Retired Persons Priority Realized with Building

The number one need of the retired and semi-retired citizens of Donley County will be met this Monday, March 31, when a three-day per week meeting place for them will open at the Clarendon Housing Authority community building, 103 E. Fourth St.

A central meeting place where they could enjoy fellowship and activities with those of similar age and interests, their peer group, was the top priority decided at the meeting called to assess the needs of the retired and elderly of the county on January 16.

The Clarendon Housing Authority, through the cooperation of Mr. and Mrs. Homer Estlack, has made the housing authority's facilities

Donley County Hospital Board Slate Filled

Filing in the Donley County Hospital board election is complete, with one person filed for each board position.

Running in place one is incumbent E.W. Barbee, and incumbent Lacy Noble filed in place three. Board president Delbert Robertson did not file for reelection, but Billy R. Johnston filed for place two in his stead. The board elects its own president from among the members.

Absentee voting started March 25 and runs one week, through April 1, during regular office hours at the Medical Center Hospital administration office, from 8 a.m. till 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

"This is what this building is for," Mrs. Estlack said. She said she and her husband, director of the authority, were happy to cooperate in providing a meeting place for the retired and semi-retired persons of Donley County.

The building is roughly 22 by 32 feet, air conditioned and carpeted throughout and nicely furnished, including complete kitchen facilities. There will always be two hostesses on hand.

Hostesses at the opening day come-and-go get acquainted party will be Mrs. Verdine Harrington and Mrs. Melville Mills, who's husband represents Clarendon on the Aging Advisory Council of the Panhandle Regional Planning Council. Mills' work was instrumental in getting the meeting place for the retired and semi-retired of the county, coordinating the needs assessment session and drawing statewide notice in "The Voice of Texas Senior Citizen Association," a monthly publication.

"The coffee pot will always be on," Mrs. Mills said. "When people come into town to go to the post office or pay bills they are invited to drop in. When we get started, we will try to have a program."

The day will begin, Mrs. Mills suggested, with some of the early arrivals making cookies to go with the coffee throughout the day. They are hoping to have card tables and chairs for games and recreation and a piano soon for sing alongs and musical recreation. Under discussion are plant and flower swapping meets and trips, such as picnics and fishing. Voluntary donations of transportation have been heartening. And a telephone visitation program will be worked out somehow, they said.

"We will try to listen to the people and have the programs the people want," Mills promised. He added that he has lived at Howardwick only three years and so doesn't know the will of the senior and retired citizens as well as some of the old timers. But he is thoroughly dedicated to starting the programs most desired by the retired residents of the county.

There are more elderly and widows in Clarendon, he pointed out, than one would expect. There are more than 100 widows listed in the telephone directory. Clarendon was said to have more elderly on a population ratio than any other place except Hedley, according to one knowledgeable with social security. With the low population density of the county, it is readily understandable why isolation is a leading problem among the retired and semi-retired and therefore why a meeting place is needed.

Property owners from Amarillo, Shamrock, and other area cities attended the general meeting, and they voted unanimously to endorse the Civil Defense siren system for the city. Civil Defense funds will finance half of the system, the Bicentennial Committee will donate \$2,500, and contributions will be needed for the remainder of the funds, estimated from \$1,500 to \$2,000. Bicentennial Committee chairman Mrs. W. Dunn said.

The general meeting was opened with a recording of "God Bless America", followed by an inspirational message by Rev. Gordon Oglesby, pastor of the First Christian Church in Clarendon. He spoke on the most important reasons for celebrating this nation's 200th birthday, pointing out that our forefathers fought for the liberties and rights which all must work together unselfishly and with desire and Christian determination to preserve.

The chairman, Mrs. Dunn, opened the business session, re-emphasizing the words of Rev. Oglesby and asking for the sincere cooperation of all.

The meeting was then turned over to Mayor Glen Doty, chairman of the project for a city-wide siren system, who explained in detail how this could be accomplished with the aid of Civil Defense. Sheriff Retracts Resignation Vow

Sheriff Frank Lindsey, Jr. withdrew his tendered resignation Thursday, March 20, after a settlement was agreed upon Wednesday night.

The county hired Paul Brady as dispatcher for night and weekend duty and to live in the jail.

Funding for Brady's salary is being sought under the Manpower program so that it won't cost the county anything under the initial training period.

Sheriff Lindsey turned in his notice of resignation in writing on March 11, citing among several reasons that his wife had acted as dispatcher for law enforcement agencies in the county during after business hours for a year and a half while the commissioners court quibbled over the possibility of paying her a salary.

The commissioners court interviewed several applicants for the sheriff and tax assessor-collector post at a called meeting March 17, but two were disqualified on the six-month residency requirement. Then chief deputy Clyde James, who had been asked by the court if he would take the job on March 10 when Lindsey phoned his intention to resign to the commissioners court, resigned from the sheriff's department.

Clarendon Police Chief Gary Gerdes told the commissioners he would take on the added responsibilities of sheriff if the law enforcement agencies of the county and city could be combined, but he quickly drew his name out of the running because of dissatisfaction among city aldermen with his position.

The sheriff's department is again intact, with Lindsey at the helm, James back on as deputy, deputy Steve Vines keeping order at Hedley, and Brady dispatching nights from the county jail.

Fire Consumes Feedlot Hay

A fire broke out Friday at The Donley County Feedlot at Hedley, but it was contained by the Hedley Volunteer Fire Department to a couple of stacks of hay.

The Clarendon Fire Department was on standby alert, but there was enough caliche around the hay to prevent the fire from spreading to grass and buildings. Security State Bank of Hedley president Melvin Boothe said.

The Donley County Feedlot is under the receivership of Security State Bank and isn't presently in operation.

Clarendon's varsity Broncho tracksters earned a total 100 points to place second at the Memphis track meet on March 22.

Memphis, ever full of surprises, won their first meet of the year on their home turf with a total 111 1/2 points.

Coach Bob Lemon's Broncho sprint relay team, Larry Shields, Barry Schafer, Eddie Eads and Kenneth King, were clocked at 45.2 for second place.

The mile relay team was also second in a 3:40.6 time. Freshman John Hall was transferred to the varsity team for the event, and he turned in the fastest time

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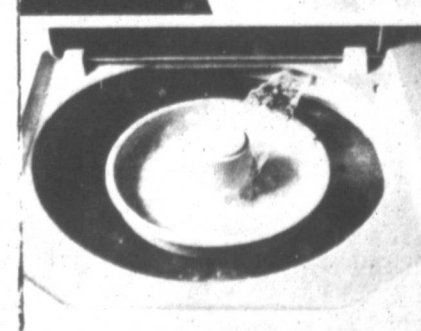
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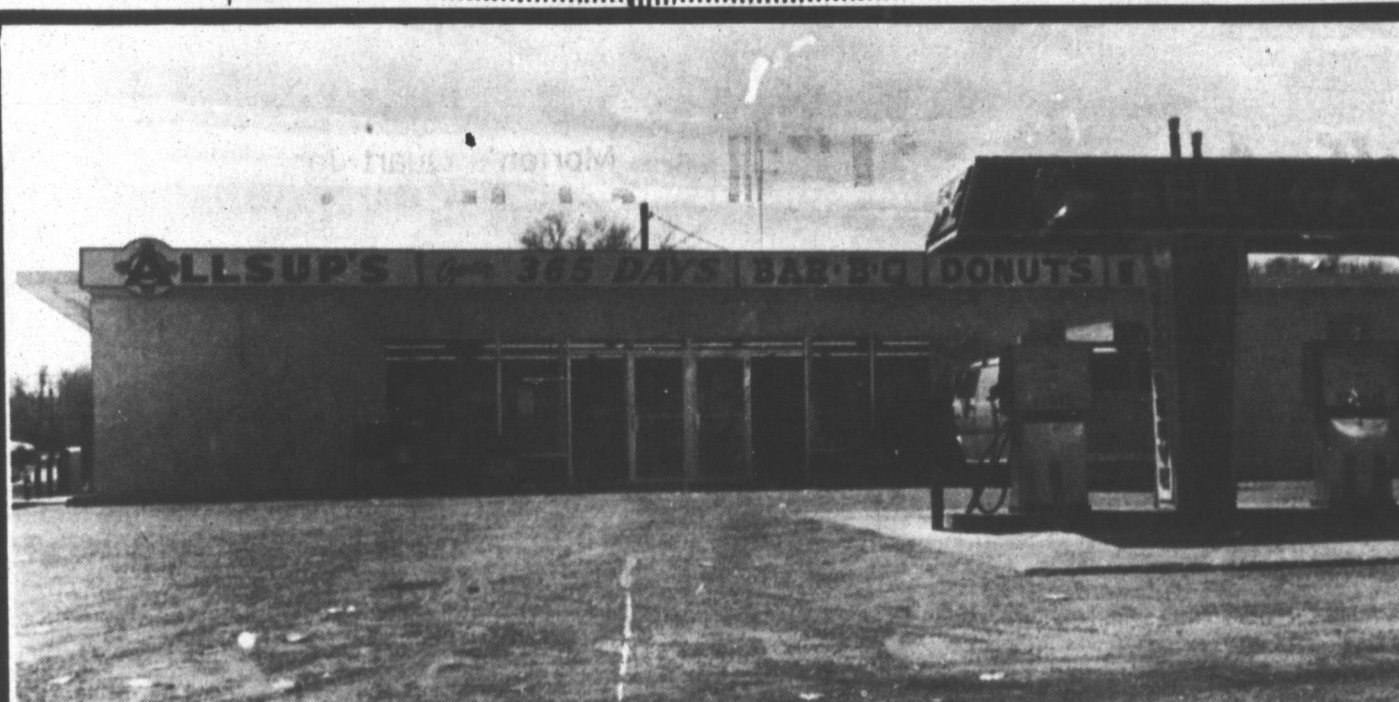

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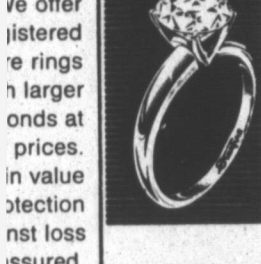

TEXAS TALK

Q: As far as feed and feed grains are concerned, what are the differences between concentrates and roughages?

A: Fiber content and the amount of nutrient which is digestible by the animal are the basic criteria for separating these classes.

Concentrates -- Are feeds generally high in nutrients and low in fiber content. Virtually all grains are in this class, as well as several by-products including linseed meal, cottonseed meal, hominy feed and wheat bran. Many of the concentrates have a high protein content, although this is not a prerequisite of the class.

ROUGHAGES--are high in fiber and low in nutrients. Feeds other than the grains are generally classed as roughage. These include: straw, silage, hay and a variety of coarse by-products of the plants utilized in feed grain production.

Suddenly, it's spring
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We've noticed the
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Nobody's Perfect But...

Suddenly, it's spring. Easter is only hours away and school will turn out for the summer in less than two months.

We've noticed the fruit tree blossoms for several weeks now, and the trees are beginning to bud out...the grass is greening. But there's still one sure sign of spring that we haven't seen yet, and that's the mesquite buds that are a sure sign warm weather is here to stay.

Not too many years ago, we talked with an old man who told us not to bother going fishing until the first mesquite bushes began to bud out. Whether his theory has merit or not, we don't know. But we do know that there are several mesquite trees around our side of town that are being watched mightily close.

There's a reason why we chose to get off on this subject today since this is an excellent opportunity to plug the fishing rodeo which starts next Tuesday at Greenbelt Lake. Although we have had several stories and comments about the rodeo in the past several weeks, we know that there are lots of people who are looking forward to trying their luck at getting a share of the \$750 in prize money put up by the Chamber of Commerce.

On weekends, we've been keeping a pretty close tab on Greenbelt Lake. The water is still cold, and only an occasional bass is being brought out. We haven't heard of any Northern Pike being caught yet, but the spawning season for them can't be far away. We have been told that several pike have been observed in the upper reaches of the lake in the last two weeks, however.

Perhaps with the advent of April, the March winds will subside enough to stay on the water for a change. Greenbelt had a lot of fishermen out this past weekend, but most had to admit defeat to the strong winds Saturday afternoon and Sunday.

Lots of the people we talked with last weekend were from the Amarillo area, by far most of these folks were from outside Donley County. Many of these families brought rather expensive campers, boats and the like to spend the weekend at one of their favorite fishing holes.

Greenbelt Lake, along with the adjacent 18 hole championship golf course of the Clarendon Country Club, is the prime tourist attraction for Donley County. The revenue realized from this recreational resource amounts to a considerable sum, all of which cannot readily be counted.

With each visitor, there will be purchases made that may vary from groceries to bathing suits, gasoline to sun tan lotion and hundreds of other items in between.

At any rate, we expect to see a lot of new faces around Clarendon and Greenbelt Lake throughout the summer months because of the resources we have at hand.

While numerous "miracles" have been proclaimed before, we have been thinking about giving our Ministerial Alliance some practical experience in witnessing a true miracle. We perform one just about every week when we finally get a paper all put together and have it printed every Wednesday. The "we" referred to is the entire staff of the Press, because there's never a week that goes by that some sort of crisis doesn't hit us, usually in the late hours on Tuesday night.

It happened last week when our typesetter, Becky Jackson, came in and announced on Monday morning that she had to quit because she and her husband were moving to Lakeview that week. We wound up taking turns at the type setting machine trying to get all the news copy set in the wee hours Wednesday morning. It hit us again this week late Tuesday night when we ran out of a stabilizing fluid used in processing all of our photo paper used in setting ads and news copy material.

Without the stabilizing fluid, all production stopped. Although additional supplies had been ordered, no delivery had been made as expected. It was about midnight when we happened to remember that our darkroom facilities had a meager amount of the precious fluid in another, older processor that we use once a week for halftone photos. It was a miracle-of sorts—that we had it.

Finally, about one o'clock Wednesday morning, a new supply was delivered by bus from Amarillo.

Even when everything goes smoothly, we sometimes consider publishing our paper a miracle, because most people tend to delay until the last possible moment turning in news and advertising copy. Out of the seven days in a week, about 75 per cent of the news and an even higher percentage of advertising copy doesn't get to our office until Tuesday.

Time elements have always dealt the newspaper trade chaos. Not so much for ours except for the time required to compose our material, but to most newspapers where a large staff and production department is involved, even an extra hour of work can mean several hundred dollars in additional payroll. In addition, a rather tight schedule is usually observed at the central printing plants where several papers are printed the same day. Some of these plants print as many as 20 to 25 different newspapers in a single day, and a rigid schedule must be kept just to get it all through the presses.

Even with the printing accomplished, the work is still unfinished. Every paper mailed to subscribers must be stenciled here in our office, separated into bundles and mail sacks and these must be labeled as to what town it is mailed to. This requires another three to four hours before the papers can be taken to the post office for delivery.

It's no wonder we sometimes feel like the weekend should begin on Thursday—every employee sometimes puts in up to 50 hours of work on the first three days of the week. This kind of reminds us of the story of the cow left hooked up to the electric milker all night...she gave 20 gallons of milk that night, and the next day she was pooped—but proud.

Speaking of news and advertising copy, another point we would like to bring out to our readers is the fact that sometimes, it is impossible to get in all the advertising sold and all of the news copy assembled, and come out with an even number of pages. Occasionally, we will have to pull out a news story which would be of interest to only a small segment of our readers to get in what we consider to be an article of more general interest. At other times, we have received photos that, in our estimation, will not reproduce clearly. These will generally be edited out, not to slight someone, but to make the newspaper more attractive and readable.

Each week, we must ferret through hundreds of pieces of correspondence and retain that which we think is of interest to our circulation area. Sometimes we may miss the point completely of a news release, because the main item of interest is tagged along the bottom. Quite often, our eyes never reach the bottom of some of these news releases because we have been trained to put the most important information in the first few paragraphs of our news stories. If there is anything important contained in news stories, it belongs at the top.

We sometimes get criticism for not having a story about some activity...but then we get right back to the name of this column...

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN—Legislators are getting nervous over new reform laws which restrict their political fund-raising.

House Speaker Bill Clayton has advised representatives to postpone their efforts to retire campaign debts until after the legislative session in view of warnings by a district attorney.

Travis County District Attorney Robert O. Smith told House leaders direct solicitation of Austin-based lobbyists for contributions to campaign war chests is a violation which he would feel called on to take before a grand jury.

The issue came to Smith's attention when a Texas Civil Liberties Union official, who is a registered lobbyist, complained that he had been solicited for a contribution to a representative's fund-raising reception in Dallas.

A provision of the new penal code makes it an offense for a legislator to solicit any benefit from a person known to have an interest in legislation. There are less-strict interpretations than the one by Smith, but the district attorney is the one lawmakers feel they must stay on the right side of.

Serious attention is being given to amending some of the laws passed in 1973—particularly the penal code provisions which cast a legal cloud on a lawmaker's accepting a "benefit" from a person who has an interest

in any matter before the legislature or "contemplated" by the legislature.

LOSS REPORTED

A Texas Education Agency indicates students lost more than 2.4 million in tuition refunds they should have received from 19 proprietary schools.

When a student quits, he is supposed to get back the unused portion of his tuition within 30 days.

Woodrow W. Bean of El Paso, State Board of Education member, called on Gov. Dolph Briscoe and Atty. Gen. John Hill for a complete audit of all Texas Education Agency financial transactions during the last four years.

Bean charged refund losses may be as much as \$5 million to \$8 million. He also claimed (while admitting he could not confirm) that about \$105 million in public funds administered by TEA has been "misused, misapplied or otherwise lost somewhere."

SMOKE BAN VOTED

Smoking in public places could bring a stiff fine under a bill just passed by the Texas Senate and sent to the House.

The ban covers elevators, theaters, movie houses, libraries, museums, hospitals, school facilities, intrastate buses, planes or trains—except in specifically designated areas.

SCHOOLS CRITICIZED

Some public schools and junior colleges have been criticized by House members for allegedly using emergency funds to raise teachers' pay, make investments and pave parking lots.

Rep. Tom Massey of San Angelo, House Education Committee chairman, said a special report is being compiled on the "abuse."

Rep. Fred Head of Troup proposed to repeal an \$18 million emergency grant to meet junior college enrollment increases.

COURTS SPEAK

The State Supreme Court again upheld constitutionality of a law permitting legislator-lawyers to delay trials in which they represent clients. The Court said the continuance provision may not be used if only enforcement of prior court orders are involved, however.

The Court of Criminal Appeals reversed a negligent homicide conviction of a Hillsboro man because the jury assessed an improper punishment of two years in jail.

Third Court of Civil Appeals upheld power of the State Finance Commission to prohibit savings and loan associations from offering premiums to lure new accounts.

In an order applauded by the Attorney General as the beginning of a statewide enforcement effort, a Bexar County district judge granted an injunction to prohibit air pollution by a rendering plant.

AG OPINIONS

Attorney General Hill warned legislators they may be overstepping the law by accepting speech-making honorariums from groups interested in legislation.

It may not be good for the ego, but it is worthwhile to rub elbows with and listen to men of talent and great technical knowledge once in a while. Henry and I did that last weekend and for good measure I took my granddaughter, Marian McDowell, to the all day seminar.

It was a program on news reporting and the law sponsored by the State Bar of Texas, the Texas Press Association and the Texas Association of Broadcasters. It was held at the Joe C. Thompson Center at the University of Texas which adjoins the LBJ Library.

Marian and Henry took the seven hour session in stride and kept taking copious notes until the last; but this old scholar was about exhausted before school turned out.

Even so, I got an earful whether I understood all of it or not. They may need to run me through the wringer again unless my children can explain it to me. Twenty or thirty years ago, I thought I knew considerable about publication laws, libel laws, etc.

Saturday I learned that decisions of the Supreme Court in the last ten years have liberalized what newspapers can print and broadcasters can say without any fear of having to pay damages. This is particularly true of reporting on the actions of public officials and this applies to more than elected officials. According to these eminent men of the law, a public official is one who has been elected, appointed or who has been employed to work for the public and is paid whether wholly or in part with tax dollars.

There is another classification that may find themselves the object of publicity whether they want it or not. This is the public figure. On the national scene it might be an actor or actress, a noted novelist or a distinguished surgeon. Anyone who is in the public eye is a public figure. And then there are those quiet people leading modest lives who are suddenly drawn into a great controversy, great tragedy or a natural disaster. They become public figures overnight.

During the time we've lived in Seminole, we've been impressed with the manner in which its citizens rally for some community cause or project.

We've seen it happen time and time again, and we saw it again last Friday when an industrial prospect came into town unannounced.

Industrial prospects are not everyday occurrences in Seminole, and when a hot one does turn up, an informal but very effective mechanism comes into play.

The folks already were armed with an impressive file on Seminole and Gaines County. Still they wanted more concrete information on taxes, water pressure, high pressure gas lines on a proposed tract of land, oil company flow lines, available utilities and transportation.

The two men were taken to the bank Gold Room where various "experts" were called to provide answers to the prospect's questions.

Help came from the county judge's office, city hall, Amerasia-Hess, Southwestern Public Service, Pioneer Gas and others.

Friday, it was a case of summon help by telephone with an immediate response as a result.

In less than two hours, the two gentlemen—one from Lubbock and one from Dallas—were back at the local airport and on their way.

Religious Thoughts

The basic foundation of the Christian faith is the resurrection of Jesus Christ. The Apostle Paul summed it up when he said to the Church of Corinth: "And if Christ be not risen then is our preaching vain, and your faith is vain. . . ye are yet in your sins" (I Cor. 15:14-17). The basis for all the Christian believes is bound up in the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Either He arose or He didn't. Christianity points to the empty tomb.

The witnesses of the New Testament era saw Him, touched Him, lived with Him, and saw Him die; all bear witness to the fact that they saw Him alive again after He had died on the cross. The Apostle Paul says that on one day after His death, Jesus was seen alive by "five hundred men at one time, not counting their wives and children" (I Cor. 15:6).

The account of the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the tomb, as recorded by Luke, who was a physician of his day, says that Jesus arose from the dead on "the first day of the week, very early in the morning." This was Sunday morning. This is why Christians ever since that day have been meeting together on Sunday morning to worship.

Some women, according to Dr. Luke's account, went to the tomb where He was buried and found it empty. Thinking that someone had stolen His body, they were very perplexed. Suddenly, "two men stood by them in shining garments . . . and said unto them. Why seek ye the living among the dead? He is not here, but is risen." They explained the reason for the Lord's coming to our planet: "The Son of man must be delivered into the hands of sinful men, and be crucified, and the third day rise again . . . that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in his name among all nations . . ." (Luke 24:1-7; v47).

The Bible says that these words seemed to many "as idle tales, and they believed them not" (Luke 24:11). You have to decide for yourself whether or not Jesus Christ is alive. The evidence is overwhelming that the tomb is empty. The witnesses of the first century, who saw Him dead and saw Him alive after His death, are innumerable.

The evidence of the present day, the results of His redeeming grace in the lives of hundreds of thousands of His children, proclaims to the world a living Savior and Lord who says, "I will not leave you comfortless . . ." (Luke 14:18).

As the Apostle John said, so say today's Christians: "That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked upon and our hands have handled of the Word of Life . . . that which we have seen and heard declare we unto you" (I John 1:1-3).

We declare that we have experienced the Lord. We have experienced a living Saviour who redeemed us, forgave our sins, and walks with us through every moment of this life. We declare unto you a Saviour who has left our planet, taking a resurrected, transformed human body with Him, who has ascended into the heavens, and who in God's great somewhere, is preparing a place for all those who love Him and believe Him. He himself said, "I go to prepare a place for you, and if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto myself, that where I am, there ye may be also" (John 14:2-3).

Because of Jesus Christ, because He is victorious over death, we who are God's people have "an inheritance incorruptible and undefiled, and that fadeth not away, reserved in heaven" (I Peter 1:4).

The final session of the "What Presbyterians Believe" study group will meet Thursday night at 6:30.

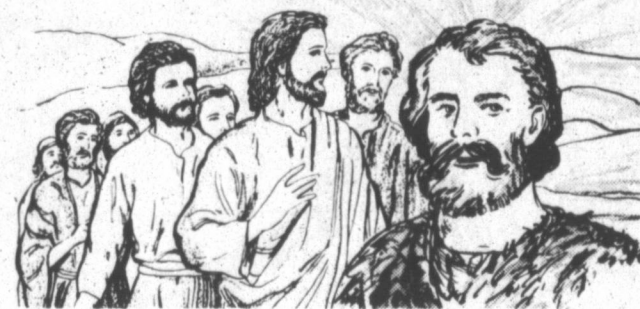
