Clarendon Schools to Convert To New Quarter System In Fall

Beginning with the 1975 fall semester, Clarendon Schools will change over to the "quarter system" which was enacted by the 62nd Legislature in 1971. Although many people have criticized this system, it will not affect students locally other than give them more electives to choose and more credits at the end of the

Simply stated, the quarter system is only a new way of lividing the school calendar year, giving systems four three-month terms instead of the previous two semesters. These changes were necessary in some of the more heavily populated cities in the state where school facilities were filled to capacity and the possibility of having children attend school the year round existed when the legislation was enacted. Rural areas and most large schools would have felt no effect by the 1971 guidelines.

CLARENDON SCHOOLS AND THE QUARTER SYSTEM By Mark D. Gunnels

The 62nd session of the Texas Legislature in 1971 enacted a law which changes school operation from a semester system to a quarter system. The following information answers some of the questions which have been asked about the quarter system for Clarendon schools.

What is the Quarter System?

The quarter system is a new way of dividing the school now have four three-month terms or quarters. Three quarters will provide 180 days of instruction to meet attendance requirements. During the summer, a fourth quarter will be our summer vacation. Like any school plan, the quarter system can be developed and modified to fit the needs of the community. It makes possible more flexibility in scheduling and curriculum and provides added educational

How Will the Quarter System Affect School Districts?

- 1. Use of the quarter system is required beginning in September, 1975.
- 2. Districts will decide which options of the quarter system to implement in their schools.
- 3. A school must operate at least three quarters, providing 180 days of instruction. Local districts are not required to operate a fourth quarter, students are not required to attend a fourth quarter, nor are teachers required to teach more than
- 4. Eligibility for funding under the Foundation School Program is based on student attendance for 180 days, three quarters, in one school year.
- 5. Districts must offer a full complement of required courses in order to obtain state financing in any quarter. 6. The three quarters that a student will be counted for eligible ADA must be determined by the district when a
- student begins a school year. 7. Districts will continue to arrange the school calendar for holidays, vacations and inservice education.

How Will the Quarter System Affect Teachers?

1. Requirements for teacher certification will remain

2. Districts will continue to make all contract arrangements as to length of service for employment of school personnel. 3. Salaries will not be affected unless a teacher teaches four

Court OK's **Election** Results

County commissioners met in a called session Friday. April 25, to certify the results of the April 22 election returns in Conley County. Commissioners canvassed ballots cast in all voting boxes in the county and confirmed that Amendment One received 281 votes for and 105 against passage.

Amendment Two received 236 votes in favor and 148 against.

In other court action, commissioners voted to employ a Home Demonstration Agent with the county paying an annual salary of \$2,315 with an annual auto expence of \$500. Approximately 15 women met with commissioners to voice approval of the Home Demonstration Agent program. The state will share in the salary to be paid the new agent when named. recommendation will be handed down to commissioners at a later date from the Estension Service as to who will be employed in Donley County.

Commissioners also voted to purchase a radio frequency scanner for the Texas Highway Patrol unit stationed in Clarendon. scanner will enable State Troopers to listen in to other law enforcement frequencies rather than having to rely on messages being relayed to them through a special frequency.

Burglars Hit Farm Home Here Friday



by JERRY SPARKS During the past week, this department has taken quite a bit of ribbing about a little clean-up article printed in this space last week. It's not that we don't deserve every bit of it but for those who had been laying in wait for an opportunity to jibe us about it, we would like to take this opportunity to point out

that progress is being made to clean up our own house-even though it may come a little at a time. We knew there was a reason that article was so extremely hard to finish, probable because somewhere in the back of our mind we kept seeing the weeds and trash gathered around at

the back of the building. At any rate, the lawn mover was brought out of moth balls Thursday and quite a bit of damage was done to the weeds and grass around the front and along the north side of our downtown building. In fact, we went just as far as the extension cord would reach. The rest will be cut as soon as we can get to an electrical plug-in in the rear of our building.

It's surprising, but in less than a week there have been quite a few changes in the landscape around town. That includes a lot adjacent to out building where the old ice house was once located. It had been partially torn down or collapsed some time back, and was probably one of the worst eyesores

For those who haven't been around lately, we'd like to pass the word along that this is now a completely vacant lot, leveled and cleaned off. Fred and Jack Clifford had a bulldozer come in Thursday and completely level the old building and bury it.

Other changes that we've noted around town are the new store front installed last week on the Goodman Furniture Co. building and a fresh coat of paint that has been applied to the Knorpp Insurance Agency.

One other very recent improvement that we've noted is the complete renovation of the Curosity Shop on the eastern edge of Clarendon, owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. George Umbarger. The Umbarger's have turned their combination service station and gift shop into one continuous building and created an attractive business of it.

We understand that several other buildings in downtown Clarendon will soon undergo some facelifting including Osborn Furniture Company and the old Stocking Drugstore building. There may be others still that we haven't heard

One other big change that we noted over the past weekend is the fantastic cooperation of Mother Nature, for the trees around town seemed to bush out overnight into full foliage. However, there still remains a lot of work to be done during the next couple of weeks to give the overall town a

presentable appearance for May visitors. There are some houses in the residential areas that are grown up in weeds and grass, one in particular that we've noticed is almost completely hidden.

Some weeks it seems nothing goes right. We had a feeling something was wrong last Thursday and Friday but just couldn't place what it was--until late Tuesday night. During the past week, we shot two rolls of film for pictures to use in today's edition. Some of these were important news pictures...others we made just to have in case we needed more pictures to use up space.

The one thing we didn't count on, however, was that only one negative of 24 exposures would be printable. It only took a few seconds to discover what happened after the film was developed.

Our Yashica camera comes equipped with a switch which controls the lens speed when using different types of flash attachments. One side of the switch is for manual or low voltage flash units--the other for electronic flash systems which we use.

Somewhere in the process, this switch was tripped to the manual flash position and can be credited with ruining the negatives we processed Tuesday night. The switch delays the shutter speed at the manual position to allow the slower moving flash to reach the subject before the aperture opens to expose the film. In the electronic position, the lens opens almost instantly when tripped because higher voltage

systems travel at much faster speeds. Although we can remember most of the pictures made over the last five or six days, there are some that we do not recall, and the image, or what there is of it on the negative, does not give us much of a clue to where the pictures were taken or who was in them.

Bear with us...we are taping off the manual control position on the camera to keep this from happening again.

It appears the fishing rodeo in progress at Greenbelt Lake is picking up steam with the recent changes in weather conditions. Almost every day we are hearing stories about the ones that got away.

There have been some changes in the leaders for the prize money being put up by the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce. A week ago, Billy Jack had the top bass weighed in at Mooring Place, headquarters for the rodeo. His four pound, two-ounce bass has been replaced twice since last Tuesday though. First, Dale Kersel took over the top spot with a bass measuring four-pounds, four-ounces on April 25. The next day, Ewell Parker of Amarillo brought one in weighing only

B. J. Mooring told us late Tuesday evening that the lake was still full of fishermen who were beating the bushes looking for still larger entries.

There were some reports of some extremely large Northern Pike hooked, but not caught, that would have probably taken over top spot in that division from Pete Darnell. Darnell's entry was a 13 pounder caught only last Tuesday. Rollie Adams still has the largest panfish entry, but this

time with a little larger crappie than before. His latest catch weighed one and a quarter pounds, caught April 24.

Somewhere in the waters of Greenbelt Lake, there are other fish still larger to be caught than what's been weighed in so far. It's time you tried your luck.

Our generation is somewhat skeptical of promises. Perhaps this is because we have heard so many and seen to many broken. Broken promises have divided husbands and wives, separated sons and daughters from parents, added confusion to the domestic scene, and brought calamity upon nations. Our heritage is that a person ought to keep his word. Because of this, we have little patience with an individual who doesn't. It is easy for one to loose his sence of direction when raised in a generation that is all promised, but seldom produces what is promised. You burn a fellow once, and he is careful not to get burned again. Some future seer might

"Promises! Promises! All I ever hear is promises!" Promises are a part of our every day life. We promise before God and men at the altar in beginning our homes. We promise at the bank with every loan. We promise every time we flash a credit card. We promise every time we give a check. We are so used to promising that we will even promise

characterize our generation with one of our popular sayings:

when we know we cannot produce. Because of our hang up on promises, we sometimes doubt God's. One of the favorite past times of many is to doubt God's promises. It is easy for some not to pay any attention to Others are completely unaware that God ever promised anything. Others know just enough about God's promises to be skeptical concerning them. Volumes are filled today by those who mock God and everything that He ever

The Apostle Peter characterized the last days as days when men would scoff at God's promises asking: "Where is the promise of his coming? for since the fathers dies, everything has continued as they were from the beginning..." (I Peter 3:3-4). "If you think God is slack concerning his promises," affirmed the Apostles, "You are men. ignorant of God's way of doing things. God isn't like men who promise and can't produce. God keeps his promises." "Be not ignorant of this one thing...the Lord is not slack concerning his promise as some men count slackness but is long suffering to us-ward" (IIPeter 3:9).

God sometimes tarries in producing the results of His promises. The Prophet, 'Habakkuk, explained the tarrying of God's promises: "For the vision is yet for an appointed time, but at the end it shall speak, and not lie; though it tarry, wait for it because it shall surely come...' (Hab. 2:3). Isaiah, the Prince of Prophets, said that God's tarrying with His promises is sometimes a blessing, a demonstration of God's loving kindness: "And therefore will the Lord wait, that he may be gracious unto you, and therefore will he be exalted, that he may have mercy upon you: for the Lord is a God of Judgment; blessed are they that wait for him" (IS. 30:18). God's tarrying is a kindness to men. It gives time to get things straightened out with God. Mankind needs all the time that he can get here.

The Apostle Paul discussed God's goodness in tarrying, about God's forberance, and about His long suffering. He explained that this goodness of God in forbearing leads many to repentance (Rom. 2:4). The Apostle speaks of God's tarrying as "The riches of his goodness" (Rom 2:4).



Soil Conservation Service Began Forty Years Ago

Forty years ago, the country faced tremendous problems brought about by erosion, floods, land damage, and violent dust storms.

On April 27, 1935, a new agency, the Soil Conservation Service, was created to combat the forces that threatened to lay waste to millions of acres of cropland. The Soil Conservation Service began working with landowners by demonstrating means of erosion control, but it became apparent that really effective conservation work was done better when landowners led the job

themselves. In 1937, President Roosevelt recommended that each state legislature enact laws permitting landowners and land occupiers to form units to be called Soil Conservation Districts. Rallying to the call, all the states, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands, enacted laws permitting formulation of districts.

Soil and Water Conservation Districts set out to focus attention on land and water owned land, develop annual problems, and to enlist all the appropriate help available from public and private environment is under pressources.


