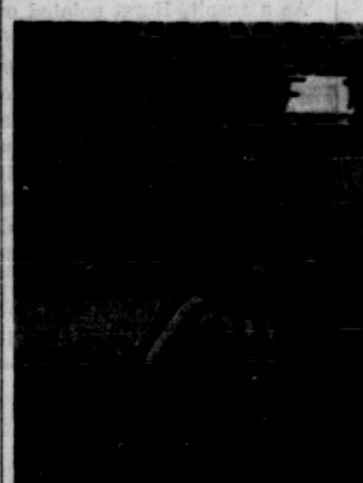
## RADIO CLUB IS DOING BANG UP JOB FOR LOCAL RESIDENTS

## Tornado Watch And Warning Signals

In the event a Tornado Watch is placed in effect for our area and our weather is threatening Two (2) Blasts will be sounded on the siren at one hour intervals as long as the condition prevails.

Should the weather deteriorate and a Tornado Warning be placed in effect Two (2) Blasts will be sounded on the siren at more frequent intervals depending on the severity of the weather. On this signal preparations should be made to seek a place of safety.

In the event an actual tornado is sighted or reported moving in the direction of the city the siren will be sounded continually until the danger is past. On this signal a place of safety should be found immediately.

The members of the Fire Department have purchased and installed a CB Radio System consisting of a Base Station and a Mobile Unit in order to better coordinate their efforts with other agencies involved in Storm Watches and other emergencies.

Clip this article of information and place it where it can be easily found for immediate reference. The above mentioned warning signals, if properly understood, could mean the saving of your life and that of others.

## CLOCKS MOVE AHEAD AN HOUR SUNDAY

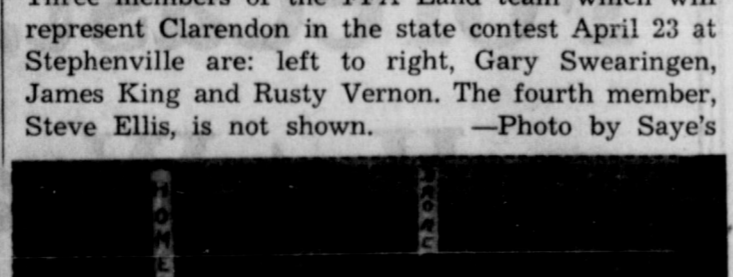

**Texas Hospital Bills Before Legislature**

Texans deserve the highest quality of hospital care at the lowest possible cost.

That is the goal being sought in two bills pending before the legislature to strengthen the state's hospital licensure law, according to O. Ray Hurst, executive vice president of the Texas Hospital Association. The companion proposals call for a certificate of need prior to construction of a new hospital and prior to institution of major new services, and are designed, Hurst said, "to assure an orderly growth of hospital facilities and services and an equitable distribution of limited resources, including dollars."

The THA sponsored measures—HB 637 introduced by Rep. Jack C. Ogg of Houston and SB 562 introduced by Sen. Don Kennard of Ft. Worth—have been sharply criticized by a few state medical groups, including the Harris County Medical Society, as an attempt on the part of the hospital association to take over control of all medical care provided in hospitals. But Hurst charged the opposition is based on misinterpretation of the two bills. "The misinformation being spread by a small segment of physicians can only be characterized as an attempt to maintain a status quo in the face of consumer demands and concurrent pending federal legislation that unless local planning is given precedence would establish far more stringent controls, the design of which neither hospitals nor physicians at state level will be able to influence."

"There is nothing in the bills," he continued, "which could be construed as an attempt by any group to 'take over' and anyone who honestly believes otherwise has spent little time in reading them," he stated emphatically. Other existing laws, licensure by the State Department of Health covers only fire, sanitation and safety and makes no reference to whether a community is in need of additional beds or whether patient services are adequate. Existing laws also make no provision for the orderly development of hospital facilities within the state or the community.

As a result, Hurst pointed out, a hospital can be constructed even when and where no need exists by anyone with sufficient financial backing to invest approximately \$30,000 a bed. And, when no need exists, he said, such construction further divides and fragments the drastically scarce professional and skilled medical personnel required to lenting inflationary spiral over turn ups the cost and the pa-

tient — the paying public — remains in the clutches of an unrelenting inflationary spiral over which he has no control, Hurst continued.

The two proposed bills call for licensure to be based on a certificate of need demonstrating the necessity for new beds and for major new services, and for setting minimal standards for patient services in the line with those currently required under Medicare. The bills also provide for establishment of a new 12-member Health Facilities Council appointed by the Governor but operated as an independent agency of the State Health Department which would issue certificates of need based upon the recommendation of local health planning agencies and the Governor's Comprehensive Health Planning office.

"This would permit grass roots planning by local communities to determine their own health needs and to establish priorities to meet those needs within the financial resources available to them," Hurst said. "Such planning not only would prevent unnecessary expenditures for facilities and services but would also remedy the fragmentation problem. More careful planning would also help discover and correct gaps in available services."

"Local governing boards and medical staffs would lose none of their present prerogatives," Hurst asserted. "The proposal assures that local governing boards can continue to insure selection of competent medical staffs. False scare tactics of some opponents go as far as to allege that incompetent physicians and/or chiropractors would be allowed staff privileges on any staff they chose. Nothing could be further from the truth. The only restriction called for is that there be a need for a new facility or service. The proposal calls for absolutely no change in the operational concept or organizational structure of any hospital so licensed," Hurst stressed.

**Inside The Legislature with**

Rep. Tom Christian

AUSTIN — Rep. Tom Christian revealed today that discussions with Rep. Delwin Jones of Lubbock, Chairman of the Legislative Redistricting Committee, indicate that Jones is not interested in saving the Panhandle's representation in Congress.

According to Christian, "Jones (the only West Texan on the Redistricting Committee) is in a position as chairman to salvage the representation of the Panhandle counties on the Congressional level. However, he shows no indication that he will endeavor to retain our seat in the Congress. This post is now held by Cong. Bob Price of Pampa."

"In fact, the latest Congressional redistricting plan to come out of Jones' office would divide the Panhandle, lumping Randall County with the counties of the lower South Plains and the far West Texas counties of Winkler and Ector (Odessa)," Christian said.

"This plan would also move the upper Panhandle counties and the Eastern Panhandle counties into a district that would be combined with counties as far east

as Wichita Falls."

"The most vicious portion of this move is the splitting of Amarillo, the economic, educational, medical and cultural center of the Panhandle, between two districts. Citizens of Amarillo living in Potter County would be part of District 24 and Amarillo citizens in Randall County will be joined with the 22nd District which also contains Lubbock and Odessa. This would destroy Amarillo's historical position as the unifying point of the High Plains."

"Certainly the economic interests of the Panhandle area are not compatible with areas this far removed and our interests would not be represented by men from these parts. The majority of their counties would not be of a similar geographic — economic pattern, yet this is where the majority of influence will rest. Spitting our economic-geographic base would destroy the influence the Panhandle now has as a tightly-knit unit."

"Apparently the purpose of this maneuvering, according to Austin sources, is to save the district of Cong. John Dowdy of Athens, currently under indictment by the Federal Government for bribery. Not that the Democrats are particularly interested in saving Dowdy. His activities have pretty well embraced the Democratic Party at home and in Washington. But the plan seems to be to retain the seat in East Texas where another Democratic candidate would have a better chance of winning."

"Both of these areas, the Panhandle and East Texas, have lost population to the metropolitan areas of Dallas - Fort Worth and to Houston which are slated to gain in Congressional representation. But I cannot justify the complete writing off of the entire Texas Panhandle as a political entity."

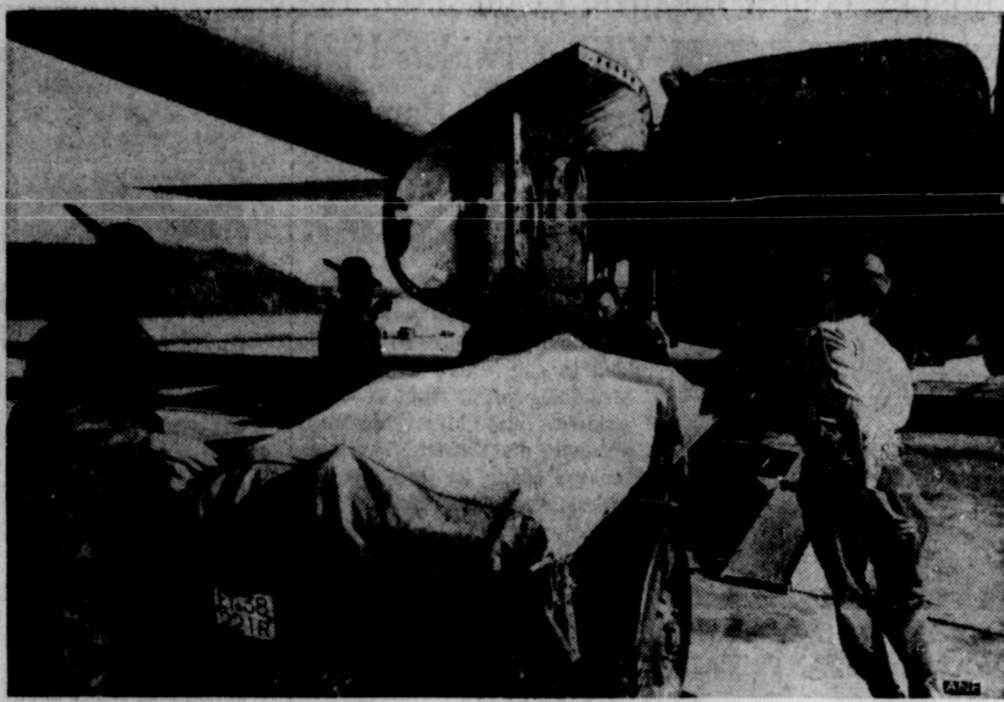

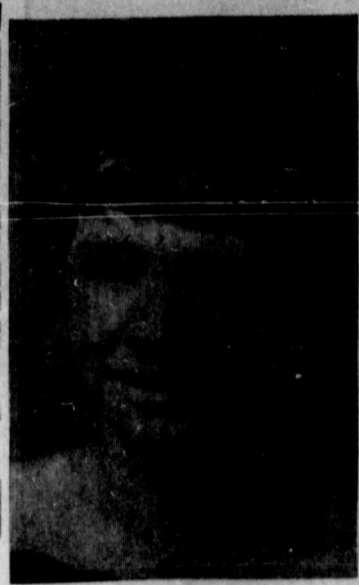

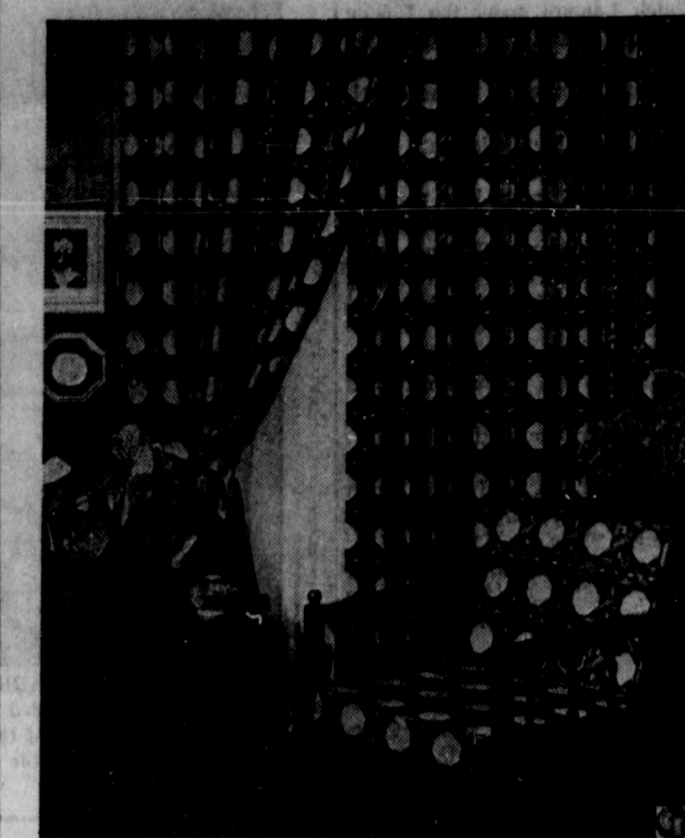

A \$50,000 suit against the former vice president of the Denver Art Museum has been filed in U. S. District Court at Denver, Colo., by Monte Ritchie, owner of the JA Ranch southwest of Clarendon.

The suit charged William V. Warren, who was convicted earlier this year of interstate transportation and sale of Ritchie's art collection, of damaging the art collection by "Wrongful transportation."

The art collection, valued at a half-million dollars, was stolen Oct. 14, 1970 from Ritchie's ranch near Larkspur, Colo. Items taken include works of Renoir and Gauguin.

Warren was convicted in New York City and was fined \$10,000 and placed on two years probation.

Ritchie said all of the art objects were eventually returned to him, but some were damaged.

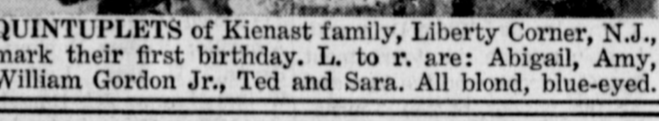

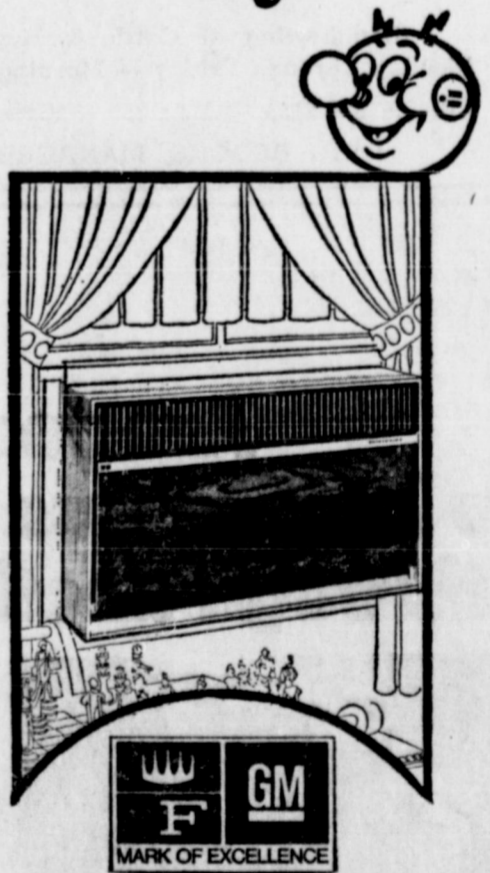

**Wheat**

May 3rd is the final date to report your wheat acreage. Remember, certification is not an estimate of what you will do. It is a statement of what you have done. If you have made all the necessary adjustments, you are urged to certify as soon as possible.

Wheat planted in lieu of feed grains on non-participating farms must be reported by May 3rd.

If you have some wheat which has been destroyed by drought and you are ready to abandon it, please come to the office and file a form requesting credit for certificates and history before you plow the land.

**Cotton**

You will have until May 3rd to transfer cotton allotments due to sale or lease.

May 3rd is also the final date to release cotton acreage or to request reapportioned acreage for 1971.

**Small Grain Cover Crops**

A small grain cover crop may be left standing on set-aside and conserving base acreage if a written request is filed by May 3rd. The request would permit you to leave the small grain on the land as a cover crop and plow it under at your own convenience. Otherwise, the acreage would have to be disposed of by May 1.


