


God Church in Clarendon, officiating. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery under the direction of Murphy Funeral Home.



loan without regard to the length of time they have been out of service? A-Yes, a recent law restored unused expired loan guaranty entitlement to all veterans who were previously eligible. There

is no longer a time limit on ap-

plying for a GI loan, Q-My 59-year-old father is a veteran of World War II, and he is receiving a pension because he is unable to work. Can he be treated in a VA hospital even though his condition is not related to his military service? -A-Yes, if a VA examination confirms that he needs hospitalization and a bed is available. 

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

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

U.S. TO HELP MAKE RAIN-Federal aid through weather nodification experiments aimed at bringing rain for bone dry areas of Texas has been promised, Governor Smith announced.

Operational details of a cloudeeding project will be coordinated with the U.S. Department of Defense, the Bureau of Reclamation of the Interior Department and the National Gceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

Smith said he is hopeful that this step may bring President Nixon to realize the "tragic exent of the drought disaster in Texas." He pointed out that half of the wheat crop already has been lost to drought and that agricultural production income loss would be more than half a billion dollars if the drought were broken immediately
