Why are there so many tax the 1040 instruction tables

A-More tax tables were needed this year because they were with incomes up to \$10,000. Previously, tables were only provided for incomes up to \$5,000.

Taxpayers Questions

This change will make it pos sible for millions of additional taxpayers to figure their tax due just by looking at a tax table rather than having to make a percentage calculation. Besides being convenient, the tables

should also help reduce the number of errors in arithmetic. Q-If I move before my refund comes, will it be forwarded to me?

A-Yes, if you have notified your postmaster of your new address. Failure to provide a forwarding address delayed the delivery of many refunds last

Q-When you reach 65, can't you deduct all of your medical expenses?

A-No, only those expenses that exceed 3 per cent of adjusted gross income can be deducted if you itemize. This applies to all taxpayers, regardless of age.
