Adair Hospital Board Leases Adair Facility To Dr. G. W. Smith

A contract dated March 19, 1971 and delivered to the present Donley County Hospital Board, has been signed by Dr. George W. Smith and the following members of the Board of Directors of The Adair Hospital, Lee Bell, Chm., Homer Estlack, Frank White Jr., William J. Lowe and Van Kennedy, leasing the Adair Hospital facility to Dr. Smith until 1986 or time as stated in the provisions listed below.

A copy of the contract in its full text is on file at the Leader Office.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the faithful performance by Dr. Geo. W. Smith under the original agreement with this Board of Directors, and in the further consideration of the sum of One and no/100 Dollars (1.00) per year to be paid as hereinafter specified, The Adair Hospital, acting by and through its undersigned duly authorized officers, does hereby lease, let, and demise all real property, buildings, equipment, and facilities of the Adair Hospital located at Clarendon, Texas, to Dr. Geo. W. Smith from July 1, 1971 (or such earlier date that the property and premises may revert to The Adair Hospital), and shall continue for so long as he or his medical associates shall operate a medical clinic available to the residents of the community; provided however, in the event that such medical clinic is not operated for twelve consecutive months, then the Board of Directors of The Adair Hospital shall have the right to terminate this lease agreement. The consideration of One and no/100 Dollars (\$1.00) per year shall be paid on or before July 1 of each year commencing on July 1, 1971, but in the event that such monetary consideration is not paid by such respective dates, then this lease agreement shall still not terminate until such lessee shall have been notified thirty days in advance of any termination of this lease agreement for failure to pay the annual lease by such due date.

It is further agreed that, subject to the availability of grants or donations of funds to The Adair Hospital for such purposes, The Adair Hospital agrees to maintain the grounds and buildings of the Adair Hospital to pay utilities pertaining to the operation of the Adair Hospital or medical clinic, and to pay the premiums on fire and extended coverage and liability insurance thereon; it being understood that should adequate funds for such purposes not be received as grants or donations by The Adair Hospital, then Dr. Geo. W. Smith shall have to furnish such costs of maintenance, utilities, and insurance at his own expense.

Vehicle Registration Lags, Six Days Left

A check with the Tax Assessor-Collector's office Wednesday morning showed a total of 60% of the vehicles in the county registered as of closing time Tuesday afternoon. This leaves 40% of the cars and other vehicles to be registered within the remaining six day period. Deadline for registration is April 1 and tags must be on all vehicles moving on highways and roads by that date.

To speed up registration you have received registration blanks from the Tax Office and should bring these blanks with you. If you have changed cars or vehicles within the year and the blank does not correspond to your present vehicle you should bring the title and last year's registration receipt for the vehicles you now own with you.

You are urged to register as soon as possible and avoid that long line on the deadline date.

Brush Control Meet Here Tues. March 30

A meeting on brush control and range management will be held Tuesday, March 30 at 8:00 p.m. in Room 102 of the Classroom Building of Clarendon College, in Clarendon, according to County Agent Ronald Gooch.

Dr. Roy Miller, Area Range and Brush Control Specialist, Texas A&M University Extension Service, will be the speaker. He will discuss the latest information on brush control including information on mesquite control with Tordon 225 which was used in Texas last year with an experimental label. Various grazing systems will also be discussed including deferred rotation grazing systems that have proven to be superior to continuous grazing on the Texas Experimental Ranch, Throckmorton.

Anyone interested in brush control and range improvement is invited to attend this meeting. Gooch said.

LOCAL FFA AG TEAM AT MECHANICS CONTESTS

Clarendon High School FFA sent a team to the FFA Agricultural Mechanics contest held in the Carson County Show Barn at Panhandle Tuesday, March 23. Teams from three districts were competing for their districts.

Childress, Clarendon, and Quail placed first, second and third respectively in the Greenbelt District. High individual in this district was Stan Chapman of Childress.

According to O. C. Watson, president of the Donley County Hospital Board, groundbreaking ceremonies for the new hospital and medical facility will be held at the hospital site northeast of the college campus Sunday afternoon, March 28 at 3 p.m. Paul Hancock, Minister of the First Christian Church, will serve as master of ceremonies.

This event will climax a year and two weeks of hard work and planning on the part of the hospital board. Residents of Donley County voted a \$390,000 bond issue March 14, 1970 for the purpose of building a new hospital. Attempts were made to secure Federal assistance and when it was learned that this route would consume an additional one or two years time or longer, it was decided by the present board to go ahead and build a hospital within the bounds of the bond money and have a hospital as soon as possible.

The general construction contract with Rose & Son Construction Co. was signed here Tuesday. The total figure was \$482,500 which includes the kitchen contract. The plans call for a 39 bed medical facility; 22 bed nursing home and 17 bed acute hospital — 7 single rooms and 5 double. The paving contract with L. A. Fuller was approved also for \$21,237 which brings the total amount to \$503,737.

Jim Rose was in town Tuesday and stated that he would move in equipment Tuesday of next week and actual construction would get under way the following week.

The City is cooperating also to get water and sewer lines to the hospital site just as quickly as possible so there will be no slow down of the project.

It is hoped that a large number of county residents will be present for this momentous occasion Sunday afternoon. People can already visualize the sight that will meet the eye when they mount the rise in west Clarendon and can see the beautiful new Clarendon College campus and a brand new hospital facility sitting adjacent across the highway to the northeast, another indication of community progress.

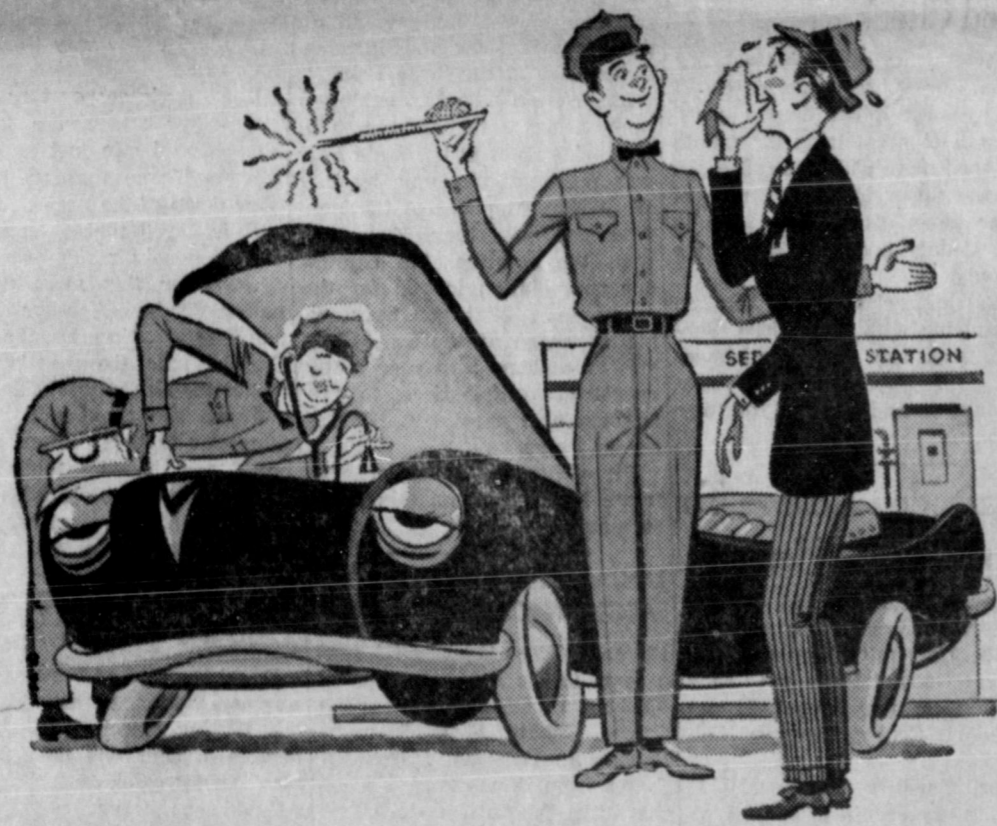

IRS Answers To Taxpayers Questions

Why are there so many tax tables in the 1040 instruction book?

A—More tax tables were needed this year because they were extended to cover taxpayers with incomes up to \$10,000. Previously, tables were only provided for incomes up to \$5,000.

This change will make it possible for millions of additional taxpayers to figure their tax due just by looking at a tax table rather than having to make a percentage calculation. Besides being convenient, the tables should also help reduce the number of errors in arithmetic.

Q—If I move before my refund comes, will it be forwarded to me?

A—Yes, if you have notified your postmaster of your new address. Failure to provide a forwarding address delayed the delivery of many refunds last year.

Q—When you reach 65, can't you deduct all of your medical expenses?

A—No, only those expenses that exceed 3 per cent of adjusted gross income can be deducted if you itemize. This applies to all taxpayers, regardless of age.

Note that one-half, up to \$150, of the premiums paid for medical insurance may be deducted without regard to the 3 per cent rule. Medicare premiums may be included.

Q—I will pay some tax on my 1970 return because my tax withholding was not enough. If I increase my withholding for 1971 can I avoid filing a declaration of estimated tax?

A—Yes, if your withholding will leave you with a balance of tax due of less than \$40 when you file your 1971 return then you will not be required to file a declaration of estimated tax. The purpose of the estimated tax system is to enable all taxpayers to pay their taxes on a pay-as-you-go basis.

Q—How long should I keep the records I used for my 1970 return?

A—Tax records must be retained as long as they are needed to administer any Federal tax law. In general they should be kept at least three years after the due date of the return. Some records, however, such as those relating to the purchase of stock or a residence should be kept longer because they will be needed for your tax return when the asset is sold or exchanged.

Q—Last year, I had income from some free lance work I did, as well as from my regular job. Do I have to pay both social security and self-employment tax?

A—The maximum earnings subject to these taxes in 1970 is \$7,800. If the wages from your regular job amounted to that much you won't have to pay any self-employment tax. Use Schedule SE to compute your liability, if any, for self-employment tax.

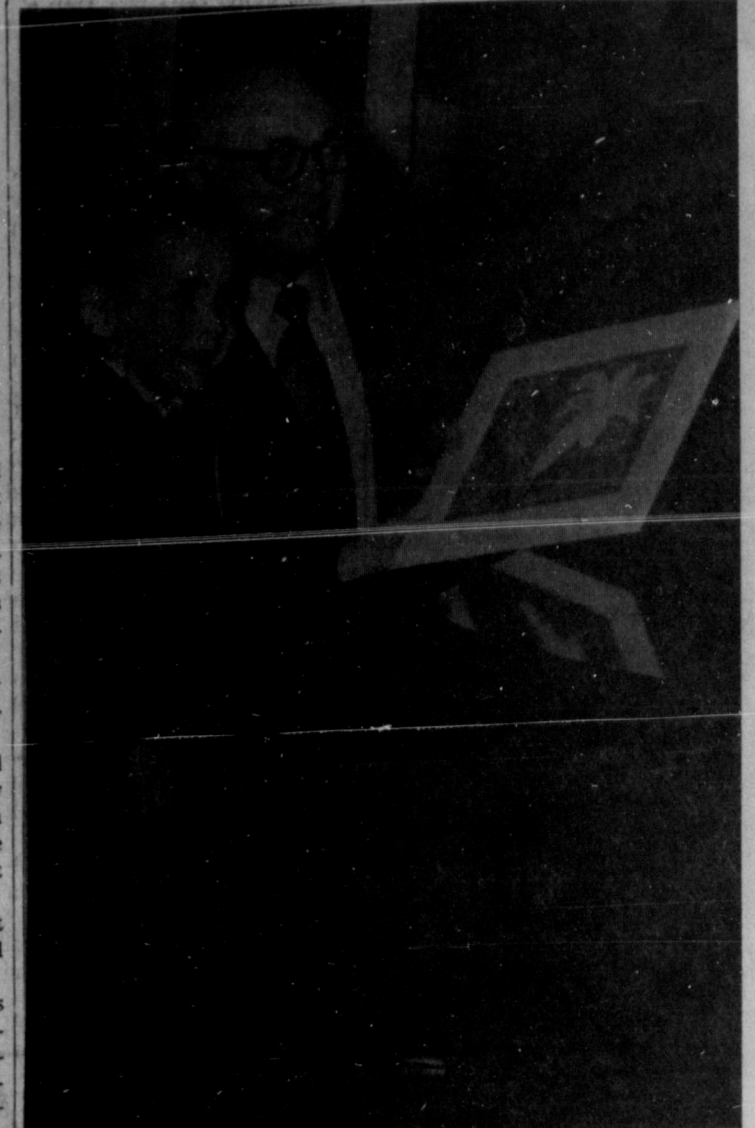
Q—Do I have to pay tax on the wedding gifts I received?

A—No, recipients of gifts are not liable for federal income or gift taxes on the gifts. However, generally speaking, income derived from the gifts is taxable to you.

Q—How does the dividend exclusion work?

A—The law provides that you do not have to pay tax on the first \$100 in ordinary dividends. Any dividend is an ordinary dividend unless the paying corporation indicates otherwise. If the stock is owned jointly by husband and wife, then \$200 in ordinary dividends may be received tax free on a joint return.

Textile Laws To Aid Consumer

Five laws have been passed by the national legislature to help the consumer do a better job buying textile products, reports Miss Joanne Thurber, Extension clothing consumer education specialist at Texas A&M University.

The laws affect wool, fur, flammable fabrics, and all other textile fibers used for apparel and household accessories, Miss Thurber explains.

The Wool Products Labeling Act requires that all wool products be labeled by percentage, with a tag. The act excludes rugs, carpets and upholstery fabrics.

The Fur Products Labeling Act requires that fur products be labeled with the authentic English name of the animal plus from the country the animal is from. If the color of the fur has been changed by bleaching or dyeing, the tag must indicate it.

The Inflammable Fabrics Act includes all wearing apparel and household textiles. The act makes it unlawful to manufacture and sell products which are dangerously inflammable.

The Textile Fiber Product Identification Act covers all textile products used for clothing and household furnishings not previously covered. If as much as five percent of a fiber is used in a fabric, it must be labeled. If there is less than five percent but the fiber has functional significance in the fabric, that fiber must also be named on the label.

Remnants do not have to be

labeled if there is a sign indicating that they are remnants of undetermined fiber content.

Miss Thurber suggests that you check the textile products you buy for accurate labeling. Read and follow instructions on these hang tags and labels.

Self-Employed Must File Tax Returns

Persons with net earnings of \$400 or more from self-employment must file Federal income tax returns and pay a self-employment tax, Ellis Campbell, Jr., IRS District Director for Northern Texas, said today.

The Tax Reform Act of 1969 liberalized filing requirements for many taxpayers so that, for example, a single person without self-employment income is not required to file a tax return unless he had income of \$1,700 or more in 1970. However, an individual must file a return if his self-employment income was \$400 or more, even if a return would not have been required based on his total income.

By filing a return and paying a self-employment tax on part or all of his income, each self-employed person helps finance Social Security benefits that are payable to self-employed persons as well as wage earners.

Besides filing an individual income tax return, a self-employed individual must complete Schedule SE (Form 1040), Computation of Social Security Self-Employment Tax. Copies of Schedule SE (Form 1040) are available at IRS offices, Mr. Campbell said.

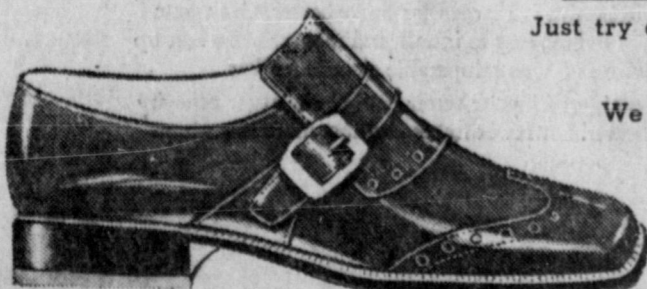

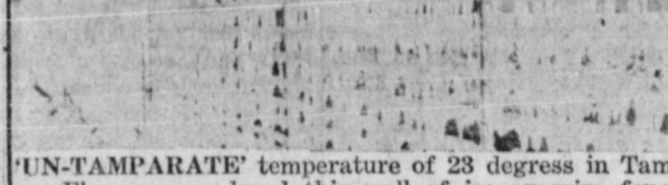
