## Carter and Bacon Sign CC Scholarships

Head basketball coach Dave Neely, announced today that two outstanding players off the Clarendon High School squad have signed scholarship agreements to attend Clarendon College next year. The signees are Wayne Carter, a 6' 3" guard, and Kenny Bacon, a 6' 6" forward.

Bacon, who did not play as a junior due to the UIL transfer rule, averaged 19.1 points per game this past season while hauling down 10.6 rebounds each contest. He was named to the second team all-state team, was an all district choice, and was named to the all tournament team in the Clarendon College Salt Fork Classic this past year. In that tournament he was voted the Most Valuable Player as he led the Bronchos to the team championship.

Carter, who helped lead the Bronchos to a second place finish in the state tournament in 1970 and the regional tournament in 1971, averaged 19.5 points a game while pulling in 10.5 rebounds a game. Honors for Carter the past two years are numerous. He made the all-tournament teams in the Tullia and Canyon invitational, and has been named to the select team for the past two years in the Claude and Clarendon tournaments. He has been an all district choice for the past three seasons, all regional for the past two years, and was named to the all-state tournament team in 1970.

"We are extremely pleased to have these two young men coming to Clarendon College next year," states Neely. "They will not only be an asset to our basketball program, but will be fine additions to our student body."

### Reapportioned Cotton

Those of you who requested additional cotton should have received a "revised" allotment notice by this time. You will need to come to the office and sign the "revised" intention to Participate" within 15 days from the date shown on the notice.

**Livestock Feed Program**  
As most of you already know, the emergency livestock feed program has been approved for Donley County. Approval period is from now through June 30.

This means that livestock owners in the county who are found to be eligible, may purchase CCC grain at a reduced price or may receive assistance for hay transportation costs.

The following eligibility requirements are to be met by the applicant:

- (1) Sufficient feed (including hay) is not available for livestock for the authorized period.
- (2) A serious loss of his crops must have been suffered because of the emergency.
- (3) Feed purchases are larger than usual because of the emergency.
- (4) It would be an undue financial hardship to obtain sufficient feed through normal trade channels.

Undue financial hardship is deemed to exist when the applicant's financial resources would prevent his obtaining required feed from normal suppliers without (a) Imperiling continuance of his farming operations; (b) defaulting on existing financial obligations; (c) unsecured borrowing; or (d) excessive disposal of livestock.

If you believe you meet these requirements, come by the office and make your application.

## College Enrollment Now In Progress

Enrollment for the first summer term at Clarendon College opened Tuesday. Registrar Leonard Selvidge reported Wednesday morning that 110 students had enrolled to that time. Enrollment will continue through June 1, the final date for signing up for classes.

Courses offered will include Freshman English, American History, Government, Spanish, Zoology, and Organic Chemistry. Other classes are pending on enrollment. If as many as ten students request a course and a teacher is available, that course will be taught, stated Mr. Selvidge.

Classes began Wednesday, May 26. All class periods are from 7 to 9 p.m.

### NEW WTSU ADMISSION REQUIREMENT SET

A new admission requirement to become effective with the 1971 fall semester has been added at West Texas State University according to Dr. Donald Cates, dean of admissions and registrar.

A deadline for submitting applications for admission and other documents necessary to admission sets August 1 for the fall semester and December 15 for the spring semester.

This requirement offers several advantages to the student in the areas of housing, familiarization with the campus and academic counseling for the student and possibility of providing financial aid or student employment if necessary.

### TECH.CC AGRONOMY PROGRAM CORRELATED

The past year Texas Tech agronomy faculty members have visited 22 junior colleges in Texas instituting and interchanging information programs designed to identify common problems and opportunities and to offer help to junior college students interested in attending Texas Tech's College of Agricultural Sciences.

Applications for transfer from one school district to another need to be filed on or before June 1, 1971.

These applications for transfer need only to be signed by the parent or guardian and by the Superintendent of the receiving district.

## Bids Being Taken For Howardwick P. O.

Competitive bids are being accepted for operation of a Rural Branch in Howardwick.

Not less than 100 square feet will be required for operation of the unit. Bidder should furnish a sketch indicating the exact place in the establishment where the postal activities will be conducted, showing dimensions of the area. The U. S. Postal Service will furnish post office boxes and other items necessary to operate the unit.

The successful bidder must provide postal services to customers which includes sale of postage stamps, money orders and acceptance of parcel post, C.O.D. and registered mail. Where non-postal money orders are sold, the non-postal money order business must be physically separated from the postal operation and shall not be identified with that function.

The bidder must be willing to furnish the United States a good and sufficient bond in the sum of \$3,000.00.

Window service hours will be 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 Noon, Monday through Friday except holidays (8); and 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. on Saturdays. No service will be required for Sundays and holidays.

Bid forms and other information may be obtained from the Postmaster at Clarendon. Interested bidders should submit POD Form 4042 (original and 2 copies) to the Postmaster at Clarendon not later than 4:30 p.m., June 3rd, 1971.

Grandsons of Mr. Shadix served as bearers.

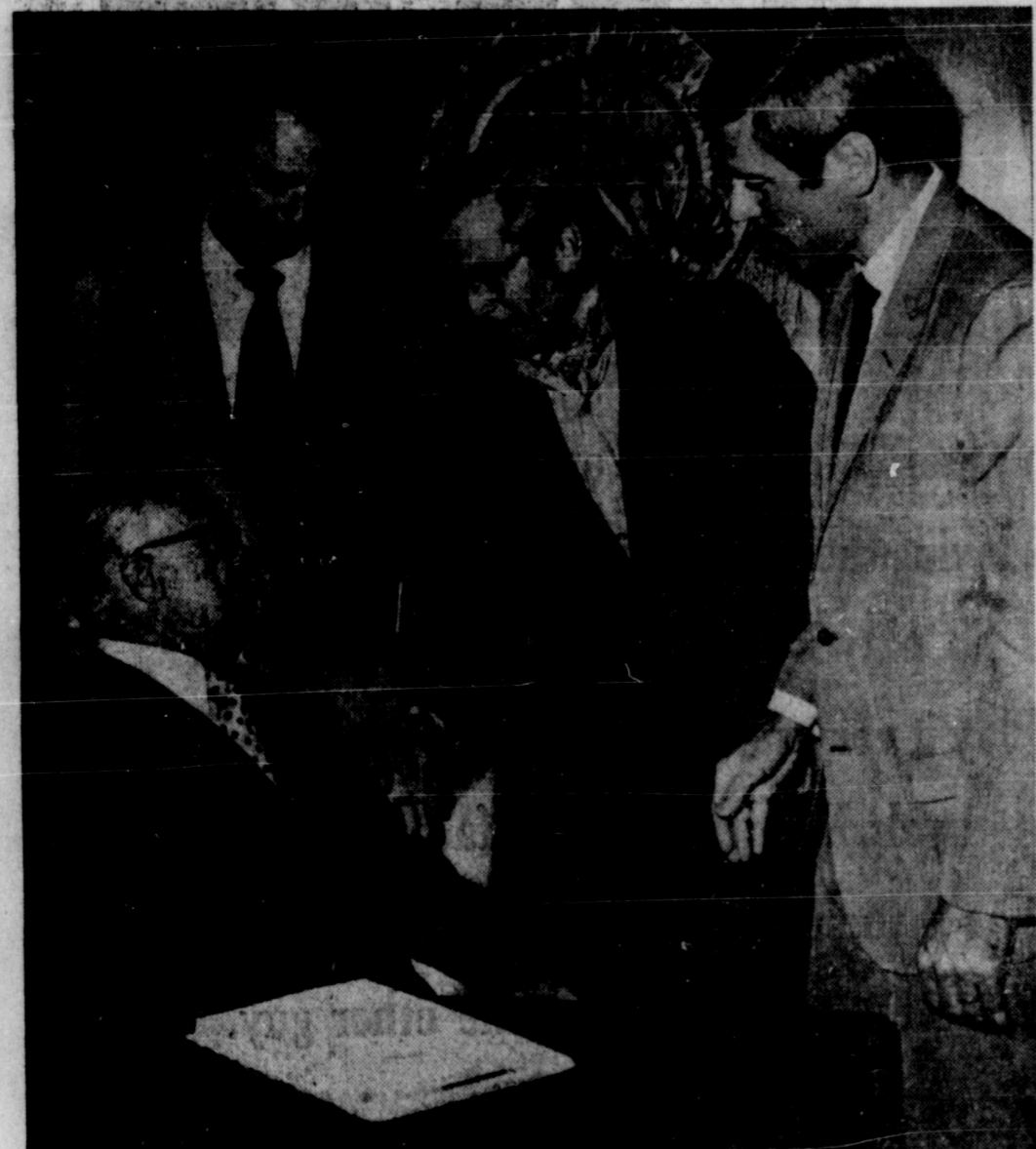

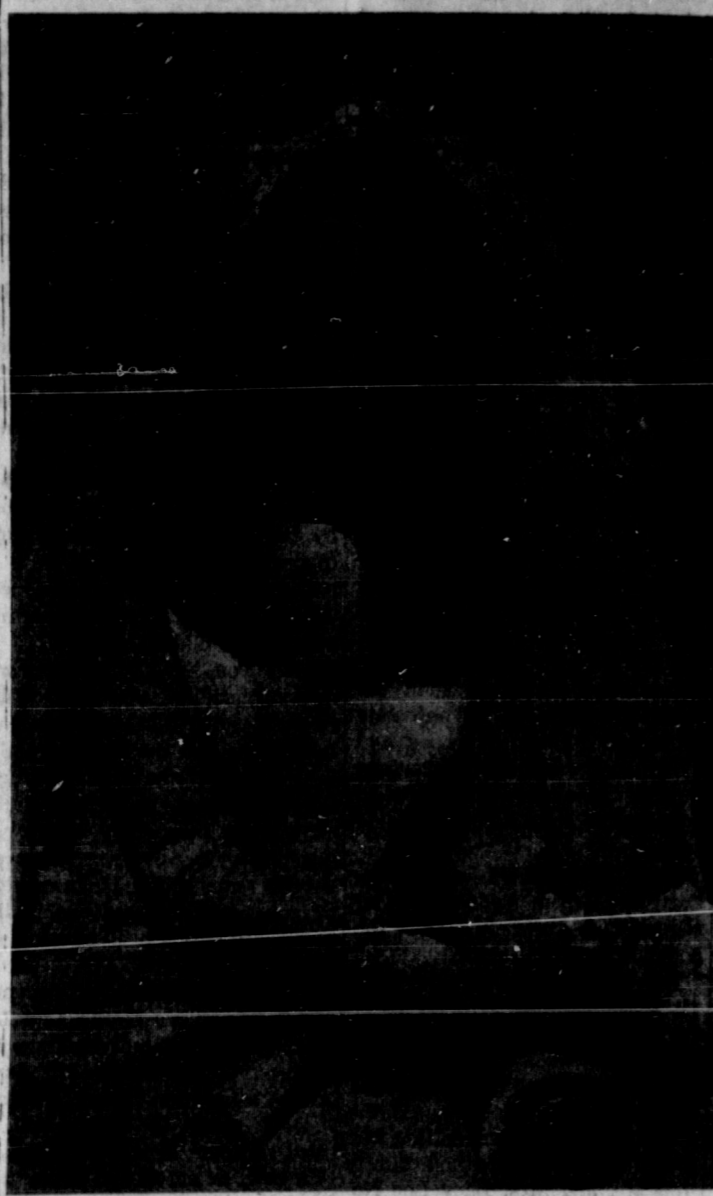

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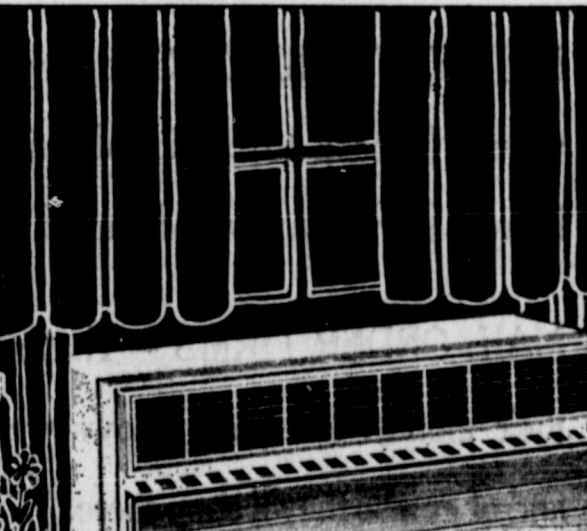

### Highlights and Sidelights From Your State Capitol

By Vern Stanford

**U.S. TO HELP MAKE RAIN**—Federal aid through weather modification experiments aimed at bringing rain for bone dry areas of Texas has been promised, Governor Smith announced.

Operational details of a cloud-seeding project will be coordinated with the U. S. Department of Defense, the Bureau of Reclamation of the Interior Department and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

Smith said he is hopeful that this step may bring President Nixon to realize the "tragic extent of the drought disaster in Texas." He pointed out that half of the wheat crop already has been lost to drought and that agricultural production income loss would be more than half a billion dollars if the drought were broken immediately.

**LAND BONDS SOLD** — Veterans Land Board sold \$23.5 million in bonds to continue financing the veterans land program of low-interest, long-term farm-ranch loans.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong said the sale will enable another 3,000 Texas veterans to get loans under the revival program.

Bonds were sold just under the constitutional interest rate ceiling—at 4.499 per cent. Ceiling is 4.5 per cent. Buyers included the Harris Trust and Savings Bank, Bankers Trust Company, Northern Trust Company, Chase Manhattan Bank N.S., Continental Illinois National Bank and Trust Company, First National Bank in Dallas and 41 others.

Armstrong said that there were three other bids of \$30 million in bonds offered for sale. Buyers represented all areas of the country.

**AIRPORT GRANT RECEIVED**—Federal Aviation Administration approved a \$419,974 grant to Texas for a comprehensive study

of future airport development needs. Funds, together with \$209,987 in state money, will be used to develop an airport systems plan for Texas. Grant seeks development of a plan that can be used to forecast regional and statewide demands for air transportation.

**COURTS SPEAK** — State Supreme Court in a Potter County case held that signing by an injured person of a release settling a damage claim is valid only for that person and no other involved in the dispute.

High Court told four contractors for San Antonio's HemisFair '68 that they couldn't collect on deferred payment certificates and unsold tickets which they received for partial payment of their services. Firms sued City of San Antonio, San Antonio Fair Inc. and San Antonio Urban Renewal Agency.

Austin District Judge Herman Jones enjoined the sale of historical (1755-1846) documents, "The Laredo Archives," to which the state lays claim. Value is estimated at from \$350,000 to \$1 million.

One who kills with a weapon not generally classed as deadly need not be permitted to testify as to intent, Court of Criminal Appeals ruled.

Third Court of Civil Appeals upheld the 1968 Railroad Commission turn-down of an application by Southern Pacific Transportation Company to transfer the Company railroad agency from El Paso to Edinburg.

**AG OPINIONS** — Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held that the Parks and Wildlife Commission and similar state agencies can be increased in size by add-

ing new members without abolishing present boards.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that: A school board may contract with a teacher whose first cousin has been elected to the board but has not taken oath. Contract remains valid after the relative qualifies for office.

A pupil promoted to a high school grade not taught in the home district can transfer to any other accredited high school, and the resident district must pay the receiving district's legally-imposed high school tuition fee.

Houston Independent School District has the option of selecting procedures available to it in establishing a junior college district.

A bill to permit an individual to petition for leave to file pro se proceedings without the suit being brought by the state attorney general, district or county attorney is unconstitutional.

Monthly salary of state employees whose salary is budgeted on an annual basis is determined by dividing the annual figure by 12. Opinion also sets a standard method of determining weekly or hourly pay for such employees.

Money collected as admission fees and concessions profits at state properties may be spent for maintenance and repair of property.
