## Miss Texas Teen-Ager Pageant Plans Firming Up For May Event

Final plans are taking shape for the three day Miss Texas Teen-Ager Pageant to be held at Clarendon College May 30, 31 and June 1. More than 65 entries have already been approved by the national committee in Atlanta, Georgia, with 80 expected to be in the running for the state title.

Judges for the contest will include Rep. Phil Cates, Oklahoma State Senator Al Terrill of Lawton, Susan Bagwell of Arlington, Pricilla Schmidt of Dumas and Danella Davis of Amarillo.

Ms. Bagwell is a recording artist and model. A former resident of Claude, she is the granddaughter of Van Kennedy of Clarendon.

Mrs. Schmidt has been a professional model for 12 years, including house modeling for Blackburns and Alexanders, Inc. of Amarillo. She is the owner of the First Debut Charm School in Dumas and currently teaches modeling classes for teenagers in Borger.

Mrs. (Bob D.) Davis is employed as a member of the public relations staff for Pioneer Natural Gas Company of Amarillo. Prior to her association with Pioneer Mrs. Davis was associated with newspapers in Fort Stockton and Amarillo. She is

an experienced public speaker and regularly instructs classes in professionalism, charm and good grooming.

Clarendon was announced as the pageant site in January of this year by Cathy Christian, former national director for the Miss National Teen-Ager national committee of Atlanta. The 1974 state contest was held in San Antonio.

The reigning Miss Texas Teen-Ager, Cindy Mitchell, of Seagraves will crown the

fourth annual winner here. Also scheduled to be present here are Lisa Lion, holder of the 1974 national crown, of New Port Richey, Florida, and Mrs. Sybil Shaffer, director of the organization's Atlanta headquarters.

Contestants will be judged on scholastic achievement, leadership, poise, personality and beauty. Each contestant is required to write a 100 word essay on "What's Right About America", the theme for the 1975 pageant which is related to

the 1976 observance of America's Bicentennial celebration.

The winner of the Texas contest will be the recipient of many awards, including a scholarship presented by the national organization and another scholarship awarded by Clarendon College, an all expense paid trip to Atlanta to compete in the national pageant, gift certificates donated by local merchants and other gifts.

A reception for parents of girls competing in the contest will be held at the Clarendon Country Club beginning at 6 p.m. Friday, May 30.

Three Clarendon girls have entered the Texas pageant. They are Teresa Jack, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Jack; Chris Cagle, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Cagle, and Kim Radney, granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Huell Brigham of Howardwick. Additional entry lists will have to come from the Atlanta office before being announced to news media.

Contestants will be housed in the dormitory facilities of Clarendon College throughout the three days of the contest.

Plans for the pageant will be Gail Stout of Pampa, a student at Clarendon College. Escorts for the five finalists on Saturday night will be Dana Bell and Bruce Ferguson, students of the college from Wellington and Turkey, respectively; Lynn Floyd and Mike Skinner, Clarendon High School students, and Tommy Shields of Clarendon, a student at Texas Tech in Lubbock.

Sure enough, there was a truck a little ways out of town in need of help...only his call was for a TIRE truck instead of a FIRE truck. The only fire to be doused was a pair of ears burning over the mistaken call.

## Light Vote Approves Two Amendments

In an exceptionally light vote Tuesday, Donley County approved by almost a two to one margin both constitutional amendments which had been submitted to the electorate of the State of Texas for approval by state governing bodies.

Although only 388 total votes were cast in the county, the major item of interest in the amendments passed here by a 236 to 148 vote. Amendment two on the ballot called for increasing the pay of state legislators from \$400 per month to \$600 per month, and to increase the daily expense compensation for members of the legislature from \$12 to \$30 per day during each regular and special session of the legislature.

Texas voters have turned down higher pay raises several times in the past 10 years.

The amendment also provided an unspecified increase in the transportation allowance for members from the present 10 cents per mile.

Amendment one on the ballot won approval from Donley County voters, 281 to 105.

This amendment dealt with revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and the amount of contributions which could be contributed to such systems by the state.

The week of May 19 through 24 has been officially designated as clean-up week in Clarendon by the Board of Aldermen. The clean-up activities are being encouraged slightly earlier this year as the city gets ready to play host to the Miss Texas Teen-Ager pageant to be held the last weekend in May.

City Aldermen are asking everyone to haul all trash, such as old boards, tree limbs, old furniture, etc., into the alleyways in a neat pile and leave it there for the city dump trucks to pick up during the week.

All accumulated trash should be stacked in the alley by Monday, May 19. Although trucks may not pick up these items the same day, residents are advised that crews will be working throughout the week and all trash will be hauled off.

Trucks which will be used in the project will have to be pulled off special gravel hauling detail in order to participate in the clean-up campaign.

Aldermen are also encouraging the citizens of Clarendon to cut weeds and grass on vacant lots and haul away other junk that is an eyesore to the city.

# Nobody's Perfect But...

When Clarendon entertains some 80 girls who will be in the running for the title of Miss Texas Teen-Ager the last weekend in May, it will mark another first in local history. In fact, for a community of 2,000 residents, our guess would be that it will be a first for the entire United States. Sure, there are beauty pageants held in many small towns over the country, but as far as we've been able to determine, never a state-wide event such as this.

The Miss Texas Teen-Ager Pageant is normally held in more swank and sophisticated urban centers such as San Antonio where it was held last year. The story behind Clarendon's selection as the 1975 site is an interesting one that we've been intending to tell for some time now but just never got around to it.

Last December 15 was a typical windy day in Clarendon. It was cool, almost cold, and bad weather was predicted to be moving into the Panhandle from New Mexico and Colorado. About the only thing going for us that day was the sun was shining and there was no dirt blowing or snow falling in the early morning hours.

Among the steady stream of traffic flowing east and west along Highway 287 was a car driven by Cathy Christian, who, at that time was the national director for the Miss National Teen-Ager contest. She was accompanied by Lynn Lyon, the 1974 Miss National Teen-Ager who hails from Florida. At the time they were passing through Clarendon, they were on their way to New Mexico, searching for a pageant site in that state.

A few miles west of Clarendon, Mrs. Christian, impressed with the appearance of the Clarendon Junior College campus and concerned with bad weather being reported in the New Mexico area, decided to turn around and pay a visit to the college and see what facilities were available here.

Although Clarendon was without the elaborate motel facilities, shopping malls and fancy restaurants, the town was recommended to the pageant committee in Atlanta, Georgia, and selected to host the pageant this year.

Since that time, Mrs. Christian has resigned as director for the organization and Mrs. Sybil Shaffer is currently in charge of arrangements for the pageant.

All of the flurry this contest has created for Clarendon College officials has been a little unsettling and, after repeatedly asking the Atlanta committee if they were sure they wanted to hold the pageant here, President Kenneth Vaughan and Dean of Students Tex Selvidge have been assured that Clarendon will be the host city for the state this year.

All this has created some special problems for the college but apparently none that can't be handled unless the audience for the finals exceeds 600 people--the capacity of the college auditorium.

However, it does create some interesting "what ifs" for Clarendon itself to think about. For instance...

"What if" you were a middle class family from Dallas, Houston or some other large city and planned to drive your daughter to the state pageant in Clarendon, Texas. Surely, this place must have something on the ball to be accorded the honors of hosting a state-wide event.

Can you imagine your own surprise when you drive into Clarendon and see what's here. It's not that we're not proud of the town, but the condition of some of the vacant lots that line the highway, weeds growing wild, grass uncut and buildings gone to seed leave a lot to be desired for Clarendon's nomination for the All-American City Award.

"What if" you were an executive with a manufacturing firm on the look-out for possible new small town locations and had to bring your daughter to Clarendon for the Miss Texas Teen-Ager contest. Would your first impression be to look further into Clarendon as a possible future site for your company? Or would the junk cars that decorate vacant lots near the highway discourage you from looking further into the resources at hand?

"What if" you were getting on up in years, just about ready to retire, and had a granddaughter in the contest. As you visit around the town, would you think about settling down in a small town like this when you retire where you could fish and play golf to your heart's content...or would you be discouraged by the many buildings that need a coat of paint and some attention paid to their yards?

The reason we're bringing out these points is not to have folks up in arms about our opinions, but to create some interest in cleaning up around town and getting Clarendon to set its best foot forward when our visitors begin arriving a little over a month from now.

There are a lot of vacant lots overgrown with weeds and grass that need mowing, junked cars that should have been hauled off years ago and a lot of buildings along the highway could stand a new coat of paint.

The Chamber of Commerce has asked us to become involved with a special clean-up campaign in an effort to present the best appearance of which Clarendon is capable during the summer vacation months when thousands of cars will pass through town daily. Most of the work that needs to be done will take more effort than money and during the coming month, could be done easily if enough people get behind the campaign.

The City of Clarendon will be providing special trucks, taken off other jobs that demand attention, to haul off all accumulated trash and junk during a one week period in May. We urge everyone to get started this week and show all Clarendon has to offer our visitors.

From our what's-so-funny-about-it-department, Yewell Parker of Amarillo who is a sportsman first and an employee of KVII-TV second, was a visitor to Greenbelt Lake Saturday and Sunday. He put in a hard day of fishing Saturday and came up with a good stringer of bass which he kept alive until Sunday.

Intentions were to stage a bass fishing film for television use, using the Saturday catch to do the filming with Sunday. His largest bass of the day weighed in at six-pounds, 12-ounces...a beautiful fish in anybody's book.

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — Statistics and common sense indicate the 64th Legislature is heading for a wild and crowded finale, and that more bills will die than survive.

This is inevitable with more than 2,200 House bills and joint resolutions and nearly 1,100 Senate bills and joint resolutions introduced.

The system is overloaded, and the tabulations of unfinished business on legislative computers effectively turn on the warning lights.

Of about 2,400 House and Senate bills referred to House committees, fewer than 500 have emerged.

About 900 bills and important resolutions have been referred to Senate standing committees, and some 500 have come out.

With the exception of constitutional revision, which was effectively and promptly disposed of, most of the session's key business remains unfinished.

Budget bills are still in the Senate Finance and House Appropriations committees.

School finance reform measures are in sub-committees, and seem likely to stay there awhile. Agreement is far from reached on public utility regulatory legislation.

Legislators have their hands full in the next six weeks, and the facts are stacked against any easy way out.

STANDARDS COSTLY  
Federal water quality

standards may cost Texas cities, towns and industries more than \$6 billion before 1983, according to a Texas Water Quality Board inventory.

Federal requirements call for complete elimination of pollutional discharges into waters by that date.

The Federal Water Quality Act specifies that every river, stream, creek, lake and coastal area is to be fit for swimming, boating and fishing in eight years.

Texas Water Quality Board estimates the cleanup of city wastewater discharges would cost cities \$400 million a year if their part of the deadline is met. Industries would have to come up with another \$3 billion, TWQB estimated.

### CONSTITUTION SUBMITTED

Final concurrence by the Senate in House amendments to a proposed constitutional revision resolution sent the issue of a new constitution for Texas to a November 4 statewide ballot.

Campaigns already are shaping up for the eight-section article-by-article rewrite proposals, which are virtually identical to the final recommendation before the 1974 Constitutional Convention. Funds will be provided by the legislature for advertising the document and "educating" voters on its

### ALLOWABLE WIDE OPEN

The Railroad Commission again set the oil allowable at 100 per cent for May in spite of a minor decline in crude requests from national buyers.

Next month will be the 38th of wide-open production. East Texas Field, restricted to 86 per cent, is an exception.

### COURTS SPEAK

The Court of Criminal Appeals, by a 3-2 vote, upheld the 1973 Texas death penalty law which permits execution for several categories of murder. Thirteen men are on death row at Huntsville prison.

Texas Supreme Court held that a man who lost an eye in an oilfield accident can collect disability insurance only for that specific injury unless he can prove that other physical problems (including traumatic neurosis) are direct results of the eye loss.

A county clerk has authority to issue a marriage license even though it appears applicants have been divorced less than 30 days, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

A bill permitting veterans to defer paying tuitions and fees at colleges while awaiting federal benefits is constitutional.

A county can spend money to maintain and operate parks without holding an election to levy a park tax.

An investigative report of the Texas Real Estate Commission is public information and must be disclosed.

The College Coordinating Board and Vocational Education Board may refuse to re-new approval of out-of-dis-

### trict junior college course offerings.

A statute which bans bringing a child into the state for purpose of placing him for adoption is an unconstitutional infringement on right to travel.



It was my privilege to fly out to Lefors with Representative Phil Cates who represents District 66. I think the other members of the Legislature should know just what type of man Representative Cates showed himself to be in this disaster.

Although his own parents had suffered minor injuries, Phil was deeply concerned about all of the injured and their financial plight as a result of the storm. He toured the damaged area, stopping often to console those in need of consolation. He contacted every possible source of assistance, and when I left to return to Austin, he was setting up folding cots in the temporary shelter at the school.

Throughout this ordeal, Representative Cates conducted himself as a Christian gentleman, a Texan, and a responsible human being, and I want you to know that he brought credit to himself and the Legislature, even though he has personal losses.

Our Liaison Officer for the Panhandle area, Mr. Jack Schlueter, tells me that Phil stayed on the job assisting those in distress throughout

the weekend. Jack was also very impressed with the warm humanity shown by Representative Cates during this tragedy.

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
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## Musical Group To Present Concert At Baptist Church



Q. Several years ago I misplaced my birth certificate. As I will be 62 soon, is it necessary for me to get another copy? I have a passport, insurance policies, and a driver's license to prove my age.

A. Yes, if a public record of birth is available from the state in which you were born, we must have it in order to process your claim.

Q. I am collecting unemployment compensation. My social security checks will start in March. Will collecting unemployment affect my social security checks?

A. No. Only Wages for services rendered and net income from self-employment count towards the \$2,520 allowed each beneficiary in 1975.

Q. My husband signed up to Medicare when he was 65. However, he is not receiving checks because he is earning too much. I will be 65 next month and have never worked. Is there any reason why I should file now?

A. Yes, while you will not be able to receive checks on your husband's record until he does, you are entitled to Medicare protection and should sign up for it immediately.

Q. I am currently enrolled in the Medicare program. I have never received any checks because I have continued to work. I plan to stop work at the end of the month. When should I come in and apply for my social security? What should I bring with me?

A. You probably supplied us with all the applications and documents we need when you signed up for Medicare. Starting your checks is as simple as calling us at 806-376-2241. Almost all "stop work" notices can be handled over the telephone.

Q. At what minimum age may a person become entitled to Supplemental Security Income if they are unable to work?

A. There is no age limit on being entitled to Supplemental Security Income if the individual is unable to work and will remain so, for at least one year due to a medical reason.

Q. How severe must the condition be before a child could qualify for Supplemental Security Income?

A. The degree of severity must be so severe that the child would be unable to work even if here were an adult.



# Jericho Men Now Hunting Coyotes Near Alanreed

There two men and one child that have been doing a great service to the Northern and Eastern parts of Donley County since the first of the year.

The men are from Jericho, they are, Johnny Bill Hermesmeier, his brother Phillip E. Hermesmeier and Johnny's young son Shawn, who is five years old.

These fellows have been up at the crack of dawn, and sometimes earlier, to hunt, chase, and kill the dreaded coyote.

They have been doing this since their early childhood, when they went with their

father and uncles on these hunts. It is really enjoyed by them and is most appreciated by all who have let them hunt on their property.

For several years there has been several acres of farm land in the "Soil Bank". This caused a tremendous build up of coyotes and other varmints, some good, some bad.

There came a change in farming, all out production; the "Soil Bank" was plowed up, so, the coyotes that had lived on rats and rabbits had to go somewhere else---the cowman got them---then the Hermes-

meys took over.

The men use their trained dogs, which are most valuable, for the chase and kill, but, at times, they have used their guns when necessary.

Most of the hunts have been fairly close to home, with the exception of some hunts on the Jess Finley place and at a train wreck West of Jericho.

They have killed 69 with the use of the dogs, shot 7, one bobcat was also killed. About three miles West of Jericho a train killed some cattle that were on the track, 16 coyotes were killed there on various mornings and 5 on the Finley place.

Jess, our daughter and myself have been to the pasture and the wheatfield and seen anywhere from one to three coyotes chase down and kill a running calf. That is wanton destruction. These men have saved the cattlemen thousands of dollars---even though cattle are cheap.

The men have been known to get the pickup up to 85 or 90 miles a running to get even or head off a coyote. Those rascals can really get up and go.

Of course, the men's dogs really get up and go when the chase is on and a most remarkable sight it is to see when they do catch up with the coyote---the battle is on, and the dogs give no quarter.

Of course the men are always there with their guns in case of an emergency, but they are seldom needed with these fantastic dogs.

This is written in appreciation for the fine work these two men and one small boy have done. It is a great service to the people who have let them hunt as the coyotes were killing calves, which is costly to the cattlemen.

Now, for one small bit of humor. Shawn, Johnny's five year old, said that he likes to go hunting, but, that just a couple of things kind of get to him--it sure is early getting up and you sure do have to go fast to get ahead or catch up with them critters.

Once again, Johnny, Phillip, and Shawn, we most sincerely appreciate, as we are sure all the cattlemen do, your work, time, and effort in chasing these varmints down.

I am sure there will be many more of them for you to get out and get after--so GO GET 'EM BOYS.

## Fish Rodeo Gets First Weigh-Ins

Entrants in the three-month long fishing rodeo being sponsored by the Clarendon Chamber of Com-

merce began weighing in fish this week after three weeks of little or no activity.

Included among the fish weighed in at Mooring Place Marina, official headquarters for the rodeo, was a 13-pound Northern Pike caught Tuesday afternoon by Pete Darnell of Clarendon who now stands in first place to receive \$50 for the month of April for the largest Northern Pike or catfish.

Top weight in the panfish division is a one-pound, two-ounce crappie brought in by Rollie Adams of Clarendon. Tops among the bass and Walleye division is Billy Jack, also of Clarendon, with a bass tipping the scales at

four-pounds, two-ounces.

A total of 26 people had entered the contest as of late Tuesday. Many additional entries are anticipated. Greenbelt has had much larger fish brought in in each of the three categories.

Current lake records include a nine-pound, one-ounce bass caught less than two weeks ago, a 15-pound Northern Pike taken last year and a crappie weighing over three pounds which was caught about two years ago.
