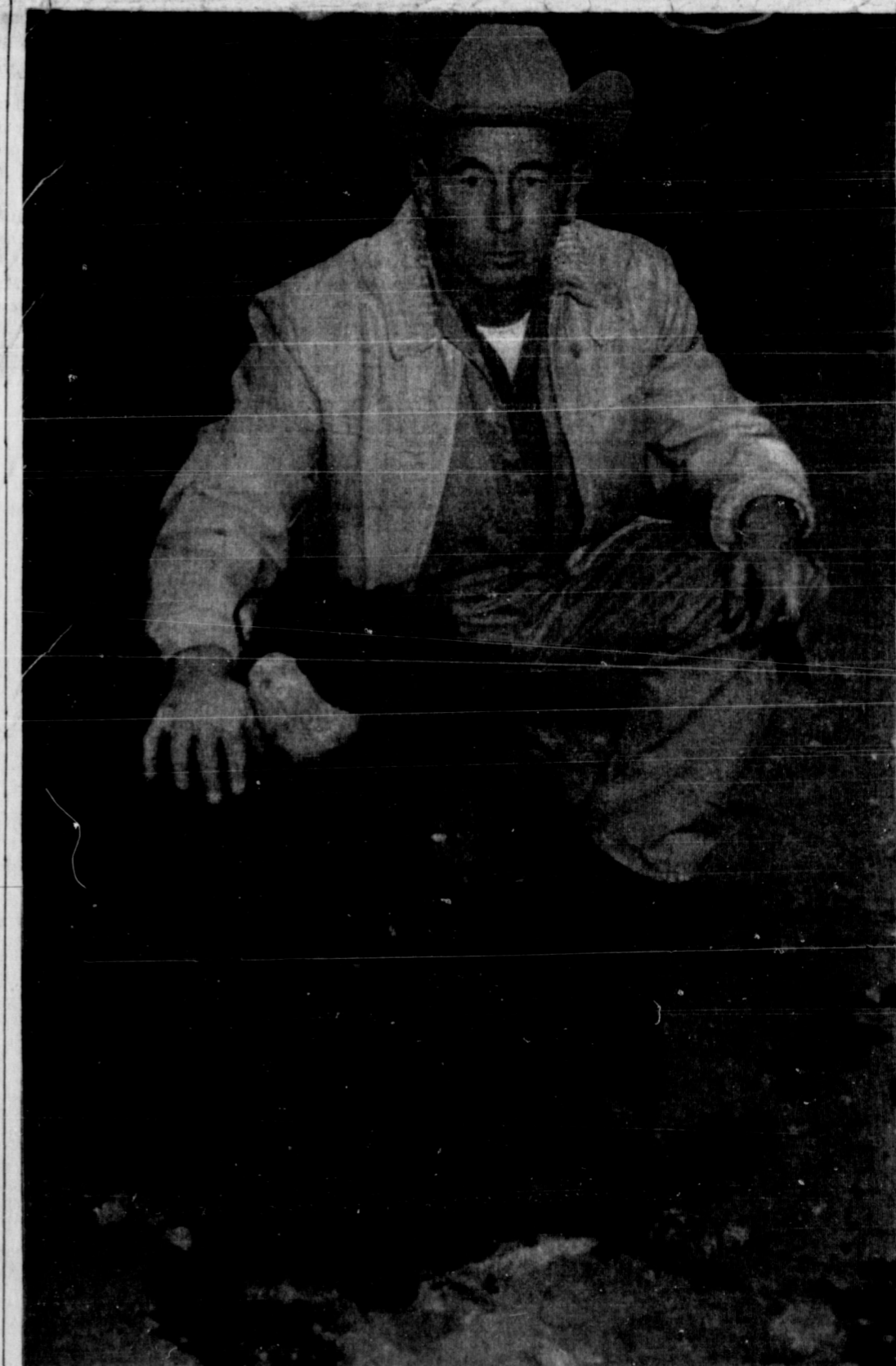
According to figures released this week by the three banking institutions of Donley County, there is only a slight decrease in deposits but a sizeable decrease in loans.
The figures as released by the Donley County State Bank, The Farmers State Bank and Trust Co. in Clarendon and the Security State Bank at Hedley show total deposits at the close of business December 31, 1970 at \$13,959,143.60 as compared with a total of \$14,048,063.68 at the end of 1969. EFFICIENCY OF AGRICULTURE — Total manhours required in farming have declined from 23 billion in 1930 to 15 billion in 1950 to 7 billion in 1968. Consequently, output per man-hour doubled in the two decades between 1930 and 1950, and almost tripled in the 20 years since 1950.

HOLIDAY SEASON ACCIDENTS — Deaths from accidents in the U. S. last December totaled 10,100. Down slightly from the year before but 700 more than the monthly average. Top killers were motor vehicle accidents, followed by fire and falls. National Safety Council studies show that it pays to be doubly careful during the Christmas and New Year's holidays. The life you save could be your own.

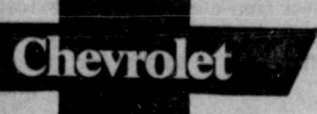

Veteran News

Q—For several years after the death of my husband, I received widow's pension from the Veterans Administration. When I remarried, the pension stopped. My second husband, who was not a veteran died recently, and I was left without sufficient income to provide for my support. Is it possible to have my pension restored?

A—Yes, if you are otherwise qualified for benefits, you may

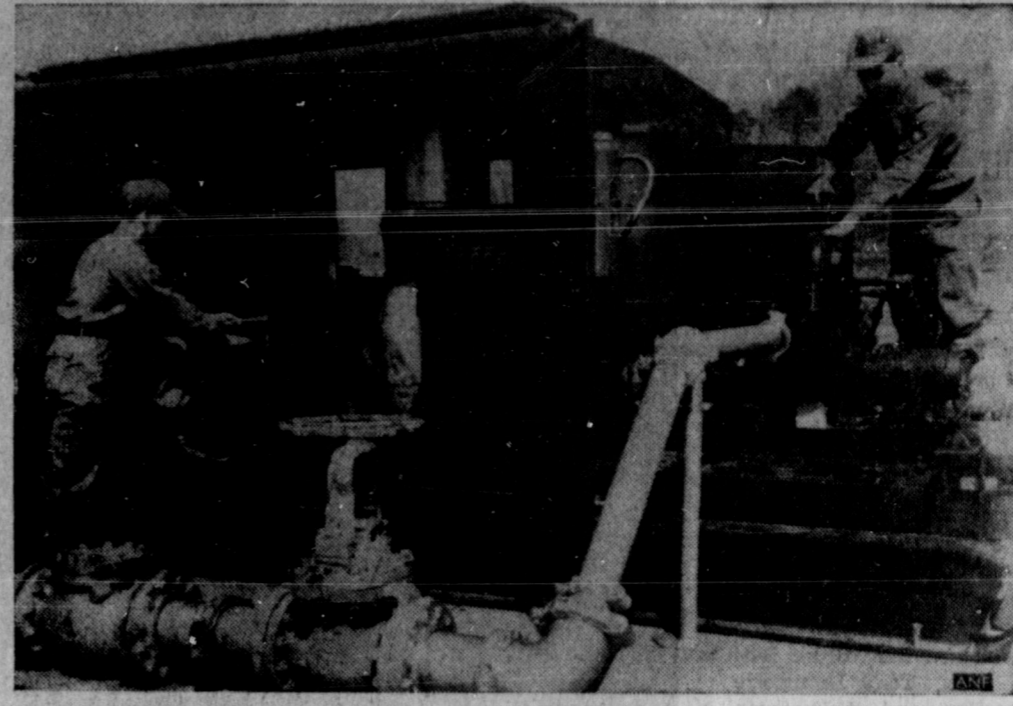
reapply for death pension benefits. A change in the law effective Jan. 1, 1971, permits restoration of death pensions to widows who remarry and the marriage is terminated by death or divorce.

Q—I did not complete high school, but was accepted as a college student under the G. I. Bill on the basis of a General Equivalency Diploma test. I now find that I am having trouble with some subjects and cannot keep up with my class. I have been advised to seek special help. Can VA help me?

A—Yes, if your school certifies that you need tutorial help to avoid failing a course, you may receive up to \$50 a month for nine months to pay a qualified tutor. Application should be made to the VA on Form 21E-1990T.

Q—Several years ago I elected to receive Army retirement benefits rather than VA disability compensation. Is it too late to change now?

A—No. There is no deadline

for changing to compensation from VA in lieu of retired military pay. However, you must undergo a VA medical examination to determine the degree and nature of your disability and the amount of compensation to which you are entitled. You can make arrangements for this examination through the nearest VA office.

Q—I am currently training as an apprentice under the G.I. Bill. As a part of my training my employer has asked me to take a correspondence course. Will VA pay for the lessons completed through correspondence, in addition to providing the allowance under the apprenticeship program?

A—No. You cannot be paid for a correspondence course at the same time you are pursuing training under an apprentice program.

Q—I am a reservist and have been on active duty for the past six months. Will my Servicemen's Group Life Insurance protect me

during the 120-day period immediately following separation from six-months' military obligation.

A—Yes. Q—When did the current G. I. educational bill take effect?

A—While the present G. I. Bill became law in June 1966, it covers veterans who served after Jan. 31, 1955.

Q—I am a 19-year-old college student who draws a death pension from VA. When I marry will my pension be discontinued?

A—Yes. Pension is not paid to a child after marriage.

Q—A service-connected injury left me permanently and totally disabled. Will my children receive VA educational assistance while in high school?

A—No. Under this program, the law prohibits payment for a regular high school education, unless the child has a mental or physical disability.

New Chemical Looks Good in Brush Test

A newly-developed chemical that will soon be available to farmers and ranchers has achieved almost complete success in control of huisache, according to G. O. Hoffman, range brush and weed control specialist at Texas A&M University.

Tests with the new material, picloram and 2, 4, 5-T mixture were conducted on a ranch near Lolita on the Gulf Coast. The experiments were carried out with the help of Jackson County Agricultural Agent Lee A. Wilson with the advice of Texas A&M brush and weed control specialists. Under the effects of the chemical applications, the carrying capacity of the pasture land went from nine acres per animal unit in 1967 to three acres per animal unit at present.

One-half pound of picloram with one-half pound of 2, 4, 5-T was applied to each acre of land in a solution of one gallon of diesel oil and enough water to make five gallons of the herbicide solution, according to Hoffman. The land was first treated in October of 1967 and cattle were put back on it in the spring of 1968.

In addition to the control of huisache, there was almost complete destruction of blackbrush and granjeno on the land. Hoffman commented that the general condition of the range land has improved with the introduction of new grass species.

This series of tests on the ranch was similar to others carried out under the supervision of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service where the landowner pays for preparation of the land and the application of the chemical, which is furnished by the chemical company testing the product. The product is not yet available for general commercial use.

According to Hoffman, the new picloram is in the stages of being approved by the federal government and may be available for use by the general public early

From Your
State Capitol

AUSTIN, Tex. — As expected, Texans will be paying higher auto insurance rates next year. But rates will not be as high as first proposed.

State Board of Insurance has announced an average statewide 13.6 per cent increase for all classes of vehicles and coverages. Actually, that's about a 14 per cent overall increase for private passenger cars.

In establishing the rate, the Board, for the first time in its history, took into consideration insurance company income from investments and all other sources. But it backed off from the "net worth concept" which would have produced still higher rates.

Staff members of the state regulatory agency last November recommended an average hike of 23.4 per cent. Industry actually asked 27.7 per cent, and reportedly is disappointed at the end result, since it got only about half of what it wanted.

Board members staunchly defended their findings as adequate, however, and said rates will allow after-tax profit of 5.1 per cent on total assets, or 7.2 per cent before taxes.

Rate of return from policy underwriting reflected in 5.1 per cent profit is only 1.3 per cent after taxes. Profit allocation from interest, dividends and rents is 2.9 per cent after taxes and from realized and unrealized capital gains of 1.9 per cent.

On a sample area basis, policies for average drivers of new, medium-priced cars would increase (all coverages combined) by the following amounts:

Northeastern zone \$25, Southeastern \$23, El Paso \$29, East Texas oil field area \$15, West Texas oil field \$30, Webb County \$19, Coastal \$24, Rio Grande Valley \$20, Galveston County \$26, Potter and Randall Counties \$24, Denton County \$25, Wichita Coun-

ty \$21, Dallas County \$27 and Harris County \$22.

LAWMAKER PAY HIKE PUSHED — A sub-committee of House Speaker Gus Mutscher's blue-ribbon "Committee of 100" termed legislator pay "unrealistically low" and said the \$4,800 limit should be stricken from the State Constitution.

Sub-panel, headed by Newspaper Publisher S. B. Whittenberg of Amarillo, recommended that a six-member commission be named by the governor to fix legislative pay and expense account boundaries.

APPOINTMENTS — Gov. Preston Smith named District Attorney E. W. Patterson of Gonzales as 25th District Judge, serving Gonzales, Guadalupe, Lavaca and Colorado Counties.

Smith picked Billie B. Schraub of Seguin to succeed Patterson as district attorney. Schraub was recently elected Guadalupe County judge.

Vernon A. McGee, side to Governor Smith for the last two years and longtime head of the Texas Legislative Budget Board, has been named executive vice-president of Management Services of Austin and New York.

COURT BLOCKS PARK — Federal District Judge Jack Roberts issued a temporary restraining order against state-federal funding of the proposed Mustang Island land purchase.

Judge Roberts acted after Parks and Wildlife Commission Chairman Pearce Johnson and three others filed suit to stop the \$4.2 million land buy.

Earlier, the U. S. Bureau of Outdoor Recreation disregarded the request of Governor Smith and Johnson that application for federal assistance totaling about \$2.1 million be rejected. Johnson went to court just before the funds were to have been released and the voucher delivered to the would-be seller, Mrs. Sam E. Wilson Jr. of Corpus Christi.

VOTE FOR 18-YEAR-OLDS — County tax assessor-collectors have been notified that voter registration certificates should be issued to applicants 18 years and above and those who will be 18 by March 1, 1972.

Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr., chief state election officer, has sent out instructions for im-

plementing the U. S. Supreme Court order giving 18-year-olds the right to vote in federal elections.

Certificates issued to those under 21 will be labeled for "federal elections only until 21 years of age." Same document will contain birthdate so it can be used for state and local elections after applicant turns 21.

OPINIONS — Commissioners courts are authorized to approve expenditures for dues in non-profit association of counties, says Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

In other opinions, Martin ruled that:

Orange County Commissioner could not resign office for new term to which he was elected before the term actually begins.

Gillespie County commissioners can lease part of an airport to the county fair association.

Secretary of State is authorized to require proof of compliance with laws governing trust companies before allowing reinstatement of charters forfeited for failure to pay a franchise tax.

City-county hospital boards can't borrow money for operation except by revenue bonds.

Higher Education Coordinating Board may alter the role and scope of the Texas Tech University Medical School in Lubbock and order initiation of a degree program in veterinary medicine in the school.

School trustees can deliberate on hiring a teacher in closed session — but not if the teacher demands a public hearing.

Property taxes, which become exempt between January 1 and October 1 by virtue of the land's being acquired by government agencies, must be pro-rated to the date of conveyance or date of the order of possession as provided by law.

County or district attorneys may seek grand jury or commissioners court action against sheriffs releasing prisoners who have not served their time.

AUTO REGISTRATION PERIOD SET — Auto registration period, February 1-April 1, for the second time will utilize the new computerized procedure devised by the Texas Highway Department.

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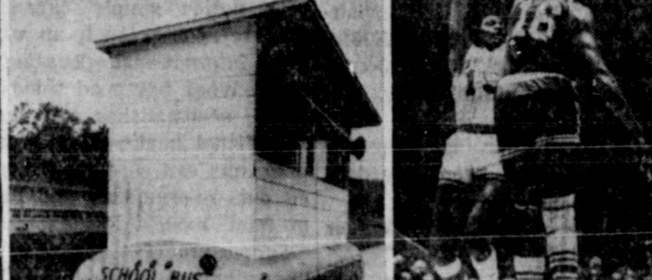

Farm News

Conserving Uses

There have been some changes in the approved conserving uses for 1971. These changes are:

- (1) 2 normal rows skipped may be used as set-aside acreage.
- (2) 1 normal row skipped is eligible for conserving base (Not set-aside).
- (3) Catfish ponds developed in current or fall of preceding year.
- (4) Sweet sorghum planted on set-aside may be grazed during approved grazing period.
- (5) All small grains may be

left standing if request is timely filed and approved (previously, this was limited to oats or rye). Other details on approved conserving uses will be released as soon as we have the final determinations.

Small Farm

The definition of a small farm has been changed for 1971. A farm base allotment must be less than 10.0 ac. or with a production of 5000 lb. or less. To be eligible for small farm benefits, a producer must live on the farm, derive the principal part of his income from such farm, and must submit evidence of his share of actual production.

Sell And Lease of Allotments
Rules for transfer by sale, lease, or owner are basically the

same as in 1970 with the following exceptions:

1. Final date for filing applications is changed from December 31 to May 3.
2. The 100.0ac. limitation is removed.
3. Out of county transfers are no longer subject to a producers referendum. Instead, the County Committee will be determined if acreage may be transferred out of the county. This determination will be made in January.
4. Transfers can not be made to farms that have no cotton allotment.

I strongly oppose liberal efforts to give the United Nations a special \$20 million grant just so it can expand its bureaucratic base of operations in New York City.

In my view, we already pay far too much money to support this organization which has proven itself unable to either promote or maintain world peace. This nation simply cannot afford to sponsor such an expensive international debating society. What few good things the U. N. accomplishes such as international health and education programs can surely be separated out, re-organized and funded at more modest levels.

Supporters of this \$20 million give away argue that the U. N. will be forced to move its New York headquarters and relocate in a foreign country if we do not subsidize its new building program.

My answer to this argument is,

if this is what it takes to get the U. N. out of the U. S., I'm for it. Late Monday, the House exempted .22 Caliber Rimfire Ammunition from the Gun Control Act of 1968. If this becomes law, hunters and other sportsmen will be able to freely buy rifle, shotgun, and .22 Caliber Rimfire shells without being subjected to burdensome federal regulations.

The House action marks the culmination of what has for me been almost two years of efforts directed toward persuading House liberals to drop their opposition to my legislation exempting sporting ammunition from the Gun Control Act. I pleaded my case based on my conviction that regulating sporting ammunition is of no real usefulness in preventing or solving crimes.

The turning point came recently, when the Treasury and the Justice Departments advised Congress that in the first two years of Federal gun control, there was not a single instance reported where any of the record keeping requirements from sporting ammunition led to a successful criminal prosecution.

Now that sporting ammunition has been exempted from federal regulation, I can redouble my efforts to have the Gun Control Act repealed in its entirety.

Seven million motor vehicle owners will soon be receiving by mail the three-part renewal application form.

Form and required fee after February 1 should be taken to county tax office, or orders can be placed through mail (by adding \$1 for handling costs and postage). At least 30 days before registration deadline should be allowed for delivery of plates ordered by mail.

Presentation of last year's registration receipt or certificate of title is no longer necessary with renewal application form.

BUILDING CONTRACT LET—State Building Commission approved contract for a new seven-story state office building to be located five blocks north of the capitol.

Stokes Construction Company of San Marcos submitted the low bid of \$7,076,596.

Alternative bids were also accepted for five possible additional floors, with the contractor to hold the enlargement offer open until September 1.

Ground breaking will be scheduled about January 15. Completion time is estimated at 780 days for the seven initial stories.

OIL ALLOWABLE CUT—Texas Railroad Commission reduced the oil production allowable for January nearly 15,000 barrels daily, fixing the maximum market demand factor at 83.1 per cent.

Cut was the second straight, although 10 of the 14 major purchasers requested the same amount in January as in December . . . 83.5 per cent.

New allowable will permit maximum January production of 3,813,125 barrels a day, com-

pared with 3,827,904 in December. Actual production was estimated at 3,421,000 barrels a day.
