ALL FOUR AMENDMENTS DEFEATED IN DONLEY

All four State Constitutional Amendments were defeated in the special election held Tuesday but statewide, it appeared that number four dealing with water bonds had passed.

Too many people take such elections as this too lightly as was indicated by the total vote here as well as over most of the state. A total of 223 votes was cast in Donley County out of a possible 1913 who had registered.

Voting here on the four proposed amendments was as follows: No. 1-82 for, 140 against; No. 2-55 for, 167 against; No. 3-84 for, 139 against; No. 4-80 for, 143 against.

FHA Drouth Loans Available To Local Farmers & Ranchers

Farmers Home Administration State Director J. Lynn Futch announced that Donley County has been designated by the Secretary of Agriculture for the making of emergency loans to farmers and ranchers who have sustained substantial losses on account of the drought.

This designation continues in effect through June 30, 1972, and will authorize emergency loans to be made to those persons who suffered substantial losses from any adverse weather conditions, such as high winds, hail, or flood, that have occurred or might occur during the period of this designation.

Funds are available and applications for such loans may be made at the FHA County Office located at the Agricultural Building Clarendon, Texas.

Municipal Airport For Howardwick Approved & Funded

Howardwick — Notification was received this past week from Washington that the proposed location for the Howardwick Municipal Airport had been okayed, and that funding will not be required.

Initial monies for the preparation of the runway site, taxi strips, and tie-down pads, has been allocated. Monies for hangars, parking lot, repair and wash service, and associated facilities will be made available over the balance of the funding term.

Fueling service will be made available on a franchise basis.

The main runway will be 2660 feet in length, with insured clearance against overhead wires and obstructions at either end, and will be 100 foot wide. The surface will be crushed stone, oiled, and "Transmarineith" grass turf on either side of the strip.

Operation of the municipal airport will be on a lease basis, with city officials authorized to arrange for public notices relative to bids.

Construction will commence within thirty days.

PITCH, HIT, THROW CONTEST HERE SUN.

Only three days remain for boys in this area to register for the Official Major League Baseball Pitch, Hit and Throw competition.

The competition, open to all boys ages 9 through 12, is a nationwide youth program sponsored by Major League Baseball and Phillips Petroleum Co.

Postal Rates Increase Sunday, May 16

Lelia Lake Postmaster Pauline Roberts, said today that increases in most postage rates took effect May 16 as the new United States Postal Service began its task of achieving self sufficiency as required by the Postal Reorganization Act.

Mrs. Roberts noted that general postage rates have not been increased since 1967 when Congress passed what was to become its final legislative act in this respect.

She pointed out that, earlier, requests for rate increases were proposed to Congress in 1969 by both President Johnson and President Nixon. In addition, President Nixon proposed an increase again in 1970, although none of the proposed increases were acted upon by Congress.

Mrs. Roberts explained that the new increases — authorized on a temporary basis until the newly created Postal Rate Commission can make recommendations to the Governors of the Postal Service on permanent changes — will raise first-class letter rates from 6 to 8 cents an ounce, and airmail letter rates from 10 to 11 cents an ounce. Post cards will go from 5 to 6 cents each and airmail post cards will go from 8 to 9 cents each.

The increases will be borne more by business than by individuals, the postmaster pointed out, since about 75 percent of first class and airmail is from commercial mailers.

In addition to increases in first-class rates, second and third class also went up on May 16. However, the full increases proposed by the Postal Service will not be put into effect on a temporary basis, for second and third class, since the postal reform legislation contemplates that such increases be phased over 5 years — or ten years for non-profit organizations — provided Congress appropriates the necessary funds to ease the transition to full rates.

Because of the phasing provision, the increases which became effective May 16 for second and third-class are generally only 1/5th of the total increase which has been proposed by the Postal Service.

No changes are made in the rates for parcel post, which is the principal component of fourth-class mail. However, initial increases will be made in the "book rate" which is classified as fourth class.

The new temporary rates also make changes in other postage rate categories and special service fees, such as special delivery and registered mail.

NEWS FROM Congressman Bob Price

18th District, Texas

Congressman Bob Price said Saturday that he plans to introduce in the near future a "tax sharing act" instead of the "revenue sharing act" suggested by the President.

Speaking at an Appreciation Dinner in his honor at Muleshoe, Price said, "I plan to introduce this legislation as an alternate to the general revenue sharing measure proposed by the Nixon Administration. However, I still intend to support some of the special revenue sharing proposals of the Administration."

The 18th District Congressman pointed out that the bill he will introduce will allow individuals a credit for the state and local income taxes they pay. Price noted that a tax credit is different than the tax deduction presently allowed.

"A tax credit is a direct deduction from the amount of tax due. A tax deduction is the amount you deduct from gross income to determine taxable income. Consequently, since the tax liabilities are determined in general categories, a tax credit is deduction," he explained.

The tax credit in Price's proposed bill will be in addition to the deduction already provided for state and local taxes.

"The tax sharing comes from the fact that state and local government could then be increased without increasing the total tax burden on the individual taxpayer," Price said.

The legislation also updates the federal estate tax credit to 80% of the tax on the first \$150,000 of the taxable estate and 20% of the remainder. The present cre-

dit which was enacted in 1926 provides an income tax credit for only that 10% of the present federal estate tax rate.

"I believe that tax sharing is more in keeping with our Constitution than general revenue sharing," Price said.

Texas Agricultural Commissioner John C. White has announced the publication of "Texas Herbicide Manual," a 69-page booklet listing all herbicides registered for use in Texas.

The TDA has the function of regulating the sale and transportation of all herbicides. The legislature has also charged the Agriculture Department with the responsibility of registering all herbicides.

Through registration the TDA can maintain an element of control over the materials by making certain that labels contain proper use and warning statements and no false claims.

The manual defines herbicide as "any weed killing chemical." The booklet also notes herbicides are employed to control toxic plants in industrial and recreational areas, as well as for ranchers seeking to gain maximum livestock production by destroying undesirable plants and guiding ecological succession.

Most herbicides have a low order of toxicity, the publication notes, but the few with high levels are denoted in a special column. Prudent use of all herbicides, lessening chances of possible harm to livestock, fish, and wildlife, is advised, as is the careful disposal of containers.

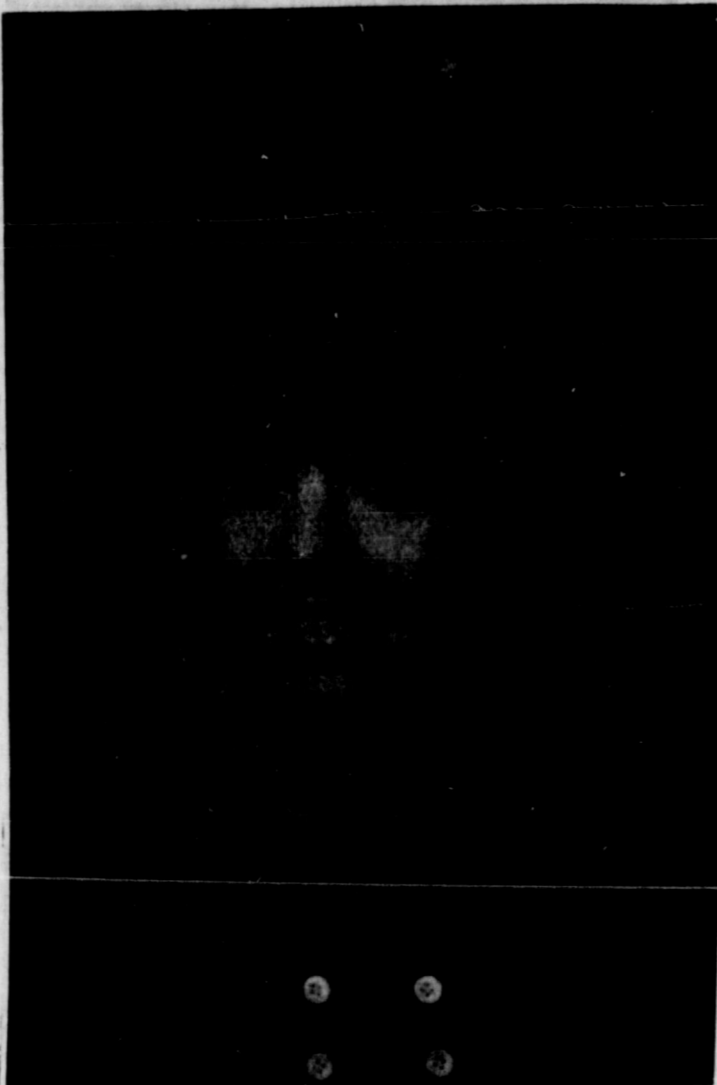

Attractive Gardens No Accident

There's no foolproof plan for growing an attractive garden, but soil preparation, fertilization, watering, and the use of good plants are some practices that can help, according to Everett

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Janne, Extension landscape horticulturist.

Garden soils should be loose and friable to prevent crusting during dry spells. Janne recommends digging up the soil and working in plenty of sphagnum peat moss. A layer of three to four inches should be applied over the bed and worked into the soil to six or eight inches.

Fertilizer should be mixed in when preparing the flower bed at the rate of two to three pounds of complete fertilizer per 100 square feet. Janne notes that a proper fertilizer should have an analysis of 8-8-8 or similar type.

He adds that light monthly applications during the summer with thorough watering after each application will insure large plants with ample flowers.

Janne also pointed out that young plants must be thoroughly watered at transplanting time.

Plants should be watered regularly except during rainy periods. A thorough soaking every five to seven days is better than a light daily application, according to the landscape horticulturist.

Gardeners that take advantage of the new and better varieties will be rewarded with more flowers and brighter color throughout the season, Janne said. He also warned gardeners against trying to save seed from the new hybrid lines since the results are usually disappointing.

Please keep in mind that one of the basic requirements of the 1971 Farm Program is that set-aside acres must be approximately equal in productivity to the other cropland acres on your farm. You will be asked at the time you turn in your acreage report whether or not the acreage you designate as set-aside is approximately equal to other land on your farm. Please answer this question to the very best of your ability. If it is not approximately equal, please tell us so the county committee can review your individual case and if necessary, make the required payment reduction.
